

INDIA/GUJARAT: EARTHQUAKE

30 July 2001

appeal no. 04/2001

situation report no. 30

period covered: 29 June - 25 July 2001

A preliminary appeal was launched on 9 July 2001 to work with local communities during the rehabilitation phase after the major response during the relief period. A wide-ranging survey of needs is ongoing and the process has become part of the Indian Red Cross Society's institutional building. A plan of action in five areas is expected to be ready by mid-September.

The context

At 08.50 hours on Friday, 26 January, a series of powerful earthquakes struck Gujarat state in western India, peaking at a massive 7.9 on the Richter scale. Tremors were felt across several states as well as in Delhi and Mumbai (Bombay) and in neighbouring Pakistan. The epicentre was 30 km north of Bhuj - population 150,000 - the headquarters of Gujarat's Kutch district. The disaster affected a radius of 100 km, including Ahmadabad, the largest city in Gujarat.

Infrastructure has been severely damaged, resulting in collapsed buildings, mine cave-ins, train derailments, power failure and cut water supplies. A series of aftershocks - more than 400, including 19 measuring over 5 on the Richter scale - kept the population and the authorities on constant alert.

India is divided into five seismic zones and the Kutch area is close to the western margin of the Indian plate and falls into zone 5, which is prone to earthquakes. According to the 1991 census, the population of Kutch district was 1.2 million. It is estimated that before the earthquake it had reached 1.6 million.

Latest events

An earthquake of moderate intensity measuring 4.6 on the Richter scale was recorded in the Bhuj region on 1 July. There were no reported deaths or injuries.

Continuing heavy rain, while providing relief after three years of drought, is flooding tents which still shelter many beneficiaries. Those affected are either moving to higher ground or seeking temporary shelter elsewhere.

Local residents claim that this is the heaviest rain in 10 years. The 171 water dams, recently rehabilitated by the Red Cross water and sanitation teams, are full. The landscape has transformed with grass sprouting on what were vast dusty expanses of land. The rain is expected to continue through August.

It is almost six months since the earthquake struck and affected areas are recovering and people are returning home. The new school semester has started in Bhuj and children are benefiting from hygiene facilities and materials that have been donated.

Recovery, however, varies from town to town, with Bhuj showing stronger signs than many places. In areas such as Anjar, many people fled to larger cities and have not returned. Several communities are rebuilding their lives from scratch, having lost everything. In areas such as Bhauchau most people remain in temporary shelters. In addition, because of the loss of small businesses many people are unemployed.

Almost all angawadis - community-based, government-run integrated child development centres - require reconstruction. They are currently operating in partial building or tents. Although welcome, recent rains have led to an increase in cases of malaria.

Red Cross/Red Crescent action

Overview

The preliminary appeal was launched on 9 July seeking CHF 60.6 million in cash, kind and services to assist the recovery and rehabilitation phase for three years. Accompanying the release of the appeal were the respective programme documents: integrated health, water sanitation, private housing rehabilitation, capacity building, and programme management and coordination.

While a number of the projects under the appeal are being partly implemented - health, water sanitation, private housing, Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) organisational development - the rehabilitation phase in India officially began on 1 July, with the identification of new projects under the following names:

Work continues on finalising of the plan of action for each of the envisaged four programme areas, with the extended programme design/appeal document for the relief and recovery phase to be ready by mid-September.

With the previous Appeal No. 04/01, the International Federation sought CHF 25.6 million in cash, kind and services to assist 300,000 beneficiaries (60,000 families) for four months. It was aimed at supporting IRCS emergency relief activities in the most affected areas in the district of Kutch, state of Gujarat. The focus was to provide beneficiaries with shelter, health and medical services, safe water and other needed relief items. Forty Red Cross Red Crescent Societies and/or their governments responded to this appeal. The response included relief supplies and emergency response units (ERUs), offering the following services: a referral hospital, water and sanitation (two units), a mobile clinic, primary health care, logistics and telecommunications. The relief operation finished on 31 May, and the transition to rehabilitation began in June.

The emergency appeal was 149 per cent covered. The value of donations in cash was CHF 16 million and in kind CHF 22 million. A number of pledges for relief goods - recorded as received and distributed or used in the relief operation - amounting to approx. CHF 3 million, are still missing. Inquiries are being made with the donor national societies. The initial budget of CHF 25.6 million was not officially revised, and it is this that will be reported against in the final emergency operation report. The project cash balance after the emergency phase is about CHF 4.5 million, comprising of unearmarked funding. These funds will be utilised for setting up infrastructure - such as field offices, manpower, and logistics - for expected programming in the three-year rehabilitation phase. Prior to this, prospective donors of unearmarked funding will be requested to agree to transferring the emergency funds to the rehabilitation appeal.

Before the appeal launch, a strategic meeting was held in Delhi on Monday 2 July to discuss the reconstruction programme. Participants included the IRCS secretary general, the Federation's head of programme coordination, and the British Red Cross (BRC) head of international programmes. The meeting agreed a plan of action that calls for the BRC to start a pilot project to reconstruct approximately 50 anganwadis in Gujarat state. It will be consistent with the same standards and methodology and run parallel with the Federation-led programme to reconstruct 600 public health care facilities over the next two to three years.

The British Red Cross representatives, accompanied by the secretary general and the head of delegation subsequently visited Bhuj to view recovery activities, including hospital construction, water reclamation/harvesting and health programmes.

On Friday, 6 July the group met in Mumbai with the IRCS vice chairman to clarify the roles and relationships of the Red Cross partners in recovery and capacity building activities.

Health

The three-person Federation health team completed the first week of the training of trainers (TOT) programme in Kutch. Twenty-three trainers were selected from local communities to be trained in the dissemination and practice of community first aid, and methods for assessing community health needs. The trainers, who are IRCS employees, will be responsible for passing on their knowledge to 186 villages in Bhuj sub-district. Eventually, trainers will be given first aid kits to distribute to the villages to ensure coverage for basic first aid needs.

Federation health delegates accompanied teams of trainers in a practical health assessment exercise. Trainers are coached by the Federation health delegates on approach and lines of questioning. In addition to malaria, there has also been an increase in cases of diarrhoea. Many areas lack basic sanitation, such as running water or lavatories. Trainers are investigating conditions and programmes will be based on their findings.

Training will be ongoing, with smaller modules at specified intervals to update and increase the trainers' knowledge. To measure the impact of the programme, the 23 trainers will conduct a house to house survey based on an assessment of angawadi workers and cluster samples of 30 nearby households. This will be repeated annually.

Plans to train traditional birth attendants (TBA) have been made. The Federation and the IRCS will work with the UNFPA (United Nations Family Planning Agency) programme in Kutch. A three-week programme has

been designed by the IRCS intended to aid TBAs with prenatal care and identify high-risk pregnancies. IRCS will recruit midwives as trainers.

The Finnish Red Cross handed over ECHO-funded hospital equipment currently being used to the government on 16 July. All other non-medical equipment, such as tents and tools, will be handed over to the IRCS. Local hospital figures as of the end of June recorded the following statistics: 24,125 patients treated (4,947 in June); 377 cases of diarrhoea, nine cases of malaria; 29 deaths; 131 births; 317 X-rays; and 3,290 laboratory examinations.

Reconstruction

Two construction delegates are progressing with the field survey of angawadis. A total of 345 angawadis out of the 565 identified in Kutch, Jamnagar, Rajkot and Surendranagar have been assessed. Those buildings which have sustained severe damage will be levelled and new structures built. Despite the damage, the angawadis have been temporarily using tents. Quotes to build the temporary hospital in Bhuj are being sought.

The last delegate of the team for the private housing reconstruction project arrived and preparations are underway for setting up operations in Surendranagar. The team will support the IRCS to work with the government of Gujarat in reconstructing private houses to provide permanent homes. Beneficiaries will be trained in basic earthquake resistant building technologies to enable them to participate in the construction using the material banks to be established in selected villages. Reconstruction will represent an opportunity of the IRCS in terms of capacity building and recruitment of new skilled staff and volunteers.

From the operations base the team will implement the project, with an emphasis on including the local Red Cross branch in all activities. During the reporting period, the operations base was identified and outfitted, and administrative systems were put into place.

Water and sanitation

A total of 171 dams have been completed: 31 in Anjar; 27 in Bhachau; 36 in Bhuj; seven in Abdasa; 53 in Rapar; 10 in Lakhpat; seven in Nakhetrana; and the majority of work in Rapar completed. The dams are full as a result of heavy rain. Some of the larger dams contain sufficient supplies for up to three years.

The team's plans have been adjusted to accommodate the heavy rain. Work in Anjar, Rapar, Abdasa and Nakhatrana has slowed because of the wet conditions, consequently the team will commence with surveying in Rajkot, Surendranagar and Jamnagar.

The health awareness programme promoting good hygiene practices continues. The teams have visited 120 villages and distributed 11,156 neem trees and buckets. A total of 12,175 children and 5,380 women have benefited.

Federation water sanitation, health and construction delegates have remained in Bhuj actively working with affected communities in preparation of the implementation of rehabilitation programmes. Much of the work has involved assessments as well as training local staff and volunteers who will be instrumental in the planned programmes.

Organisational Development

In addition to the ongoing programmes, first aid training materials are being translated by the Federation staff into Gujarati and Hindi. On 6 July, the IRCS together with the Federation, finalised the service contract with ACNielsen to conduct the planned IRCS branch mapping and assessment. The agency will organise interviews with the 34 state and union territory branches and 650 district and sub-district branches of the IRCS. It will complete questionnaires, analyse data, and produce an extensive analysis as well as an IRCS branch profile directory. The countrywide survey will generate the baseline data, allowing the IRCS to identify how to improve branch services to the most vulnerable, and to measure impact. The survey will serve as a major management tool for the institutional change process for the IRCS.

Meanwhile, the organisational development delegate, the special officer to the secretary general IRCS, and ACNielsen piloted the data collection during the Red Cross secretaries meetings in Srinagar and Jammu, Kashmir.

The same team designed a Red Cross orientation workshop on 13 July for ACNielsen regional research managers, who will train their field data collectors. During the reporting period questionnaires were distributed to the branches, accompanied by a letter from the IRCS secretary general, stressing the importance of the exercise for improving the National Society's ability to manage humanitarian challenges.

Logistics

Logistics team staffing has been adjusted following the clarification of changing operational needs. A new fleet manager has been designated to ensure vehicle safety, establish procedures for the delegation, and maintain high standards and flexibility for the operational departments. The fleet manager also provides support and advice concerning vehicles.

Three logistics delegates, including the coordinator during the relief phase, have left or will be leaving by the end of the month.

Federation delegates, together with three local staff and representatives of the IRCS, are currently buying new vehicles. The process involves identification of specifications, possible in-country models, rigorous testing, short listing suppliers and awarding of a contract.

Because of the high level of delegate travel in the field, an assessment of alternative transportation, including air charter, is being conducted.

A proposal for a workshop on "tabling of RubHalls" (warehouse tent) was submitted to the Federation disaster preparedness delegate in support of the development of the IRCS's capacity in disaster preparedness.

Telecommunications

The delegation has procured eight satellite telephones for delegate security, to be used in emergencies. Satellite communication is viewed as the short to medium term solution as part of a security plan. HF and VHF communications is being explored as a longer term strategy. Radio communication is a challenge for several reasons including securing a license in an area with a high military presence as well as because of the local topography.

The inventory of all IT/Telecom assets has been completed for the Bhuj compound and Delhi operations centre. The telecom delegate will now conduct a similar review in Ahmedabad.

Delegation

Three delegates have departed while the head of sub-delegation, reporting and finance delegates for the Ahmedabad office arrived. Federation activities in Bhuj will move from the Red Cross camp at Lalan college. Delegates are investigating alternatives. Precautions against malaria are being taken such as residual spraying of the living compound. Delegates working in Bhuj have begun language classes in Hindi.

Outstanding needs

Outstanding needs have been outlined in the preliminary appeal for the recovery and rehabilitation phase and the respective programme documents. The delegation team continues to change as the final delegates from the relief and transition phase depart and the new human resource needs are addressed.

External relations - Government/UN/NGOs/Media

Media

A French photojournalist arrived in Bhuj and will focus on the ongoing aid operation and current situation for beneficiaries.
