## INDONESIA: YOGYAKARTA EARTHQUAKE

- Revised appeal was launched on 6 June for CHF 38 million to assist 325,000 beneficiaries for 12 months

#### Operational Summary:

In solidarity of the Yogyakarta earthquake survivors, fellow Indonesians from other parts of the country have volunteered to engage in the housing reconstruction of disaster-affected communities. Through continuous support of PMI volunteers and staff as well as the Federation secretariat, expanded operational capacity lead to a scale up of beneficiaries in the emergency relief sector, where target families have increased from 65,000 to 90,000. To date, relief distribution has reached approximately 87,600 families, with more than 85,000 families receiving shelter material. The plans of action for programmes are being finalized as the operation transitions into the rehabilitation phase. With the appeal now over 70% covered, the Federation wishes to thank the continuous strong financial support by sister societies, governments, ECHO, other international organizations and private donors.

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## Background

An earthquake with a magnitude of 6.3 on the Richter scale struck near the city of Yogyakarta in Central Java at 05:54 hrs local time on 27 May 2006. Causing extreme and widespread destruction, there has been considerable loss of lives and injuries, with villages in more remote areas south of Yogyakarta as well as in and around Bantul most severely affected. The earthquake epicentre was located some 20 km south-southeast of Yogyakarta at a depth of 10 km. Tremors were felt across the region, as far away as Semarang and Surabaya on the opposite coast of Java.

## Operational developments

Indonesian communities continue to mobilize their own resources in the reconstruction of their earthquake-damaged houses. In the spirit and cultural practice of mutual assistance or *gotong royong*, Indonesians from outside Yogyakarta have travelled to disaster areas to assist villagers in the clean up and reconstruction. Many volunteers from different parts of Indonesia have also joined the PMI and Federation since the start of the operation to deliver assistance to many affected communities.

After detailed needs assessments of the affected communities and through the dedication and commitment of PMI volunteers, staff and the Federation delegation, the operation plans to scale up operational capacity for relief, expanding the target beneficiaries to 90,000 families. To date, approximately more than 87,600 families have received relief supplies, with more than 85,000 from this figure receiving shelter materials. To reach the additional 25,000 families without increasing the appeal budget, funds initially planned to provide 65,000 families with a relief package for a second month as per the plan of action will be diverted, enabling the operation to reach more people, many of whom still face great vulnerability. These additional 25,000 families will receive a complete relief package that consists of supplies that can fulfil their shelter, food and hygiene needs. Based on assessment, this approach is more critical as the initial 65,000 families have already benefited from an earlier relief package of hygiene, food and baby parcels.

Plans to increase target beneficiaries for relief is still being finalized and harmonized with plans from other sectors and will be reflected in future updates. In the meantime, an operational plan of action is under preparation, which also outlines an operational budget and staff requirements.

The Federation secretariat and partner national societies continue working with the PMI in relief, water and sanitation and health. Currently, more than 120 PMI volunteers from Java and other districts are still actively providing relief support to affected communities in Bantul, Sleman, Klaten and Kulon Progo districts, in coordination with the Federation delegation and partner national societies. Volunteers further support communities in health and water and sanitation, particularly in Bantul and Klaten, where cleaning of wells and distribution of water is ongoing: 106 wells have been cleaned in Klaten and 30,000 litres of water distributed in Bantul. Considering the possible outbreak and spread of a pandemic, the PMI has started spraying insecticide in Sleman and Klaten districts. In Bantul, 376 earthquake survivors were treated by PMI mobile clinics. Volunteers also provide support to ongoing psychosocial programmes.

Human resources within the Federation operation continue to stabilize, with longer-term delegates in place. As the operation settles and the emergency phase ends, the need for ongoing support from other offices in Indonesia has diminished and all staff-on-loan from the tsunami are expected to return by the end of July.

Beyond the emergency phase, partner national societies (PNS) continue to support and the operation and are developing longer-term strategies. The German Red Cross has closed its water purifying plant and handed it over

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to the PMI. It is now moving into early recovery projects, having submitted a proposal to the Humanitarian Aid Department of the European Commission (ECHO) that targets assistance to 6,000 families in the distribution of building materials for three months (July to September).

With the status of Mt. Merapi now lowered from “caution” to alert, many are returning home. The number of people displaced has remained at 3,150. The villages of Gandang, Batu, Gading, Ngancar, Singlar, Pagerjuran and Ngemplak are receiving 79,500 litres of water daily from the PMI water and sanitation team, which is especially critical where water sources are scarce or contaminated. As part of the preparedness programme, the PMI has opened a clinic at its office in Sleman. An ambulance is on standby 24 hours in case of an eruption of Mt Merapi.

## Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress, impact

### Emergency relief (food, non-food and emergency shelter)

**Overall Goal: Beneficiaries have the necessary immediate support to meet their basic needs for food, non-food items and shelter until their permanent needs are met for the long-term.**

#### Objectives:

- **Food:** 65,000 families (approximately 325,000 beneficiaries) have supplementary food support until such time as they are able to resume their own income generating activities.
- **Non-food items:** 65,000 families (approximately 325,000 beneficiaries) have the necessary household items and basic economic support to restore domestic stability, and their own capacity to initiate their recovery is reinforced.
- **Emergency shelter:** 65,000 families (approximately 325,000 beneficiaries) are provided with the appropriate type of emergency shelter, tools and materials to support their immediate recovery needs, with consideration of temporary, intermediate requirements for coping with the pending monsoon rain season that normally starts in September/October.

The relief plan is being updated based on ongoing assessment of beneficiary needs, PMI branch capacities and the current operating budget, and will be further harmonized with the plans, beneficiary targets and budgets of other programmes. The initial target to reach 65,000 families with relief supplies for two months is being revised to provide 90,000 families (450,000 beneficiaries) with a complete package of supplies for one month, without altering the overall emergency appeal budget. The shift will refocus PMI capacity to meet the immediate needs of the most vulnerable families still suffering from lack of shelter, food and hygiene supplies. These families will also benefit from community tool kits that will aid the process of rebuilding their homes.

Each of the 90,000 families will receive an updated relief package that includes: one tent or tarpaulin, a hygiene kit, a food parcel, a baby kit if the family has children under five, two sleeping mats and two sarongs. As noted in the distribution table below, many families have only received shelter and hygiene materials. PMI distribution teams are now returning to fill in gaps to ensure all 90,000 targeted families will receive the complete package.

A one day relief coordination meeting was held with PMI relief teams from affected sub-districts. Key aspects of the ongoing operation were discussed, including assessment methodology, distribution techniques and monitoring activities. All branches agreed on best practices that will be incorporated into a policy document for PMI leadership. In addition, draft guidelines for the upcoming tool kit distribution were put forward for branches to provide feedback on.

Piloting of distribution monitoring tool continues. Based on initial surveys, some questions were reworded to better capture required information. Random sampling of distribution sites and families within all sub-districts will ensure wide coverage and good representation.

### Early recovery

The early recovery programme, designed to empower communities to develop coping strategies to ensure all families living in tarpaulins or tents can move into a roofed, walled structure within three months, began with volunteers conducting a survey of villages in one of the target areas this week. Groups within communities will be invited to map the current situation, their capacities and shortfalls, identify who are the most vulnerable and make a strategy to ensure all families have a shelter by the time the rainy season starts. Community groups will be invited to define how the available resources should be used and support will be provided through community bank accounts in tranches. This will allow community groups, supported by PMI volunteers and other village volunteers, to maximize available resources in undertaking an early recovery.

A cooperation agreement between the architecture faculty of Atma Jaya University, PMI and Sanata Dharma was signed by both rectors and PMI Yogyakarta this week. Up to 150 university undergraduate volunteers attended a one-day briefing on safe shelter construction. The university volunteers, together with PMI volunteers and the Federation delegation, have completed the sub-village surveys in Gantiwarno. The data will be cross-checked with relief data and made available by next week to all the agencies. Health kits and distributions to fill gaps in earlier relief efforts will start next week in coordination with relief teams in Klaten.

A bamboo consultant to the Federation delegation has joined a team of bamboo experts to explore the applicability of local methods on the use of bamboo in temporary shelter. The consultant will produce materials and give input for sensible bamboo design and responsible use after attending a national seminar on bamboo this week.

### Logistics support

Tarpaulins from Canadian and Belgium Red Cross, food parcels, a consignment of tarpaulins and 14,000 hygiene parcels are expected to arrive by the beginning of next week. The tender procedure for tool kits is ending this week and the first shipment is expected end of next week.

As IOM cuts down the number of fleet, the Federation has made adjustments accordingly, with the 32-truck fleet reducing by five trucks every week. The Federation has planned a day-to-day training on standards of fleet management for the fleet manager assigned by the PMI.

All stock from a PMI warehouse damaged by the earthquake has moved to the central warehouse. The mobilization table for the Yogyakarta earthquake operation and appeal is available on the Federation's disaster management information system (DMIS) at [this link](#).

### Shelter Cluster Group

In addition to the distribution of emergency shelter materials and key household items, shelter activities include publicity on safe clean up, a cross-cluster survey, development of materials and guidelines and intensive policy dialogue with the Department of Public Works of the government.

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The Federation/PMI, through the Emergency Cluster Coordination Group, have supported the development of a poster which publicizes safe and environmentally responsible cleanup methods. This is currently being distributed widely among the PMI and other agencies.

The strong involvement of the Federation has helped ensure the success of an interagency cross-cluster survey, with the Federation playing a key role in developing a statistically strong methodology and leading teams of volunteers recruited from the local universities. The broad range of survey questions means the results will have relevance for all the Federation programme areas. Analysis is ongoing and results will be distributed to all agencies next week. Guidelines on materials to strengthen emergency shelters and provide better shelter for families as the rainy season approaches are also being prepared by the Federation, as part of the cluster group.

Discussions with the Department of Public Works are focusing on the immediate need for shelter to protect the quake-affected people from anticipated rains. A new strategic framework for transitional shelter is being developed by the shelter cluster group to guide shelter projects in the interim period before permanent houses are constructed.

## Health and Care

**Overall goal: The mortality and morbidity amongst the affected population is reduced to pre-disaster levels by addressing immediate basic health care needs and future health risks through preventative and basic health care interventions.**

Epidemiological data from the World Health Organization reports only two new cases of tetanus, bringing the total to 79 cases and 29 deaths (crude fatality rate – 36 percent). Seven typhoid cases have been reported in Yogyakarta city and three cases in Gunungkidul, however investigation is ongoing. Both diarrhoeal disease and acute respiratory infections are decreasing. The second round of immunization by the ministry of health (MOH) is underway, although figures are not yet available on targets achieved to date.

The MOH reports a total of 144 mental health cases since the earthquake and of those, 30 new cases have been identified. Further investigation of these figures is required to determine whether the incidence is unusual for the area.

**Objective 1: To provide psycho-social support programmes (PSP) to affected communities in districts severely affected by the earthquake and to PMI volunteers supporting the response.**

PMI activities in the psychosocial programme continue in Bantul, Klaten and Sleman districts, with over 1,500 children reached across all districts during June. The low numbers of trained local volunteers continue to inhibit the delivery of PSP, with volunteers coming from outside central Java to deliver the programme. Discussions with PMI and partner national societies are ongoing to formulate an action plan for the psychosocial programme.

**Objective 2: Reduce the impact of the most common diseases and ailments seen in post disaster situations, including epidemics.**

Health promotion messages on communicable diseases, immunization, free health care access, injury and disability prevention, mental health and reproductive health are being developed within the health promotion sub-cluster. The Federation delegation and partner national societies continue to work with PMI to provide follow-up care of earthquake injuries through the mobile clinics.

**Objective 3: To provide 325,000 beneficiaries with access to preventive, basic clinical and physical health and rehabilitation services.**

The mobile medical teams have visited the villages in the affected districts of Bantul and Sleman. The hospital and two mobile clinics in Bantul have administered wound care and provided other necessary services to 359 patients in Demangan, Pendowoharjo, Sewon, Banguntapan, Srungo I and Pucung Growong Kerang villages. Two mobile clinics in Sleman have served 159 patients in the villages of Tanpungan, Sandangtirto, Berhah, Klodangan and

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Kuncen. None of the patients have required hospital referrals. No life-threatening cases have been reported to date, and most cases are the under control of local health personnel.

In close collaboration with PMI Yogyakarta medical team, the Federation health team continues to monitor the general health situation in the earthquake stricken and Mount Merapi areas. Monitoring and observation of the health situation of the IDP camps in Gunung Kedul, Kulon Progo district is also ongoing. However, the gathering of statistics for health remains a challenge, with the reporting of statistics from the field and branches requiring further coordination. To address these issues, the delegation is working with the PMI to implement mechanisms for better compilation of data and statistical information. With longer-term health and water and sanitation coordinators now in place to follow up, this process is expected to move forward.

**Objective 4: To support and coordinate efforts with Movement partners and international partners in support to the PMI and its government (MOH).**

The Federation team continues to attend health cluster meetings in order to identify the gaps in health care provision and actively participate in the rehabilitation sub-cluster group. Recently, the MOH has supplied mobile health units for some areas as a temporary measure. Handicap International has long-standing facilities and projects for disabled people. MSF France has started physiotherapy services in Jetis. The MOH and PMI are aware of these facilities and are able to refer patients to them.

**Objective 5: To ensure the target population has access to adequate and safe water supply, sanitation and hygiene promotion, materials and facilities to prevent significant outbreaks of water supply, sanitation and hygiene related disease.**

Reports from Bantul area show that almost all the wells near Opa River are dry, and discussions are underway on mechanisms to address the problem. Three IDP camps are being set up by local authorities for Kulon Progo, Jatimulyo where the sub-district has asked the Red Cross for further assistance on water and sanitation services for 274 beneficiaries in the hillside community. A proposal is being prepared to support them. In the meantime, the PMI/ Federation will resume hygiene promotion alongside hygiene kit distribution in Klaten district.

The German Red Cross (GRC) handed over the water treatment plant to the PMI. Training of PMI volunteers in Bantul on operating the plant has been completed by the GRC. The German water and sanitation team plans to exit next week.

The Spanish Red Cross (SRC) and PMI have stopped distributing water in Bantul, but are still trucking water in Sleman for 7,000 people. PMI/SRC have moved the equipment for water treatment from Bantul to Sleman for standby on Merapi. The SRC will also support local communities by rebuilding 2,500 latrines of the 3,200 identified in the Federation appeal, clean up wells and provide manual water pumps.
