## Philippines: Floods

This Preliminary Emergency Appeal seeks CHF 922,700 in cash, kind, or services to support the Philippine Red Cross to assist 15,000 families (some 75,000 persons) for 5 months. The operation will be completed by 31 December 2012 and a final report will be made available by 31 March 2013 (three months after the end of operation).

CHF 180,837 has been advanced from the Disaster Relief Emergency Fund (DREF) to initiate distributions and to support detailed assessments.

**Summary:** The Philippines have been battered by the heaviest rains recorded in three years, affecting up to two million people across the country. The rains have been fuelled by the southwest monsoon enhanced by two storms – initially Typhoon

Saola and Tropical Storm Haikui. According to the Philippine Atmospheric Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA), from 6 to 8 August, the monsoon downpour exceeded half of the average monthly rainfall in August. Flood waters caught many residents by surprise and swamped swathes of land in the capital Manila and neighbouring provinces. The National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) reports at least 19 people killed to date. As well as casualties, the flooding has damaged 2,677 houses, destroyed 358 others and forced over 292,000 persons to seek temporary shelter in evacuation centres while the rest are with friends and relatives.

The Philippine Red Cross (PRC) has been on the ground responding to the immediate needs of flood-stricken families. As well as conducting search and rescue operations, the National Society has supported pre-emptive evacuation of people living in high-risk areas and delivered a range of services, mainly to affected persons in evacuation centres. As of 9 August, PRC had provided ready to eat meals to some 22,000 persons in evacuation centres, provided emergency food packages to more than 30,000 individuals and delivered non-food items to 5,000 others. Red Cross staff and volunteers have also provided psychosocial support and referral services to displaced families in evacuation centres.

Relief distributions continue and pre-positioned stocks are being released for immediate dispatch to the most affected areas. Intensive distributions will be conducted beginning 10 August 2012, and will continue in the following weeks as access to marooned areas improves. The PRC has in stock, items sufficient to meet the needs of at least 30,000 families; these include IFRC-provided stocks that are adequate for 12,000 families.

At the moment, PRC have prepared assessment teams to be deployed to conduct more detailed assessments as

soon as access to flooded sections improves. Nevertheless, based on reports from its chapters and review of secondary data and media reports, there are needs that the National Society has to meet immediately. As such, this appeal is being launched on a preliminary basis. Adjustments to the plan and budget will be done in the coming weeks based on assessment results.

Through this intervention, PRC will deliver two-day food packages to 15,000 families, sleeping materials (blankets and sleeping mats) and jerry cans to 15,000 families and hygiene kits to 10,000 families. PRC will also undertake disease prevention, health and hygiene education to 10,000 families, and support environmental sanitation efforts by conducting cleaning campaigns in communities as floodwater recedes. Owing to concerns relating to potential incidence of leptospirosis and diarrhoeal diseases in flooded areas, PRC is also making a provision to have medical support, oral re-hydration solutions and water treatment solutions ready for provision to those who may need. The National Society will provide psychosocial support to affected persons as well as staff and volunteers responding to the needs on the ground. To meet immediate water needs of those in evacuation centres, PRC will supply clean water – through trucking and setting up bladders for distribution points – to centres in most need. Finally, to increase the capacity of PRC to respond to hydro-meteorological disasters, one chapter will be supported in forming, training and equipping a search and rescue team.

## The situation

Heavy rains fuelled by the southwest monsoon enhanced by two storms – initially Typhoon Saola and Tropical Storm Haikui – have been battering the Philippines since the first weekend of August. The rains caused some dams to overflow, turning rivers and streams which run through heavily populated urban areas into raging torrents that burst their banks and flooded large swathes of land, mainly in the National Capital Region and neighbouring provinces.

The latest update from the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) reports that the floods have already killed 19 persons and injured 4 others. As well as casualties, the floods damaged 2,677 houses and destroyed 358 others. In total, nearly 2 million persons have been affected across six regions. Currently, 488 evacuation centres serve as temporary homes to over 292,000 persons. The floods also wrought damage to roads and bridges, as well as public buildings. Authorities of 10 cities in the National Capital Region as well as six provinces in Central Luzon, CALABARZON<sup>1</sup> and MIMAROPA<sup>2</sup> have declared a state of calamity due to severe flooding.

According to the Philippine Atmospheric Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA), from 6 to 8 August, the monsoon downpour to date exceeded half of the average monthly rainfall in August. Flood

waters caught many residents by surprise and swamped swathes of land in the capital Manila and neighbouring provinces. The floods have been compared to those caused by Typhoon Ketsana in 2009, considered the worst in the Philippines' recent history, as water level in parts of in Metro Manila reached up to two metres.

Given its response to frequent disasters in the country, the Philippine Red Cross (PRC) has gained extensive experience and knowledge in undertaking massive relief programmes. The National Society has consistently provided quality humanitarian services through its pool of trained, skilled and highly experienced staff and volunteers drawn from all facets of the community. Building on this experience and based on its mandate outlined in 'Republic Act No. 10072' [also known as Philippine Red Cross Act of 2009], PRC has the responsibility to alleviate human suffering. As such, it needs the support of in-country and international partners to deliver much-needed assistance.

## Coordination and partnerships

**Movement coordination:** Coordination is crucial for the success of this operation. The Red Cross Red Crescent operational coordination mechanism is active and PRC is providing updates on its response plan. It is upon a request from the PRC that IFRC is issuing this Preliminary Emergency. Partners continue to hold coordination meetings to discuss the latest developments, with representatives of the IFRC, ICRC, Australian Red Cross, German Red Cross, Spanish Red Cross, and the Netherlands Red Cross based in-country participating.

**Coordinating with authorities:** As an auxiliary to public authorities – and as mandated in Republic Act 10072 – PRC maintains a strong relationship with government bodies through participation or collaboration with the following: (i) the NDRRMC; (ii) provincial, municipal and barangay disaster risk reduction and management councils; and (iii) local government units. The National Society participates in NDRRMC meetings and coordinates with the department of social welfare and development (DSWD), especially in the shortlisting of beneficiary lists.

**Inter-agency coordination:** PRC and the IFRC country office participate in humanitarian country team (HCT) meetings, with the latest meeting held on 9 August 2012. The Red Cross Red Crescent – either through PRC, IFRC, German Red Cross or Spanish Red Cross – is represented in meetings and working groups of relevant clusters. IFRC and PRC are also maintaining close collaboration with other partners, including the European Commission's Humanitarian Office (DG ECHO) and civil protection.

## Red Cross and Red Crescent action

PRC has been on the ground responding to immediate needs of flood-stricken families. As well as conducting search and rescue operations, the National Society has supported the pre-emptive evacuation of people living in high-risk areas and delivered a range of services, mainly to affected persons in evacuation centres.

As of 9 August, PRC had provided ready to eat meals to some 22,000 persons in evacuation centres, provided emergency food packages to more than 30,000 individuals and delivered non-food items to 5,000 others. Red Cross staff and volunteers have also provided psychosocial support and referral services to displaced families in evacuation centres.

Relief assistance by the National Society has thus far covered Caloocan, Malabon, Quezon, and Valenzuela cities of Metro Manila, Olongapo City, and the provinces of Bataan, Bulacan, Laguna, Rizal, Pampanga and Pangasinan, among other affected areas. Relief distributions will be intensified in the coming days using pre-positioned stocks and funds made available from DREF. The PRC has in stock items sufficient to meet the needs of at least 30,000 families; these include IFRC-provided stocks that are adequate for 12,000 families. As such, a proportion of the resources raised through this appeal will be used to replenish the stocks to ensure that the PRC's capacity to respond swiftly in future potential disasters is not weakened.

Procurement of food items, blankets, jerry cans and sleeping mats will be done locally in accordance with IFRC and PRC procedures and policies. Hygiene kits will be procured from outside the Philippines within the context of existing IFRC framework agreements.

## The needs

At the moment, PRC have prepared assessment teams to be deployed to conduct more detailed assessments as soon as access to flooded sections improves. Nevertheless, based on reports from its chapters and review of secondary data – including updates from NDRRMC and local disaster risk reduction and management councils

and media reports - the National Society has determined needs that it has to address immediately. As such, this appeal is being launched on a preliminary basis. Adjustments to the plan and budget will be done in the coming weeks based on assessment results.

#### **Food and non-food relief:**

Food stocks and household items have been damaged by floodwater, leaving some families dependent on relief support. A number of organizations have distributed food and non-food packs, but gaps exist. This operation will thus provide emergency food and non-food relief packages to 15,000 families and hygiene kits for 10,000 families. The food package will comprise five kilos of rice, five packs of noodles, five cans of sardines, a packet of iodized salt and half litre of cooking oil. The non-food package will be composed of two blankets, two sleeping mats and one 20-litre jerry can. A standard PRC hygiene kit contains five toothbrushes, a tube toothpaste, a bottle of shampoo, five pieces of bathing soap, five plastic combs, a pack cotton buds (with 200 pieces), a pack of sanitary napkins (with 10 pieces), a nail cutter/clipper, a bar of washing soap, two packs of disposable razors, two rolls of toilet paper and five face towels.

#### **Health and hygiene:**

The Department of Health (DOH) has urged the public to take precautions to make drinking water safe amidst possible contamination after the continuous heavy rainfall and flooding in Metro Manila and nearby provinces. Furthermore it issued a leptospirosis alert and advised that those who will continue to be exposed in possibly contaminated flood water should consider medical treatment (antibiotics) as a preventative action.

The environmental health and hygiene situation is of serious concern, as some waterborne diseases such as diarrhea, and skin diseases are increasing in flooded areas where water is becoming unsafe. Garbage collection has been disrupted and resulted to open dumping in flooded communities. There are also instances where some latrines are damaged and/or submerged, and as a result, people are practicing open defecation. People living in these areas are at high risk, thus the need for disease prevention, health and hygiene education.

This operation will support disease prevention, health and hygiene education for 10,000 families. This will be complemented by the distribution of hygiene kits. There is also the need to provide psychosocial support to affected persons as well as staff and volunteers responding to the needs on the ground.

#### **Water and sanitation:**

To meet immediate water needs of those in evacuation centres, PRC will supply clean water – through trucking and bladders – to centres in most need. Jerry cans, for water storage, will be provided alongside sleeping materials. On case-by-case basis, water purification solutions will be provided. Additionally, as floodwater recedes, cleaning campaigns in communities will be required to improve environmental sanitation.

#### **Disaster preparedness and response capacity:**

In addition to meeting the direct needs of affected people, the operation will support the enhancement of PRC's capacity to respond to future potential disasters. Water search and rescue teams played a crucial role during the emergency phase, and as such, the concept will need to be improved upon by forming, training and equipping one additional search and rescue team, building on actions undertaken through previous operations.

### **The proposed operation**

This preliminary emergency appeal operation will focus on providing relief support to assist 15,000 families (75,000 people). The sectors to be supported are as follows: food distributions (two-day rations); relief distributions (sleeping materials); health and hygiene promotion; water and sanitation (provision of water containers and hygiene kits); and; national society disaster response capacity enhancement. However, adjustments to the plan and budget will be done in the coming weeks based on the results of further assessments to be conducted. This operation will cover Caloocan, Malabon, Quezon, and Valenzuela cities of Metro Manila, Olongapo City, and the provinces of Bataan, Bulacan, Laguna, Rizal, Pampanga and Pangasinan, among other affected areas.

Due to limited access to certain areas, while flood levels remain high, the preliminary emergency appeal is estimating the target beneficiary numbers according to current data. These numbers may evolve as access is gained and further assessments take place.

Throughout the operation, IFRC will provide technical materials and technical support to PRC. Delegates engaged for this intervention will support PRC training opportunities by facilitating relevant sessions based on

their expertise. All trainings related to the operation will refer to the 2011 Sphere<sup>3</sup> standards.

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### Water and sanitation

### National society disaster preparedness and capacity building

### Logistics

Professional logistics support to the operation will be provided in accordance with IFRC standards, procedures and processes. Activities will include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Mobilizing relief items pre-positioned in IFRC's zone logistics unit (ZLU) in Kuala Lumpur for emergencies and ongoing operations.
- Coordinating within IFRC and PRC programme managers and the zone logistics unit in Kuala Lumpur for timely and cost-efficient sourcing option for items required in the operation
- Coordinating mobilization of goods and reception of incoming shipments
- Utilizing existing warehousing facilities and vehicles for storage and efficient dispatch of goods to the final distribution points
- Supporting PRC in securing adequate storage solutions
- Ensuring that local procurement of goods, services and transport is in line with IFRC procurement standards and procedures
- Liaising and coordinating actions with other key actors so that the IFRC logistics operation processes use all information to be as efficient and effective as possible

The PRC and IFRC are encouraging the local procurement of relief items to respond to needs in the field. As such, donors should coordinate with the ZLU regarding outstanding needs. The ZLU will coordinate with the country team to address gaps to be covered. Thus far, relief distributions have drawn largely from the DREF advance and pre-positioned stocks.

### Communications – Advocacy and Public information

Maintaining a steady flow of timely and accurate information between the field and other major stakeholders is vital for fundraising, advocacy and maintaining the profile of emergency operations. A steady flow of timely and accurate information will be maintained between those working in the field and other stakeholders, including the media and donors, to promote greater quality, accountability, and transparency.

Communications support to this operation will ensure that needs, achievements and challenges are profiled to enhance funding, other support, accountability and to provide a platform for advocating in the interests of flood-affected populations. Donors and national societies will receive information and materials they can use to promote the operation. Relevant information and publicity materials will be channelled through IFRC's public website, [www.ifrc.org](http://www.ifrc.org), as well as PRC website, [www.redcross.org.ph](http://www.redcross.org.ph).

Activities will include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Producing press releases, news stories and beneficiary case studies
- Proactive engagement with media (international based in the Philippines and international based around the world) to highlight the needs of the storm-affected and to profile the response of the Red Cross. This will include the use of established IFRC social media tools
- Developing packages and audio-visual products for distribution to partner national societies, partner organizations and media
- Developing and producing communications products that highlight achievements of the operation.
- Supporting field visits by interested colleagues from partner national societies and donor agencies
- Supporting programme teams in designing and producing project-specific materials, including forms, banners, pamphlets, brochures, posters and signage
- Supporting programme teams to ensure consistent and two-way engagement with beneficiaries as part of the IFRC's commitment to greater accountability to affected communities.

### Capacity of the National Society

PRC is the nation's largest humanitarian organization and is recognized by 'Republic Act No. 10072' – also known as 'Philippine Red Cross Act of 2009' – as an independent, autonomous organization auxiliary to the authorities in the humanitarian field. The PRC works through 100 chapters covering all administrative districts and major cities of the nation. In delivering services, PRC relies on a team of skilled, trained and experienced staff and volunteers with different specializations. Currently, it has approximately 1,000 staff at the national headquarters and chapter levels and approximately one million volunteers and supporters, some 500,000 of them active volunteers. Below the national headquarters level, a professional administrator, who doubles as the manager in charge of operations and administrative functions, represents each chapter of PRC.

The PRC is in partnership with a number of national societies, some maintaining offices in the Philippines. Australian Red Cross, German Red Cross, Japanese Red Cross Society, Spanish Red Cross and the Netherlands Red Cross maintain offices within PRC. PRC also enjoys a close working relationship with many other partner national societies and works closely with the ICRC.

Outside the Movement, PRC works in partnership with the government and non-government agencies as well as private groups in achieving effective networking and delivery of services. It is the only organization outside the government structure that has a wide network, presence and mandate, ranging from the capital, Manila, to the grassroots level.

### Capacity of the IFRC

IFRC maintains a country office in the Philippines, housed within PRC's national headquarters. The office is headed by a country representative and has three delegates and eight staff supporting an ongoing operation in responses. The three existing delegates and eight staff [specializing in finance and administration, logistics, relief/recovery, reporting and communications, shelter, water and sanitation] will take on additional

responsibilities relating to this operation. In addition, the country office will be strengthened with a field delegate and a logistics delegate, who will support this operation. The IFRC Southeast Asia regional office in Bangkok and the IFRC Asia-Pacific zone office in Kuala Lumpur are also available to provide technical and operational assistance in the following areas: communications; finance; health, water and sanitation; logistics; operation coordination, resource mobilization, and; planning, monitoring, evaluation and reporting.

### **Lessons learned**

The PRC and IFRC are committed to improving the quality of their humanitarian programmes. As a contribution to meeting this commitment, PRC, supported by its partners, will capture lessons for this operation. The IFRC will facilitate a lessons learned workshop at the end of this operation with the aim of determining the quality of the initial response, identifying areas that needed improvement and capturing early lessons learnt. Throughout the operation, PRC and the IFRC country office will facilitate monitoring visits by interested partners.

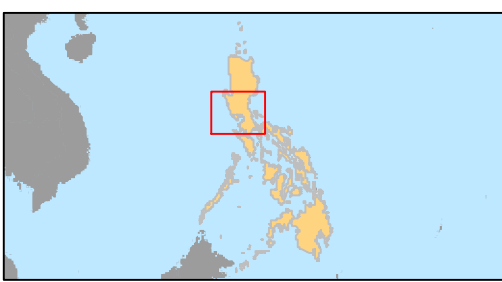
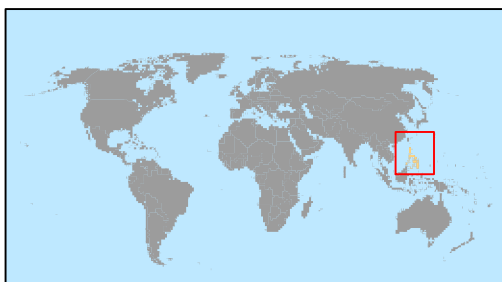
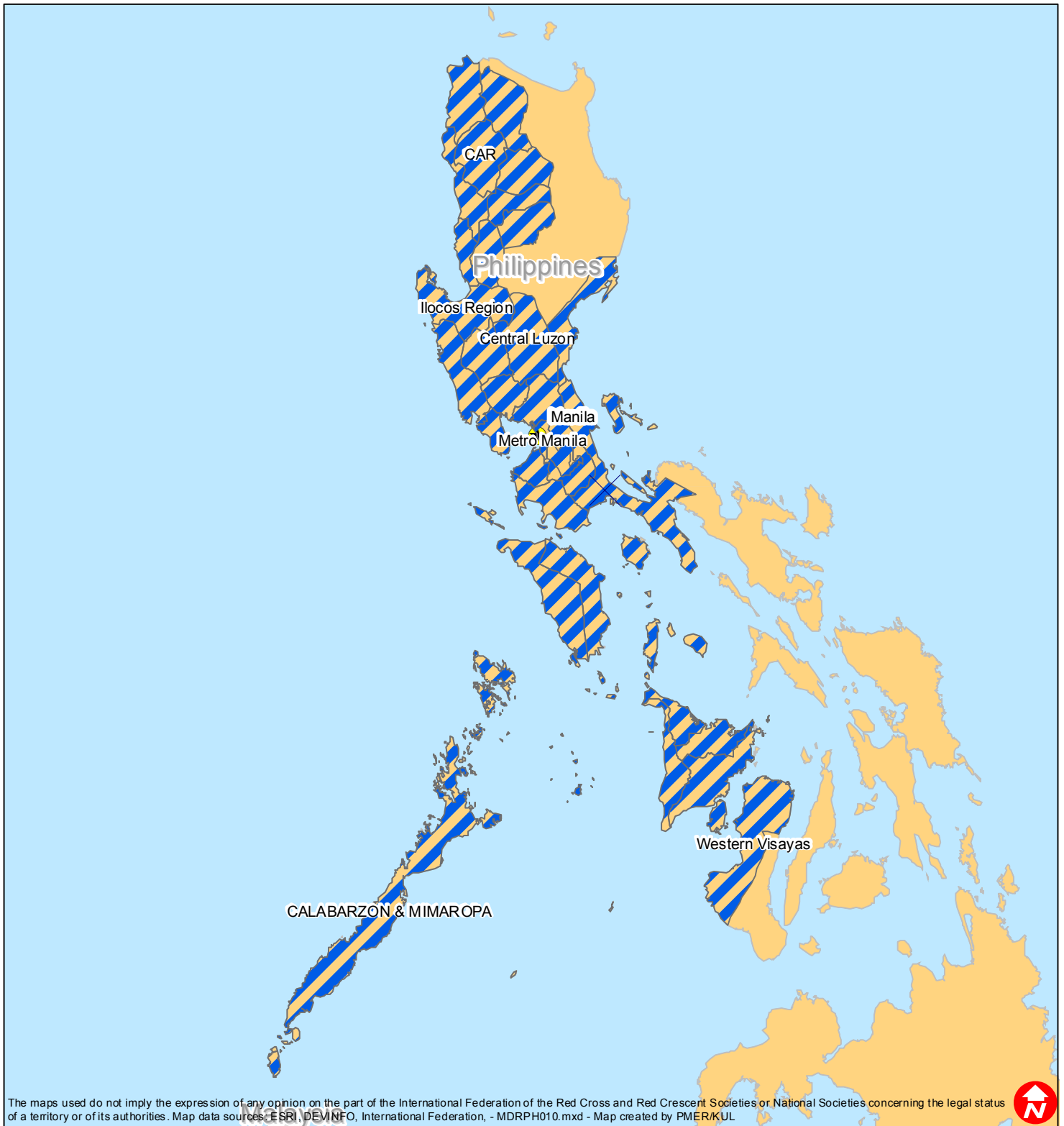
