

INDIA/GUJARAT: EARTHQUAKE

13 March 2001

The demolition of damaged buildings in Bhuj has begun and building by-laws have been introduced. Since the beginning of the operation, 14,231 patients have been treated at Red Cross health facilities, some 193,000 blankets, 64,000 tarpaulins, 4,300 tents, 15,000 kitchen sets and 13,000 water containers have been distributed. Further assessments in urban areas will be carried out given the need to ensure identification of all vulnerable communities. The International Federation planning mission is presently focusing on the structure and capacity of the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) with regard to implementation modalities for the forthcoming recovery and rehabilitation phase of the operation.

The context

At 08.50 hours on Friday, 26 January, a series of powerful earthquakes struck Gujarat state in western India, peaking at a massive 7.9 on the Richter scale, with tremors being felt across several states as well as in Delhi and Mumbai (Bombay) and in neighbouring Pakistan. The epicentre of the quake was 30 km north of the town of Bhuj (population of 150,000), the headquarters of Gujarat's Kutch district while, at the same time, seriously affecting the area within a range of 100 km from the epicentre including Ahmadabad, the largest city in the state of Gujarat.

Infrastructure has been severely damaged, resulting in large scale collapse of buildings, mine cave-ins, train derailments and power failure, cutting off the water supply. A series of aftershocks (more than 400 with 19 measuring over 5 on the Richter scale) has been keeping the population and the authorities on constant alert.

India is divided into five seismic zones with respect to the severity of earthquakes. The entire Kutch area lies close to the western margin of the Indian plate and falls into zone 5. It is thus very prone to earthquakes. According to the 1991 census, the population in Kutch district was 1.2 million. It is estimated that the population in the district before the earthquake had reached around 1.6 million.

Latest events

According to the latest federal government figures, the earthquake in Gujarat took 19,989 lives, whilst the number of missing persons has risen to 247. The number of persons with earthquake related injuries remains at some 166,000, of which 20,717 are serious injuries. An additional statistic on the earthquake damage is the number of reported deaths of head of cattle which currently stands at 20,717.

The demolition of damaged buildings in Bhuj town has begun. The federal government reports that, to date, the following equipment has been deployed in Kutch: 831 cranes, 395 bulldozers, 2,679 loader trucks, 1,603 ambulances and 614 gas cutters. An increasing number of hospitals, mobile hospitals, as well as temporary medical relief centres have reopened their doors.

New building by-laws have been initiated by a special committee appointed by the state government. These are intended to ensure that building companies are held accountable for the buildings they construct. The repair and seismic strengthening of buildings will be also be subject to the new by-laws.

Some international and national NGOs have started construction work in the “adopted” villages. A number of organisations are funded by non-resident Indians who are interested in various forms of assistance to earthquake victims, including the production of artificial limbs.

Red Cross/Red Crescent action

Overview •

The International Federation has sought CHF 25.6 million in cash, kind and services to assist 300,000 beneficiaries (60,000 families) for four months to support the Indian Red Cross Society activities in the most affected areas in the district of Kutch, state of Gujarat. A revised appeal covering the recovery and rehabilitation phase, will follow a partnership meeting in New Delhi on 21 and 22 March. Some 40 Red Cross Red Crescent Societies and/or their governments have so far extended their support to the International Federation operation.

The main objective has been to provide the beneficiaries with essential shelter, health and medical services, safe water and other urgently needed relief items.

In support of the initiatives of the IRCS, Red Cross Red Crescent Societies responded with relief supplies and emergency response units (ERUs) comprising a 350-bed joint Norwegian/Finnish Red Cross emergency response referral hospital, German and French Red Cross water and sanitation units, a Japanese Red Cross mobile clinic, a British Red Cross logistics emergency response team, a telecommunications emergency response team from the Austrian and Spanish Red Cross Societies and a Spanish Red Cross emergency response primary health care unit.

To date, 14,231 patients have been treated in the Red Cross health facilities, 395 operations have been performed and 131 deliveries have taken place. Since 3 February, 1,107 patients have been x-rayed and 1,243 tests have been conducted in the laboratory. Fifty one deaths have been registered so far.

Approximately 193,000 blankets, 64,000 tarpaulins, 4,300 tents, 15,000 kitchen sets and 13,000 water containers have been distributed since the operation commenced. Each family assisted receives two tarpaulins and five blankets, with water containers and kitchen sets provided to those whose homes have been completely destroyed.

More than 50 water tanks (storage tanks, collapsible bladder tanks, “onion” tanks) with capacity ranging from 2,000 litres to 95,000 litres, have been installed by the French and German Red Cross Societies’ water/sanitation teams in the area of Bhuj, Anjar and Bhachau, totalling 494,000 litres of water storage capacity. The German Red Cross water purification facility in the Red Cross compound in Bhuj produces approximately 70,000 litres of water per day for the Red Cross hospital and the compound in general.

The emergency response units operating from the Red Cross compound (medical, water/sanitation, telecommunications) in the town of Bhuj as well as from Sukhpur (medical) and Bhachau (medical) have been increasingly integrating into the Federation’s system and structures.

The Secretary General of the Danish Red Cross visited Bhuj over the weekend, and also held meetings at the IRCS headquarters in Delhi.

Indian Red Cross Society •

The IRCS has continued preparations for the partnership meeting which will take place in Delhi on 21 and 22 March 2001. Some 14 Red Cross Red Crescent partners have already confirmed their participation. The draft programme and agenda for the meeting have been finalised and forwarded to the national societies invited to the meeting.

Together with the members of the planning mission, the IRCS has continued its active involvement in the preparation of recommendations for the partnership meeting. In the field, the National Society has continued to conduct assessments and distributions in close co-operation with the Federation’s relief team.

The Indian Red Cross has identified candidates (Red Cross volunteers) to act as interviewers for the nutritional survey to be carried out by the Federation, WFP, Save the Children and Oxfam.

Recovery and rehabilitation phase planning mission •

Extensive discussions were held with the IRCS on the longer-term health programme, reconstruction, disaster preparedness and disaster response, organisational development and the country assistance strategy with special emphasis on Gujarat. The planning mission is presently focusing on the National Society capacity and structure, including the implementation modalities for the proposed programme. The recommendations for the recovery and rehabilitation phase of the Gujarat earthquake operation are expected to be finalised by the end of the current week. In the meantime, some of the members of the planning mission returned to Ahmadabad and Bhuj for additional meetings with representatives of the state and district Red Cross branches, as well as with relevant delegates in the Red Cross compound. In addition, visits to other, less affected districts in Gujarat were undertaken in order to assess the capacity of local branches and acquire a more comprehensive overview of the structure of the Indian Red Cross Society and its network. A summary of the planning mission’s initial findings has been forwarded to invitees of the partnership meeting.

Health •

The epidemiological situation in the affected area remains under scrutiny and one case of bloody diarrhoea was detected in Bhachau. Four cases of malaria amongst patients living in suburban Bhuj were also confirmed. There is a slight increase in watery diarrhoea cases among outpatients, which seems to be usual at this time of the year. Epidemiological data on tuberculosis and HIV/AIDS is still awaited. Dengue fever is endemic and likely to increase in the autumn.

The Red Cross referral hospital in Bhuj has continued treating an increasing number of children and the elderly with coronary problems, whilst a growing number of patients with earthquake related injuries are getting better and are ready for discharge. The number of complicated deliveries and the percentage of caesarian sections remains high.

The government assigned doctors and nurses continue to work on the basis of seven day shifts, in spite of discussions at different levels about the need for longer-term commitments of the local medical staff. There is presently a sufficient number of local staff in the laboratory and x-ray department, thus making both facilities operational 24 hours a day, which is essential for the referral function of the hospital.

In co-ordination with the IRCS and local health authorities, the Spanish Red Cross primary health care unit has started to provide medical donations to the assessed government primary health centres in the area of Bhachau. Vector control in the identified primary health care centres will be conducted later in the month.

The Japanese Red Cross clinic in Sukhpur will be closed on 25 March. The equipment will be handed over to the IRCS and the local government, under mutually agreed terms.

Referral points for patients with particular symptoms have been further divided in the Red Cross hospital. An order has been placed for two month supplies of medicines and other consumables. Coolers have been installed in a number of additional wards. Since the city power supply is not reliable, generators have been in continuous use. It has been decided that, on discharge, those patients in need of assistance would receive a blanket and a package of high energy biscuits.

The activities related to the nutritional survey undertaken by the Federation, WFP, Save the Children and Oxfam have continued with training of interviewers and piloting of data collection tools. According to the calculations, the determined sample size will be 768 individuals, drawn from a total of 30 clusters. The number of children sampled in each cluster will be 26. Sampling will take place in both urban and rural areas in direct proportion to the population in both of these strata. A simple, short quantitative questionnaire will be also developed for use in the survey. Its aim is to complement anthropometric data by providing information on the current prevalence of diarrhoea and respiratory infections, as these conditions are known to have a negative impact on nutritional status.

Water and sanitation •

Most of the water/sanitation equipment recently brought in by the French Red Cross will be set up by mid-March. Further assessments will focus on the water/sanitation situation in schools in remote villages as well as health facilities in need of reconstruction. The German Red Cross team continues

providing approximately 70,000 litres of purified water per day for the Red Cross hospital and compound in Bhuj. In view of the rehabilitation plans, the Indian Red Cross will provide local staff to be trained for further maintenance of the water purification system. In addition, a mobile sanitation and waste disposal team for Bhuj town has been initiated.

Relief distributions •

During the reporting period, relief distributions were undertaken in Bhuj town, Bhachau town and the villages of Mundra and Nakhatrana talukas (sub-districts). Due to certain security problems encountered during the distribution of coupons in identified neighbourhoods in towns of Bhuj and Bhachau, the distribution on 8 March was suspended. At the follow-up meeting at the Red Cross compound, the relief team assessed the methodology used in urban distributions. Accordingly, it was decided to conduct additional assessments in urban areas in order to identify all vulnerable communities before any coupon distributions. Distribution of shelter material will continue upon completion of the distribution of coupons. In the meantime, assessments and monitoring visits in rural areas have continued.

Tracing •

A number of meetings took place during the visit to Bhuj of the Indian Red Cross head of family news services. District officials and representatives of the Indian Red Cross and the ICRC discussed a number of issues including the lists of the dead and missing persons in rural areas; support and assistance to vulnerable individuals; the role of the police in identifying the dead; access to information on patients evacuated after the earthquake. Five persons looking for family members were provided with advice.

Telecommunications •

The newly-arrived delegate has been working on internet options for the Red Cross compound and telecommunications improvements for the Spanish Red Cross team in Bhachau.

Delegation •

Delegates have been encouraged recently to take malaria prophylactics, although an increase in malaria cases is not expected before June. Water facilities in the Red Cross compound have been further upgraded including improvements to the laundry and kitchen areas. A local company donated a

tractor and a trailer to the compound to be used for fire prevention. A fire drill has been scheduled for next week.

Outstanding needs

Additional unearmarked cash contributions remain of paramount importance, particularly in view of the envisaged recovery and rehabilitation phase of the Red Cross Red Crescent operations in Gujarat. The International Federation is urgently seeking a health coordinator, an information/reporting delegate and a construction delegate, all based in Bhuj.

External relations - Government/UN/NGOs/Media

The Gujarat Reconstruction Package was presented by the Gujarat state disaster management authorities to representatives of international and national organisations in the field. According to Abhyan, the co-ordinating body for local NGOs, there were initially 280 organisations involved in the emergency operation in Gujarat. Their number, however, has already dropped to 80. It is expected that the total will further decrease and that approximately 35 organisations will participate in the rehabilitation phase of the Gujarat earthquake operation. In the relief sector, regular co-ordination meetings have been held with MSF, World Vision and WFP.

According to the information from the health co-ordination meetings, the trend is to support primary health care centres and subordinate health structures. The Integrated Child Development Service, Department of Health, state of Gujarat as well as Save the Children and Merlin are preparing primary health care programmes. Contacts have been established with the Crisis Intervention Centre, an NGO from Delhi supported by UNICEF, which is involved in the psychological support for children in Kutch.

The federal minister of sports and culture visited the Red Cross compound in Bhuj. This high level visit attracted significant publicity in the local print media.
