Summary: Intense fighting continues around Kandahar, affecting the civilian population inside the city, and driving thousands south towards the Pakistan border. In the north, the Northern Alliance control of Mazar-i-Sharif is showing sign of fracturing under the pressure of inter-factional fighting. At the same time, the first falls of winter snow are reported in the city. The lack of security and access to remote areas remain major constraints on the operation, but the Red Cross/Red Crescent Movement continue to work together to meet the needs of those most affected by this crisis, whether in Afghanistan or in neighbouring countries

Operational Developments:

- **Security** - a resurgence in factional fighting was reported in Mazar-i-Sharif, as tensions within the Northern Alliance started to come to the surface. The area around the city is reported to be unstable, so restricting access. The UN has withdrawn its team, but the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) staff remain as do Federation local staff. There are concerns over a similar situation arising in Jalalabad. Continuing banditry along the main supply routes is making access to rural areas and the use of major supply routes hazardous

- **Population movement** - around 55,000 refugees are estimated to have crossed over to the North West Frontier Province (NWFP) of **Pakistan** from Afghanistan since the beginning of this crisis. Though still not entirely clear, it is estimated that thousands have already returned back home from NWFP. The UNHCR has begun to transfer some of the new refugees in NWFP from the old refugee camp in Jalozai to a new camp, called Kotkai, situated closer to the border with Afghanistan. Already, 5,000 people have been relocated
- On the Afghan side of the Chaman border in **southern Afghnaistan**, concern is growing for internally displaced persons (IDPs) in 3 - 4 camps around the Taliban-held town of Spin Boldak. Their location is precarious as they are in the midst of military action taking place in the area. Their camps are entirely makeshift and they face food shortages. The numbers in these camps remain unclear, but food is starting to get through thanks to WFP and Islamic Relief (UK)
- There is also concern for those IDPs who have decided to leave these Spin Boldak camps to seek more security over the border in Pakistan. Many of these refugees have to wait for days in a virtual **no-mans land** between the two countries, waiting to be screened by the Pakistani authorities. It is estimated that around 6,000 people are staying in this area, without shelter or food, at any one time
- On the **Pakistan** side of the Chaman border, Federation teams report the following refugee situation:
 - Killi Faizo camp*** - on average about 3,000 people wait at the Killi Faizo transit camp on the Chaman border, for transfer to a more permanent camp inside Pakistan. As soon as some of the families are transferred, the camp fills up again with people who have been waiting in no man's land
 - Roghani camp*** - the Roghani camps (I and II) are now full with over 14,000 refugees and the UNHCR is urgently looking for extra land on which to erect new camp facilities. Extension of the Roghani camps is also under consideration but the space available is limited. Land disputes have put some sites on hold but a possible site (Tarabaz) has been identified, just across from the United Arab Emirates Red Crescent (UAE RC) camp and only about 2 km from Roghani
 - UAE RC camp*** - the UAE RC camp was officially inaugurated last Friday in the presence of the UAE Ambassador in Pakistan and the local military authorities. Forty nine families moved into the camp that same day and new refugees are moving in all the time. The short term objective is to accommodate 5,000 refugees
 - Mohamed Kheil camp*** - UNHCR has also transferred over 1,100 of the so-called "invisible refugees" or unregistered refugees who have been squatting in the city of Quetta to the Mohamed Kheil camp, situated 2.5 hours south west of Quetta. This camp was inaugurated on November 29th, and will have the capacity to house 10 to 15,000 of the "invisible refugees"

Red Cross and Red Crescent coordination and action w

- A revised version of the Federation's **Humanitarian Crisis Appeal** for Afghanistan is expected to be launched early next week. However, the challenge for the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, as it is for all humanitarian organisations, is to undertake proper assessment and planning, within the constraints placed by the current security situation, and then to ensure that appropriate resources are allocated, not only for the relief phase of the operation, but also for the recovery and rehabilitation stages as well. Such a commitment will be measured in years rather than months
- Weekly co-ordination meetings are now taking place in Islamabad, Quetta and Peshawar involving representatives of the Pakistan Red Crescent (PRCS), Federation, ICRC and the PNSs in the country
- The Federation and ICRC have also agreed to establish a co-ordination team comprising respective Heads of Delegation in Kabul and Islamabad
- The Federation and ICRC logistics representatives in **Uzbekistan** met on the 30th November to update each other on respective activities from Uzbekistan in support of the Afghanistan operation. The port of Termez is still not open to use by the Red Cross

Health w

- The Federation's health co-ordinator has now concluded his assessment of the **ARCS clinics** in Kabul. At present, there does not appear to be a medical or nutritional emergency in Kabul city, caused by the recent events. The situation outside the city remains unclear, and ARCS and local Federation staff, where possible, have been asked to undertake field assessments. According to the Kabul clinic's own statistics, there have been no changes in the recorded morbidity figures. Diarrhoeal diseases remain the main reason for consultations, but figures are going down following the known seasonal cycle. Respiratory tract infections

are the second main diagnosis with increasing figures. Five per cent of the patients are children with malnutrition, about 98% of them with a mild and chronic form

- The **ARCS Community Based First Aid** programme has continued throughout the recent crisis, alongside the clinic activities, emphasising not for the first time, the courage and dedication of ARCS staff involved in these and other activities
- The **ARCS** runs 5 **mobile health clinics**, which normally go out into remote areas of the country to provide preventive and curative healthcare and collect morbidity data, and data concerning nutritional status and food security. In the current security situation, these teams have been unable to continue their activities, particularly in the drought prone areas, and so have been used instead for quick assessments in the provinces around Kabul
- The health delegate from the Japanese Red Cross (JRCS) has arrived in Quetta to assess the JRCS plan to rehabilitate the **Chaman District hospital**. Security permitting, the JRCS medical team will arrive within 2 weeks to begin the programme
- The Federation is supporting the **PRCS** to set up a Basic Health Unit in Chaman town. It is expected to be operational by next week. The Federation and PRCS are also planning to set up another Basic Health Unit in the Mohamed Kheil camp

Water-sanitation w

- **Pakistan** - 60 emergency latrines have now been completed in the Roghani camp. Work on permanent latrines is expected to begin soon. The Federation is also working with Oxfam to truck water in to the camp
- The Federation has committed to lead all water and sanitation activities in the new camp planned at **Tarabaz**. This has been agreed upon by all partners on the ground. The Federation will also provide permanent water and sanitation facilities at the **Mohamed Kheil** camp
- Two water bladders and one rubbhall (large storage tent) were supplied to the **UAE RC camp** by the Federation. The rubbhall will be erected in the camp to store non-food items for the refugees

Relief and shelter w

- **Supplementary feeding** - there does not appear to be a need to provide supplementary feeding through the **ARCS clinics** in Kabul, through the clinics, as the identified existing needs are being covered by ACF, which is feeding a total of 5,000 children. However, one ARCS clinic in the city is running such a programme. Assessment elsewhere is on-going, depending on the security situation, but the nutritional situation is expected to deteriorate in the coming months
- **Iran** - Iranian Red Crescent Society are planning two aid shipments into Kabul by air, the first going in this week, provided that the necessary permits are received in time. The likely cargo of each flight will be 35MT of rice, oil, sugar, pulses and high energy biscuits
- **Iran** - current numbers in the two IRCS-run camps just inside the Afghan border are 1,081 families (or 4,666 individuals) at Mile 46 camp, and 1,000 families (or 5,225 individuals) at Makaki camp. New arrivals are being directed towards Mile 46. IRCS are providing relief supplies (food and non-food items) to local villagers to reduce the flow of people leaving their homes and heading to these nearby camps.
- **Central Asia** - the Federation and National Societies in the region remain on standby for any possible deterioration in the situation in northern Afghanistan due to factional fighting

Logistics w

- The Termez port in **Uzbekistan** remains closed to the Federation and ICRC. **Mazar-i-Sharif** airport has not yet been declared ready for the landing of fixed wing aircraft
- As part of the co-ordinated RCM approach, agreement has been reached with the ICRC for them to ship Federation stocks into Afghanistan from Pakistan

National Society Capacity Building

- Twenty seven representatives from the five **Central Asian** national societies, including three Vice-Presidents, last week participated in a 5-day disaster management workshop in Almaty (funding for the workshop was provided by British Red Cross). Follow up will likely include in-country practical training for each National Society and a 9-day regional training workshop in 2002

- Security permitting, the **Federation** envisages re-opening its **offices** in Herat, Mazar-i-Sharif, Jalalabad and Kandahar as well as opening a new office in Faizabad. The primary role of these offices will be to continue to support the local ARCS branches and clinics

Co-ordination

- The Federation attended an inter-agency co-ordination meeting in Herat, also attended by local Ministry of Foreign Affairs officials, at which the Federation and ICRC roles in promoting the ARCS and supporting its programmes and projects in the region were re-stated
