SOUTHERN AFRICA: FOOD AID AND HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

6 November, 2002

This Ops Update is intended for reporting on emergency appeals.

Appeal No. 12/02

Launched on 2 May 2002 for CHF 6,803,000 for 12 months; revised 22 July to CHF 89,285,274 (USD 61.6 m/EUR 60.9m) in cash, kind and services to assist a minimum of 1.3 million beneficiaries for 12 months. Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 50,000

IN BRIEF

Appeal coverage: 43.9%

Outstanding needs: CHF 53,315,000

Summary: According to long term climate forecasts the present drought situation is expected to continue with rainfall likely to stay below average, especially during the early months of next year. Further support is necessary to address all the needs planned in the appeal.

Operational Developments w

In Zambia 350 MT of beans have been delivered to warehouses in the districts, and 630 MT of maize are waiting for import permits.

In Swaziland the national Red Cross society has finished its second round of general food distribution, providing 26,000 beneficiaries with food assistance.

In Lesotho the distribution of approximately 417 MT of food was finished by 25 October. The next round of distribution of WFP food is scheduled to start on 4 November. 120 MT of maize were delivered to warehouses in Lesotho on 24 October as part of the targeted food distribution. 72 MT of beans and 45,000 litres of cooking oil are ready for shipment

from South-Africa to Lesotho. A total of 790 households have been covered in the distributions of seeds in Mokhotlong district (by 21 October). The TSP M6 trucks are being divided into clusters in all countries involved in the SA Food Security Operation. The hiring of local cluster administrators will start soon.

- **MALAWI**

OBJECTIVE 2: WATER AND SANITATION *To improve the availability of safe water and sanitation to maximize the efficiency and effectiveness of food provision.*

The planning of activities related to water and sanitation is well under way (by the Federation water sanitation and health co-ordinators and the national society), and implementation of activities aimed at improving the availability of safe water in targeted areas is expected to commence soon.

OBJECTIVE 3: CAPACITY BUILDING *To strengthen operational and response capacity of the MRCS to carry out the operation..*

The Malawi Red Cross will receive two vehicles for monitoring and transportation purposes during this operation. Most funds allocated to the capacity building of the national society will aim at activities complementing the food distribution process, as an important part of the Southern Africa Food Security Operation.

OBJECTIVE 5: NON FOOD DISTRIBUTION *Distribution of seeds and agricultural tools to improve the 2002-2003 harvest season to 150,000 beneficiaries in targeted areas of Chikwawa, Mchinji and Nkhotakota for the 2002-2003 harvest season.*

Through bilateral co-operation between the Malawi Red Cross and the German Red Cross, 40,000 starter packs (seeds and fertilisers) will be distributed to vulnerable families in targeted areas of Malawi. This is to complement the Spanish Red Cross project of another 45,000 starter packs that will be distributed in the country.

- **ZAMBIA**

OBJECTIVE 1: GENERAL FOOD DISTRIBUTION *To ensure secure transportation of food from main warehouse to designated distribution points and ensure the timely and fair distribution to targeted households.*

350 MT of beans have been delivered to warehouses in the districts. The Federation has still not received import permits for the 630 MT of maize that is a part of the planned food rations. Distribution of the food items will take place when the maize is delivered to warehouses in the districts. The import permit for the maize is expected before the end of the month, whereafter production and shipment can start.

- **BAPHALI SWAZILAND RED CROSS SOCIETY**

OBJECTIVE 1: GENERAL FOOD DISTRIBUTION *To ensure a continuous support of approximately 45,000 beneficiaries for a period of four months with basic food items.*

The Baphali Swaziland Red Cross Society (BSRCS), has just finished the second distribution round of WFP donated food. These food items were distributed using commercial transportation in the country. The BSRCS and the Federation have encountered difficulties and unexpected expenses when utilizing commercial trucks. In an attempt to reduce delays and distribution costs the Federation is now considering the option of purchasing a truck that is more suited to the conditions in Swaziland.

Approximately 26,000 beneficiaries received assistance through the second round of the general food distribution in Baphali Swaziland. The distribution took place between 10 September and 14 October. Rations in distributions of WFP donated food are generally in line with the regional WFP standard, which constitutes a monthly allowance of 12 kg of maize, 1,8 kg beans, and 750 ml of cooking oil. Due to the unavailability of beans they were, however, not included in the second round of distributions in Baphali Swaziland.

OBJECTIVE 2: TARGETED FOOD DISTRIBUTION *To provide nutritious food supplements to the under-fives and to people infected and affected by HIV/AIDS.*

Through bilateral co-operation with the German Red Cross, the Baphali Swaziland Red Cross Society has planned a distribution of 15 MT of CSB (corn soya blend) to targeted beneficiaries in the country. This assistance will be distributed to malnourished children under five as nutritious food supplements. The amount of CSB that will be distributed may increase.

WHO kits have been distributed to 3 clinics in Swaziland. Each of the kits contain medical items to service 10,000 people and is estimated to last for 3 months. The Baphali Swaziland Red Cross Society, in co-operation with the Federation is introducing stock management of the medical supplies in the clinics. The clinics have so far not had stock management systems.

• **LESOTHO**

The following activities took place during this period:

- **Arrival of the Logistics Delegate:** a Federation logistics delegate from the Swiss Red Cross arrived in Lesotho to work with the Federation relief delegate already operating in the country, and to provide support to the logistics officer employed at the Lesotho Red Cross Society to manage transport and warehouse activities during the relief operation..
- **Visit by Information Delegate:** Between 24 and 26 October, the Federation Information delegate visited Mokhotlong district, accompanied by a cameraman in order to gather video footage on seeds distribution in the area.
- **Visit by German Red Cross Desk Officer:** The German Red Cross desk officer for Africa, accompanied by the GRC Relief Delegate for Swaziland and Lesotho visited Mokhotlong district between the 24th and 25th of October. They traveled to the distribution point at Libibing, together with a delegation from the European Union. The visitors were briefed on beneficiary selection and distribution procedures. A beneficiary monitoring visit was carried out by the German Red Cross.
- **Visit by OMCC Information and Audio Visual Delegates:** the information and audio visual delegates visited Lesotho between 15 and 19 October, and produced articles and visual material on the relief operations in Lesotho. The delegates spent 3 days in Mokhotlong district.
- **Selection of Local Transportation Company:** a local transportation company in Lesotho, "Mile Transport", has been selected to carry out local transport in Mokhotlong, and a transport contract was signed on the 20th of October. The company conducted previous distributions in the area as well. The company was selected from four quotations.

OBJECTIVE 1: GENERAL FOOD DISTRIBUTION

To ensure secure transportation of food from the main warehouse to distribution points, and to ensure timely and fair distribution to the targeted households.

WFP food distribution: the distribution of WFP food scheduled for October was completed on 25 covering a total of 31 distribution points in Mokhotlong district. A total of more than 417 MT of food commodities had been distributed by 25 October. The distributions of WFP food for November are scheduled to start on 4 November.

OBJECTIVE 2: TARGETED FOOD DISTRIBUTION

To provide nutritious food supplement to 5,000 under-fives in vulnerable households of targeted communities.

120 MT of maize meal were delivered to warehouses in Lesotho on 24 October as part of the targeted food distribution. 72 MT of beans and 45,000 l of cooking oil are ready for shipment from South-Africa to Lesotho.

Federation seeds distribution

The Ministry of Agriculture has provided temporary storage space for seeds in Lesotho. The Federation and the Lesotho Red Cross have also rented additional storage space to accommodate further batches of seeds.

The Federation aims at distributing 15 kg rations of maize seeds to 5,000 households in the Mokhotlong district. The first distribution of seeds commenced on 21 October at 4 distribution points. Another 6 distribution points were opened on 24 and one on 25 October. Approximately 38MT from a total of 75MT dispatched from Maseru to Mokhotlong district have been distributed. The total number of beneficiaries will be confirmed within a short period of time.

A total of 790 households have been covered in the distributions of seeds in Mokhotlong district. Each household received 15 kg of maize seeds, amounting to half a bag. A total of 395 bags were distributed, amounting to 11,850 kg. The distribution took place at four distribution points on 21 October, Molumong, St. James, Malakabeng and Tseko.

Seven other distribution points were opened in Mokhotlong district on 24 and 25 October in Linakaneng, Matjota, Moeketsanne, Iholetso, Malubalube, Libbing and Kampong town. The distributions from these locations will cover an estimated additional 1,600 households..

Another 9 distribution points that will become operational during later phases of the distribution in Mokhotlong district are estimated to cover a total of 2,367 households. These distribution points will be located in Malingoaneng, Mapholaneng, Khatleli, Khutloveli, Senkoase, Phalameng, Malefiloane, Liphofung and Khotsang. The seeds need to be transported up to over 70 km to reach some of these locations.

In Lesotho there are serious time constraints caused by the necessity of providing seeds and tools before the sowing season is over. It is however also necessary to inspect the goods, which will take time. Therefore distribution will go ahead while awaiting inspection results.

- **ZIMBABWE**

OBJECTIVE 1: TARGETED FOOD DISTRIBUTION *To ensure that HIV/AIDS infected and affected people and malnourished children under 5 years have access to nutritious food supplements.*

WFP support to the targeted food distributions through the HBC programme is now confirmed for those areas where no general distributions are yet taking place.

Food for all the HBC programmes is being purchased through Federation logistics structures for the first three months of 2003.

Problems related to the distribution of genetically modified food in Zimbabwe are still unresolved, which is contributing to the uncertainty related to the Federation operations in the country. The operating environment for all agencies in Zimbabwe remains complex and changeable, and many agencies are struggling to gain the necessary authorisations for their work.

OBJECTIVE 3: CAPACITY BUILDING *To strengthen the ZRCS by increasing its capacity at central and divisional level, particularly in the field of human and logistical resources.*

The Zimbabwe Red Cross has requested support in assessing the logistics set up for reception and distribution of the medical supplies within the HBC programme. Assessment visits to different project areas are expected to take place around the middle of November.

Training of volunteers has begun in the HBC project areas, and ZRCS is in the process of recruiting specialist food security staff on national and provincial level.

Final decisions on the composition of the HBC kit w

The regional delegation in Harare is working with the Zimbabwe Red Cross health and HIV/AIDS coordinators on determining the composition of HBC (home based care) kits in relation with the Zimbabwe Red Cross HBC programme. Decisions will also be taken on the supplementary requirements for care facilitators. Requirements for the proper storage, monitoring and reporting of medical supplies were also discussed in the meeting. Final decisions on these factors are expected before the middle of November.

OBJECTIVE 5: NON-FOOD DISTRIBUTION *Ensure that the HIV/AIDS affected beneficiaries have access to basic drugs, winter weather protection and means for income generation for a more dignified lifestyle.*

Hygiene parcels and blankets have been received in the Federation warehouse in Harare and distributions to all HBC clients will begin in early November.

The Zimbabwe Red Cross will carry out distributions of agricultural inputs during the last week of October and the first week of November. This should ensure that beneficiaries receive the items on time with regard to the rainy season. Beneficiaries of the distribution are the families within the ZRCS HBC programme, in projects within rural areas. In total, 3,180 households in eight HBC projects will benefit from the distributions. The people benefiting from the HBC program are dispersed over large areas which means that 36 distribution points are needed to complete the distributions.

Two different distributions are planned, each appropriate to the area targeted. A mixture of different types of seeds and fertilizers is expected to provide beneficiaries with a degree of self-sufficiency following the harvest period in March next year. The agricultural inputs provided are designed to cover approximately half of the needs of an average communal farmer.

TRANSPORT SUPPORT PACKAGE (TSP) FOR WFP

The country transport manager for Zambia arrived in Lusaka on 30 October. He is the first non-Norwegian member of the TSP staff, and is provided by the Zambian Red Cross Society.

All local drivers for the M6 trucks in Lesotho, Zimbabwe and Malawi have been hired and 25 trucks with drivers are already operating in Lesotho, distributing for the WFP. Drivers are still being hired in Zambia.

Transport managers, workshop managers and driving instructors have been provided by the Norwegian Red Cross, as they have had access to people with adequate knowledge of TSP M6 trucks. The Norwegian Red Cross is searching for transport managers to replace those who have already finished their contracts and returned to Norway. Other national societies are encouraged to propose personnel with the relevant skills to cover open positions of transport managers and workshop managers.

A finance delegate will arrive on 4 November to work specifically on matters related to the TSP. The delegate will be based at the OMCC in Johannesburg.

The regional fleet coordinator has returned from field missions to Malawi, Zimbabwe and Zambia. The main purpose of his travels was to determine locations for the maintenance centers to service the TSP.

The trucks are divided into clusters in all countries involved in the SA Food Security Operation. Cluster administrators will be hired locally. They will be responsible for reporting on the activities of the trucks and serve as local contact persons for WFP and NGOs. They will also be in charge of issuing and controlling driving logs and tanking lists.

The WFP is now promoting action to prevent sexual abuse and the abuse of power. The TSP staff and drivers will be involved in training on this subject.

The transport coordinator visited Lesotho on 24th and 25th of October in order to set up a cluster system of the same kind as the systems already in place in Malawi and Zambia.

On 29 October the fuel supplier "Exel" provided a draft of an agreement regarding the supply of diesel fuel to the fleet in Lesotho.

Registration plates for trucks in Zimbabwe have been received but plates for the trailers have still not been provided. 2 Toyota Land Cruisers for Zambia and 2 for Malawi were dispatched last week. The remaining Toyotas are scheduled to be released for onward transport to Malawi and Zambia this week.

The long haul trucks in Harare, Zimbabwe are expected to start delivering spare parts, rubbhalls and forklifts to Malawi and Zambia next week. The remaining Toyotas will join the convoys to the respective countries.

PROGRAMME CO-ORDINATION AND MANAGEMENT

The Operational Management & Coordination Centre (OMCC) in Johannesburg, South Africa w

Meeting between Federation Secretary General and the Secretaries General of Southern Africa Operating National Societies w

The Federation secretary general, Mr Didier Cherpitel, and the secretaries general of southern Africa operating national societies met in Johannesburg on 21 October. The secretaries general discussed various topics related to the co-operation between the Federation and the operating national societies during the Southern Africa Food Security Operation.

The importance of the significant contribution of the national societies was widely recognised -- work which will serve as a basis for similar work in the future. The situation in the whole of southern Africa is very grave with regard to the food security situation and the spread of HIV/AIDS. The national societies in the region will in the future be able to seek support from the national societies participating in this operation as the need grows for response to the needs of the most vulnerable in other parts of the region.

The Red Cross movement has a leading role in Southern Africa in the fight against HIV/AIDS and the participants at the meeting emphasised the importance of maintaining this lead. The home based care programmes providing assistance to the HIV/AIDS affected is at the same time a very important basis for food distribution to this group, which is targeted because of the inability of the patients to work and earn an income.

Real Time Evaluation Team w

An evaluation team that spent two weeks conducting a real time evaluation of the Southern Africa Food Security Operation has now finished its field work. The team is preparing an extensive report containing an evaluation of different aspects of the operations such as access to targeted victims, the efficiency of transportation and logistics, and the organization of shared learning. The evaluation is expected to provide the Red Cross movement with valuable information on the strength and weaknesses of the work of the Federation and its co-operation with other actors. This is expected to provide valuable information on how to improve not only the efficiency of the Southern Africa Food Security Operation but also the way Federation operations are conducted in general.

Outstanding needs and the response to date w

The Federation continues to receive contributions to the operation; the American Red Cross recently contributed USD 25,000 to this appeal and operation, specifically for relief efforts in Lesotho. The Iranian Red Crescent recently donated USD 15,788 worth of food and hygiene items, and the Danish Red Cross contributed CHF 484,365 to relief efforts related to the operations in Malawi. CHF 518,790 was contributed to the operations by the Icelandic Red Cross following a fundraising event on the 5th of October. More than 2,000 Icelandic volunteers walked from house to house collecting donations. Approximately 95% of Icelandic homes were visited and the event received intensive and positive media coverage.

Further support is necessary to address all the needs planned in the appeal. Recent meetings have been held in Tobusa with major donor representatives, including ECHO and DFID. According to long time climate forecasts the present drought situation is expected to continue. Rainfall is likely to stay below average, especially during the early months of next year, according to most estimates, although weather can never be predicted with perfect accuracy.
