## IRAQ: HUMANITARIAN CRISIS - POST WAR REHABILITATION

7 January 2005

Appeal No. 08/03; Operations Update no. 15

Appeal launched on 20 March 2003 for CHF 111,039,000 (USD 79.7m or EUR 75.4m) for 305,000 beneficiaries for 9 months. [<click here>](#)

**Operational Summary:** The overall situation in Iraq remains insecure and confused. The Iraqi Red Crescent Society also faces many difficult challenges. Its scheduled institutional development is not progressing according to plan. Indicators for progress, set at last year's Support Team meeting in Damascus, are not being met. As a result, the signing of the MoU between the Iraqi Red Crescent Society (IRCS), ICRC and the Federation has been delayed. Despite difficulties within the country and national society, all planned rehabilitation work is ongoing and will be finished more or less as scheduled. Similarly, the Al Eid distribution and the orphan programmes have been carried out successfully (separate reports are available upon request). The Orthopaedic Centre in Basrah has received a donation in kind of 280 wheelchairs from Spanish Red Cross through the IRCS local branch in Basrah.

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## Operational developments

The plan of action and milestone indicators set forth as a result of the internal agreement made among the Iraqi Red Crescent board members and the executive management is not being implemented as expected. There is still a serious division amongst the leadership. The Federation has signed a cooperation agreement with the IRCS but a tripartite memorandum of understanding between the national society, Federation and ICRC remains to be signed.

Despite the political situation, the Federation and the IRCS has been able to make progress in specific areas such as health, psychosocial support (PSP) and disaster management (DM).

### 1. Organisational Development

**Objective 1:** The IRCS foundations are strengthened.

In order to further test capacities, all branches were monitored during the Eid Distribution programme. A separate report is available upon request

**Objective 4:** The operational and management capacity of the NS at the headquarters and in the branches has improved.

**Objective 5:** The IRCS is effectively managing its volunteers.

**Impact**

The national society has been very active with relief operations in Fallujah and Mosul in particular. The IRCS was the only organisation given access into the town of Fallujah, now unfortunately stopped again. IRCS volunteers have also been active in Mosul, assisting people affected by conflict. The recruitment of an OD delegate should strengthen Federation support in this area.

**Constraints**

Unfortunately, the security situation is not improving, but rather deteriorating further. This has put further constraints on movement restrictions. As the national society has just signed the cooperation agreement but not yet the memorandum of understanding, progress with regard to institutional development has also been affected.

**Federation Coordination**

Fewer meetings with the lead agency, ICRC, and the IRCS (Iraqi Red Crescent Society) have been held due to the overall situation. Meetings have also been held with some partner national societies as well as other international organisations.

**B) Physical Rehabilitation: transfer of technical expertise**

**Objective:** The Iraqi Red Crescent rehabilitation and maintenance department gained the needed technical and managerial skills to operate independently and has rehabilitated a number of buildings and/or water/sanitation plants owned or managed by the national society.

**Impact**

Following reemployment of key staff, the IRCS rehabilitation and maintenance department is slowly getting back on track. Federation funded rehabilitation projects are mainly handled by Federation employed technical staff.

**2. Health and Care**

**A) Community-Based Health Intervention (CBHI)**

**Objective 1:** The IRCS has an increased capacity in planning, organizing and implementing the health education programme in the PHC centres and the community, and organizing volunteer participation in national immunization campaigns (NIDs), in collaboration with the ministry of health and UNICEF.

#	Expected Results	Status
1	900,000 beneficiaries in all 18 governorates have benefited from a health campaign for the prevention of diarrhoea and dehydration, malnutrition, and HIV/AIDS, through the implementation of home-visit activities, and health education in PHC centres and other public institutions	This can not be achieved, and the new target is set at 300,000 beneficiaries. However, this is still an ongoing programme, and just recently the national society was provided with further stocks of hygiene kits and printed dissemination materials
2	Volunteers have participated as an independent monitoring body in immunization campaigns in all governorates	The IRCS is still a partner for monitoring of immunisation campaigns and highly recognised for its work in this field
3	Oral re-hydration units (ORU) attached to primary health	Still not reactivated. Prior to any restart, the situation

**Objective 2:** The IRCS has an increased capacity in planning, organizing and implementing first aid and health promotion courses in order to improve the national society volunteer capacity that will enable expansion of volunteer intervention of Red Cross/Red Crescent programmes in the country.

**Impact**

The support to volunteers will continue, and in particular in conflict areas, volunteers will be provided with more first aid kits, as well as restocking of used first aid materials. A second quantity of first aid kits has been procured and assembled in Iraq. All kits have been distributed to the branches.

**B) Psycho-social programs**

**Objective 1:** The IRCS volunteers have an improved psychological wellbeing after being released from tension and stress and their coping strategies and the capacity to provide psychological support to individuals and families in the community have consequently increased.

**Objective 2:** Six hundred victims of wars were provided an appropriate vocational education as a part of their psychosocial rehabilitation aimed at empowering coping mechanisms of vulnerable individuals and their communities.

### 3. Disaster Management

**Objective:** The IRCS has an effective disaster preparedness and response mechanism that ensures an optimal utilization of human and material resources in times of emergencies.

#	Expected Results	Status
1	The approach of the IRCS to disaster preparedness and response has been systematized through the organizational capacity-building and planning ongoing at HQ and at branch levels	It still needs to be seen how the national society will be able to restore this. **Impact**

The impact of the DM/DP activities as well as the actual capacity of the national society needs to be further analysed and reinforced as found necessary. The IRCS still has to improve their support to the vulnerable population and not only respond to direct emergencies.

**Disaster Management in the neighbouring countries to Iraq: Jordan and Syria**

**Objective:** Jordan and Syrian Arab Red Crescent Societies (JRCS & SARC) have well-functioning DM capacities and have been implementing integrated DM programmes.

#	Expected Results	Status
1	Disaster management units (DMU) have been established to manage all activities related to natural and man-made disasters	The branches of the SARC have now functioning DMUs, also including separate staff and offices. The JRCS have established three DMUs throughout the Kingdom, with two additional staff members at HQ level and three coordinators
2	National interventions teams of both national societies were strengthened	110 SARC volunteers participated in the national intervention Team training. This was facilitated by 10 trainers and at the Sweada training centre. NIT members were fitted with necessary clothing and equipment. In November, the SARC facilitated a NIT exercise for Yemen RCS. Similarly the JRCS NIT members have been trained and equipped as required. Members of JRCS also participated in an emergency response unit (ERU) training hosted by the Palestinian RCS
3	Logistics systems and procedures have been fully integrated into <i>the modus operandi</i> of the two national societies	The logistics departments of both national societies have been fitted out and trained as required, and their function and capacity was put to the test when procurement was done for the NIT equipment and clothes

#### **4. Humanitarian Values**

**Objective:** Staff and volunteers of the IRCS at headquarters and in the branches have a good understanding and appreciation of the Fundamental Principles and humanitarian values of the Movement as well as concerned new Government officials such as the police and the army.

1	All members of the NS are aware of the humanitarian values of the Movement	The ICRC has printed the IRCS statutes, which should be distributed to all members and paid staff

#### **5. Federation management and coordination**

**Objective:** The Federation presence in Iraq has evolved into an advisory role, with a focus on capacity-building that will yield an autonomous and accountable organization.

#	Expected Results	Status
1	The NS staffs have achieved a level of operational independence that minimizes the need for continuing technical support of the Federation	It is still vital that the Federation and the ICRC continue supporting the national society. However, the present political situation is putting constraints on the efforts from the Federation and the ICRC
2	The Federation and the ICRC have harmonized their support of the NS to the maximum benefit of the IRCS	The support from the Federation and the ICRC is harmonized and considered being on the correct level. It is anticipated, that the IRCS will improve their performance and internal commitments
3	The national society is collaborating with UN agencies and with established NGOs in the country where the programmes of these 3 <sup>d</sup> -party entities serve the goals and objectives of the IRCS	This is a very sensitive issue and the ICRC and the Federation has included necessary details in the MoU (still to be signed)

The status agreement for the Federation as an international organisation is still pending. Government representatives in Iraq have promised that this will be resolved before the end of the year.

#### **Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement -- Principles and initiatives**

Due to the fact that the MoU is not signed, and the cooperation agreement has only just been signed, separate agreements have been signed as required. This slows progress. It is hoped that the IRCS will sign off on all anticipated agreements with the Federation and the ICRC soon.

HIV/AIDS training has been included in the coming ToT training organised by the Federation secretariat's health department.

#### **National Society Capacity Building**

The anticipated implementation of the agreements from Damascus is not proceeding as planned. The IRCS is still experiencing serious political and management problems. Despite the outspoken and demonstrated willingness from the Federation and the ICRC, the national society is not responding in a proper way.

The Federation and ICRC (as lead agency) continue to work closely with the IRCS to ensure a coherent and regular flow of information.
