HAITI: SOCIAL UNREST

Operational Summary: The security situation in Haiti has improved and humanitarian activities have now recommenced; however, conditions are volatile and rebel factions continue to control small towns and rural areas. New assessments on the part of the Haitian National Red Cross Society (HNRCS) and the Federation together with other humanitarian organizations reveal a worsening humanitarian situation throughout the country calling for medium term as well as emergency assistance. The unrest has eroded fragile health care, exhausted coping mechanisms and exacerbated vulnerability. The Haitian National Red Cross Society and the Federation have now enhanced the Plan of Action (PoA) to meet the objectives of the Emergency Appeal, details of which are given below. The budget of the Appeal has been revised, taking into account the revised plan of action; however, the funding target of CHF 1,388,000 remains unchanged. The implementation of the revised PoA has begun, particularly in the area of telecommunications. Focus is maintained on the areas of disaster management, health and organizational development. Negotiations with PNS and external donors are on-going and the response to the Appeal thus far has been positive. Effective coordination with the ICRC as lead agency in Haiti, as well as with PNSs and external partners, continues.

Operational developments

The political and social instability throughout Haiti since September 2003, which became an acute crisis since January 2004, has all but subsided at present. Humanitarian organizations have returned to the field and are carrying out assessments. In the capital, the situation is gradually returning to normal, with most schools having reopened after being closed since December. US Marines are carrying out patrols near schools and officials are trying to fill classrooms, using radio messages. French legionnaires based in Gonaïves aim to maintain security for a humanitarian corridor from Port-au-Prince via Saint Marc and Gonaïves to Cap-Haïtien. However, armed rebel groups are still in control of smaller towns and rural areas in the north, and the situation in the south is also a cause for concern. On 14 March, the first WFP convoy since the armed revolt erupted in early February reached Cap-Haïtien.

The transition government formed on 17 March seems to be open to the backing of international organizations leading to overseas support for structural reforms. This support will, to a large extent, depend on the capacity of the new government to restore stability in the country through the use of reconciliatory and unifying skills.

In general, it appears that the humanitarian situation is significantly deteriorating in most parts of Haiti. Humanitarian agencies' assessment reports which are now gradually being published indicate that prices of commodities of first necessity have risen in urban markets. The poorer sections of the population have been forced to sell possessions to purchase basic necessities and remittances from abroad, which constitute a substantial income source in Haïti, have been blocked since many banks and cash transfer houses are not working. Health institutions are insufficiently provided with essential drugs and electricity and a safe water supply have sharply diminished in some regions. In addition, a number of limited nutritional surveys show deterioration amongst sample populations.

On the basis of new assessment being conducted by the Red Cross Movement, the UN system and other agencies, a clearer vulnerability pattern is now emerging and medium to longer term assistance programmes are being drafted. The Federation will continue to implement the objectives defined in the Emergency Appeal, while also considering some further objectives for the medium term, particularly in health.

The Federation telecommunications team, working with Haïtian National Red Cross Society and ICRC colleagues, are currently installing radio equipment in the north of Haïti and report good working conditions. The French Red Cross and the Netherlands Red Cross have also resumed their projects with the National Society.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress, impact

On 19 March, a half-day working meeting was held with the President of the Haïtian National Red Cross Society and heads of sections to discuss the current response to the Emergency Appeal and to draw up a detailed Plan of Action for each Appeal objective. Hereafter is the result of this work.

Emergency Relief

Objective 1: To boost the emergency response capacity of HNRCS branches.

The work of the HNRCS ambulance service and the volunteers was maintained throughout the periods of violence in February and March, taking the wounded to hospital, often in extremely difficult circumstances and the courage of this work has been recognized by the Movement. The provision of protective helmets and vests marked with the Red Cross emblem will further increase the safety of staff and volunteers. The Red Cross emblem is generally recognized by the population throughout Haiti and, through the work of the ICRC and HNRCS, increasingly by armed groups, political activists, authorities, police and security forces, and will ensure increased protection of Haïtian National Red Cross staff and volunteers. HNRCS management indicate that First Aid kits are now totally lacking at branch level throughout the country.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

The Pan American Disaster Response Unit (PADRU), with funding from the Norwegian Red Cross, has procured 500 security helmets, 1,000 cotton vests (dossards) and 500 first aid kits. 20 tents contributed by the American Red Cross have been added to the above materials. Shipment of these items to Haïti was blocked given the security conditions; however, it is now expected that the materials will be in Port-au-Prince on 31 March. HNRCS will then undertake customs formalities for these goods and arrange for the emblem printed on the vests and security helmets. A distribution plan for the materials is being established by the HNRCS and will include all of the 13 regional branches. Funds to purchase additional first aid materials to replenish the First Aid kits will be made available from the budget relating to objective 3 under the health section below. These goods will be purchased by PADRU and transported to Haïti for temporary storage at headquarters.

Objective 2: To reduce and prevent the spread of diseases and boost improved sanitation by promoting public information and health education through awareness campaigns with a main focus on the importance of clean drinking water, good hygiene and sanitation practices.

This objective aims to reduce the risk of potential health disasters through training of Red Cross staff and volunteers in Gonaïves in water and sanitation and hygiene and to carry out the distribution of water purification tablets. Water sources in Gonaïves are reported as sufficient to meet basic needs, but quality is questionable due to limited treatment capacity, given either reduced availability of chlorine or lack of funds to purchase this. In addition, lower income due to the recent social unrest has reduced the quantity of water purchased from kiosks or other private sources and increased the consumption of water from more unreliable sources.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

240 boxes (50,000 tabs per box) of water purification tablets (aquatabs) will be distributed by the Red Cross regional branch to 3,000 persons in affected households and institutions in Gonaïves over a 9 month period to ensure the use of a target of 8-10 litres per person of safe water per day. This planning figure for the quantity of drinking and cooking water may be revised by the local Red Cross branch according to needs identified locally. Purification tablets will be purchased through the PADRU regional logistics unit (RLU) and transported to Haiti by air. The HNRCS Relief Section will be responsible for beneficiary targeting and aims to identify beneficiaries through health and education institutions and orphanages. Leaflets will be printed in Haiti with instructions to beneficiaries on the use of water purification tablets, general advice on safe drinking water, including advice on limiting the use of alternative water treatment products and possible hazardous side-effects, and information regarding the Fundamental Principles.

The continued need for provision of water purification tablets to affected households through appropriate institutions (schools, hospitals and orphanages) will be re-evaluated on the basis of the first month of project implementation by the HNRCS in coordination with the Federation, the ICRC and other partners. The ICRC currently has a water sanitation delegate based in Gonaïves concentrating on re-establishing the water supply to the hospital.

Refuse bags will be purchased in Haiti by the HNRCS and provided to HNRCS volunteers from the Gonaïves regional branch for use in refuse clean-up campaigns. Sanitary systems such as the canal and the market area will be targeted for cleaning to reduce the risk of an epidemic. Public information will also be provided on excreta disposal and simple forms of vector control.

A two-day training session in Gonaïves will be provided for Red Cross staff on the importance of water supply, sanitation and hygiene promotion in emergencies facilitated by the Regional Water and Sanitation Delegate. HNRCS national headquarters staff will be encouraged to travel to Gonaïves to attend the course. Further assessment of the water and sanitation and hygiene situation in Gonaïves and elsewhere in Haiti will be conducted at the project outset. A portable water testing kit will be provided to the HNRCS in order to maintain data on water quality in the identified areas.

The HNRCS regional branch in Gonaïves has a satisfactory volunteer network, enabling it to carry out these activities. However, implementation will be subject to a continued stable security situation in Gonaïves.

Disaster Management

Objective 1: To implement an emergency telecommunications system with VHF and satellite phones.

A Federation evaluation mission conducted between 18 and 26 February 2004 concluded that the communications system in Haiti is currently fragile and deficient. The public phone system (terrestrial) is unreliable and coverage is limited to a few urban centres; the cellular phone networks also have limited coverage, and are prone to service interruption; absence of international agreements regarding roaming also limits cell phone operation, and there is currently no VHF network with national coverage. The UNDP has also indicated in the Flash Appeal that lack of communications infrastructure is undermining humanitarian activities.

As a result, access to communities outside the capital for the assessment of needs and the provision of humanitarian assistance is significantly hindered. The security of humanitarian workers, overall logistics capabilities and general coordination of efforts are hampered by these problems.

The HNRCS has a VHF network for its emergency services within the capital. Some equipment, including VHF base stations, mobile radios, and antennas are stationed in 9 Red Cross regional branch offices. However, the equipment is not currently operational because the system lacks repeaters and technical training for the operators, in particular. The ICRC has a functioning VHF network in Port-au-Prince and in other parts of Haiti.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

Phase I: Installation of telecommunications equipment; agreement with Haitian authorities on the use of VHF frequencies and recruitment of an HNRCS telecommunications coordinator.

Phase II: implementation of the technical protocols and training of the network users.

Phase III: maintenance of the network and additional training of HNRCS staff, as required.

Two Spanish Red Cross telecommunications delegates are working with the Federation's PADRU telecommunications delegate assigned to Haiti between 18 February and 4 April, and are implementing this objective in close cooperation with a telecommunications coordinator for the HNRCS and two ICRC telecommunications delegates.

Under Phase I: three of five VHF repeaters planned: Obléon, Goyavier and Puilboreau have now been installed/rehabilitated and are functioning well. VHF coverage is now ensured on a central north-south axis covering a large part of the Movement's current action. VHF stations in Cap-Haïtien and Saint Marc have been installed and VHF handsets were tuned and provided for French Red Cross and Netherlands Red Cross delegates. The plan for installation of VHF radios in HNRCS ambulances donated by the French Red Cross was finalized and additional equipment ordered. Arrangements for the appointment and support of the HNRCS Telecommunications Coordinator have been finalized with the National Society.

Objective 2: To facilitate the development of the Haitian National Red Cross Society's disaster response system in view of outbreaks of social unrest and the vulnerability of the country to natural disasters, particularly floods, drought and hurricanes.

The period of intense social unrest has now ceased, however analysts concur in the possibility of further unrest. The period of September 2003 to February 2004 during which infrastructure and the economy of Haiti were damaged and basic amenities severely diminished has left virtually the entire population in a state of increased vulnerability. It is essential to further increase the capacity of the HNRCS, particularly certain key branches, to respond to a variety of possible disasters. Please refer to the objective 2 under organizational development covering branch development for further support to key branch reinforcement. The creation of a national VHF network under objective 1 of the disaster management section above provides a unique opportunity for the HNRCS to further strengthen its coordination and operational role in disaster response.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

Support for this objective will concentrate on three activities:

1. Reinforcing the human resources of the HNRCS Relief Section through support for a second disaster relief officer for an initial period of six months.
2. Support for the creation of National Intervention Teams (NITs), including cooperation with national authorities, NGOs and other agencies with regard to disaster preparedness planning and coordination and the development of a national response mechanism utilizing the new VHF network
3. Assignment of a disaster management specialist to support the HNRCS Relief Section in assessment, planning, systems and procedures for a two month period.

Objective 3: To reinforce preparedness and response strategies in National Societies in potential host countries in view of possible population flows outside Haiti.

Increased numbers of those at risk from the political and social unrest throughout Haiti, particularly at the end of 2003 and in early 2004, together with the sharp decrease in living standards caused by the instability, could

potentially have resulted in a marked increase in the population outflow from Haiti to neighbouring countries. To date, this has not been the case.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

Contingency planning for population flows from Haiti to the Dominican Republic is currently being considered for joint implementation with the Dominican Red Cross.

Health

Objective 1: To help meet emergency relief needs arising from the crisis situation in Haiti.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

The distribution of 1,500 family hygiene kits and 1,500 kitchen kits procured with funding from ECHO has not been carried out by the HNRCS to beneficiaries in Cap-Haitien affected by flooding in December 2003, as originally planned. These relief goods were looted from the port area in Port-au-Prince during the disturbances at the end of February 2004. This issue is currently being examined with ECHO.

According to a recent OXFAM rapid assessment report on water sanitation and health in the North West of Haiti dated 25 February 2004, "the observance of hygiene is widely known and messages are broadcast over radios and health care centres ... however the purchase price of hygienic materials, toilet paper, toothpaste and others have doubled since two or three weeks" due to lack of access to these urban areas. The Haitian National Red Cross Society confirms that price rises which occurred during the period of heightened social unrest have not been reversed. The improved access to these urban areas has not necessarily resulted in previous access to hygiene products, especially in public facilities. This increases the possibility of disease. As a basic minimum, soap should be available for hand and face washing, however other hygiene products will enhance hygiene and improve living conditions. Distribution to beneficiaries through health centres, orphanages and schools is seen as the most efficient and effective means for the HNRCS regional branches to target the most vulnerable in the present volatile situation.

The following activities will replace the previous distributions outlined in the Emergency Appeal.

Hygiene products in parcels will be distributed to educational and health centres and orphanages in urban and rural areas in the north west of Haiti serving the needs of approximately 4,500 persons for a six month period.

Refuse bags will be purchased in Haiti by the HNRCS and provided to National Society volunteers attached to the regional and local branches for use in community refuse clean-up campaigns to reduce the risk of an epidemic, mainly in areas surrounding the targeted institutions. Protective clothing, at minimum boots and gloves and, as required, overalls and protective masks will be provided to HNRCS staff and volunteers participating in these activities. It is planned that National Society staff and volunteers would encourage and lead community action and not solely be responsible for refuse collection.

A two day training session in Cap-Haitien will be provided jointly for Red Cross staff of regional branches concerned, focusing on the importance of water supply, sanitation and hygiene promotion in emergencies. This training session will also be facilitated by the Regional Water and Sanitation Delegate and National Society headquarters staff will be encouraged to travel to Cap-Haitien to attend the course.

Implementation will be subject to a stable security situation and access in the north west of the country.

Objective 2: To boost the availability of safe blood in response to the current crisis through reinforcement of the voluntary, non-remunerated blood donation programme carried out by the HNRCS.

There is a need to boost voluntary, non-remunerated blood donations (VNRBD) given the increased need for blood during periods of political violence and disasters.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

This objective will initially be met through the recruitment of a technical consultant in VNRBD and another in haematology for a period of one month to work with the HNRCS. Social mobilization activities encouraging voluntary blood donation will be undertaken within the communications activities under the promotion of humanitarian values section below.

Objective 3: To strengthen the Haitian National Red Cross Society's medico-social section through the provision of technical support, equipment and training, thereby enhancing assistance to vulnerable groups, particularly in the area of HIV/AIDS and first aid.

Increasing health needs described in the Emergency Appeal, in ICRC reports and in those of other agencies including WHO/the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO), underscores the necessity for increased support to the HNRCS medico-social section. The HNRCS will also continue to scale up activities including dissemination of information regarding HIV/AIDS and the services of mobile clinics.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

1. Reinforcement of human resources within the HNRCS medico-social section through support for one social worker for an initial period of six months.
2. Organization of two workshops for HIV/AIDS Peer Educators aiming to train at least 30 persons using available manuals in Creole "Together We Can", and distribution of the same manual to secondary schools and other educational institutions.
3. Purchase through PADRU and contingency stocking by HNRCS of materials for replenishing First Aid kits (see objective 1 under emergency relief).

Promotion of Humanitarian Values

Objective 1: In cooperation with the ICRC, to conduct awareness campaigns to enhance knowledge of Humanitarian Values and the Fundamental Principles and to promote the image of the Haitian National Red Cross Society.

The ICRC, as lead agency for the coordination of international Movement activities in Haiti, has identified the need to encourage many different actors in the recent events to apply humanitarian values. The HNRCS' capacity to deliver key messages regarding the Fundamental Principles and Humanitarian Values will be reinforced through the support of an information/reporting delegate and the provision of audio-visual equipment to the National Society's Communications Section. Support will also be offered in donor and management reporting.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

1. Recruitment of an information/reporting delegate.
2. Purchase and provision to the HNRCS Communications Section of audio-visual equipment.
3. Development of materials on voluntary, non-remunerated blood donation

Organizational Development

Objective 1: To support the HNRCS in the modernization of its institution in line with the criteria for a well functioning National Society, improving its service delivery to vulnerable people.

Within a context of rapidly increasing humanitarian needs, it is important the HNRCS further develops a clear vision of its role within the humanitarian field based on a generally understood and implemented mission enabling it to strengthen its core activities, especially in health and disaster management. It is also imperative that new volunteers are recruited, and that old and new volunteers are regularly trained in Red Cross Principles, and are given guidance in how to provide services to their communities through their local branches.

The National Society has an increasing number of humanitarian partners, such as PAHO, WHO, IDB and the Global Fund to fight Aids, Tuberculosis and Malaria. These donors are primarily providing programme support,

which requires the HNRCS to ensure well-managed administration and finance units, internal programme coordination, and strategic planning exercises.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

1. Training in volunteer management by a volunteer manager from a sister National Society, and creation of a computerized volunteer database with assistance from a locally hired consultant (existing volunteer management software may be provided).
2. Follow-up training by a regional resource person of HNRCS staff in administrative and financial systems and procedures; printing and distribution of a finance handbook at headquarters level and in regional branches.
3. Provision of training by regional resource person for the governing board, as well as the presidents and secretaries general of regional branches in governance and management, and in the specific roles and responsibilities of the components of the Movement in relation to the HNRCS to facilitate the effective coordination of partnerships

Objective 2: To reinforce the capacity of Red Cross branches on either side of the Haitian/Dominican Republic border.

The political, economic and social situation in Haiti remains volatile, and fighting may erupt again. It is therefore important to develop the response capacity of the branches along both sides of the Haitian/Dominican Republic border, where migration is taking place, and where there may be larger population movements should the situation in Haiti deteriorate.

Activities under the revised plan of action:

1. Organization of an initial meeting with staff/volunteers from two selected pairs of branches, Belladère – Elias Piñas and Anse-à-Pitre – Pedernales, and encourage support and collaboration between them in identifying vulnerable groups, evaluating their needs and providing basic services to them.
2. Coordination with PAHO and the Dominican Red Cross regarding the participation of Red Cross volunteers in a planned PAHO vaccination campaign on both sides of the Haitian/Dominican Republic border at the end of April.
3. Translation, adaptation and use of a branch development manual (developed in the Panama Regional Delegation).
4. Training of volunteers in Red Cross principles, first aid and vulnerability and capacity assessment (VCA).
5. Equipping of branches with basic equipment and emergency response materials, such as cotton vests with the Red Cross emblem and First Aid kits.
6. Provision of material to complete the rehabilitation of the Quanamthe local branch office.

External coordination activities

Overall coordination

The Federation continues to participate, jointly with the ICRC, in the weekly coordination meetings hosted by OCHA for all agencies. The role of the Military Interim Force and its relations with humanitarian organizations was the principal discussion point during the current reporting period.

Telecommunications

A specific telecommunications meeting is being planned by the Federation for all agencies involved in this activity (including Movement partners, UNSECOORD, WFP and OXFAM) to enable technical staff to discuss common issues, which include frequency licenses, security of installations located in remote areas and pooling of resources, maintenance tasks and information.

Health

The WHO is preparing a national evaluation mission, and the Federation will assign a health delegate to participate in this mission. In the meantime, contact was made with WHO/PAHO regarding possible collaboration between PAHO and the Haitian National Red Cross Society through the involvement of Red Cross volunteers

from the branches along the border with the Dominican Republic to participate in a polio vaccination campaign planned for the end of April.

Water and Sanitation

Discussions are being held with OXFAM to coordinate activities in the north west of the country where OXFAM is implementing emergency water distribution and chlorination over a six to eight week period. OXFAM is planning a further intervention of a six month period involving water and sanitation, hygiene and food security.

Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement -- Principles and initiatives

- The Federation is working with the HNRCS, in close cooperation with the ICRC, to ensure an impartial response to the current crisis and to assist the most vulnerable.
- The Federation will continue helping the HNRCS to work in the framework of its approved national development plan (NDP) and the present emergency plan of action.
- Coordination between all components of the Movement is taking place under the ICRC, as lead agency; external partnerships are sought in order to maximize resources and ensure optimum impact of activities.
- A weekly meeting, chaired by the ICRC, is held for Red Cross Movement partners and covers operational and security issues. The negotiation of a tripartite Memorandum of Understanding (also open to Partner National Societies working in Haiti) is expected to be completed at field level within the next few days.

Communications – Advocacy and Public Information

A special section on the Federation web site under the Disaster Management Information System (DMIS) has been set up regarding the situation in Haiti and the Federation's response to the crisis.

Information and photographs describing the progress and challenges of the rehabilitation of the VHF radio network by the Federation telecommunications delegates was provided to the Communications Department of the Secretariat in Geneva.
