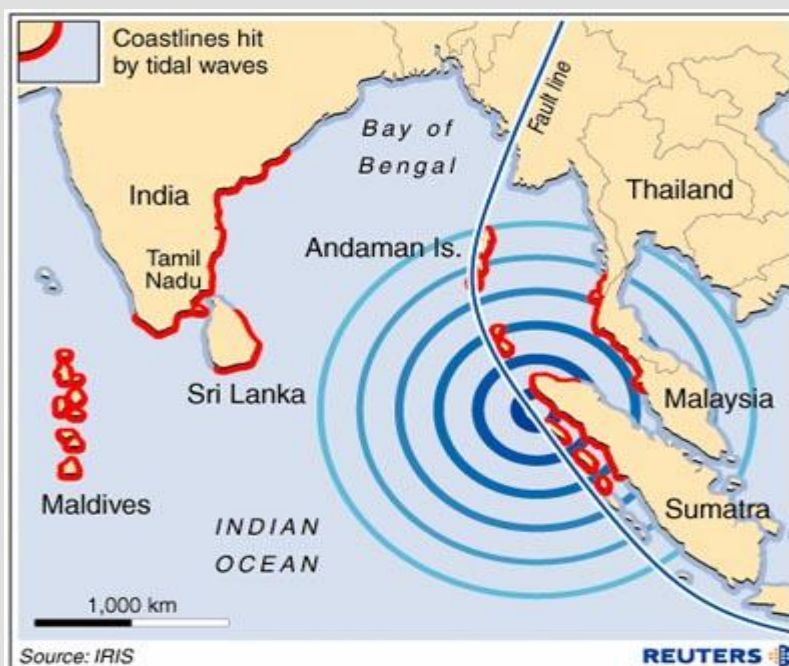

In Brief

Preliminary Appeal No. 28/2004; Operations Update no. 2; Period covered: 27-28 December, 2004; Appeal coverage: fully covered; a revised appeal and plan of action is under preparation. The list of contributions is being updated and will be posted to the Federation's website shortly.

Appeal history:

- Launched on 26 December 2004 CHF 7,517,000 (USD 6,658,712 or EUR 4,852,932) for 6 months to assist 500,000 beneficiaries.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 1,000,000.
- Revised title: with this Operations Update no. 2 the title of the operation is being changed to "Asia: Earthquake and Tsunamis. This will also be reflected in the revised preliminary appeal to be issued tomorrow, 29 December 2004.



Outstanding needs: this appeal is fully covered, and a revised preliminary appeal and budget is under preparation, to be launched tomorrow, 29 December 2004. The list of contributions is being updated and will be posted to the Federation's website shortly.

Operational Summary: The Federation anticipates launching the revised preliminary emergency appeal tomorrow, 29 December, 2004. Two days after the disaster, the unprecedented severity and impact of the event in terms of the human toll is now clear, along with the emerging picture of the related humanitarian needs. Search and rescue efforts continue, along with assessments of the situation. The lack of information and communications continues to hamper a timely and effective response. The deployment of the Federation's Field Assessment and Coordination Teams (FACT) in Sri Lanka and Indonesia will generate the needed detailed information, and with the deployment of the Federation's Emergency Response Units (ERUs) for logistics, water and sanitation, basic health, and telecoms, the full range of Federation emergency response tools will be mobilized to support the national societies' response.

Tracing and restoring family links (RFL): the Federation and ICRC are coordinating tracing action and activities. The joint or linked tracing website address will be communicated in subsequent update or in the

revised preliminary appeal.

Background

The magnitude 9.0 earthquake that struck the area off the western coast of northern Sumatra Sunday morning, 26 December 2004, at 7:59 am local time (00:59 GMT), triggered massive tidal waves or tsunami's that swept into coastal villages and seaside resorts. The earthquake epicenter was located at 3.30 N, 95.78E at a depth of 10 kilometers (see map above). This area is historically prone to seismic upheaval due to its location on the margins of tectonic plates. The death toll continues to rise, with latest estimates recording over 25,000 dead (but indications that authorities think this figure could rise to 50,000), with an estimated 10,696 reportedly injured, over 33,000 missing, over 280,000 displaced, and over 200,000 homeless (see summary attached). These figures are still expected to increase. Anticipating the need to immediately respond in a large and coordinated fashion, the International Federation launched Preliminary Emergency Appeal no. 28/2004 to support the immediate relief and assistance activities of the national societies in the affected countries, with a particular focus on Sri Lanka, India, and the Maldives. The Federation is now preparing a revised interim appeal, expected to be launched tomorrow, 29 December 2004.

Operational developments & update on the Red Cross and Red Crescent, Government, and other agencies action

Objectives and activities planned

Objective 1: based on the assessment and evaluation of needs in the affected areas, distribute emergency shelter materials, food, and non-food relief items.

Activities planned:

- organize the purchase and transport of basic relief items (food and non-food, such as tarpaulin, mosquito nets, food, health kits, and family kits) to the affected areas.
- carry out door-to-door surveys to select and register people.
- distribute the relief items among the most vulnerable affected households focussing on targeted, affected areas.

Two days after the disaster, the unprecedented severity and impact of the event in terms of the human toll is now clear, along with the emerging picture of the related humanitarian needs. Search and rescue efforts continue, along with assessments of the situation. The lack of information and communications continues to hamper a timely and effective response. Please refer to the attached Federation mobilization table for information on relief items mobilized for his operation. Medical supplies and medicines for some 120,000 people have been sent to Sri Lanka,

to provide basic medical care and treat possible cases of diarrhoeal disease. Flights carrying relief items (including tents, medicines, food) from Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies around the world have arrived in Sri Lanka and more flights are due today.

A Federation field assessment and coordination team is on the ground in Sri Lanka, and eight emergency response units specialized in water and sanitation, health care, aid distribution, telecommunications and logistics are due to arrive today and tomorrow. Access to potable water is essential to avoid the propagation of waterborne disease, in particular malaria.

With more than 12,500 people dead, 250,000 displaced and at least 200,000 homeless, Sri Lanka is the hardest-hit country of the region. More than 40,000 people are being temporarily housed in 66 Red Cross camps and shelters and 14,000 are staying with relatives and friends.

In India, some 5,000 family kits have been distributed in the Chennai (Madras) region. These kits include blankets, cooking utensils, mosquito nets, clothes and other emergency items. Major casualties and emergency needs are expected from the Andaman and Nicobar islands.

Five emergency response teams are being sent to Indonesia to assist with water and sanitation, logistics, basic health and telecommunications. We fear the death toll and the numbers of homeless and injured will significantly rise in Indonesia as information comes in from outlying regions. A field assessment and coordination team will leave for the Maldives today.

The International Federation's preliminary appeal for 7.5 million Swiss francs, launched on 26 December, was fully covered within 12 hours.

Indonesia

More than 10,000 people were feared dead in Indonesia as a result of the earthquake and the consequent tsunamis. The conflict-prone province of Aceh is the worst affected, with death toll reaching 7,000 according to the provincial government. The Indonesian government estimates that the death toll could be as high as 25,000. Rice is being distributed but there is shortage of ready food. The WFP is organizing an airplane to transport ready-food tomorrow to the affected areas. The government is distributing fresh water but this is not sufficient for the affected population. Many health facilities were damaged in Aceh. Medicines, especially antibiotics, and shelter materials are urgently needed. It is expected that the Indonesian government will open Aceh province for foreign aid agencies tomorrow. UNOCHA has an assessment team in Jakarta to be deployed tomorrow.

The Federation has mobilized a five-member FACT consisting of a team leader and four specialists in health, logistics, water-sanitation, information and reporting. The team will arrive in Jakarta tomorrow (29 December). ERU teams specialized in water and sanitation, telecommunications, logistics and basic health care are being made ready to support the emergency relief operation in Indonesia. The Federation regional programme coordination has been assigned to assist the country delegation and is arriving 28 December evening in Jakarta.

More than 300 volunteers are actively engaged in relief activities in Aceh providing first aid, search and transport, with more standing by in case of further needs. The society is purchasing urgently required body bags, burial cloths, cloths and masks for volunteers. A medical team of five doctors and nurses will be sent to Aceh tomorrow. The Indonesian Red Cross and the Federation delegation are arranging helicopters for the assessment teams and medical personnel to reach the affected areas as access is still limited due to heavy military presence in the area and disrupted road and telephone communications.

The Japanese Red Cross has pledged CHF 1.2 million for the relief operation in Indonesia with more contributions underway and is deploying a basic health care ERU to Aceh. USAID is supporting Indonesian Red Cross through the Federation and more donors have indicated support.

Malaysia

The death toll in Malaysia from a tsunami which devastated coastlines across southern Asia has reached 65. Some 183 were injured, unknown number of people is missing and about 25,000 people were affected. The northern states of Penang and Kedah are the worst affected. Weather officials warn that continuing tremors may signal the approach of another wave. Several subsequent tremors of magnitudes between 5.5 and 6.1, including one this morning have been recorded.

According to the Malaysian Red Crescent, the strong tidal waves have killed 44 people and affected about 25,000 people. An unknown number of people are still missing and search and rescue continues. Four local Red Crescent branches have been working non-stop to assist the affected people in cooperation with the government and other agencies in about five localities affected. Some 5,000 blankets were jointly distributed with the welfare department. The society will be compiling daily update and share with the Federation regional delegation in Bangkok.

The Malaysian Red Crescent has sent an initial contribution of USD 10,000 from its relief fund to the Indonesian Red Cross to assist the affected people in Aceh. A nation-wide appeal was also launched, in collaboration with its media partners, to urge for public support for the Red Cross Red Crescent response in Southeast Asia. A five-member medical and relief team comprising a doctor, a relief specialist, an information officer, a photographer and a camera person was also sent to Jakarta this morning to support the Indonesian Red Cross activities. At the same time, another seven Red Crescent staff also went to Indonesia this afternoon as part of the government SMART assessment team requested by the Indonesian government. The society will deploy additional relief officers to other tsunami affected countries as required.

Thailand

The confirmed death toll rose to 918 in Thailand with more than 1,000 others still missing. Massive rescue and recovery operations, one of the country's largest, are continuing on land, sea and air. Thai officials expect the death toll to reach 2,000. Provinces battered by the tsunamis were Ranong, Phang Nga, Phuket, Krabi, Satun and Trang. Most of the casualties were in Phuket and Phang Nga. Armed forces and private businesses and volunteer workers raced against time to seek out survivors.

Thai Red Cross headquarters called an internal meeting today to coordinate its relief activities and address visibility issues of the national society response to the disaster. Further to the deployment of a team of doctors and setting up health centres in four locations in the affected provinces, hundreds of doctors and nurses have approached the society volunteering their services. The society, in coordination with the Narenthorn emergency health centre of the ministry of health, has sent another team of 30 nurses, transported by the Thai airforce, at 01:30pm to Ta Kua Pa district in the worst affected province of Phang Nga. The society has received a huge amount of relief supplies, including medicines but has emphasized preference for direct cash contributions which will allow flexibility to procure urgently required relief items. Drinking water, food and transportation are priority needs. The Thai air force continues to assist the society in transporting relief good to the affected areas.

The Thai government has allocated around USD 6.3 million for six provinces for immediate relief assistance. Additional grants are also underway. International assistance has not been requested. The main focus of concern of the government is dealing with the relatives and friends of tourists who were killed, injured or are still missing. The government authorities with support of many organizations including the Thai Red Cross are working very hard to ensure the proper care and treatment of the injured (both foreign and Thai nationals) and in close collaboration with the diplomatic community to ensure that the deceased are identified and their families informed. Medical personnel, medicines, search and rescue teams, helicopters and body bags are the priority needs in the affected areas as search and rescue and emergency relief remains the primary focus of the government. A coordination centre has been set up in Bangkok to provide assistance to the foreigners en route back to their home country, and to handle tracing requests from arriving families and friends of the deceased, missing or injured.

The Thai government has created several websites in both Thai and English with names of the dead and missing, in addition to setting up several hotlines and teams to handling tracing requests for both local and foreign nationals. The local hospital and health facilities in the affected provinces have also been efficient in updating the lists of the deceased and injured. The ICRC and the Federation are working closely with the Thai Red Cross to follow up on any possible Red Cross tracing support.

Myanmar

There is no official news of total damage in Myanmar. The government team visited Labutta in Irrawaddy delta. From this visit and information gathered from other sources, (yet to be confirmed) the death toll is put at more than 90. An unknown number of fishing boats are also reported missing.

A inter-agency meeting was held on 28 December morning in which representatives of UN, international and foreign government agencies including the Federation, Myanmar Red Cross, ICRC, UNDP, UNHCR, UNICEF, WFP, WHO, MSF(Ch), CARE, SCUK, DFID, British embassy and JICA were present. It is generally believed that Irrawaddy delta and its southernmost coast is the worst hit area with no damage reported in Rakhine and only slight damage reported in Myeik. Information about the situation at southernmost part and other areas is still unclear or unavailable. UNDP, JICA and UNICEF program offices and personnel at the Irrawaddy delta are conducting assessments in their respective areas.

Myanmar Red Cross volunteer team is going to conduct a field assessment from Labutta to Pyinzalu, which is at the southern part of delta, to evaluate the extent of the damage at southern Irrawaddy. MSF has also sent one of their medical teams from Myeik to Kawthoung. Their boat will be dispatched later this week to archipelago area at Andaman Sea.

Next coordination meeting is scheduled for 30 December at the Federation delegation office. Meanwhile, the Federation will act as focal point to gather and disseminate with other different agencies their priority concerns, expertise and areas of interest along with their latest assessment findings.

India

The state of Tamil Nadu in India is one of the worst affected states where 3,200 people are reported dead. The district of Nagapattinam in Tamil Nadu saw the highest number of casualties with 2,300 dead. The situation is very grim and the devastation is widespread. People are taking shelter in whatever public houses are still standing, with no proper sanitation facilities available. Search and rescue operations are being continued by the government and many people are still missing in different areas, especially fishermen. About 18 relief centers have been set up through the worst affected districts. In the Andaman & Nicobar Islands, 3,000 people have reportedly been killed. In Pondicherry, 337 people have died and hundreds of fishermen are still missing. 97 casualties have been reported from Andhra Pradesh, while the death toll in the state of Kerala has reached 150. In the Car Nicobar Island, 100 Indian Air Force personnel have reportedly been washed away. Houses and roads are still under water. The extent of the damage is not fully clear as communication lines, especially with the outlying islands, are still down. To gauge the full extent of the damage it could take days or even weeks.

In the Andaman and Nicobar Islands, the Red Cross DP stocks were released from Salt Lake (Kolkata) warehouse on request from the Andaman Red Cross branch. This was airlifted by the local airline, Jet Airways from Kolkata. This has been received by the Andaman branch and distribution is ongoing. An additional 2,000 family packs are being sent to the Andaman branch with help from Indian Airlines tomorrow. The family packs contain tarpaulin sheets, cotton blankets, bed sheets, towels, kitchen utensils, clothing in the form of saris and dhotis. According to the Secretary of the Andaman branch the district administration is not allowing any teams to arrive on the island due to unsafe conditions and warnings of further tsunami's. The islands are currently inaccessible, making it impossible to perform a proper assessment.

In Tamil Nadu, the assessment team organized by the Indian Red Cross Society (with the participation of the Joint Secretary Dr. Ganthimathi and the Federation DM delegate, together with the IRCS Secretary General in Chennai) met with the state branch and then went on to see the affected sites of Chennai city. The IRCS national headquarters has released 4,000 pieces each of saris, dhotis, bed sheets and towels for distribution in the affected areas of Tamil Nadu from the Arakonam warehouse (Tamil Nadu). More materials will be dispatched to the affected areas through local procurement of the basic items such as bed sheets, clothes (Saris & Dhotis) and blankets.

The Joint Secretary, IRCS and the Federation DM delegate further visited Nagapattinam district, Tamil Nadu and met the district branch representatives. The local municipality is providing basic health care and food. In some places cooked food is being provided to those affected. People are being treated for injuries. 25 doctors and 15 ambulances are presently functional at the Nagapattinam district hospital.

The state branch is actively involved in relief operations and is also coordinating with other stakeholders present. 20 truckloads of drinking water have been distributed by Red Cross volunteers in three districts in cooperation

with Coca Cola India. Local volunteers (300) provided with surgical masks and gloves are helping the people most in need, and have set up a Red Cross post center in the district hospital to register people. A tracing cell has been set up within the hospital compound. So far 340 cases have been registered for tracing, including 128 people who are from states other than Tamil Nadu. Three children have been traced and the volunteers are trying to restore their family links. Additional medicinal support is required. No statistics are yet available on the number of displaced.

In Kerala, the Kerala state branch is providing cooked food to the affected in the district of Kollam, the worst hit in the state of Kerala. According to Mr. Vinod Dua, correspondent with NDTV (local news channel), the only people seen to be helping are Red Cross personnel. Requests have been coming in to the national headquarters for supply of relief material in the form of blankets, cooking vessels, bed sheets and food packs.

Objective 2: complement local reconstruction initiatives through the distribution of essential building materials and basic tools.**Activities planned:**

- organize, purchase and make available basic building and repair tools.
- carry out door-to-door surveys to select and register people.
- undertake distribution among the households in the targeted areas.

Action for this objective is pending further assessments and the priority delivery of basic relief.

Federation Coordination

The Federation is managing this operation from its Secretariat in Geneva, supported by its regional delegations in Bangkok and New Delhi and country delegations across the disaster zone, including Indonesia and Sri Lanka. Some 15 national societies participated in a conference call held today (Monday 27 December) at the Federation Secretariat in Geneva. The Federation Southeast Asia delegation organized the first regional coordination meeting in Bangkok today (28 December). Representatives from Oxfam, UNDP, Catholic Relief Services, American Refugee Committee International, ICRC and CARE attended. A similar meeting has been convened for next Tuesday (4 January).

Communications – Advocacy and Public Information

Given the scope and scale of this disaster, there is intense media focus and interest in the response. The Federation has been well-featured across radio, television, and other media components, and continues to meet the need to provide updated and accurate information, both externally and internally.
