## ASIA: EARTHQUAKE & TSUNAMIS

25 January 2005

### In Brief

**Revised Preliminary Appeal No. 28/2004; Operations Update no. 28; Period covered: 24-25 January 2005; Appeal coverage: 88.9%** ([Click here to view the provisional contributions list attached, also available on the Federation's website](#)).

#### Appeal history:

- Preliminary appeal launched on 26 December 2004 for CHF 7,517,000 (USD 6,658,712 or EUR 4,852,932) for 6 months to assist 500,000 beneficiaries.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 1,000,000.
- Revised Preliminary Appeal issued on 29 December 2004, for CHF 67,005,000 (USD 59,152,246 or EUR 53,439,988) for 2 million beneficiaries for 6-8 months.
- The Preliminary Appeal was originally launched titled "Bay of Bengal: Earthquake and Tsunamis". The title was subsequently changed to "Asia: Earthquake and Tsunamis" in the Revised Preliminary Appeal launched on 29 December 2004.
- Operations update No. 16 issued on 12 January 2005 revised the Revised Preliminary Appeal 28/2004 budget to CHF 183,486,000 (USD 155,286,000 or EUR 118,669,000) with programme extensions for Sri Lanka, Indonesia, the Maldives and East Africa.

#### Highlights of the Day:

- **Red Cross ERU water distribution has recently been extended to Arugam Bay to provide water to 14,000 beneficiaries in the area.**
- **In Indonesia, constraints in transportation, leading to difficulties in getting relief goods through the pipeline and moving staff to the field, are beginning to ease.**
- **Urgently sought for Indonesia: head of operations and programme coordinators for logistics, health and water-sanitation.**
- **Official death toll rises to over 276,000.**

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## Background

The magnitude 9.0 earthquake that struck the area off the western coast of northern Sumatra on Sunday morning, 26 December 2004, at 7:59 am local time (00:59 GMT) triggered massive tidal waves, or tsunamis, that inundated coastal areas in countries all around the Indian Ocean rim – from Indonesia to Somalia. Sri Lanka, the Indonesian province of Aceh, four states of southern India, the Maldives, coastal areas of Thailand, Malaysia, and Myanmar were the most severely affected. The earthquake epicentre was located at 3.30 N, 95.78E at a depth of 10 kilometres. The area is historically prone to seismic upheaval due to its location on the margins of tectonic plates. However, tidal waves of this magnitude are rare and therefore the level of preparedness was very low.

Thousands of staff, relief and medical personnel, and volunteers of the Red Cross and Red Crescent societies of the tsunami-affected countries have provided a vital initial response, in search and rescue, clean-up, providing temporary shelter and immediate relief assistance, emergency medical services, psychological first aid and tracing. It is estimated that over 5,000 Red Cross and Red Crescent volunteers and 76 relief and medical teams have been mobilized in the disaster-affected areas.

The Federation immediately launched a Preliminary Emergency Appeal on the day of the disaster with a focus on Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives. On 3 January 2005, the ICRC launched budget extensions additional to its 2005 Emergency Appeal for Indonesia and Sri Lanka. Along with initial support from the country and regional delegations, the Federation deployed within 24-72 hours three [Field Assessment and Coordination Teams \(FACT\)](#) and 18 [Emergency Response Units \(ERU\)](#) in the sectors of water and sanitation, health care, aid distribution, telecommunications, and logistics/transportation to Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives.

A total of 77 relief flights have now arrived in the various affected countries and a further 31 flights are in the Federation relief pipeline, making a total of 108 relief flights coordinated through the Federation.

The Federation and the ICRC in Geneva are currently working on an organizational framework for Movement coordination in the tsunami operations. A note has been sent out to national societies and delegations on this today, for consultation. It is expected that the framework, which will set in place strong platforms for coordination, will be finalized shortly, and a final note will be sent out by the Federation and the ICRC next week.

## Operational Developments

### Indonesia

#### Overview

The UN's Joint Logistics Centre (UNJLC) is coordinating with the outgoing military forces and laying out plans for a smooth transition from military to non-military assets. The UN deputy coordinator for humanitarian operations in Sumatra declared that the UN would send in more helicopters – likely up to 15 – to provide service to the pockets of population that cannot be accessed by other means. Meanwhile, troops from Japan's largest military deployment since World War II arrived in Aceh yesterday, in order to help tsunami victims.

The Indonesian State Secretary said on Monday that the central government would start the rehabilitation and reconstruction of Banda Aceh after March 25, when a special authority board (BOK) will have been formed. The headquarters of BOK will be in Aceh and the organization will be led by an official with ministerial status, who will be directly responsible to the president. Various governmental ministries and agencies (including the Attorney General's Office, the National Agrarian Agency and the National Bank of Indonesia) have indicated that they would be using unconventional methods to cope with post-tsunami legal issues, in order to facilitate the replacement of documents, such as land titles, identity cards and bank books. As of 22 January, 54 of 241 sub-district administrations and 647 of 5,958 village administrations throughout the affected area were not yet functioning. Some 800 civil servants in Aceh province have now been declared dead, with a further 2,410 missing.

WHO announced that health conditions in the disaster area were improving and that no major epidemics were anticipated thanks to the quick response of medical teams in handling diseases, which helped prevent rapid spreading. WHO deployed a team of eight coordinators to operate a surveillance system in order to prevent any future outbreaks. The organization is also setting up laboratories to support prevention measures. There are currently four laboratories set up at emergency and general hospitals, as well as at ICRC facilities in Banda Aceh and Meulaboh.

A recent quick assessment by the UN in some refugee camps around Banda Aceh revealed that some 13 per cent of children aged under five years were showing signs of malnourishment due to the limited variety of food (slightly higher than the national average of nine per cent). As a result, programmes will focus on the nutritional diversification of food supplies – as well as on improving water and sanitation conditions.

There were recent reports of survivors leaving camps for internally displaced persons (IDPs), to move in with relatives or rebuild their villages. The preferred option appears to be to rebuild their homes in their communities. Federation delegates and other eyewitness accounts report survivors sifting through the rubble in order to salvage building material and other household items of use. According to UN sources, the number of relief camps has dropped some 75 per cent in the past week, from 385 to less than a 100. The number of people in any one camp ranges from a few hundred to about 2,000. The government has said that it intends to build temporary housing for 100,000 survivors, along with mosques, schools and medical facilities. A government blueprint is in the works and is expected to be approved within the coming weeks.

Federation delegates in the field indicate that local people are showing high resilience as they look to rebuild their shattered lives and are showing great effort in helping themselves. It is now estimated that 3,000 villages and urban communities were destroyed or badly damaged. Although the devastation is enormous – particularly to people just arriving in the area – delegates on the ground nevertheless report that there have been visible signs of progress over the past two weeks.

#### Coordination

On Tuesday, 25 January, the Federation's Recovery Assessment Team organized an informal coordination meeting with the various partner national societies (PNS) present in Indonesia. The purpose of the meeting was to

present an overview of PMI activity and future plans in the disaster-affected area, as well as to outline the terms of reference and activities of the Recovery Assessment Team. ICRC representatives also presented an overview of the security situation. A draft organizational framework for the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement (the Movement) coordination in Indonesia was shared with the assembled representatives. It is expected that this framework will be formally agreed by the Indonesian Red Cross (Palang Merah Indonesia/PMI) over the next few days, at which point it will be officially made public.

The PMI board held a meeting today to discuss and agree on its rehabilitation and capacity-building programme.

The head of the Federation's Recovery Assessment Team underlined the fact that the Movement's response in recovery and rehabilitation was based on a number of critical assumptions:

- A comprehensive role for PMI-led action would be agreed with the government;
- The security situation in Aceh would allow for ongoing humanitarian activity; and
- Recognition that 'humanitarian space' in the disaster-affected area is likely to be limited in scope.

These factors will influence how much the Movement will ultimately be able to do. PMI, the Federation and ICRC representatives appealed for patience while detailed plans were developed and stressed the need for a closely coordinated approach, with PMI assuming the lead in Movement activities.

The Recovery Assessment Team will be holding another informal meeting with PNSs, to outline its preliminary conclusions, on Friday, 4 February.

### **Red Cross and Red Crescent action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints**

Four weeks after the tsunami, the Movement (PMI together with ICRC, the Federation and various PNSs) is still involved in a range of activities, including evacuation, body retrieval, relief distribution, health services, restoring family links, and the provision of shelter, clean water and sanitation. PMI reports that more than 20 Red Cross and Red Crescent societies have provided their support through the national society.

PMI currently has more than 1,200 volunteers in the field, assisting with the relief operation and pursuing the difficult task of body recovery. Psycho-social support, in the form of organized de-briefing, is being organized by PMI for teams returning from the field. Despite the thankless job, morale among the teams – generally youth members in their late teens and early twenties – is said to be high, with a very strong level of commitment apparent.

With the departure of the Canadian Red Cross' head of the Medan sub-office (previously based in the Batam logistics cell), the disaster management trainee delegate from the Jakarta delegation has now moved to Medan to take charge of the day-to-day operations.

**Overall Goal: Up to 100,000 internally displaced and otherwise affected families (approximately 500,000 people) in western Aceh receive adequate and timely emergency humanitarian assistance over the next six months.**

**Objective 1 (emergency relief): Basic supplementary food and non-food needs of the 500,000 IDPs and most vulnerable beneficiaries are met so that they can start rebuilding their future.**

#### Impact

Relief goods are mobilizing more smoothly through the pipeline, with a steady stream of non-food items reaching the target communities. Relief distribution figures are currently being compiled from the Banda Aceh operations base, and further details will be available later this week.

#### Constraints

Constraints in transportation, leading to difficulties in getting goods through the pipeline, are beginning to ease. Up until very recently, there were serious logistical challenges in moving staff and supplies to the field. The first relief delegates arrived in the field on 19 January. The Federation's team considers that it now has both the logistical means and the relief capacity to significantly increase the scope and scale of its relief distributions. This is expected to be reflected in a noticeable difference in the relief operation within the next week.

**Objective 2 (logistics): PMI will have a strengthened supply chain capability and capacity to ensure timely transport of material and human resources to the areas of operation.**

#### Progress / Achievements

Having assessed the various supply routes, it has now been decided that Teunom will be served by road from Meulaboh, as there are serious restrictions on landing boats in Meulaboh.

The confirmed relief plan enables logistics to control the back end of the supply chain by calling forward the requisite resources to the staging points in Banda Aceh and Meulaboh in preparation for the monthly distributions.

From Banda Aceh, the team is currently using five helicopters (three on charter and two hired as needed). Logistics is also running five boats (3-10 tonnes in weight) with relief supplies loaded at the local port. Negotiations are underway to hire both a 500-ton and a 100-ton landing craft, to be used for distribution to Lam No and Calang.

A vehicle was airlifted to Meulaboh, in support of the Federation's sub-office team setup. Furthermore, a Land Cruiser was airlifted to Teunom and a Hilux to Meulaboh, in support of the German Red Cross and Spanish Red Cross ERUs, respectively.

### **Impact**

A detailed supply and distribution plan to assist 22,000 affected families has now been developed. In addition, a finalized logistics assessment provides an overview of transport and logistics requirements. Based on this, relevant assets are being positioned to support the operation. Furthermore, shortfalls in the current pipeline against proposed distribution and local procurement activity have now been identified.

The procurement of food parcels for 22,000 families over six months has begun.

### **Constraints**

Longer-term arrangements for ongoing air and sea transport are being negotiated. The rotation of logistics staff is in process, with a need for proper handovers as vacancies continue to be filled. With the imminent departure of the logistics coordinator, this remains the most urgent position to be filled within the overall emergency operation. There have been no candidates proposed yet. This is a crucial vacancy, which the Federation's Human Resource Department is urgently looking to fill.

**Objective 3 (health): primary health care service provided to the tsunami-affected communities and potential epidemics are prevented or adequately addressed.**

### **Progress / Achievements**

A PMI counterpart to work alongside the Federation's health coordinator has now arrived in Medan.

#### **German Red Cross BHCU – Teunom**

The BHCU treated 101 patients on 24 January, bringing the cumulative total to 1,841 patients. There have been reports of an unusually high incidence of watery diarrhoea, however this has been put down to the new case definition being put in place by the director of public health. There are currently 11 patients in the clinic. This number is expected to stabilize at between five and 10.

With the rotation of the PMI volunteer teams, the mobile clinic has been put on hold, pending the arrival of the new team. Other PMI general volunteers continue with the mapping of surrounding villages. The new German Red Cross BHCU has arrived in Batam and will be going to Banda Aceh tomorrow, from where they will be transported onwards.

#### **Japanese Red Cross BHCU – Meulaboh**

The Federation's health coordinator met with the outgoing ERU team leader in Medan for a debriefing. The replacement ERU equipment (seven tonnes) arrived by convoy to Meulaboh. This will be erected as a base on the site of the PMI IDP camp, to provide a permanent clinic. At last count, there were 1,200 IDPs on site, with numbers rising. The measles vaccination campaign is ongoing.

A team of Belgian Red Cross doctors has arrived and is reported to be carrying out triage at the hospital. The Korean Red Cross team has now left Meulaboh.

### Constraints

Difficulties with the transportation of PMI volunteers to the field are proving to be a constraint in the smooth rotation of the teams. There seems to be an overall lack of coordination of health activities on the ground, exacerbated by the constant arrival of new agencies looking to be involved. This is making it difficult for the PMI to maintain a high profile, despite the key role it continues to play.

**Objective 4 (water and sanitation): the spread/outbreak of infectious diseases is prevented through water and sanitation interventions.**

### Progress / Achievements

The team leader of the Swedish Red Cross ERU and an Austrian Red Cross water and sanitation team member were dispatched to Lam No for an assessment of the situation and to hold discussions with other agencies operating on the ground.

### Meulaboh

With the arrival of the two water tankers, the overall production capacity of the Spanish Red Cross' water and sanitation ERU is set to increase. Discussions are underway with the Danish Red Cross base camp for sanitation support to the camp.

### Teunom

The Federation's water and sanitation coordinator met with the German Red Cross team to discuss operations. Chlorine, as well as a bicycle for operation support, were delivered. Both the 5,000-litre bladder tank set up in town and the 1,500-litre bladder set up in the school grounds were well received by the community and are being used by IDPs.

The German Red Cross' ERU team, along with PMI, has begun building latrines in the school grounds and at selected IDP settlements. A general sanitation plan is being discussed with PMI. The German Red Cross ERU team will be rotating out on 27 January, with replacements expected to arrive by 26 January. The replacement team has already arrived in Batam and is travelling onwards, as planned.

### Calang

ERU team members were dispatched to Lam No to assess the situation, following information that MSF may be leaving the area and are looking for water and sanitation replacements.

### Sigli / Salamanga

A requisition for 5,000 water containers has been made. Forty tanks of 3,000-litres capacity have now been set up in the IDP settlements, as distribution points for community access to water. Despite rotations and the undertaking of other activities, the ERU continues to function well.

### Impact

For the first time since the beginning of the operation, all personnel were functioning in place and there were no disruptions from outside sources.

### Constraints

Administrative support to delegate activities in the field needs to be bolstered.

**Objective 5 (telecommunications): fast and reliable means of communication is secured in the areas of the relief operation.**

### Progress / Achievements

The telecommunications coordinator is in the field, reviewing operations at various sites.

## Sri Lanka

### Overview

According to the government's Centre for National Operations (CNO), the spread of infectious diseases in tsunami-hit areas of Sri Lanka has been contained because of prompt action and preventative measures by the Ministry of Health. A key strategy in the prevention of infectious diseases was early diagnosis and treatment of infectious diseases. The fact that affected areas were virtually free of such disease also contributed to the low numbers of infectious diseases in the country.

According to reports received to date, nearly 44,000 beneficiaries have received vital food and non-food items including drinking water, health support, medical assistance and logistics support distributed through the Sri Lankan Red Cross Society (SLRCS), and seven Emergency Response Units (ERUs) of the Federation. The ICRC complements these efforts with its relief activities in the eastern part of the country; meanwhile, tracing activities in Ampara district are ending today.

### Coordination

The SLRCS has been signing memoranda of understanding with several partner national societies (PNS) working on short-term activities in the country. Long-term needs, once identified, will require more formal agreements between the SLRCS as well as the Federation and ICRC.

Working arrangements have begun with the SLRCS and ICRC to establish a Movement coordination mechanism including a service centre in Colombo. The service centre will be phased in as capacity is developed and offer, among its many services, logistics and administration support to PNS.

### Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress/achievements, impact, constraints

**Overall Goal: Up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) in the south of the country receive immediate relief, shelter, health and care, and community support over the next six months.**

**Objective 1 (water and sanitation): Adequate sanitation and water supply provided to a selected number of temporary shelters/welfare centres, and water and sanitation systems to serve the affected population.**

**Progress/Achievements:**

The German Red Cross' specialised water ERU and the Swedish Red Cross' mass distribution ERU are working closely together to improve water supply to beneficiaries. Initially, it was estimated some 20,000 people would have access to drinking water. Water distribution has recently been extended to Arugam Bay, with a 70 m<sup>3</sup>-capacity tank from Oxfam erected to provide water to 14,000 beneficiaries in the area.

Water provided in this way is used only for drinking purposes, while existing wells supply water for personal hygiene. About 110,000 litres of clean water are produced and distributed daily. Under consideration are plans to expand the distribution network and thus increase production to 150,000 litres per day. Water usage was initially estimated at four litres per capita per day. If these new beneficiaries are included, the amount of water/capita is estimated to be three litres per capita per day.

Well cleaning continues in Arugam Bay and as of 24 January, a total of 70 wells have been cleaned. The Swedish Red Cross ERU team also removed one 11 m<sup>3</sup> tank from the Finnish Red Cross' clinic to a camp housing 1,000, which is located between Pottuvil and Komari.

**Impact**

The number of beneficiaries having access to clean drinking water has increased, with the extension of water distribution to 14,000 people in Arugam Bay. The total number of beneficiaries receiving assistance is approximately 35,000.

**Objective 2 (shelter): Temporary shelter provided to up to 15, 000 families (about 75,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have no extended family to live with.**

**Progress / Achievements**

Some 3,000 tents, ordered from the American Red Cross, are in the pipeline. Meanwhile distribution of tents (on hold for the past week as the Sri Lankan government discussed concerns about the haphazard establishment of 'tent camps' around the country) has resumed with 250 tents distributed yesterday and a further 580 tents going out to affected families in the next few days. To date, nearly 1,200 tents have been distributed.

**Objective 3 (immediate livelihood restoration): The minimum livelihood requirements provided for up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have lost their belongings.**

**Progress / Achievements**

In the past five days the ERU of the American Red Cross provided an additional 2,160 families with non-relief food items (NRFI), bringing the total number of families assisted during the course of the tsunami operation to nearly 10,700 (or some 43,700 people).

Distribution of NRFI to the eastern district of Ampara is scheduled to begin tomorrow, coordinated by the American Red Cross' relief ERU and the ICRC sub-delegation, and carried out by SLRCS branches. Distribution will begin in Pottuvil and also cover Panama and Komari. Among other items, relief supplies include sleeping mats, bed sheets, blankets, jerry cans, hygiene kits and tents.

### Impact

Response from beneficiaries for NRFI supplied by the Federation continues to be high, with items such as sleeping mats in great demand.

### Capacity of the National Society

The SLRCS is in the final stages of planning, identifying its needs for the next one to five years, in a report to be completed in the coming days. Distribution of NRFI by the National Society branches has been going slowly but smoothly.

### Communications – Representation, Advocacy and Public Information

The Federation's information delegates and the media department of the SLRCS continue to provide media coverage, photo exchange, stories and interviews to the local and international media.

## India

### Overview (also refer to Operations Update 25)



*Indian Red Cross relief items in  
Tamil Nadu*

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) is holding a meeting on tsunami rehabilitation activities in Chennai on 27-29 January. The purpose of the meeting is to help the most vulnerable tsunami-affected people recover by reinforcing the activities undertaken and initiatives planned by the IRCS, thereby developing a comprehensive plan of action for rehabilitation/reconstruction activities. The meeting will also explore the possibilities for branch development and response preparedness at various levels.

Objectives of the meeting will be:

- to inform/share experiences regarding relief work undertaken by the IRCS national headquarters;
- to analyze the response from the branches to the questionnaire sent by the national headquarters
- to discuss the measures already taken and activities planned by the branches for undertaking the rehabilitation/reconstruction programme
- analyze the interventions from the major stakeholders and prioritize the IRCS intervention as per sectors and geographically;

- to explore the opportunities for branch development; and,
- to develop a possible plan of action with a tentative time frame - to agree on the monitoring and follow-up issues/mechanisms

#### Update on Indian Red Cross activities in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands:

As outlined in Operations Update 25, there were 2,000 family kits distributed last week in relief camps in the capital Port Blair and its outskirts. A total of 11,500 people benefited from this distribution. The contents of the family pack include:

Food basket: Milk powder, bottled water, biscuits and hygiene items such as phenyl.

Non-food basket: 1 kitchen set, 1 cotton blanket, 1 bed sheet, 1 towel, 1 piece of female clothing and 1 piece of male clothing, 1 plastic sheet, 1 plastic bucket.

The 4,000 family kits released from the national headquarters on 11 January reached the Andaman and Nicobar Islands on 16 January. Distribution of these relief materials (same as above except for the plastic bucket) has already started in some islands:

- Little Andaman – 1,500
- Car Nicobar – 1,500
- Nancowri – 1,000

The transportation of these relief items was made possible with the help of the local authorities. The seven-member national headquarters team present was responsible for distribution.

The national headquarters had previously mobilized five water purification plants along with 10 metric tonnes of alum and 10 metric tonnes of bleaching powder. A three-member team from the National Society consisting of an engineer, an electrician and a delegate from the Spanish Red Cross is in the process of setting up these units. On-the-job training for local volunteers will be provided.

The first plant is now operational in Port Blair and is providing safe water to relief camps via tankers supplied by the local authorities. Sites for the other three plants, on the outskirts of Port Blair, have been finalized.

## **Malaysia**

### **Overview**

On 24 January, the Malaysian Deputy Prime Minister that 1 February would be the last day for all local private companies to give contributions to the local tsunami fund.

With the tsunami fund standing close to RM80 million (CHF 25 million), the Deputy Prime Minister said the amount was more than adequate for Malaysia to start its rehabilitation programmes. Half of this amount has been disbursed to the beneficiaries via the National Disaster Fund. However, funds collected for tsunami beneficiaries in other affected countries are still seeking donations.

The Deputy Prime Minister said the National Housing Corporation would build 1,066 houses in Kota Kuala Muda in Langkawi and Penang for those directly affected by the tsunami.

According to a local English newspaper, 12 Malaysians are still missing since the tsunami, with six unaccounted for in Malaysia and the rest in Phuket, Aceh and Sri Lanka.

### **Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress/achievements, impact, constraints**

#### **National society health activities**

The medical team of the Malaysian Red Crescent Society (MRCS) dispatched to Banda Aceh, Indonesia, treated 3,435 patients between 29 December and 16 January.

According to the MRCS medical team, infected laceration wounds and pneumonia are the most prevalent diseases in the area. The medical team used the Malaysian Military Medical Unit and Rumah Sakit Kasdem (Kasdem Hospital) as referrals for complicated cases.

Logistics still remains a problem as patients have difficulties in accessing the medical team.

## **Thailand**

### **Overview**

The latest official death toll, as of 24 January 2005, is 5,384 (1,808 Thais, 1,892 foreigners and 1,684 unidentified) with 8,457 injured persons (6,065 Thais and 2,392 foreigners) and 3,130 persons missing (2,120 Thais and 1,010 foreigners).

The Thai Prime Minister has promised to speed up the identification of dead bodies in response to complaints from several European nations about the slowness of this process.

An initial THB 3.5 billion (CHF 107,772,169) from the government was released to the tsunami victims for distribution through ten subcommittees in the country that are assisting victims. Apart from allocations to other sectors such as agriculture, natural resources and transport, THB 506 million (CHF 15,580,776) will be disbursed for the construction of 3,600 new homes, including the repair of damaged infrastructure.

### **Coordination/Cooperation**

Today the Bangkok Regional Delegation hosted the fifth inter-agency meeting. The meeting was attended by the Federation and ICRC from the Movement and six other UN and non-governmental organizations. Information was shared in the meeting on the various work and progress of the different organizations working in Indonesia, Thailand, Myanmar and Malaysia. Some of the issues raised in the discussion included: the problems of reaching out to migrant worker populations; the need for better coordination and sharing of information on assessments; and an update on the first meeting of the inter-agency psycho-social working group.

Heads of the delegations from Thailand's European Commission and its humanitarian office (ECHO) visited the Thai Red Cross today to express sympathy for the tsunami victims in Thailand. ECHO had promptly allocated EUR 3 million (CHF 4.6 million) for the Federation's relief effort.

The regional office of the UN Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) in Bangkok and a Thai minister signed a joint agreement for FAO to start delivering cash to certain beneficiaries. The majority of the jobs held by those affected by the tsunami were in the fishing industry and this sector is in need of rapid rehabilitation to restore livelihoods. The FAO is planning to support about 8,700 fishermen and farmers.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), no disease outbreaks were reported in Thailand. However, the threat of water-borne and vector-borne diseases remains a concern and disease surveillance is high. Progress is being made in addressing the mental health needs of people in the affected areas. The Thai Mental Health Department has set up a centre for psycho-social services at its regional centre in Surat Thani. Teams of local psychologists and counselors are visiting areas affected by the disaster.

### **Red Cross and Red Crescent Action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints**

The cash donations to the Thai Red Cross' Relief and Community Health Bureau, as of 24 January, now total THB 153,800,029 (CHF 4,735,818).

The Thai Red Cross cooperated closely with the ICRC on its family links programme for the tsunami-affected population. The Thai Red Cross has designated two senior officials to work with the ICRC on this programme.

The Secretary General of the Thai Red Cross Society received a visit of the delegation from Magen David Adom (MDA) on 24 January to discuss assistance to tsunami victims. MDA has offered its support, with priority on

orphans, to be set up by the Thai Red Cross in cooperation with the government or other organizations. MDA will provide medical supplies and medical services, such as a mobile medical clinic.

### Human Resources

The recruitment of Federation delegates for Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Maldives and for the Federation's office in New York continues, and 21 posts remain to be filled, as detailed below. The recruitment of head of operations for Indonesia is extremely urgent. The recruitment for a logistics coordinator for the Banda Aceh operations centre (with strong procurement skills and knowledge of Federation systems) is also an urgent priority.
