SOUTH ASIA: EARTHQUAKE

14 October 2005

PRELIMINARY EMERGENCY APPEAL REVISED BUDGET NOW CHF 73.3 MILLION (USD 56.6 MILLION OR EUR 47 MILLION)

Appeal history:

- Preliminary Emergency Appeal launched on 9 October, 2005 for CHF 10,793,000 (USD 8,438,294 or EUR 6,957,415) for four months to assist 30,000 families (some 120,000 beneficiaries).
- As an increasingly serious situation has unfolded, the Preliminary Appeal budget was revised on 12 October to CHF 73,262,000 (USD 56,616,692 or EUR 47,053,307) for six months to assist up to 150,000 families (some 750,000 beneficiaries).
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 200,000.

Outstanding needs:

- The Preliminary Emergency Appeal revised budget is now 15% firmly covered. Response to the appeal to date has been slow, and cash contributions are very urgently needed in order for the Red Cross and Red Crescent to rapidly scale up their emergency operations.
- Large scale mobilization of relief items is needed; details are on the Federation's Mobilisation Table posted on DMIS. Most urgently needed items are: winterized tents, family tents, blankets, plastic sheeting/tarpaulin, kitchen sets, jerry cans, kerosene lamps, kerosene stoves and hygiene parcels.
- A comprehensive list of human resources needs will be available very shortly. In the meantime, Red Cross Red Crescent partners are asked to start sourcing urgently: a head of operations and coordinators/delegates for relief, logistics, IT/telecom, health, water-sanitation, security, reporting, information, administration, legal and finance. A Movement Coordinator is sought immediately.

Summary:

Concern is growing at the subdued response to the International Federation's appeal, with pledging slow for a disaster of this magnitude and media exposure. Current contributions - including in-kind and those awaiting confirmation - stand at less than 25 per cent. The extreme gravity of the situation in Pakistan cannot be over-emphasized with the international community facing a race against time to contain an even greater humanitarian disaster through the winter. The Federation is committing significant sums through purchase of goods and deployment of resources to kick-start and then to continue a vital operation whose initial phase will occupy the coming months, leading into an extensive recovery and rehabilitation component.

As is readily apparent from this operations update, activities to support those affected by the disaster are moving into full swing, with the logistics pipeline in place and distributions to the stricken areas gearing up rapidly. The International Federation and ICRC have signed a joint statement setting down management and coordination modalities for the first 60 days of the operation.

Following assessments and consultations, it is foreseen that with the upcoming winter, the affected people will be dependent on relief for the next six months, and will be extremely vulnerable. The relief operation promises to be long and difficult due to the lack of infrastructure, rugged terrain and remoteness of many affected people. This situation will only worsen when the rain and snow come.

In four weeks the winter will have arrived in many of the mountain areas and it is imperative that a steady supply of relief goods continues. It is essential that winter supplies arrive and are distributed as soon as possible and that humanitarian agencies operating in Pakistan remain, and maintain a broad, coordinated and substantial relief operation for the months to come.

Background

An earthquake with magnitude of 7.6 on the Richter scale centred 95 kilometers north-east of the Pakistan capital Islamabad struck at 0350 GMT on 8 October 2005. The quake severely affected northern areas of Pakistan and northern India. There have been over a hundred aftershocks.

The UN estimates the disaster has affected 4 million people (1 million severely) and made 500,000 people homeless. The official death toll in Pakistan has increased to 25,000 while Indian authorities say 1,300 people have died in Jammu and Kashmir.

The Pakistan government says the priority needs are helicopters, winterized tents, blankets, medicines, disinfectants, water purification kits and food (cooked and tinned, and high energy biscuits).

The International Federation has launched this Preliminary Emergency Appeal (no. 05EA022) in response to a request from the Pakistan Red Crescent Society. CHF 200,000 has been allocated from Federation's DREF Fund to mount the initial response. Given the size, scope, and geographic location of the disaster, and the difficulty in accessing the area to gather detailed damage information and humanitarian relief needs, this appeal is being launched on a preliminary basis with a focus on action in Pakistan.

Operational developments

The International Federation and the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) in a joint statement on 13 October outlined their respective roles and responsibilities regarding the management and coordination of Red Cross Red Crescent Movement resources, highlighting the tireless work of the Pakistan Red Crescent and Indian Red Cross in responding to the disaster. The joint statement stresses that the International Federation and the ICRC are committed to ensure that host national societies play a major role in planning, coordination and implementation of the operation.

The main aim is to ensure resources can be managed flexibly and deployed rapidly to the areas where they are most needed.

Key points in the agreement include:

- The Movement's response will be in phases with phase one to last 60 days. Following this, the ICRC, the International Federation and host National Societies will review the situation and move to the next phase which will include rehabilitation and development plans.
- For the initial 60-day phase, the ICRC and the International Federation have established a coordination team in Geneva, which will liaise with and support the operational field structures. This team will ensure regular communication with partner National Societies.
- The ICRC will be responsible for operational coordination of international Movement components in Pakistan-administered Kashmir. The International Federation will take on the operational coordination role elsewhere in Pakistan.
- A joint Pakistan Red Crescent/Federation/ICRC coordination mechanism will be established in Islamabad and a logistics agreement is in place (see 'Federation / ICRC Joint Logistics Operation in Pakistan' section later in this report).
- The ICRC will take on responsibility for the provision of overall security guidelines to all the components working internationally. In their respective areas of operational responsibility, the ICRC and the International Federation will provide and assure implementation of specific procedures for security management.

The UN's Chief Emergency Relief Coordinator today (Friday 14 October) called for a more urgent world aid response. He also stressed the need for relief/humanitarian organizations to make every effort to coordinate their responses. The Head of the Federation's FACT team had a meeting with the Coordinator in Islamabad today, detailing the Federation/ICRC/Pakistan Red Crescent response and discussing coordination and cooperation issues.

As outlined in Operations Update 3, the emergency operation is being significantly scaled up. The budget has been increased from CHF 10.8 million (USD 8.4 million or EUR 6.9 million) to CHF 73.2 million (USD 56.6 million or EUR 47 million). The number of targeted beneficiaries has been increased from 120,000 for four months to 750,000 for 6 months. Operations Update 3 included the summary revised budget.

The supply pipeline is up and running and substantial supplies have either arrived or are en route. See the emergency relief section later in this report.

A Field Assessment Coordination Team (FACT) has been deployed to Pakistan, comprising 17 members: team leader, disaster management and coordination, health, water and sanitation, relief, shelter, logistics, reporting / information, telecommunications, Emergency Response Unit (ERU) coordination, Regional Disaster Response Team (RDRT) coordination, Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement Coordination, finance and administration. FACT team members are from American Red Cross, Australian Red Cross, Austrian Red Cross, British Red Cross, Danish Red Cross, Finnish Red Cross, Norwegian Red Cross, Spanish Red Cross, Swiss Red Cross, Turkish Red Crescent and the Federation. A primary role for the FACT deployment is coordination and liaison, in addition to the vital assessment role, and supplementing the Federation's Pakistan country delegation, which prior to the disaster comprised a head of delegation and five national staff. All but one of the FACT team members have arrived in Islamabad, the remaining member to arrive very shortly. In addition, a shelter coordinator has arrived.

The FACT team is being bolstered with the deployment of a legal expert who will deal with issues such as establishing a legal status agreement for the operation, contracts, service agreements and cooperation agreements with various Movement partners.

A total of ten Emergency Response Units (ERUs) have been deployed so far are:

On behalf of the ICRC:

- Field hospital (Norwegian Red Cross/Finnish Red Cross)
- Logistics (British Red Cross)
- Two basic health care (German Red Cross and Japanese Red Cross)

For the Federation

- Logistics (Danish Red Cross/Spanish Red Cross) – has arrived in Islamabad
- IT/Telecommunications (Danish Red Cross) – has arrived in Islamabad
- Two basic health care (French Red Cross and Spanish Red Cross) – both arriving this weekend.
- Two specialized water ERUs (Austrian Red Cross and German Red Cross) and a mass water ERU (Austrian Red Cross) – en route.

National Societies/delegations from eight countries and the South Asia Regional Delegation have committed 35 personnel to the Regional Disaster Response Team (RDRT) to be utilized in the Pakistan operation. Ten personnel have now arrived. The contributing national societies/delegations are Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Malaysia, the Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines and Singapore. It is planned for RDRT members to be tasked to assist the Pakistan Red Crescent, the country delegation and operations in the field. They will cover areas such as relief, health and care, and logistics.

While road access continues to improve, there are major transportation problems. There are not enough trucks available to cope with the supplies coming in. The heavy aid traffic is causing significant delays in vehicles reaching their destinations. The Norwegian Red Cross is mobilizing 40 trucks to be used in relief operations, to be airlifted to Pakistan shortly. The Iranian Red Crescent has offered two helicopters for the operations.

Longer-term human resource issues are being examined. The Head of the FACT, the Head of Delegation Pakistan and the Head of the South Asia Regional Delegation are finalizing the longer-term needs and these will be reflected in future updates.

Other developments in the operation in Pakistan:

- A Qatar Red Crescent team has arrived in Pakistan with 19 medical staff and will be deployed to the field.
- The Turkish Red Crescent is establishing a 50-bed field hospital in Muzaffarabad.

The World Health Organisation reports that most of the 600 health clinics in affected areas have been destroyed and that 26 hospitals have been either destroyed or are too unstable to use. The WHO says there is a desperate shortage of medical personnel and that the numbers on the ground need to be doubled or even tripled to cope with the situation. There is a shortage of general practitioners with experience in emergencies and basic surgical skills, and of paramedics. The WHO notes that vulnerable communities crammed together out of necessity increase the risk of the spread of disease such as measles while poor conditions increase the incidence of the likes of water-borne diarrhoeal disease.

The Indian Red Cross Society is responding to the emergency situation in Jammu and Kashmir but at this stage is not seeking any funding under this appeal. It is resourcing its operation through existing stocks, existing Federation in-country budgets and support from ICRC and in-country partner national societies. Indian Red Cross state branches today launched a public fundraising campaign in India.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress, impact

Emergency relief (food and basic non-food items)

Objective: To meet the immediate shelter and supplementary food needs of 150,000 vulnerable families (some 750,000 beneficiaries) in affected areas in Pakistan-administered Kashmir, North West Frontier Province, and Islamabad.

Progress/Achievements (activities implemented within this objective)

In addition to in-country stocks already being mobilised, the supply pipeline is open and relief items are arriving every day. The latest supply figures are –

Today (Friday 14 October), a fleet of eight trucks filled with relief items left from the PRCS headquarters in Islamabad. Four are on their way to Muzaffarabad, two to Mansehra and two to Rawalakot. In the seven days since the quake struck, a total of 21 truckloads of relief have been dispatched from the national headquarters. In total, including dispatches from provincial branches, a total of 59 truckloads (including today's dispatch from the headquarters) of relief have been sent to affected areas.

Total relief goods despatched to date via the 21 trucks from the Pakistan Red Crescent from headquarters are as follows- (*note this is not an exhaustive list and covers major items only – a wide variety of other miscellaneous items have also been dispatched*)

*The food packs consist of 5 kgs rice, 5kgs sugar, 3 kgs daal channa, 400gms tea, 1kg milk powder.

The above items are being supplied from national societies from Austria, Belgium, Canada, France, Iran, the Netherlands, Spain, Switzerland, UK, USA, and some commercial organisations. Twelve truckloads of relief supplies from the Federation warehouse in Islamabad will be sent tomorrow (15 October) to Mansehra and Muzaffarabad. The shipment will include two Rubb halls, tents, blankets and plastic sheeting. Local Pakistan Red Crescent branch staff and volunteers will be utilised to assist with the distribution.

However, a lack of transport remains a critical constraint to move relief supplies coming in. The Pakistan Red Crescent Society transport fleet is currently fully committed and cannot cope with the supplies coming in. As noted in the operational developments section above, the Norwegian Red Cross is making a crucial contribution to deal with this situation, mobilising 40 trucks. The Iranian Red Crescent has made available two helicopters.

The four assessment teams deployed to the North West Frontier Province which were each made up of a doctor and a general relief person have completed their initial examinations of relief, health and shelter needs. They have all filed their initial assessments and these are being analysed and the findings will be fed into the ongoing relief operation, and the planning of the winter months.

The Indian Red Cross Society has indicated to the Federation India delegation and in-country partner national societies that it would welcome support for the immediate procurement of the following to assist in the relief effort in Jammu and Kashmir.

- 5,000 tents
- 30,000 blankets
- 5,000 mattresses
- 5,000 kitchen sets
- 5,000 metres of cloth

Constraints:

Trucks to transport relief materials are scarce. The existing Pakistan Red Crescent fleet is running at full capacity while the Federation is seeking as many vehicles as possible. As outlined above, the Norwegian Red Cross is mobilizing 40 trucks which will greatly assist the situation. As winter draws in, road transport will become unreliable. Remote communities in the hills and mountains will be made even more vulnerable once the weather deteriorates. Winter snow is just four weeks away for communities in the mountain areas.

Health

Objective: To meet the basic health care and first aid and emergency transport needs of 150,000 vulnerable families (some 750,000 beneficiaries) in Pakistan-administered Kashmir, North West Frontier province, and Islamabad.

Progress/Achievements (activities implemented within this objective)

The German Red Cross has given major support to achieving this objective, providing medical supplies for 50,000 people for three months. Five emergency health kits arrived on Wednesday night and have been transported to Abbottabad in North West Frontier Province for further distribution. Each kit includes medicines, disposables and instruments sufficient to support 10,000 people for three months.

Two basic health Emergency Response Units (French Red Cross and Spanish Red Cross) will have arrived in total in Islamabad by the weekend. The French unit will be deployed to Batgram and the Spanish unit is planned to go to Balakot.

Also en route or being formed are three water and sanitation ERUs. An Austrian Red Cross specialized water ERU, a Swedish mass water ERU and a German specialized water unit.

As noted in the operational developments section above, a Qatar Red Crescent team has arrived in Pakistan with 19 medical staff and will be deployed to the field while the Turkish Red Crescent is already establishing a 50-bed field hospital in Muzaffarabad.

The Pakistan Red Crescent has had two health teams from the Punjab provincial branch working in Muzaffarabad since 11 October. The teams incorporate two PRCS doctors, five PRCS paramedics and three volunteer paramedics. To date the teams have treated 800 people with 60 percent of these having injuries. The medical teams are also utilizing two ambulances from the Punjab Branch.

An outreach medical team comprising one of the PRCS doctors mentioned above, 12 volunteer doctors and eight volunteer paramedics from a private hospital in Faisalabad left today from Muzaffarabad to travel to remote villages.

A third medical team from the Karachi branch has just arrived in Muzaffarabad. The team is made up of a PRCS doctor, seven volunteer doctors and is supported by two ambulances and one transport vehicle.

Two PRCS medical teams staffed by two PRCS doctors, three volunteer doctors and one paramedic continue to operate in North West Frontier province.

The medical team which had been assisting victims of the apartment collapse in Islamabad has now wrapped up its operation.

The blood bank at the National Society headquarters in Islamabad continues to collect blood and has now collected a total of 508 units and a total of 246 units have been utilized. There are requests for blood for use in Muzaffarabad, Abbottabad and Mansehra and the coordination is underway with government authorities to arrange for transport.

Federation / ICRC Joint Logistics Operation in Pakistan

In order to ensure a most efficient and effective coordination of logistics efforts in Pakistan, the ICRC and the International Federation have established a joint logistics structure to support the operations of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement. There is daily coordination of activities at Geneva and field levels and regular updates will be communicated to all parties involved.

As per the joint statement issued by the International Federation and the ICRC on 13 October, the logistics arrangements will incorporate:

- establishment of a joint logistics hub in Islamabad in support of the Pakistan Red Crescent Society and partner National Societies, ensuring airport reception, warehousing and dispatch of goods;
- establishment of an ICRC logistics centre in Abbottabad to support operations;
- procurement officers will be hosted in the already existing ICRC logistics and procurement centre in Peshawar;
- air operations will be managed by ICRC;
- the use of military logistics in Kashmir is ruled out, unless clearance is given by the ICRC;
- Mobilisation of all Movement resources, including ERUs, will be carried out in close coordination between the International Federation and the ICRC. ERUs will be placed under the operational coordination of either the International Federation or the ICRC.

Supply Chain Management:

Mobilisation tables for relief goods have been issued individually by ICRC and the International Federation (available on DMIS). The mobilisation tables will be adjusted according to needs identified in the field. Each institution should be contacted for donations towards their respective mobilisation table. In-kind donations in response to the Federation mobilisation table should be negotiated and agreed upon with the Federation's Logistics Department in Geneva, prior to shipment of goods and all consignments should be delivered to Islamabad.

Logistics personnel in the field:

The International Federation logistics structure in Islamabad is already in place and fully operational to handle the receipt and storage of all accepted goods. The senior field logistics officer from Geneva has been in Islamabad since 10 October and is coordinating the Federation's overall logistics effort. Danish Red Cross and Spanish Red Cross Logistics ERUs have also arrived in Islamabad. The Federation logistics delegate in Maldives has been relocated to Pakistan to support the logistics operations.

For ICRC: The Peshawar structure is already in place and will support the Abbottabad set-up. The British Red Cross Logistics ERU arrived on 11 October to set-up the ICRC logistics structure in Abbottabad and they will be supported by Peshawar employees. Several logistics staff have arrived in the past few days.

Air Operations:

Air operations are being fully handled by ICRC and all relevant inquiries should be addressed to ICRC to the attention of ICRC Air Operation Coordinator Michel Schaffner at +41 22 730 25 63, mob +41 79 217 32 71 or the Islamabad Air Operation Manager as soon as he is in place. Several ICRC helicopters are on their way to Islamabad.

Coordination

The Red Cross Red Crescent Movement partners formalised their coordination and cooperation structure as outlined in the joint statement and referred to earlier in this report. The FACT Movement Coordinator is working with the ICRC Movement Cooperation delegate to support Movement actors.

The Federation's Pakistan Delegation is attending coordination meetings with UN and other agencies on a daily basis, including meetings relating to specific sectors such as health, water and sanitation and shelter. The in-country Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement partners – the Pakistan Red Crescent, the Federation country delegation and the ICRC – are working in close cooperation. The Pakistan Red Crescent is working closely with the government relief coordination commission.

The Pakistan Red Crescent has established field offices in Mansehra, Bagh and Muzaffarabad and these are acting as coordination focal points. A control room is operating at the headquarters in Islamabad and is available to the ICRC and the Federation for information updates etc.

The Federation's South Asia Regional Delegation in Delhi is providing reporting, information, disaster management, health and administrative support.

The Geneva Secretariat has this week attended three Inter-Agency Standing Committee meetings on the South Asia earthquake. The other participants were WFP, UNITAR, UNHCR, WHO, UNICEF, UNDP, WFP, UNFPA, HABITAT, ILO, IOM, MSF, ICVA and the ICRC.

Communications – Advocacy and Public Information

The Pakistan Federation delegation, the South Asia Regional delegation (Delhi) and the Geneva Secretariat are profiling the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement disaster response. All parties are fielding and dealing with numerous national and international media queries. Two information bulletins have been issued, four Operations Updates, and three media releases have been issued by the Geneva Secretariat.

The FACT team contains an information specialist who has just returned from the field and will file shortly. An experienced photographer being utilized by the Federation has also arrived and conducted a field visit to Balakot today and will return to the field as soon as possible.

With delegates from more than 10 nationalities, regular media interviews are being conducted with CNN, BBC, and various other media organizations including those in the Netherlands, UK, Japan, Norway, Germany, Mexico, Sweden, Switzerland, France, New Zealand, Australia, Denmark, Israel, Canada, and Malaysia.
