## SOUTH ASIA: EARTHQUAKE

21 October 2005

### In Brief

**Appeal No. 05EA022; Operations Update no. 7; Period covered: 20 – 21 October 2005; Appeal coverage: 34.5%;** ([click here to go directly to the attached Contributions List, also available on the website](#)).

**PRELIMINARY EMERGENCY APPEAL REVISED BUDGET NOW CHF 73.3 MILLION (USD 56.6 MILLION OR EUR 47 MILLION). CASH CONTRIBUTIONS URGENTLY NEEDED.**

#### Appeal history:

- Preliminary Emergency Appeal launched on 9 October 2005 for CHF 10,793,000 (USD 8,438,294 or EUR 6,957,415) for four months to assist 30,000 families (some 120,000 beneficiaries).
- Operations Update No. 3 of 12 October 2005 increased the Preliminary Appeal budget to CHF 73,262,000 (USD 56,616,692 or EUR 47,053,307) to assist up to 150,000 families (some 750,000 beneficiaries) for six months, as an increasingly serious situation has unfolded.
- Operations Update, No. 5, revised down the number of targeted families to 70,000 (some 500,000 beneficiaries) based on the newly assessed delivery capacity and average family size of seven.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 200,000.

#### Outstanding needs:

- Response to the appeal to date has been slow. Cash contributions are very urgently needed to allow the Red Cross and Red Crescent to rapidly scale up emergency operations.
- Large-scale mobilization of relief items is needed (detailed mobilization table is available and updated on the Federation's [Disaster Management Information System \(DMIS\)](#)). Among outstanding needs remain tarpaulins, winterized tents, blankets, jerry cans, kerosene lamps, kerosene stoves, kitchen sets, hygiene parcels, water purification tablets, pharmaceuticals (antibiotics and vaccines) and emergency health kits.
- The following longer-term positions urgently need to be sought internationally, regionally and nationally: in Pakistan – operations manager, head of support services, finance, information, reporting, IT/telecom, ERU coordinator, logistics coordinator, transport manager, warehouse manager, airport manager, fleet manager, relief coordinator and three relief managers, water-sanitation coordinator, heads of sub delegations, health coordinator, ERU health coordinator, medical logistics coordinator, 2 field health managers, psychosocial support manager, shelter coordinator; and in Delhi – regional reporting and regional disaster response.

#### Operational Summary:

**The full extent of the devastation caused by the earthquake is unfolding as more remote areas in the mountainous regions are being accessed and assessed. Many quake survivors continue to be exposed to harsh conditions and await medical care. Freezing temperatures are posing major health concerns.**

**While assessments continue, the focus of the operation is placed on stepping up relief distributions. The Pakistan Red Crescent Society (PRCS), supported by the International Federation, the International**

**Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and other Red Cross and Red Crescent partners, continues to be at the forefront and is effectively managing the large-scale relief operation.**

**To date, the Pakistan Red Crescent and the Federation have distributed 1,791 tents and 12,155 blankets to some 1,700 affected families in the country.**

**The Federation's basic health care units have started to receive patients. The Pakistan Red Crescent and the Federation have in total treated over 13,500 patients in the quake-devastated areas.**

**With sufficient medical teams on the ground at this stage, the Federation urges all member national societies not to send any more medical teams unless requested but to prepare for the longer-term needs and replacement of existing teams.**

**Plans for the next stage of the relief operation are underway. The Federation will revise the emergency appeal in the coming week. Alternative shelter options, other than tents, are being studied.**

**Given the scale and scope of the disaster, the Federation encourages donors to continue to provide unearmarked cash contributions to allow an immediate, flexible and effective response to the quake-affected population.**

**Less than one third of advertised positions are filled.**

## **Background**

An earthquake with magnitude of 7.6 on the Richter scale centred 95 kilometres north-east of the Pakistan capital Islamabad struck at 0350 GMT on 8 October 2005, with tremors felt as felt across the region from Kabul to Delhi. The quake has decimated areas of northern Pakistan and northern India.

The area surrounding Muzaffarabad in Pakistan-administered Kashmir has been the most severely affected with half a million people affected.

Over a hundred aftershocks have been reported and felt in Islamabad. Seismic activity is likely to continue according to meteorological officials.

The latest official death toll in Pakistan has passed 48,000 and will continue to rise. The World Health Organization (WHO) and local authorities estimate 65,000 people have been injured and that around 50,000 remain untreated. According to the UN's latest figures, the disaster has affected four million people (one million severely) and displaced 3.3 million.

## Operational Development

Efforts continue to more accurately assess the destruction caused by the earthquake. Reports from the Federation FACT/RDRT/Pakistan Red Crescent assessment teams (see table under relief) in the field continue to indicate extreme hardship for the survivors, with temperatures dropping. Shelter remains the priority need and in some villages, the Red Cross and Red Crescent has been the first aid agency on the ground.

Distribution has started with focus in Garhi Habibullah, benefiting some 1,600 families. A total of some 250,000 beneficiaries from the remote villages in Balakot, Batagram and Garhi Habibullah have been identified for relief distributions. Distribution plans are underway while assessments continue and findings are being verified with other agencies.

The Federation has mobilized to date, from the region and internationally, over 100 specialists from 19 Red Cross and Red Crescent partners to support the Pakistan Red Crescent. This includes a field assessment coordination team (FACT), eight emergency response units (ERUs) – four of which are already operational – and regional disaster response team (RDRT) members from South Asia and Southeast Asia, in addition to Federation staff from Geneva and other field structures. An increased number of drivers and national staff are being recruited.

The Afghan Red Crescent's president is meeting with the Pakistan Red Crescent chairman today. The Afghan Red Crescent, in addition to sending two RDRT members, has brought in two trucks with dry fruit, 380 tents and 9,500 blankets in support of Pakistan Red Crescent's relief operation.

Coordination and cooperation are being structured at both headquarters level and in the operational areas in Pakistan with all international response tools and among Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement partners. The head of the South Asia regional delegation and the head of the Pakistan delegation visited Mansehra, Balakot and Batagram in the last two days and commended the effective coordination and cooperation between various response tools – FACT, ERUs and RDRT – developed by the Federation.

## **Logistics**

The joint logistics operation of the Federation and ICRC is progressing at full capacity. Logistics support of the Federation for the operation is provided from two locations in Pakistan – from hubs in Islamabad and Mansehra. Emergency relief goods mobilized by the Federation continue arriving in Islamabad, followed by arrangements for storage and dispatching.

The Federation's logistics team is working day and night with ICRC colleagues and, to date, handled 32 flights containing 800 tons of relief goods, medical supplies and ERU equipment. The logistics team is gaining momentum both in Islamabad and Mansehra with additional logisticians and fleet specialists already in place or en route to Islamabad from the Federation's Dubai fleet base, its delegations in Sri Lanka and Myanmar and the Norwegian Red Cross.

However, limited infrastructure and the high volume of relief goods continue to strain resources. The airport is still congested while warehousing and storage capacities are overstretched.

In Islamabad, two warehouses, with 2,000 square metres and 660 square metres' space, respectively, are operational around the clock to handle the flow of incoming and outgoing supplies. Two Rubb halls are in Mansehra and two other Rubb halls are on standby to be erected according to operational needs. A warehouse facility with 666 square metres has been secured in Mansehra.

The 16 light-weight vehicles leased from the Federation's Dubai fleet base have been cleared and ready for use. Drivers are being identified and trained. A workshop and fuel station has also been identified in Islamabad. Some of these vehicles have been allocated to Mansehra hub. The fleet manager will visit Mansehra to ensure a proper fleet set-up. In addition, ten M-6 Norwegian trucks are due to arrive tomorrow (22 October) and will be followed by another 30 in the coming week. The Federation's logistics team is negotiating with some contractors to secure fuel supply for the operation.

Despite the various challenges, the overall logistics operation is beginning to normalize. Pakistan Red Crescent has limited logistics capacity in Islamabad. The Federation and the Pakistan Red Crescent are urging partner national societies that are sending direct relief supplies to Pakistan to inform flight details to the Federation's logistics department in Geneva to ensure smooth handling and clearance of these relief goods and to ensure that goods are not getting lost.

The mobilization table (available on DMIS) is designed to report the identified basic needs of some 250,000 affected people. The list has been updated to reflect additional needs for medical items and hospital beds.

The Federation has to date mobilized 41,573 tents, 344,315 blankets, 2,000 jerry cans, 31,370 tarpaulins, 19,596 kitchen sets, and 10,000 kerosene lamps and 17 new emergency health kits.

In response to the Federation's initiative of booking production lines for 19,000 tents, the British Red Cross has pledged to fund production of 6,000 tents. Many other national societies have expressed interest in funding the project.

The Federation has procured 5,000 tents from Iranian Red Crescent, which will arrive in Islamabad today. In addition, the Iranian Red Crescent has consigned directly to Pakistan Red Crescent 500 tents, 5,000 blankets, 50,000 canned beans and 50,000 canned fish.

## **Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress, impact**

### **Emergency relief (food and basic non-food items)**

**Objective: To meet the immediate shelter and supplementary food needs of 70,000 vulnerable families (some 500,000 beneficiaries) in affected areas in Pakistan-administered Kashmir, North West Frontier Province, and Islamabad.**

**Progress/Achievements (activities implemented within this objective)**

Pakistan Red Crescent has, as of 20 October, distributed 873 tents, 4,463 blankets and 1,625 quilts to Pakistan-administered Kashmir (Jhelum valley, Neelum Valley and Muzaffarabad) and North West Frontier Province (Mansehra, Pashawar, Changala, Swat and Abbottabad). In total, some 800 families have been assisted. Inaccessibility to remote areas due to blocked roads and landslides is the major challenge.

While assessments continue (see table below for summary of assessments undertaken from 13-19 October), emphasis of the Federation's field resources is shifting from assessment to distributions. Some 250,000 beneficiaries have been identified.

The Federation's relief distributions started on 19 October, with initial focus on Garhi Habibullah. A total of 918 tents, 1,086 tarpaulins and 7,692 blankets were distributed on 19 and 20 October. The distribution is targeting some 1,600 families.

One Rubb hall each will be put up in Balakot and Batagram prior to commencing distributions next week. Relief teams have been put in place. A distribution plan targeting approximately 40,000 in Balakot and 180,000 in Batagram is in progress. The plan will be adjusted in coordination with other agencies as more assessment information becomes available.

Cooperation with the Pakistan Red Crescent's relief teams has been excellent. All operational activities are jointly assessed, planned and implemented.

The main challenge now is to ensure adequate shelter is delivered as quickly as possible to the quake survivors given the scattered locations of the communities. Operational resources need to be well coordinated and prioritized. Given the access difficulties and after consultation with the ICRC, it has been decided that military helicopters can be an option for the Federation's relief operation if accompanied by a PRCS member.

## India

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) has been on the forefront of relief activities. To date, a total of 20,460 blankets, 3,592 kitchen sets, 1,300 food parcels, 125 tarpaulins, 38 ground sheets, 2,000 sets of clothes for women and children, 50 kilograms of milk powder, assorted medicines and 70 cases of mineral water have been distributed. Also, five metric tonnes of dry fruit is being sent to the Jammu and Kashmir state branch by the national headquarters.

In view of the acute shelter needs, the Indian Red Cross Society's headquarters has mobilized another 11 large foldable tents, three large yellow air tents and four large Rubb halls. The three-member national disaster response team (NDRT) arrived yesterday in Baramulla (130 kilometres from Srinagar) to help in relief distribution and to assess further needs. A Rubb hall is being erected in Uri. A Federation consultant is helping the branch to erect the Rubb hall. Six volunteers from the state branch will be trained to assist the process.

The Red Crescent Society of the United Arab Emirates, with assistance from the Federation's delegation and Indian Red Cross' procurement team has completed the supply of 30,000 blankets for distribution to affected areas in Jammu and Kashmir.

The Federation has committed to providing 3,000 tents and 2,000 mattresses. The first consignment to Srinagar should arrive next week. The Canadian and Spanish Red Cross societies will be supplying 1,700 and 1,800 mattresses, respectively. ICRC has also donated 5,000 pieces of *pheruns* (traditional local clothes worn in winter) to the IRCS.

The IRCS is taking a lead role in coordination among the other NGOs and international NGOs working in the quake-affected areas. The IRCS will be convening a SPHERE meeting tomorrow at the Disaster Management Centre which will focus on the issue of coordination and look into immediate shelter needs. The Jammu and Kashmir state branch has opened two field offices in Poonch and Rajouri in order to better coordinate relief work in addition to its office in Jammu and Srinagar.

## Health

**Objective: To meet the basic health care and first aid and emergency transport needs of 70,000 vulnerable families (some 500,000 beneficiaries) in Pakistan-administered Kashmir, North West Frontier province, and Islamabad.**

### **Progress/Achievements (activities implemented within this objective)**

The Pakistan Red Crescent medical teams saw a total of 1,064 patients in the last two days: 304 in Manshera, Batgram and Balakot and another 760 in Pakistan-administered Kashmir. Injuries and psycho-somatic problems were highlighted in the teams' report. The medical teams have to carry the injured to the ERUs and the hospitals. In total, over 13,000 patients have been treated. In addition, Pakistan Red Crescent has collected to date 1,081 units of blood.

The health team of the Pakistan Red Crescent/Federation completed an exhaustive assessment of Batagram and surrounding areas. The report requires additional analysis before outlining expected needs. According to the Pakistan Red Crescent's volunteers, some villages which are accessible have not yet been visited by any organizations. The FACT health member is meeting with the Pakistan Red Crescent team to confirm this information and map out the areas yet to be covered.

The latest information also indicates that the army may open the road into Kagan Valley within the next few days. Volunteers from the Pakistan Red Crescent reported that the following villages were in need of aid:

- Jurid (on the way into the valley, approximately 45 kilometres from Balakot)
- Kawai (approximately 6,000 people)
- Shogran (2,000-3,000 people)
- Pares (3,000-4,000 people) has widespread destruction.

Based on the assessment visit, the 20-bed hospital in Garhi Habibullah has been totally destroyed with the exception of one building. The building is currently used as an out/inpatient facility with two beds and some surgical procedures. The hospital treats 250 patients a day (mostly injuries). The UN is providing it with medical supplies. More local medical personnel are being recruited. Currently, an Iranian hospital and an army health centre are also operating in the area. The need for a mobile clinic is being studied.

In Batagram, the French Red Cross' basic health care ERU is operational and complementing the established field hospital at the same location. The basic health needs in the area should be sufficiently covered. The field hospital and the BHC unit together have made approximately 2,000 consultations (60 per cent of patients suffering from injuries) a day. There are additionally reports on cases of diarrhoea and respiratory infections. Part of the ERU team has been airlifted to remote villages in Bana Alali, 20 kilometres north of Batagram. The area is only accessible by air. On 18 and 19 October, the mobile team treated 370 patients. The ERU is admitting patients today and is working with the Pakistan Red Crescent's provincial branch. There is an urgent need for the specialized water unit to support the basic health unit. The German Red Cross' specialized water and sanitation ERU arrived in Islamabad and both the team and the related equipment are en route today to Batagram.

In Balakot, the Spanish Red Cross' basic health care ERU, set up on a site near the river, has treated 116 patients in total on 18 and 19 October. The Malaysian Red Crescent's health unit has taken over the original site identified near the helipad and treated 44 patients. The Swedish/Austrian mass water and sanitation unit is establishing its base on the identified site and is expected to be operational tomorrow (22 October).

A medical post has been established in the Kagan Valley, that is extremely isolated and cut off by road, with two medical doctors from German and Japanese Red Cross societies. Two nurses from Malaysian Red Crescent will join today. Medical supplies have been transported to the site by mules provided by the army.

Two FACT health members are out in the field surveying, monitoring and coordinating Red Cross and Red Crescent medical teams. The health coordinator has returned to Islamabad this afternoon and will be feeding in her findings into the revised appeal.

The government has established a plan of action for psycho-social support. The plan is much in line with the Federation's approach and initial framework. A psycho-social support delegate is urgently needed.

Medical personnel from Japanese Red Cross (10), New Zealand Red Cross (5) and Malaysian Red Crescent (3) are being identified for the 250-bed hospital en route from Norway to be installed in Abbotabad. Further nursing staff is required and accommodation for up to 30 international staff is being examined.

It has become increasingly evident that field monitoring and support is much required, as is psychological support for survivors and Red Cross and Red Crescent staff and volunteers.

A South Korean medical team has left for Besham Quala, NWFP, to work bilaterally with Pakistan Red Crescent's medical team there.

## **India**

The Indian Red Cross Society's water purification plant is operational in Uri and will benefit 500 people per day.

## **Federation Coordination**

The Federation's representatives in Pakistan are attending inter-agency coordination meetings, including the UNICEF water and sanitation sector meetings, the WHO/ministry of health cell, the World Food Programme (WFP) health and nutrition meetings and the International Organization for Migration (IOM) emergency shelter meetings. The Federation has been requested to chair the shelter sector meetings. The focus is mainly on temporary shelter at the moment.

Operational updates and assessment findings are being fed into the UN reporting systems. The UN's humanitarian information centre (HIC) has started functioning and is collecting assessment reports from agencies to create an overall picture of the devastation and needs.

Movement coordination meetings between the Pakistan Red Crescent, the Federation and the ICRC continue on a daily basis. With the UN focusing its operation in Muzaffarabad, where there is also a significant Movement presence, a Federation liaison officer is sought.

The plan to move the coordination office to the guest house at the Pakistan Red Crescent's headquarters was put on hold. The coordination team continues to operate from the Pakistan delegation's office in the same compound. Both office and accommodation in Islamabad has been overstretched. This will hopefully improve with more staff shifting to the operational areas in the coming days.

The Bangkok-based advisor on International Disaster Response Law (IDRL) for the Federation will arrive tomorrow to deal with the legal aspects of the operation. A human resources consultant from the Australian Red Cross is also en route to Islamabad.

In Geneva, the Secretariat is attending regular meetings of the Inter-Agency Standing Committee (IASC) on the South Asia earthquake. Other participants include WFP, UNITAR, UNHCR, WHO, UNICEF, UNDP, WFP, UNFPA, HABITAT, ILO, IOM, MSF, ICVA and the ICRC.

**Communications – Advocacy and Public Information**

The FACT information specialist and the Federation's photographer are conducting field trips and filing news stories for the media and the Federation's website – <http://www.ifrc.org/news/southasia/index1.asp>.

The longer-term information delegate has arrived in Islamabad from Australia and will focus on establishing media relations to profile further the Red Cross and Red Crescent's activities and advocate for humanitarian needs on the ground.

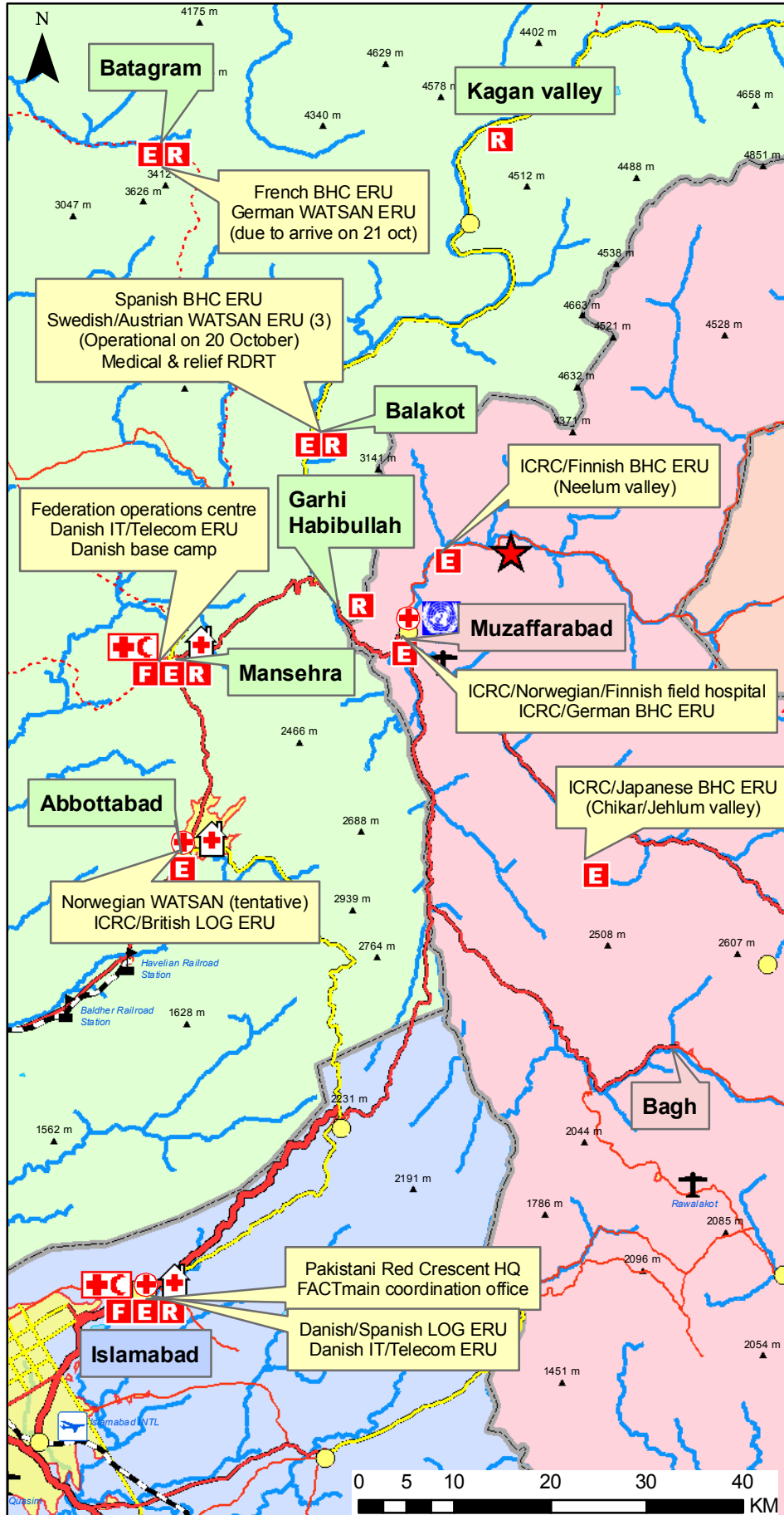
