### Appeal history:

- The Emergency Appeal for the Peru Earthquake operation was launched on 17 August 2007. It sought 1,626,000 Swiss francs (USD 1,341,869 US dollars or 979,150 Euros) to assist 4,000 families (20,000 people) for a five-month period.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Fund (DREF): 250,000 Swiss francs (207,641 US dollars or 151,515 Euros) was initially allocated from the Federation's DREF to support the National Society response.
- The Revised Appeal was launched on 20 August 2007 featuring a Revised Appeal Budget for 5,605,000 Swiss francs (4,655,315 US dollars or 3,396,970 Euros) for nine months to assist 7,500 families (37,500 people).
- A second revision of the Appeal Budget was made on 3 December 2007 for 10,895,000 Swiss francs (9,917,000 US dollars or 6,785,000 Euros) for 18 months (February 2009) to assist 7,500 families (37,500 people).
- The Operations Update n° 7 featured an extension of the timeframe until 31 December 2009.
- The Operations Update n° 8 was issued with a third revision of the Appeal Budget for 11,017,248 Swiss francs (9,790,411 US dollars or 7,201,756 Euros).
- Operations Update n°10 included a fourth revision of the Appeal Budget to 10,468,864.04 Swiss francs and in Operations Update n°11 the timeframe was extended until 28 February 2010.



Healthier and stronger communities are the main outcome of the comprehensive participatory reconstruction programme. **International Federation / J.Ormeño**

**Summary:** The Peru Earthquake International Federation of the Red Cross Red Crescent Societies (IFRC) Operation was the three-phase comprehensive response of the to the 7.9 (Mw) seism that impacted the Peruvian coast on 15 August 2007. The combined action of the Peruvian Red Cross and the IFRC provided emergency relief to 19,891 families exceeding the original target of 7,500 families (37,500 people), bringing shelter and basic non-food relief items. The operation provided psychosocial support to approximately 18,000 children and adults. The IFRC responded the affected population's need for water, providing

7,975,500 litres of clean water to 44 communities.

During the second phase of the operation, 6,308 transitional housing facilities were built by the Peruvian Red Cross, the IFRC and Partner National Societies (PNS), reaching 6,008 families, of whom 1,028 were provided by the IFRC mainly in the province of Pisco. In the third phase of the operation – the comprehensive participatory rehabilitation programme – the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement rebuilt and repaired 36 community facilities such as health centres and schools. In cooperation with the target families the Movement built 761 seismic resistant houses. Vulnerable families in 13 communities now inhabit 592 of them, built with support of the IFRC's secretariat programme.

The most important achievement of the programme has been the change in the way the community interacts and supports one another. They are now empowered to lead their own development. A strong community is a community less prone to the risk of disasters and is better prepared to respond to them.

The operation had a participatory nature, requiring the concurrent action of the families, communities, cooperation agencies and the Movement. The activities were planned and revised taken in account an environmental impact assessment, the opinion of the community members and regular operation team meetings.

**The Participatory Programme Review (PPR)** carried out in the third quarter 2009 reported some long-term recommendations for future operations such as:

- Supporting programmes for affected volunteers.
- Considering a more integrated and longer-term psychosocial support programme.
- Developing clear community guidelines on the commitment required by the programme.
- Considering working with community leaders to ensure transparency in the beneficiary selection process.
- Considering a work for food programme within the participatory reconstruction process.
- Develop specific training for those involved in participatory building.

At the coordination level the PPR suggested to work closer with local governments and authorities so it can better support communities, to have a clear assignation of roles and duties within the Movement and offices and to consider taking on a greater role in coordinating Movement's activities in the field.

The report features an interim financial report since a number of bookings are being finalized. The final financial report will be made available as soon as possible.

## The situation

On 15 August 2007, an earthquake of 7.9 (Mw) struck the Peruvian coast, causing severe damage in the provinces of Pisco, Chincha and Ica (department of Ica). The earthquake also affected the departments of Lima and Huancavélica. The National Institute of Civil Defence (Instituto Nacional de Defensa Civil -INDECI) reported 593 deaths and 656,965 directly affected people. Government buildings, homes, schools, water and sanitation infrastructure, roads and bridges were severely damaged.

The Peruvian government responded to the emergency through INDECI, supported by the international community, and soon after it created the Fund for the Reconstruction of the South (Fondo para la Reconstrucción del Sur - FORSUR). This institution launched a programme to support affected families with a voucher of 6,000 Peruvian soles (approximately 2,000 US dollars) for housing reconstruction. In late 2008, after delivering 28,000 vouchers, the National Congress decommissioned FORSUR as its programmes experienced implementation difficulties and were severely criticized by the media.

The slow progress of governmental reconstruction projects in the affected area frustrated the local population and this occasionally disrupted the operations due to protests and blockades of the main roads to the programme target areas.

In order to solve this situation the IFRC's Peru Earthquake Operation and other cooperation institutions advocated for the National Administration to support those people vulnerable in rural areas. They also supported the development of the implementation scheme of voucher programme for rural communities. The joint cooperation of the Government and auxiliary international cooperation would thus be able to reach more

families. However, the constant changes in the Ministry of Housing, Construction and Sanitation (Ministerio de Vivienda, Construcción y Saneamiento - MVCS) have delayed the implementation scheme (announced in early December 2009) and any dependent programme for several months.

Nonetheless the IFRC continued supporting these efforts; thus the operation team opted to address the urgent need of vulnerable families for permanent housing without IFRC's secretariat and designated by their communities as the most vulnerable live in their new safe and secure houses. To date, the rural voucher programme is still expecting its actual implementation.

## Red Cross and Red Crescent action

### Achievements against objectives

#### Overview

The Peru earthquake operation developed the complementary, but independent programmes of the IFRC's secretariat, Peruvian Red Cross (PRC) and PNS, four of which carried out long-term programmes in the area. These PNS are the American Red Cross (ARC), the Belgian Red Cross (BRC), the German Red Cross (GRC) and the Spanish Red Cross (SRC). The joint programmes funds summed approximately 25,000,000 Swiss francs (as reported by PRC in February 2010), out of which 11,017,247 Swiss francs —accounted in the attached financial report— were managed by the IFRC and the PRC. The coordinated action of the Movement responded to the emergency needs of targeted families and assisted vulnerable populations in the affected area in the rehabilitation of their houses and improving their quality of life, while strengthening the Peruvian Red Cross. The operation had three phases: emergency, early recovery and rehabilitation. The third phase of the operation was a Comprehensive Participatory Rehabilitation programme, thus most activities were carried out involving the target families and PRC volunteers in order to build their capacities while supporting the programme. This development aspect of the programme was remarked in the Participatory Programme Review as one of the one of the most significant changes caused by Red Cross action. The following text summarizes the Movement action impact highlighting the IFRC's secretariat programme.

#### Emergency - Relief distributions (food and basic non-food items) and Shelter

**Objective:** 7,500 families (37,500 people) provided with emergency shelter and basic relief non-food items

#### Expected results

7,500 families receive emergency shelter and relief items

The outcome exceeded the planned objective due an unexpected contribution of in-kind donations. This was adequate as the needs of population were great. Between the 15 August and 15 November 2007 the Operation lead by the PRC supplied with non-food relief items to 19,891 families (99,455 people). Of these, 8,025 families received a standard emergency relief kit that included an emergency shelter kit (tent and/or tarpaulins), a kitchen kit, a hygiene kit and blankets. Following vulnerability criteria, 45 per cent of the total was distributed in Pisco, 33 per cent in Ica and 22 per cent in Chincha.

Further, in July 2009, the IFRC and the PRC responded to of a cold wave affecting 900 families living in two-provinces of Huancavélica (a department also affected by the 2007 earthquake) providing blanket kits.

#### Emergency - Health

**Objective:** Psychosocial support will be provided to at least 1,000 families affected by the earthquake

#### Expected results

4,000 people receive psychosocial support

Between August and October 2007, the International Federation delivered psychosocial support to more than 18,000 people, of which 56 per cent were boys and girls of the provinces of Pisco, Chincha and Ica. Games, meetings, and teachers training allowed the target population to overcome the stress produced by disaster and start moving forward with their lives. Psychosocial support was also provided to PRC volunteers, who were the first to respond the distress call of the affected population.

The target population manifested in the Participatory Programme Review that psychosocial support should be extended for longer periods, as it also is the basis for the subsequent work.

### Emergency – Water supply

**Objective:** Water needs of the affected population are evaluated and responded to by the PRC.

#### Expected results

Water needs of population are responded

Families in need of water was addressed with the installation of 6 water treatment plants in 4 camps, the installation of 44 water bladders and the distribution of waters by trucks. The Local Water Services managed two of the water-treatment plants. Despite the accessibility problems to the communities due to the earthquake, more than 7,975,500 litres of safe water were distributed to the affected population for a three-month period. These activities were complemented by discussions and training to the communities on the how to handle the bladders and facilities, and on clean water management.

### Early Recovery

**Objective:** Early recovery activities are assessed, planned and implemented together with the communities and key local, national and international stakeholders.

#### Expected results

Shelter needs of population are addressed involving target families

After the disaster the IFRC and other organizations started to provide temporary housing to vulnerable families, allowing the better living conditions while reconstruction activities began. Temporary or transitional housing made of wood or reinforced straw mats (a technology widely tested and improved by research centres) provided shelter from weather conditions to the vulnerable population. The IFRC's secretariat programme delivered 1,028 out of the 6,248 transitional shelters supplied by the Movement. The construction was carried out with the assistance of the targeted families, and when these had more than five members, additional materials were provided. Approximately 30,040 people were reached by the combined Movement's efforts in this sector.

### Rehabilitation – Housing

**Objective:** Families in the zone affected by the earthquake have the knowledge and ability to self build secure and earthquake resistant infrastructure and have healthy living practices.

#### Expected results

- The selected communities are acquainted with the promoted construction technologies.
- The selected families have safe and secure housing.
- The selected communities know how to address their land tenure issues.

The IFRC's programme assisted the target families and communities to build safe and secure houses. This allowed the transference and development of skills, which they will be able to use in the future and enhances the community capacity for disaster resilience and reconstruction. Thus, training was integral to the programme and each family designated two people to work with the programme. These people were members of the families or community members supporting a family when this was unable to provide labour. After the acquisition of building technologies from IFRC partners, the communities themselves lead the building process, with the logistic, financial and technical support of the IFRC. An aspect to take into account for future long-term reconstruction programmes that requires involvement from target families is food for work. Advocacy with institutions such as the United Nations' World Food Programme or the National Food Programme allowed the most vulnerable communities to continue taking part of the programme.

Safe and secure housing involves improved materials, designs and construction techniques. The actions taken respected the cultural background of the population and were appropriate to the target areas. They are relatively low-cost in comparison to the equivalent cement brick buildings. The foundation materials employed are environmentally friendly, as the preparation requires low energy for production and produce minimum waste. Furthermore, since the basic component is soil, walls provide thermo-insulation from extreme temperatures. Materials and designs were tested at the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú (PUCP) laboratories to guarantee their seismic resistance. The techniques used were:

- **Improved adobe reinforced with geogrid** was used by the secretariat and the BRC in the district of Independencia (Pisco) and in the districts of El Carmen and Chincha Baja (Chincha).
- **Improved quincha** was used in Humay in Pisco and in San José de los Molinos (Ica). The SRC used this technique in Independencia also (Pisco)
- **The earth-cement block (ECB)** technique was used in the district of San Clemente (Pisco).

The houses were equipped with water and electric installations, a sanitation solution (latrines) and an improved kitchen that consumes less fuel and pollutes less —the kitchen has a chimney which prevents the soot from remaining inside the house and the design of the kitchen increases the heat-use efficiency. The designs separate cooking spaces and segregate sleeping spaces for adults and children, thus providing safer houses.

The construction process was challenged by the difficult access to target areas, logistics and transport had to be solved with assistance of communities and cooperation of suppliers.

This way, the association between communities, partners and the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement successfully built 761 houses out of which 592 were built with support from the IFRC programme, please see detail in the following table:

\* Due to soil conditions one of these houses, constructed in partnership with PUCP, was made in wood. The beneficiary family is composed of a young couple and four daughters aged 4 to 15.

In addition to the training-by-doing carried out with the participant families, the IFRC led 29 courses and workshops for 997 beneficiaries. Civil engineers, construction workers, local government personnel and architects have increased their knowledge in subjects such as seismic-resistant building.

The housing programme included activities aimed to ameliorate the widespread land tenure issues. Workshops were carried out by the PUCP with the booklet series *My propriety and I (Mi propiedad y yo*—ISBN 978-612-45504-0-9) providing guidance in the formalization of property in rural areas. A thousand copies were distributed among target communities and institutions working in housing rehabilitation in southern Peru. Part of the series

was reproduced by United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) for their workshops with municipalities around the country.

The IFRC and other members of the *Healthy and Safe Housing Group* worked for developing new strategies for a solution to the various aspects of the rehabilitation. The group supports a website with lessons learnt and documentation from the Peru earthquake at [www.gvss.pe](http://www.gvss.pe). The group has also assisted the government and the National Administration in the design of a voucher programme for supporting rural housing. This is an opportunity for cooperation organizations to assist vulnerable population.

#### Rehabilitation – Community Facilities

<b>Objective:</b> Families in the zone affected by the earthquake have healthy living practices
<b>Expected results</b>
- People in the working areas develop healthy living practices.

The Movement rebuilt 13 schools and repaired 19 more reinforcing their structures in Chincha, Ica and Pisco. Nine schools were equipped with modern furniture and computer rooms. The SRC distributed 3,000 school kits. More than 60,000 students and teachers were benefited by these actions. Likewise, the BRC equipped seven health centres and also repaired one, building for it a maternity room. Four community centres were also built, two of them by the IFRC programme.

#### Rehabilitation – Improved Quality of Life

<b>Objective:</b> Families in the zone affected by the earthquake have healthy living practices
<b>Expected results</b>
- People in the working areas develop healthy living practices.

The comprehensive approach of the operation led families to identify its vulnerabilities and capacities in order to develop healthy environments and living practices that promote individuals' well-being. This enhances prevention and response capacities of the communities in harmony with strategic priorities as environmental care and HIV and AIDS prevention.

PRC volunteers and IFRC personnel carried out community-based Vulnerability and Capacity Assessments (VCA) in 12 communities. The IFRC led talks and workshops around leadership, prevention of diarrheic and respiratory diseases, women's health, sexuality, HIV and AIDS, family planning, nutrition and gender. Besides a number of talks, the IFRC's secretariat supported 49 workshops, attended by over 1,000 people. Some members of the communities, elected by its neighbours, received training by the Ministry of Health and become local health promoters. The IFRC supplemented this initiative providing the communities with first aid kits.

The ARC concentrated its activities around risk reduction and provided training in first aid, VCA, and disaster prevention to 17,000 people in Chincha.

The PRC branch volunteers from the target areas provided first aid training in primary schools and communities. Together with community members, they also took part in a number HIV and AIDS and sexual rights awareness-raising events in the region organized by the local organization COREMUSA and the Ministry of Health in Chincha, Ica, Nazca and Pisco.

Complementary to the provision of sanitation solutions by the rehabilitation programme, the IFRC in coordination with partner organizations, as the Peace Corps, provided training to communities in water and solid

waste management and improving the quality of life through environmental protection. Motivated by a series of talks, targeted communities asked and were given support for growing green areas and planting trees.

There is also an opportunity for local Peruvian Red Cross branches to continue risk reduction-related training in line with the *Strategy 2020*. Further work in ecology, water and sanitation could be carried out, as governmental institutions are slow to address the lack of accessibility to basic services.

### Rehabilitation – Community Development

**Objective: Strengthen the capacity of families and communities affected by the earthquake to improve their prospects to generate income and contribute to their communities' development**

#### Expected results

- The selected communities are familiar with supplementary family income activities.
- The selected communities have strengthened social networks.
- The selected communities carry out practices of communal living.

Since the target families' economy depends on seasonal agricultural activities, the programme aimed that they could receive a supplementary source of income from construction and other activities. The IFRC introduced other activities for women who stay at home to care for their children. The operation supported 13 workshops in handicrafts, bakery and domestic business management for 338 people. Jointly working with community leaders, local authorities and other cooperation organizations, the IFRC supported local fairs and monthly markets for the promotion of goods locally produced.

The operation has supported the legal registration of pre-existent community organizations and also promoted network strengthening activities such as training talks on team-work, meeting management, leadership, collective decision-making and formal note-taking to the Women's Associations and water distribution committees. As a result, more than 3,600 people are working together in all the communities. They organized themselves to clean and recover community spaces. Communities were also involved in the building process: land clearing, foundations, stone carrying and reception of construction materials.

Furthermore, an earth-cement block production factory was installed with a community association in San Clemente, so it can help them to build their own houses and produce blocks to sell, providing them with an extra source of income.

The communication of relevant and clear information led families to understand what was happening with the programme and the strengthening of community bonds were the basis of the programme's achievements. Community development is essential if a programme should endeavour in participatory construction.

### National Society Capacity Building

#### Objectives:

**PRC Pisco and Ica branches are capable of contributing with the rehabilitation activities.**

#### Expected results

- The Pisco branch has adequate quarters
- The Pisco and Ica branches have committed volunteers and members, acting under the Red Cross and Red Principles
- The Pisco and Ica branches are capable of leading risk reduction activities.

The International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement supported the Peruvian Red Cross in its organizational development process and in the promotion of capacity building activities at the branch level. The objectives and results in the heading refer to branch level activities carried out by the operation.

In November 2009 the IFRC and the International Committee Red Cross (ICRC) endorsed the PRC intervention plan 2009–2010 that will lead the National Society to:

- a. elect new national governing authorities and promote good governance;
- b. ensure that effective and efficient management is in place with the purpose of assisting vulnerable people (this includes improved finances, project management and resource mobilization);
- c. strengthen human resource skills and provide volunteers with a strategic vision, leadership and operational skills; and

- d. design and implement humanitarian emergency intervention proposals, programmes, and projects that respond to the Peruvian context and its Strategic Plan.

Currently, the Executive Director and the Transitional Council carry out the Strategic Plan. The Transitional Council will soon transfer powers to the new Governing Board elected in December 2009 and this will end the judicial intervention that has threatened the institution for so long.

The IFRC and PNS supported the PRC Pisco, Ica and Chincha branches in their efforts to ensure the regularization of property rights of the land where the branch buildings are built. The operation also supported a soil study and a dynamic study of the branch, the reconstruction of the PRC-Pisco branch perimeter wall, and the rehabilitation of infrastructure. The Peruvian Red Cross's headquarters and target branches have been equipped with computers and training equipment.

The capacity building process at the branch level has a direct impact on the PRC overall response capacity. The operation supported five Basic Institutional Training courses in which 150 volunteers received instruction on the Fundamental Principles of the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, history and basic procedures of the Movement. Also, thirty new PRC instructors from the target branches completed their lecture-hours requirement towards their official certification. The lecture hours included community and school-based first aid, Vulnerability and Capacity Assessment and promotion of hygiene. A National Intervention Team (NIT) has been trained with 25 volunteers from different branches across the country with the support of the Regional Centre of Reference in El Salvador. Certificated first aid training that the branches can now offer are a potential source of income for both PRC branches and the headquarters. Furthermore, the target branches are in a better position to carry out activities in (a) community and school-based first aid, (b) disaster prevention at home and school, (c) Vulnerability Capacity Assessment and (d) the fundamental principles.

The transfer to the National Society of 1,700 kits of hygiene, kitchen and blanket sets also reinforced the disaster response capacity of the PRC, as these items are now in the PRC warehouses.
