

CENTRAL ASIA: BUILDING CAPACITIES

18 October, 2000

The Regional Delegation continued with a programme effectively balanced between relief and development activities, both in support of the respective National Societies. Among the important activities included: the visit of the Institutional and Resource Development (ID&RD) review team, continuing this important process; in Turkmenistan, working the Federation's current planning cycle into the National Society's own planning and budgetary cycle so as to avoid a duplication of efforts and wasting resources; proceeding with the appeal process which has proved a good exercise for the National Societies to become increasingly used to the objectives and measurement indicators model. The Federation FACT team (Field Assessment and Coordination Team) also conducted an assessment mission in Tajikistan to measure the impact of drought and to draft an emergency appeal. This included the participation of the regional health delegate in Uzbekistan and the information officer.

The context

Starting with the 2000 programme, the Federation made a fundamental shift in strategy for Central Asia. Recognising the problem of donor fatigue in the face of overwhelming relief needs and the drawbacks inherent in maintaining pan-regional programmes in a diverse part of the world, there was a strategic move towards decentralising Federation operations and personnel and a greater focus on capacity building activities. With the decentralisation process completed in 1999, some programmes carry forward into early 2000 with a regional approach. An example of this is the Information Officer support programme. However, during the course of 2000-2001, such programmes will refocus into

individual country programmes, allowing a greater local focus to suit the specific needs of individual communities and operating environments.

Formulated in concert with the respective National Societies, the Federation's Regional Assistance Strategy (RAS) for 2000-2001 aims to build capacity in the four core areas stated in Strategy 2010 of disaster response, disaster preparedness, health, and humanitarian values, carried out in conjunction with institutional and resource development programmes. It is planned that in the latter half of 2000 the RAS will be revised into a document integrating all National Societies assistance to this region.

While providing relief goods continues to be a key assistance activity, it is being scaled back to allow greater focus upon the other core areas. Within these core areas, population movement programmes, information and advocacy, youth activities, fund-raising and volunteer management are all being emphasised. These programmes are vital, not only because they will eventually benefit thousands of people, but because they will also help the Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies of Central Asia carry out their humanitarian mandate in a sustainable manner.

The Regional Delegation continues supporting the five National Societies as they increasingly take full responsibility for all aspects of relief provision including budgeting and reporting elements. Training provision for the National Societies in financial management and accountability and logistic support is complemented by continuing encouragement to seek local fund raising opportunities and media exposure. This is in line with the Federation Development Policy, the Code of Conduct, and the Almaty and Copenhagen Declarations.

The assistance programme is targeted to the most vulnerable: children, especially those in institutions, isolated elderly, and multi-children families. Much of this help is concentrated on the Aral Sea area which, in addition to economic dislocation, is the scene of ecological devastation. The Regional Delegation supports the Tajikistan Country Delegation, as required, in providing much needed relief to Tajikistan.

Latest events

Sporadic outbreaks of conflict in Uzbekistan and Kyrgyzstan during the reporting period has created an unsettled security situation. The president of Kyrgyzstan, Askar Akaev underlined the importance of a new military co-operation agreement with Uzbekistan. He said the agreement would enable both countries to ensure their security, territorial integrity and regional stability. Mr Akaev also called on the United Nations to take immediate measures to prevent an escalation of the conflict in Afghanistan.

At their annual meeting in Kyrgyzstan interior ministers from the CIS states signed a joint three-year program of measures to combat terrorism, religious extremism, organised crime, and drug-smuggling. They also agreed to set up an anti-terrorism centre in Bishkek.

Drought is affecting parts of Central Asia. Kazakh government officials held urgent talks with neighbouring Uzbekistan and Tajikistan to increase water supplies to southern Kazakhstan where the cotton crop in Maqta-Aral is threatened by drought. The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) is preparing to launch an appeal for Uzbekistan, where ninety per cent of the rice crop has failed because of drought. The focus will be on the provision of drinking water and other health needs. The drought also threatens a large part of the country's cotton harvest, the major agricultural exports.

Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan have signed a treaty defining their common border. According to the treaty the two countries have no territorial claims on each other.

Red Cross/Red Crescent action

Disaster Preparedness (DP) w

Objective 1: to assist the National Society in establishing a formalised auxiliary role as recognised partners of the governments in their respective national disaster preparedness programmes. The highlight of the quarter has been the Regional DP Workshop/meeting, at which the priorities and the future of the programme were discussed and agreed with National Societies. The result of the workshops conducted by the Kazakh Red Crescent and Red Cross (KRCRC) for the country's NGOs was the creation of a Co-ordination Committee, signing of a Memorandum of DP Co-operation and of an agreement to act according to the Red Cross/Crescent Movement and NGOs, Code of Conduct for disaster response operations. The KRCRC has been participating, during the last 18 months, in developing the "National Disaster Preparedness Plan for Kazakhstan". In June, the final version of the Plan was issued in Russian and a few copies are available in English language. The Plan clearly defines the roles and responsibilities of the National Society and of NGOs, providing a higher profile.

Objective 2: to provide continuous and broad training in Disaster Preparedness. One regional workshop was conducted in Issyk-Kul, one Republic-level workshop in Kazakhstan; six rayon level workshops (five in Kazakhstan, one in Turkmenistan), and two oblast level workshops in Turkmenistan. The Regional workshop was very successful in fulfilling the following objectives:

- to summarise the current state of the DP programme implementation;
- to present and discuss the Federation's global and regional strategies and in particular their relationship to DP,
- to explore methodology for more effective cross-border co-operation, to enhance skills and knowledge in Information Management,
- to find ways to effectively implement Community Based DP and First Aid programmes,
- to establish the future strategy of the Regional DP programme.

The workshop was attended by National Society DP Officers, First-Aid Co-ordinators and one representative from each country's Emergency Ministry. A detailed report on the workshop is available upon request.

The Kazakh National Society conducted two DP workshops with NGOs and one with volunteers. Thirty volunteer youth leaders had a seven day DP training at a youth camp in Kyrgyzstan covering disaster preparedness, public education, risk reduction and co-ordination, youth involvement in DP activities, volunteer movement, and project planning issues. In Turkmenistan, two oblast level and one joint National Society Rescue Team/State Emergency/Interior Ministry workshop on fires and chemical accidents were held during the reporting period. The National Society established a classroom at the State Emergency Committee Training Centre which was provided with TV, video and a computer supplied by the Federation. A DP training curriculum was developed for schoolchildren (volunteers in 10 Ashgabad schools with a purpose to train oblast level youth trainers).

The Community Based Disaster Preparedness (CBDP) pilot project in Uzbekistan aims to develop a curriculum and methodology for CBDP training workshops which can be applied throughout Uzbekistan and, with appropriate modification, throughout the other countries of Central Asia. It is also intended to reduce the vulnerabilities and increase the capacities of the participating community. This project will operate over a six month period. As a result of the first stage, six groups (communication, disaster situation assessment, First Aid, disaster response, evacuation and relief distribution) had been established within the community following the two CBDP workshops for community leaders.

Objective 3: to ensure minimum relief stocks at Disaster Preparedness centres to enable National Societies to respond to the most common localised disasters. All the stocks procured during the last quarter to replenish items distributed have now been delivered to the National Society DP Centre warehouses. A decision was made to establish a new DP centre in Batken oblast and a warehouse with DP stock for 300 people. The items delivered include mattresses, blankets, bed linen, used clothing, detergents, candles, chlorine tablets, and kitchen sets.

Objective 4: to increase public awareness of disasters and the need for individuals to prepare for them. Eight video programmes were aired on TV, seven radio programmes and 16 articles in newspapers reporting on Disaster Preparedness/Response activities in Kazakhstan. Brochures and posters on earthquakes were distributed at DP workshops among NGOs and volunteers. In Uzbekistan sanitary teams held FA competitions as preparation for the annual national level contest. The distribution of an additional set of DP brochures in the local language was completed in Turkmenistan. Also in Turkmenistan, 40 copies of a DP video were produced and will be distributed for training purposes at oblast level and also among nurses teaching First Aid at schools and volunteers- trainers.

Objective 5: to improve the operations of the existing communications network. An HF radio base station was installed in Batken (South Kyrgyzstan) to enable more effective communications from this isolated oblast, a key security area. In Uzbekistan, an HF Base station was also installed in the Bukhara Oblast DP Centre as part of the ongoing improvement of regional telecommunications.

Population Movement (PM) w

The PM delegate position in the Almaty Regional Delegation was filled in June this year. The task of the new Population Movement delegate is to co-ordinate the Regional Delegation's assistance and to provide support to the five National Societies PM co-ordinators in Central Asia to improve, strengthen and upgrade their knowledge to be able to provide support and assistance in a systematic manner to the beneficiary population.

Current PM activities include the following: Kazakh RCRC and UNHCR programme for refugees, providing medical assistance to 350 people. A similar programme is run by the Kyrgyz National Society. The Federation and the PM Co-ordinator is working closely with the Afghan Refugee Women Association in Bishkek to develop social and income generation projects for women refugees. The Population Movement department in Turkmenistan runs a joint Red Cross and UNHCR programme to distribute cash allowances to the refugees in Turkmenistan. The programme also includes registration and the provision of reimbursement of medical expenses to the refugees. The Slow Sand Water Filter and Health Education projects for Tajik refugees in Turkmenistan will commence soon.

Health w

Objective: to improve the health status of the most at-risk communities, through implementation of effective, focused programmes on the promotion of healthy life style and preventive health. The regional approach is to focus on immediate health issues with a primary health care perspective. The Regional health programme for the 2001 appeal has been prepared with inputs from the National Society medical coordinators. Tuberculosis will be the focus for the current year health programmes. Most governments have adopted the standard DOTS strategy to control the disease. Some Red Cross and Red Crescent activities which complement the government strategy includes the following: the Regional delegation assisted in producing a poster on tuberculosis for the Kyrgyz Red Crescent. Also in Kyrgyzstan the pilot project on tuberculosis involving visiting nurses has commenced in two rayons following a special training in September. A brochure on tuberculosis in Central Asia is being printed and will be available in October. A book on tuberculosis for children is under preparation.

Other health activities supported by the delegation include the finalisation of a brochure on breast feeding in Kazakhstan. In Uzbekistan the health department was provided with a set of computer, printer and a modem. The report on the Semipalatinsk health and humanitarian support assessment (conducted during the last quarter, in May) is now available for circulation.

Relief w

Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Uzbekistan, Turkmenistan - Public Canteens

Objective: Public Canteens to provide vulnerable people in urban areas with one hot meal a day.

The National Society of Kyrgyzstan is running a soup kitchen in Batken, Kyrgyzstan supported by USAID. Fifty isolated elderly, handicapped and other target groups will receive daily hot meals during

the six months of the soup kitchen operation. In Turkmenistan bulk food donated by the Danish Red Cross has been distributed to the six Red Crescent soup kitchens in five oblasts (20 beneficiaries per day) and the capital (50 beneficiaries per day). The soup kitchens in Uzbekistan continued their services to provide hot meals to 400 of the most vulnerable people by the end of 2000. The Navoi Oblast branch has organised a soup kitchen for ten people sharing efforts with one of the local enterprises. Plans are established to increase the number of beneficiaries in the future.

Clothes Distribution

Objective: provide poor elderly people living alone and pensioners, invalids, orphans, refugees, and people affected by disasters and specialised institutions (orphanages and prisons) with second hand clothing to survive during the cold winter months. The Swedish Red Cross donated 500 MT of used clothing and shoes to the five countries of Central Asia. 20 MT is allocated as replenishment for the DP stocks for every National Society, and the rest is for the general distribution. The consignments started to arrive in mid-September which allows the distribution to begin before the onset of winter. The Finnish Red Cross allocated an additional donation of 60 MT of used clothing. The consignment will be shared between Tajikistan and the Regional DP warehouse.

Drought assessment

A Federation assessment team, including some of the members of the FACT mission to Tajikistan visited Uzbekistan and the oblasts Karakalpakstan and Khorezm to analyse the drought situation in the area. During the mission they met with officials, local Red Crescent branches, farmers and families. During the trip the Head of the Regional Delegation participated in the international seminar in Nukus, organised by the NGO "Ekosan" on the drought situation and the Aral Sea region in general.

Although the authorities currently have the broad situation under control, there is still much work to be done to supplement the government and NGO efforts and to ensure that the capacity exists to respond rapidly if the situation worsens. The assessment mission recommends a provision of supplementary food distribution to 40,000-50,000 people who are the vulnerable groups whose existing coping mechanism is insufficient for them to pass the coming winter (see separate assessment report).

Kostanai floods

An Emergency Appeal No. 13/2000 was launched on May 26, 2000 to provide emergency response and rehabilitation support to the population of Kostanaj city and the oblast affected by heavy flooding earlier this spring. The second phase of the relief operation was completed in September. It included food distribution (wheat flour, pasta, sugar) and individual assistance to the most needy (winter clothing, stationery for schoolchildren, medicines, and coal). More than 2,000 affected people received assistance during the second phase of the operation. The final third phase will be accomplished by distribution of an overall 21 MT of food commodities, clothing, shoes and hygiene supplies donated by the Iranian Red Crescent Society.

Aral Sea Programme w

The two year Aral Sea programme to assist the population in the countries affected by the ecological disaster was completed in May. The decision was made to continue the programme based on the situation in the region. The new American Red Cross Head of Project was appointed and is now based with the Regional Delegation in Almaty. Two other delegates are still being recruited. The new focus for this year is on distribution to institutions caring for TB patients. Links are being made with the country based delegates and particularly with the Regional Health programme.

Assistance to National Societies w

Capacity Building

Institutional/Resource Development (ID/RD) review: with programme support provided by the British and Swedish Red Cross, a review was complete in September 2000. The ID/RD review team completed a participatory assessment of the 5 National Societies in the region and of the Movement's support to capacity building. The review included 28 workshops and more than 400 interviews. Its

findings and recommendations are focused on the areas of the role of the Red Cross and Red Crescent in the region, management including branch development, financial sustainability of the National Society and the coordination of assistance to the National Society. These were discussed with the National Societies, the delegation and the ICRC during a regional meeting in September. The final report has been distributed in the region and is available.

Management and Governance - The guidance for the National Society Statutes has been translated into Russian and made available for the Red Cross and Red Crescent branches. The Kazakh National Society was assisted in revising the Statutes to comply with the conditions for admission to the Federation.

Finance - the activities to improve reporting procedures with a special attention on the outstanding reports from relief operations continued. A regional reporting and accountability workshop was held for the five National Society finance people and programme co-ordinators, to focus on the narrative and the finance part of the reports and increase awareness of the Federation reporting standards, and Appeal process.

Institutional and Resource Development

Objectives: to assist the National Society to successfully implement fund-raising programmes through public appeals and the development of small enterprises - In Kyrgyzstan the regional delegation supported the Annual Charity Lottery run by the National Society throughout the country. In Uzbekistan income generating and fund-raising projects are being successfully implemented. The mini-bakery enterprise allowed the branch to return a loan to the National Society, and selling of membership stamps brought further funds, allowing refurbishing of the National Society training centre.

Resource development seminars in Uzbekistan concluded the regional training for oblast and rayon level chair people. With the completion of these seminars more than 95% of the Oblast and rayons have at least one person trained on the basics of resource development. The remaining 5% have new staff members and will be covered during next year. In Turkmenistan a planning workshop was held at the National Society oblast level. Development of branches will be the priority for the National Society in the two coming years.

Regional - Information, Media, Fund-raising

Objective - to train information officers, National Society staff and volunteers in public relations activities, image support and fund-raising. The highlight of the reporting period was the IV Regional Information workshop. The workshop successfully integrated both DP and Information Officers in one disaster response team. The opportunity was taken to discuss the future of Information Departments in the National Societies. As three-year funding from the Icelandic Red Cross is coming to an end, financial support is urgently needed.

The National Societies of Turkmenistan, Kyrgyzstan, Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan have submitted their proposals on the continuation of the Information programme. These proposals are included in the Appeal for 2001-2002.

Objective - to help the National Societies to promote and improve their image - a booklet on the "Red Crescent Society of Uzbekistan- the 75 Anniversary" had been published in three languages- Uzbek (15,000 copies), English (1,500 copies) and Russian (7,500 copies). These booklets will help to increase the awareness of the public, expatriates, and wide range of communities about the history of the National Society, and help to promote its present activities and core programmes.

Youth w

Objectives: to increase the number of volunteers and strengthen the capacity of the volunteer management system within the National Societies for the recruitment, screening and assignment and retention of volunteers: Youth activities in the region supported by the Finnish Red Cross and

Korean Red Cross are focused on the recruitment and training of volunteers, various health prevention activities, integration with other programmes (DP, FA, Health) and organisation of youth camps. In Uzbekistan a new edition of the Guidelines for the Youth Centres and Clubs will help to develop, streamline and further promote youth activities and recruit more young volunteers to the Youth movement. Twenty youth leaders took part in the national round table to exchange experiences in youth leadership. Eleven branches of the Kazakhstan Red Crescent and Red Cross received funds for youth centre equipment, furniture and salary support for 11 youth leaders as well as running costs from September to December 2000. Printed materials on volunteers and training issues were published and prepared for distribution to the branches. This is considered important to reinforce youth activities. The Kazakh National Society successfully held a National Youth Conference for 17 branch youth leaders to give them training, develop work plans and define their priorities on the country and branch level. The Turkmen Red Crescent youth presented a video project to UNICEF who agreed to fund the proposed project. The money raised by the Balkan youth club was spent for food for the needy in the area. English lessons are taking place for young volunteers by a volunteer English teacher.

Outstanding needs

The DP programme progressed smoothly and according to plan this quarter. Unfortunately, due to redefined ECHO priorities, its funding of the programme ceased as of 31 July 2000. Also, the delay in the anticipated funding from the Norwegian Red Cross has halted the implementation of some activities; at the end of the reporting period funding available was only sufficient to allow for continuation at a minimal level until the end of 2000. It is therefore not possible, in this climate, to proceed with formulation of new country-specific programme activities or new agreements with the National Societies. There is now a real risk that lack of funding for the vital next one to two concluding years will threaten the ultimate success of the entire DP programme. While new donors are being sought, the future of the programme remains tenuous. The future of the Information Programme is very much precarious as the current funding has finished in August. At the moment the information officer is assisting the information component of the ID programme. As it is a very vital project to enable the National Societies to improve their fundraising, there is an urgent need for funds to continue this programme. It is hoped that renewed interests from partners and long term commitments will be achieved during the upcoming Partnership Meeting in Almaty from 16-20 October.

External relations - Government/UN/NGOs/Media

The Regional Delegation and its offices in Ashgabad, Tashkent and Bishkek work closely with the UN agencies, ICRC, USAID, Embassies, local governments and NGOs. The Federation office in Tashkent has regular co-ordination contacts with the ICRC Regional Delegation, especially the co-operation delegate in order to have a coordinated approach towards National Society development. During the reporting period frequent contacts were made with UNICEF, USAID and UNDP especially about the drought situation. A general presentation was made on the Federation activities by the delegate at an ICRC humanitarian law seminar.
