

INDIA/GUJARAT: EARTHQUAKE

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) / Federation operation in support of earthquake disaster victims continues to run smoothly. Over the reporting period, the Red Cross medical facilities in Bhuj, Shukpur and Bhachau treated an average of 450 patients per day. Numbers of IRCS volunteers have increased and 11 teams are available, the members of which come from all over India. Within the humanitarian community, the focus is beginning to turn to rehabilitation. However, the IRCS/Federation continue to respond to emergency relief needs. Early next week, a Federation planning mission will arrive in India to prepare a strategic framework, plan of action and budget for the recovery and rehabilitation phase of the IRCS/Federation operation.

The context

At 08.50 hours on Friday, 26 January, a series of powerful earthquakes struck Gujarat state in western India, peaking at a massive 7.9 on the Richter scale, with tremors being felt across several states as well as in Delhi and Mumbai (Bombay) and in neighbouring Pakistan. The epicentre of the quake was 20 km north-east of the town of Bhuj (population of 150,000), the headquarters of Gujarat's Kutch district while, at the same time, seriously affecting the area within the range of 100 km from the epicentre including Ahmadabad, the largest city in the state of Gujarat.

Infrastructure has been severely damaged, resulting in large scale collapse of buildings, mine cave-ins, train derailments and power failure, cutting off the water supply.

Latest events

Around 395 aftershocks have been reported so far, with 19 measuring over five on the Richter scale, and the latest hitting the area north of Bhachau on the morning of 22 February.

Meanwhile, the chief minister of Gujarat stated that assistance would be available through a low interest loan from the World Bank for reconstruction in the earthquake-affected Kutch district. World Bank officials present in Gujarat pointed out that construction of housing for the affected population before the onset of the monsoon season is the priority in the overall reconstruction plans for Gujarat. It is reported that the World Bank and the Asian Development Bank are pooling around USD 600 million for the "Gujarat Reconstruction Package", an ambitious plan involving some 800,000 housing units for those made homeless by the earthquake. The chief minister of Gujarat stated that 800,000 one-room units would benefit around 4 million people affected by the earthquake.

The latest reported death toll is of 19,466 people with 166,000 injured including 20,717 seriously injured.

The vice president and the director general, international relations department of the Japanese Red Cross Society (JRCS), are on a three day visit to the Kutch district in order to observe the Red Cross operation and to hold discussions with state officials.

A member of the managing board and vice president of the Uttar Pradesh state branch of the Indian Red Cross visited Bhuj, Bhachau and Anjar and had the opportunity to see the Japanese and Spanish Red Cross health facilities.

Red Cross/Red Crescent action

Overview •

The International Federation seeks CHF 25.6 million in cash, kind and services to assist 300,000 beneficiaries (60,000 families) for four months to support the Indian Red Cross Society activities in the most affected areas in the district of Kutch, state of Gujarat. Some 30 Red Cross Red Crescent Societies and/or their governments have so far extended their support to the International Federation operation.

The main objective is to provide the beneficiaries with essential shelter, health and medical services, safe water and other urgently needed relief items.

Operating from the Red Cross compound which was progressively built during the days following the disaster in the town of Bhuj, the International Federation is presently supporting the IRCS with a 350-bed emergency response unit (ERU) referral hospital, including a German Red Cross water and sanitation unit, largely financed by the European Community Humanitarian Office (ECHO) through the Finnish and German Red Cross Societies. The hospital has been operational since 1 February. Medical assistance is further strengthened by the Japanese Red Cross mobile hospital team which is operating in co-ordination with the emergency response hospital. Support is also provided through the French Red Cross water/sanitation team with water treatment kits, the British Red Cross logistics emergency response team, a telecommunications emergency response team from the Austrian and Spanish Red Cross Societies and a Spanish Red Cross emergency response primary health care unit.

To date, 7,534 patients have been treated in the Red Cross medical facilities, 230 operations have been performed and 48 deliveries have taken place. Since 3 February, 630 patients have been x-rayed and

339 tests have been conducted in the laboratory which became operational on 6 February. Nineteen deaths were registered so far. While the occupancy rate of the Red Cross hospital beds fluctuates daily between 120 and 160 people, the breakdown of the total number of outpatients in all three Red Cross health facilities in Bhuj, Shukpur and Bhachau shows a steady influx of around 450 patients per day.

To date, approximately 133,000 blankets, 3,400 tents, 38,200 tarpaulins, 4,700 kitchen sets and 1,700 water containers have been distributed.

A total of 37 water tanks (storage tanks, collapsible bladder tanks, “onion” tanks) of different capacities ranging from 2,000 litres to 95,000 litres have been installed by the French and German Red Cross water/sanitation teams in the area of Bhuj, Anjar and Bhachau while 15 additional locations are under consideration. Around 44 latrines have been constructed.

An International Federation planning mission will arrive in India early next week to prepare a strategic framework, plan of action and budget for the recovery and rehabilitation phase of the Red Cross Red Crescent operation in Gujarat. Furthermore, the IRCS has indicated its intention of holding a partnership meeting in Delhi, provisionally scheduled for 22 and 23 March 2001.

Indian Red Cross Society •

Over the reporting period, the National Society has focused particularly on the Red Cross health facilities. The Mehta rehabilitation centre in Baroda, Gujarat, donated 200 crutches to the Red Cross referral hospital through the IRCS. A local donation of medicines was also received. Furthermore, the IRCS ordered a portable ECG, a nebulizer, an oxygen cylinder, glucose sticks, a plaster cutter and other small surgical instruments for the Red Cross referral hospital in Bhuj and the Spanish Red Cross primary health care unit in Bhachau. The National Society is also arranging radiotherapy for a brain tumour patient who was operated just before the earthquake.

At the same time, the IRCS continues to expand its contingent of volunteers. There are now 11 teams - many members of which have come from all over India as well as from the region. A workshop is planned for Saturday, 24 February with delegates and IRCS team leaders to discuss distribution techniques and procedures.

Health •

The morbidity statistics show that the number of trauma cases related to the earthquake has dropped significantly, from 90% on 1 February to 10% on 21 February. The number of cases of respiratory tract infections, however, remains at around 10% whilst the number of cases of diarrhoea is minimal. The remaining patients currently seeking medical assistance fall in the category of “other health problems”, and are mostly paediatric and internal medicine patients. The Red Cross referral hospital reports sufficient numbers of staff. The priority at present is to promote treatment procedures and better nursing care, together with the increased bedside training. The majority of temporary health facilities in the affected area have either closed or have plans for departure with the intention of transferring inpatients to the Red Cross referral hospital. Furthermore, all medical equipment and medicines in the Red Cross hospital have been inventoried and stock card procedures put in place. Job descriptions and standard procedures have been finalised and regular visiting hours introduced. The second medical warehouse (rubhall 10x24 m) has been set up.

During the continuing medical assessments carried out by the Japanese Red Cross, several cases of diarrhoea were identified in a village west of Bhuj. Another case was identified in the Red Cross referral hospital. Action was undertaken jointly with the German Red Cross water and sanitation team and coli bacteria was identified in both cases. However, this does not indicate the outbreak of an epidemic and the situation is under control. The information was shared with the WHO and the local Institute of Epidemiology in Bhuj.

A health officer from the Federation Secretariat was deployed in order to identify local procurement capacities in medicines, especially for chronic and paediatric cases. A Federation health consultant also arrived in Bhuj to set up a more comprehensive health monitoring system at the Red Cross referral hospital, thus further upgrading the management of data (collection, analysis and reporting) related to OPD (outpatient department), IPD (inpatient department) and the pharmacy.

Water-sanitation •

The French Red Cross team continued installing bladder tanks, with the latest 5,000 litre tank in a village south of Anjar. In co-ordination with the local authorities and Oxfam, the French Red Cross water and sanitation team has been also been working on the installation of a water filtration unit in a new prefabricated hospital in Anjar and of a water tank north of Anjar.

The German Red Cross water and sanitation team has hired a private trucking company in order to maintain a steady supply of raw water to the Red Cross compound.

Relief distributions •

The relief operation is continuing in the worst hit areas of the Kutch district: Bhuj township, northern Bhuj taluka (sub-district) close to the Pakistan border, Anjar, Rapar and Abdasa. The distribution of shelter material to Abdasa and northern Bhuj has stretched current resources to the maximum. Mandvi and Mundra districts have been largely covered.

Attendance at NGO meetings continues; however, most of the meetings are now focusing on rehabilitation issues rather than co-ordination of emergency shelter. Bilateral meetings with organisations such as MSF are continuing in order to avoid an overlapping of distribution areas.

As almost one month has passed since the occurrence of the earthquake on 26 January, plans are being developed to undertake a follow-up assessment to ensure that the relief operation is targeting those districts most in need.

Logistics •

The logistics movements during the reporting period (20 - 22 February) are as follows:

A database of all items relevant to this and future emergencies which can be procured locally is being developed by the logistics team in the Federation South Asia regional delegation.

In Bhuj, negotiations are underway with a potential contractor for a minibus (25 seats) to shuttle personnel and visitors to and from the airport and to transport local staff from the Red Cross hospital, as other transportation options are limited. Furthermore, a four month contract (renewable on a monthly basis) has been signed with the charter plane company recommended by the Federation consultant following an assessment. Standard procedures/requirements for passengers scheduled for the Federation flights have been introduced both in Delhi and in Bhuj.

Tracing •

The ICRC continues to provide coordination and technical advice with regard to the restoration of family links. Several religious centres (ashrams), a medical unit in Bhachau as well as the area south-west of Bhuj were visited during the reporting period. No tracing needs were established. However, it was noted that different communities (castes, religious groups) are more likely to seek assistance from the members of the same community, even in a different geographic location, rather than from other communities in the same locality. At another meeting with the district collector, assistance to elderly patients on discharge from hospital was discussed.

Psychological support •

A preliminary work plan was discussed with the secretary general of the IRCS in Delhi. In order to facilitate further recruitment of psycho-social delegates, selection criteria were drafted. In the meantime, a Gujarati-speaking delegate seconded by the Danish Red Cross has joined the team. It was agreed that the services of the psycho-social team would also be available to Red Cross staff in order to prevent stress-related problems.

A meeting was held with Triangle, a French NGO, which is planning psycho-social services in the area. At the same time, representatives of Befrienders Programme of India expressed their interest in making their volunteers available for the programme.

A visit to the state branch of the IRCS in Ahmadabad is planned including meetings with the ministry of health, UNICEF, other NGOs involved in psycho-social support as well as with representatives of mental health institutions.

Scheduled consultations continue with patients from the Red Cross referral hospital and an on-site consultation facility at the Japanese Red Cross mobile clinic has been arranged.

Red Cross compound •

The arrival of delegates, replacing those on short term missions at the International Federation compound, continues. Four nurses from the Norwegian Red Cross and an orthopaedic technician and 12 nurses from the Finnish Red Cross recently arrived to Bhuj. A quartermaster and a chef have also arrived.

As regards improvements in the compound, an incinerator has been ordered for kitchen waste, and a concrete floor for the washing area near the kitchen was built.

Outstanding needs

Additional unarmarked cash contributions remain of paramount importance, particularly in view of the envisaged recovery and rehabilitation phase of the Red Cross Red Crescent operation in Gujarat.

External relations - Government/UN/NGOs/Media

Delhi •

The overall “Gujarat Reconstruction Package” was presented at the UN/NGOs co-ordination meeting on 22 February. The additional chief secretary, government of Gujarat, stated that the affected area covers 7,904 villages with a population of approximately 37 million, of whom 15 million are considered as worst affected. The government package is divided into sections with plans for relocation of destroyed villages, reconstruction of village houses which sustained less damage and reconstruction of totally and partially collapsed flats and houses in towns, with the exception of Bhuj, Anjar, Bhachau and Rapar. The decision either to rebuild or relocate these four towns is still to be made by the government. In order to better co-ordinate the reconstruction effort, the government of Gujarat decided to allocate villages for “adoption” by different NGOs involved. NGOs will therefore be responsible for the overall reconstruction of the villages under their remit, including houses, water and sanitation, health and education facilities. As Kutch is largely populated by artisans, rehabilitation of the household industry is also planned. The list of worst affected villages under the rehabilitation scheme is available together with the modalities for partnership.

The government of Gujarat is also seeking assistance from governments with expertise in prefabricated structures (Chile and Turkey) while the Japanese government has donated 440 high quality tents to be used as health sub-centres.

UNDP has mobilised UN volunteer (UNV) mobile teams to conduct assessments and to promote community driven decision-making in the rehabilitation and reconstruction phase. Improved co-ordination practices including linking of databases of organisations working in Bhuj on a sectoral basis is a further priority.

In the field of water and sanitation, UNICEF is concentrating on the traditionally water scarce areas in the district of Kutch.

It was agreed that the present operation in Gujarat provides an opportunity to reconsider disaster mitigation, preparedness and awareness-building strategies within the capacity building programmes of national and international agencies and organisations.

Bhuj •

The principal secretary and chief co-ordinator of relief operations in Kutch reiterated that the integration of the Red Cross referral hospital in the local health system should take place at the earliest opportunity.

To improve information sharing and promote improved co-ordination, the Federation has suggested that groups such as Abhiyan (NGO co-ordination body) be offered technical assistance to enable the organisation to provide information electronically. The representative of Abhiyan announced that data indicating numbers of damaged buildings, water resources, orphans and destitute women is available.

At a second meeting, the child protection sector emphasised that extended family care for children who lost their parents in the earthquake should be further supported and encouraged.

A nutritional survey is planned by the WFP, including the assessment of possibilities for integration of drought and earthquake programmes in the food sector.

Relatively high interest from the Indian media has continued with articles in local newspapers, web sites and on national television. The Associated Press has maintained coverage of the activities of the Red Cross referral hospital. The American Red Cross television crew has left, whilst a television crew from Ausaid arrived which will follow the activities of two Australian Red Cross delegates.
