

INDIA/GUJARAT: EARTHQUAKE

12 April 2001

appeal no. 04/01

situation report no. 23

period covered: 5 - 11 April 2001

It is anticipated that the monsoon season may begin early this year, preceded by a pre-monsoon period of strong winds. The transition phase of the operation is running smoothly and project proposals are currently being drawn up by representatives of the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS), the Federation and PNSs. A teleconference was held on 11 April focusing on the reconstruction component of the recovery and rehabilitation phase of the operation. During the reporting period, 22 dams have been reconstructed in Bachau, Rapar and Bhuj sub districts and the health awareness team is working in the communities where work on the dams is taking place in order to deliver health education sessions related to the environment and hygiene.

The context

At 08.50 hours on Friday, 26 January, a series of powerful earthquakes struck Gujarat state in western India, peaking at a massive 7.9 on the Richter scale, with tremors being felt across several states as well as in Delhi and Mumbai (Bombay) and in neighbouring Pakistan. The epicentre of the quake was 30 km north of the town of Bhuj (population of 150,000), the headquarters of Gujarat's Kutch district while, at the same time, seriously affecting all the area within a range of 100 km from the epicentre including Ahmadabad, the largest city in the state of Gujarat.

Infrastructure has been severely damaged, resulting in large scale collapse of buildings, mine cave-ins, train derailments and power failure, cutting off the water supply. A series of aftershocks (more than 400 with 19 measuring over 5 on the Richter scale) has been keeping the population and the authorities on constant alert.

India is divided into five seismic zones with respect to the severity of earthquakes. The entire Kutch area lies close to the western margin of the Indian plate and falls into zone 5. It is thus very prone to

earthquakes. According to the 1991 census, the population in Kutch district was 1.2 million. It is estimated that the population in the district before the earthquake had reached around 1.6 million.

Latest events

Continuing strong winds in Bhuj during the reporting period, and reports of rain in Rapar and Bhachau, as well as in Goa, Mumbai and Delhi have increased concerns related to an early onset of the monsoon season. After three years of drought in the region, cloud activity currently spotted over the Arabian sea indicates a strong possibility that the monsoon will arrive in early June, preceded by a pre-monsoon season of heavy winds. However, this impossible to confirm at present.

Red Cross/Red Crescent action

Overview •

The International Federation has sought CHF 25.6 million in cash, kind and services to assist 300,000 beneficiaries (60,000 families) for four months to support the Indian Red Cross Society emergency relief activities in the most affected areas in the district of Kutch, state of Gujarat. Some 40 Red Cross Red Crescent Societies and/or their governments have extended their support to the International Federation emergency relief operation.

During the emergency relief phase, the main objective has been to provide the beneficiaries with essential shelter, health and medical services, safe water and other urgently needed relief items.

In support of the Indian Red Cross Society, the Red Cross Red Crescent Societies responded with relief supplies and emergency response units (ERUs) comprising a 350-bed joint Norwegian/Finnish Red Cross emergency response referral hospital, German and French Red Cross water and sanitation units, a Japanese Red Cross mobile clinic, a British Red Cross logistics emergency response team, a telecommunications emergency response team from the Austrian and Spanish Red Cross Societies and a Spanish Red Cross emergency response primary health care unit.

As of 9 April, 22,426 patients have been treated in the Red Cross health facilities, 537 operations have been performed and 236 deliveries have taken place. Since 3 February, 2,395 patients have been x-rayed and 4,629 tests have been conducted in the laboratory. Seventy six deaths have been registered so far.

The distribution of blankets already exceeded the targeted 210,000 pieces. As for other relief material, 109,000 tarpaulins, 22,600 tents, 38,000 kitchen sets and 41,000 water containers have been distributed since the operation commenced on 3 February 2001. Two tarpaulins and five blankets are distributed per family assisted, with water containers and kitchen sets provided to those whose homes have been completely destroyed.

More than 50 water tanks (water storage and water treatment units) with capacity ranging from 2,000 litres to 95,000 litres, have been installed by the French and German Red Cross Societies' water/sanitation teams in the area of Bhuj, Anjar and Bhachau, totalling 524,000 litres of water storage capacity. The German Red Cross water purification facility in the Red Cross compound in Bhuj produces approximately 70,000 litres of water per day for the Red Cross hospital and the compound in general.

The Federation appeal for recovery and rehabilitation based on project proposals which are currently being drawn up is targeted for launch by the end of April, although the absence of some key personnel may delay the process.

Transition phase follow-up •

Programme design for the implementation of the recovery and rehabilitation phase of the Red Cross Red Crescent operation in Gujarat is well underway, following last month's partnership meeting in Delhi. Project proposal writers and consultants, drawn from the Federation and interested participating national societies, will shortly complete early drafts of consolidated sectoral projects to be incorporated into the five overall programmes recommended for the recovery and rehabilitation phase.

The disaster preparedness and disaster response team comprising the Indian Red Cross, Federation, British Red Cross and German Red Cross members is finalising its project proposal and plans to have the draft ready during next week.

The work on health and water/sanitation project proposals is nearing completion and the team comprising Indian Red Cross and Federation members expects to submit a draft within a week.

The further relief needs team is expected to arrive in the coming days, comprising members from the Austrian Red Cross and the Bangladesh Red Crescent Societies. In the meantime, however, the relief team in the field plans to expand the assessment process to include rehabilitation issues, in order to use the information to assist with the post-relief phase of the Red Cross programme.

A dozen Red Cross Red Crescent partners - from Austria, Belgium, Britain, Canada, Germany, Hong Kong, India, Japan, Norway, Singapore, Spain and Sweden - participated in a teleconference this week to review early progress in moving ahead with the construction of public buildings, mainly schools and clinics, in the earthquake zone. There was broad consensus among the group that all Red Cross Red Crescent partners should work within a common framework coupled with strong support for methodology entailing a single channel for programme design, procurement of services and project management. Meanwhile, the International Federation continues to seek construction specialists to take the programme forward and will look closely at the Indian market, in addition to urging national societies to continue to identify candidates. The need for urgency in developing the programme, as stressed by the Indian Red Cross, is being addressed in the light of available resources. There were also calls during the teleconference for more information on activities and initiatives undertaken following last month's partnership meeting and a special section is being introduced into Federation situation reports (beginning with the current document) to accommodate this request. Meanwhile two construction consultants - deployed separately by the International Federation and the British Red Cross - are currently in the field working on a series of programme design tasks, whilst the team of three in charge of preparing proposals for private housing from the Austrian, Belgian and German Red Cross Societies are expected in India around 20 April. At the request of the teleconference group, a follow up session will be called for later in the month.

As agreed by all participating national societies, a capacity building element will be incorporated into all recovery and rehabilitation programmes as one of the prerequisites for successful implementation of the second phase of the operation. The Federation regional institutional development delegate is presently working on a project proposal related to the overall capacity building of the Indian Red Cross at national level, at the same time bearing in mind the specifics of the individual programmes.

Health •

A five day assessment regarding the distribution of medicines will start shortly. As of 11 April, assessments of health related facilities will take place in the following talukas (sub districts): Lakhpat, Anjar, Bhachau, Abdasa, Rapar and Bhuj.

Activity in the Red Cross hospital has decreased. Currently, there are approximately 65 in-patients. Hospital staffing is at a sufficient level to cover the needs of the hospital's three shifts with 16 Finnish and 10 Norwegian medical staff members who are scheduled to leave within the month of April. As of 10 April, there are 63 IRCS nurses who are supported by additional weekly rotating staff of 25 governmental nurses, 10 doctors, and 94 support staff. A local administrative team of 5-6 members is also replacing the expatriate administrative structure.

Water and sanitation •

Dam reconstruction before the rainy season in June and health awareness remain the priority. The sanitation programme in Bhuj and Anjar are continuing. The major activities are latrine construction and garbage disposal. Repairs to damaged foundations of concrete storage tanks connected to the piped network are proceeding in Anjar. With the departure of the Japanese Red Cross, the water purification plant previously used in Sukhpur has been removed and a site has been identified in Anjar for the system to be redeployed.

A total of 22 dams have been reconstructed either with machinery or by hand since the last reporting period: 17 in Bachau and Rapar and five in Bhuj talukas. Dam walls have been strengthened and consolidated by the deepening of the internal dam structure and removal of clay silt. Work continues at Kuwathra Dam in Bhuj taluka where the stone pitching has been removed over the 300 metre face. Backfilling and compacting of earthworks is currently ongoing. Similarly at Kodki dam in Bhuj the damaged stone retaining wall has been replaced, and a one metre stone supporting wall has been erected to provide additional support to the replaced section. The arrival of motorbikes allows the field teams to deploy immediately in order to monitor and supervise dam reconstruction on site and increases the capacity to conduct village and dam surveys in the areas concerned.

A total of six storage tank foundations have been repaired in Anjar, and the current rate of repair is two tanks per week. Repair of these structures in Anjar taluka should be completed by the end of April and the team will move to Bhuj to carry out a similar programme.

During the reporting period, information was disseminated on basic health awareness in relation to good water and sanitation practices in five villages in Bachau and three villages in Bhuj. The health awareness team is targeting villages where dam reconstruction is currently being carried out. In addition to the village awareness programmes, two campsites within Bhuj township were visited to create awareness of good sanitation practices. The visit was a follow up to a distribution of garbage bins and the construction of latrines and washing facilities in these campsites.

Another sectoral initiative in advance of the fully-fledged recovery and rehabilitation water/sanitation programme includes a combination of environmental and health promotion which will undoubtedly enhance the programme and increase attendance of the villagers, particularly women and children at health awareness training sessions. Neem tree seedlings have been procured, a local magician to attract children has been hired and surplus relief buckets and chlorine tablets will be used to carry out this programme component.

Logistics •

Both air operations and logistics have been on constant alert in anticipation of the arrival of 23 cargo flights expected by the end of the month. These flights will deliver consignments of tents from the Netherlands and the Italian Red Cross Societies. Given the erratic weather conditions, specific dates and times concerning arrivals and departures of aircraft cannot be guaranteed. Two Belgian Red Cross consignments arriving by sea have been also slightly delayed but are expected today (12 April).

Due to the exceptionally windy weather conditions, cutting of tarpaulins slowed down during the reporting period.

*The lower figure in this table is the result of agreement reached with the relevant participating national societies on readjusting the number of tents initially allocated in response to the Federation appeal.

One of the logistics delegates has assumed responsibility for issuing and dispatching VHF radios, until the arrival of a new telecommunications delegate.

Relief distributions •

Relief distributions by the Indian Red Cross, American Red Cross and the Federation teams have continued in villages situated in the following talukas: Abdasa, Anjar, Bhuj and Nakhatrana as well as the towns of Bhuj and Bhachau. All teams are also focusing on assessing villages with the aim of providing tents, tarpaulins, water containers and kitchen sets. Assessments are going on in villages not extensively covered by Red Cross distributions in the past two months.

The following criteria have been applied to the villages where more than 50% of the houses were totally destroyed:

- villages which have not received any shelter material to date;
- villages which have not received tents from authorities/another agency;
- villages which previously received only one tarpaulin from the Red Cross;
- villages in which only a portion of the villagers have received tents whilst Red Cross assessments indicate that there are still families requiring tents;
- villages which are in the process of entering a partnership agreement with an agency within the state government “Gujarat Rehabilitation Package” but need tents to help them through the monsoon season.

The latest update of the summary distribution table reads as follows:

Discussions are underway concerning the reallocation of the remaining relief goods, in general. It appears that the three major items for reallocation will be BP5, kitchen sets and buckets. While the remaining stock of buckets will be used as a part of the ongoing water/sanitation programme, the high protein biscuits and kitchen sets will become a part of the Indian Red Cross disaster preparedness stocks.

In addition to regular distributions, the American Red Cross teamed up with the Indian Red Cross Society for a special distribution of eyeglasses to approximately 500 beneficiaries in Bharapar and Surajarpar, small villages located 30 kilometres south of Bhuj. The American Red Cross relief activities will be ending officially on 14 April. The office will remain semi-operational in Bhuj while awaiting the arrival of the new psychological support team. A member of the Federation relief team has been assigned to work with the American Red Cross during this period, to ensure the retention of the Indian Red Cross volunteers within the overall Red Cross operation.

The Italian Red Cross completed assessments of 11 villages throughout Rapar taluka prior to beginning of the distribution of 4,000 tents in the region. The first consignment of 450 tents was expected on 11 April and distributions should be completed by the end of April.

Delegation •

Three of the planned 15 semi-permanent living units being built to house delegates have been completed. The hut-like structures were designed based on traditional regional designs and can eventually be used by the community following the completion of Red Cross activities in the area. Between 60-70 hot meals are presently served per day to 54 delegates and visitors.

Security in the compound has been strengthened with the addition of two new security guards who are funded by the Italian Red Cross. The German Red Cross has installed protective covers over the kitchen and the Italian Red Cross premises. In addition, a cover will be placed over the new tree nursery being planted by the water and sanitation delegate. Power lines were lifted in anticipation of the rains and a trench is being built around the medical rubble hall.

The forthcoming month will be particularly active as the compound undergoes preparations for a possible early monsoon season, and adjusts to changes in the operational structure.

Outstanding needs

Outstanding needs will be incorporated into the International Federation Appeal for the recovery and rehabilitation phase which will be based on detailed project proposals which are currently under preparation. Meanwhile, a health co-ordinator is sought for an interim period and, as indicated above, the Federation is also seeking construction specialists to progress the programme design effort on the building of schools and clinics in the earthquake zone. A construction engineer to manage the prefabricated hospital project in Bhuj is urgently needed, with the monsoon season imminent.

External relations - Government/UN/NGOs/Media

A co-ordination meeting for agencies involved in distributing tents was held at the Federation office on 6 April and copies of a spreadsheet compiling all available distribution information by village was updated and e-mailed to all interested parties.

A shelter co-ordination meeting held by Abhyan (local NGO) and supported by UNDP as well as a Disaster Emergency Committee (DEC) interagency co-ordination meeting were held during the reporting period.

Following the visit to Bhuj of the former U.S. President, Bill Clinton, he attended a meeting on 5 April in Ahmadabad with NGOs participating in the humanitarian effort in Gujarat. Representatives from the American Red Cross and the Federation attended this meeting. The Secretary General of the Indian Red

Cross Society gave an update on the current activities of the Indian Red Cross and highlighted further challenges and constraints whilst, at the same time, emphasising the importance of disaster preparedness and disaster response capacity building at all levels.

There has been renewed media (both print and electronic) interest in the Federation operation following the visit by the former American President. There have been visits by both the national and international media over the past week. The Bhuj local media has also expressed much interest in Red Cross activities, and later this week, the Federation will hold a press briefing focusing on relief distribution.
