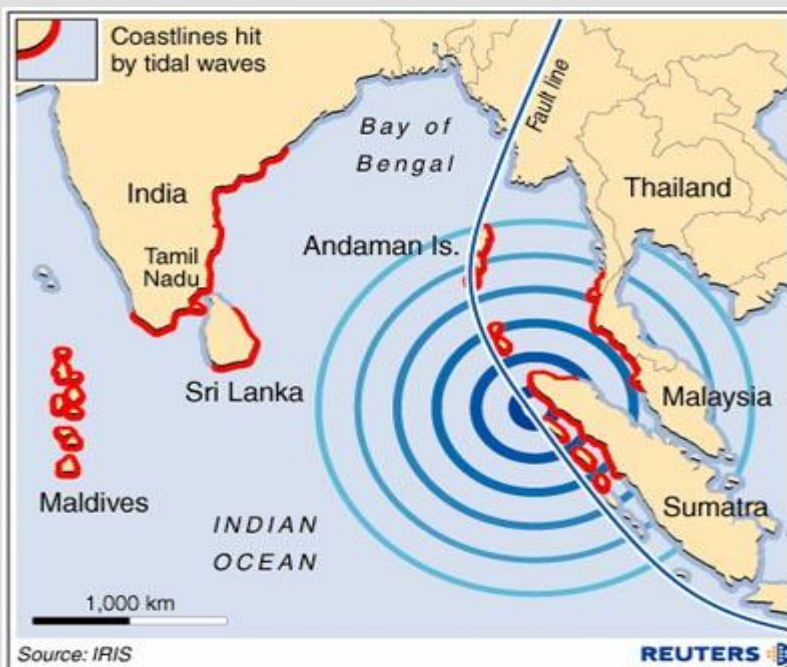

In Brief

Revised Preliminary Appeal No. 28/2004; Operations Update no. 4; Period covered: 30-31 December, 2004; Appeal coverage: provisionally 99.2% (see attached contributions list, also available on the Federation's website).

Appeal history:

- Preliminary appeal launched on 26 December 2004 CHF 7,517,000 (USD 6,658,712 or EUR 4,852,932) for 6 months to assist 500,000 beneficiaries.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 1,000,000.
- Revised Preliminary Appeal issued on 30 December 2004, for CHF 67,005,000 (USD 59,152,246 or EUR 53,439,988) for 2 million beneficiaries for 6-8 months.
- The Preliminary Appeal was originally launched titled "Bay of Bengal: Earthquake and Tsunamis". The title was subsequently changed to "Asia: Earthquake and Tsunamis" in the Revised Preliminary Appeal launched on 29 December 2004.



Operational summary: the response of the international community to this unprecedented disaster has been timely and tremendously generous. As a result, this revised preliminary appeal is almost fully covered, and the International Federation is entirely focused on effectively using these resources in mobilizing and moving the critical relief supplies (please refer to the updated relief items pipeline status attached at the end of this report). A full plan of action is also under development, based on the detailed information now being generated by the Federation's Field Assessment and Coordination Teams (FACT) and Emergency Response Units (ERUs), working in close coordination with the UNDAC teams and other operational agencies.

Background

The magnitude 9.0 earthquake that struck the area off the western coast of northern Sumatra Sunday morning, 26 December 2004, at 7:59 am local time (00:59 GMT) triggered massive tidal waves, or tsunamis, that swept into coastal villages and seaside resorts. The earthquake epicenter was located at 3.30 N, 95.78E at a depth of 10 kilometres (see map above). The area is historically prone to seismic upheaval due to its location on the margins of tectonic plates, however tidal waves of this magnitude are rare, and therefore the level of preparedness was very low.

The casualty toll continues to mount, with the latest deaths estimated at over 123,000 (this figure is anticipated to rise to over 156,000), and over 523,000 injured, over 17,000 missing, close to 1,600,000 displaced, and close to 10,000 homeless (see summary document on the Federation's Disaster Management Information System, or DMIS, at https://www-secure.ifrc.org/dmis/response/dmi_respond.asp). These figures are still expected to increase. Anticipating the need to immediately respond in a large and coordinated fashion, the International Federation immediately launched Preliminary Emergency Appeal no. 28/2004 on 26 December 2004 to support the immediate relief and assistance activities of the national societies in the affected countries, with a particular focus on Sri Lanka, Indonesia, India, and the Maldives. Support is also being provided to Thailand, Malaysia, and east African countries affected by the tsunamis. The Federation followed this up with a Revised Preliminary Appeal in order to be able to continue to respond to this unprecedented event. The Federation has deployed its full complement of disaster response tools in the form of Field Assessment and Coordination Teams (FACT) and Emergency Response Units (ERUs) in the sectors of water and sanitation, health care, aid distribution, telecommunications, and logistics/transportation, and their reports are due shortly.

Operational objectives

Emergency relief (food and non-food)

Objective: basic food and non-food item needs of the most vulnerable beneficiaries are met.

Activities planned:

- purchase and distribute a six to eight-month food ration.
- purchase and distribute a six to eight-month hygiene package.
- purchase (mainly locally) and distribute one six to eight-month ration of non-food items to the vulnerable groups, and a reduced allocation (excluding tents, blankets and shelter equipment) to various other beneficiaries.
- purchase and distribute supplementary food parcels to especially vulnerable individuals such as pregnant women and elderly people;

Logistics objective: support the ongoing national society and Federation relief operation by providing efficient logistical support in terms of warehousing, transport management and procurement.

Activities planned:

- support and maintain airport clearing capacity for the substantial amount of incoming relief goods.
- establish efficiently managed warehouses in the operational area.
- acquire and manage a fleet adequately sized to the operation.
- carry out joint national society/Federation local procurement activities.
- designate counterparts in each core logistics functions thus enabling a proper transfer of skills.
- conduct one advanced logistics workshop for participants from each national society.

Health objectives:

- restore parts of former Primary Health Care (PHC) capacities in the affected area to levels prior to the earthquake.
- ensure the appropriate treatment and recovery for those injured by the tsunamis.
- ensure the prevention of or effective treatment for potential/additional health threats such as diarrhoeal diseases, malaria, and respiratory infections.
- design a handover plan to the national societies for PNS/ERU health facilities.
- provide psychological support and training for national society staff to benefit victims of the earthquake.

Activities planned:

- installation of Basic Health Care (BHC) ERU units.
- integration of medical staff for on the job-training.
- provide PHC services in the surrounding villages.
- effective statistics and data-processing will be developed and an early epidemiological surveillance system for diarrhoeal diseases installed.
- psychosocial support programme (PSP) interventions will carry out training for volunteers, and jointly provide PSP services to those affected and relief-workers.

Water and sanitation objectives:

- prevent the outbreak of water-borne epidemics.
- ensure an adequate and safe water supply and provide sanitation facilities to the basic health care ERU, Red Cross camps, and other health structures.
- handover water sanitation ERUs to the national societies.

Activities planned:

- watsan ERUs will provide safe water to beneficiaries and BHC units.
- Mass sanitation ERUs will provide latrines to the BHC-ERUs.
- water storage capacity will be provided for the affected population in areas without functioning pipe systems, serving the intended beneficiaries whenever possible.
- National society staff will be integrated into the ERUs, and trained.

Basic shelter, care and educational objective: fully or partially meet the basic shelter and care needs to unaccompanied children.

Activities planned:

- accommodate unaccompanied children in buildings constructed for this purpose.
- provide children accommodated in orphanages with basic care and education.
- provide financial support to the extended families or relatives caring for unaccompanied children.

Indonesia

The general situation in Aceh province has further clarified as international aid agencies and independent assessment teams arrived in the Banda Aceh area. The northeast coast road is being used as the main supply route from Medan to Banda Aceh. Military cargo aircraft are also using the airstrip and significant quantities of relief supplies are being downloaded. Outlying areas, particularly the west coast, remain virtually impossible to access with the roads south from Banda Aceh to Meulaboh either not trafficable through damage or blocked by debris. Travel to the more remote areas is only possible by helicopter. At least 34 towns in this area have been totally destroyed and remain inundated. Pulau Simeulue has also been devastated but little detailed information is available. Aftershocks continue to be a source of concern to the residents in the northern extremity of the Province.

The Indonesian death toll now stands at 79,940. This figure is largely based on estimates, not on body count, and is expected to rise again. The number of injured still stands at 2,096 with an estimated 100,000 displaced.

A number of hospitals in Aceh province have reopened in the last 24 hours and nine are now listed as operational, largely through combined efforts of staff and resources mobilized by the government, Indonesian Red Cross and foreign aid agencies. Infrastructure is slowly being restored with electricity being available to 30% of users in Banda Aceh and telecommunications expected to be available for 80,000 subscribers by 2 January. A commercial provider is establishing a mobile repeater unit to assist in recovering the mobile phone network in the same area. Outlying areas remain without any services.

Although commercial supplies are arriving in Banda Aceh, aid teams and personnel must be deployed fully self-contained for transport, fuel, accommodation, food, water and ancillary administrative needs. Humanitarian assistance including water, food, medicines, shelter and family kits is moving into the area slowly due to the difficulty of securing transport resources. However, roads are trafficable between Medan and Banda Aceh and truck convoys are beginning to move. Convoys as extensive as 50 vehicles are being reported. Despite some improvement, fuel is still in short supply and stocks in Medan are only adequate for local use, not for bulk filling.

Medan is the staging area for all organisations moving to operate in Aceh Province and with effect from this afternoon was closed to cargo aircraft. The warehouse capacity and space available for storage both on the airfield and in the city is fully utilised. Although it is preferable for goods and personnel to deploy direct to Medan or further forward, large aircraft can only operate into Jakarta where warehousing is still available at the airport, and cargo transshipment can be conducted effectively to other aircraft types or transportation modes (such as road). The

International Federation is establishing a logistics centre on Batam Island, between Singapore and Indonesia, from where supplies will be airlifted to the disaster zone.

Local authorities continue to assist in the evacuation of affected people to safe areas, providing shelter, emergency food and clean water. Health facilities are being augmented, including the dispatch of medicines and health teams into Aceh. The Indonesian government authorities have advised that all distribution of relief aid will be undertaken by them and their responsible departments. It is unclear how this is to be implemented as major organized distribution of relief supplies has yet to occur. Stocks are accumulating on the ground in Banda Aceh.

The UN Disaster Management Team (UNDMT) is trying to reinforce information sharing and coordination among aid agencies to prevent unnecessary duplication of efforts and to optimize operational capacity.

Red Cross Action

More than 800 emergency response volunteers of Indonesian Red Cross have been deployed across the affected area including some outlying areas, undertaking search, rescue and first aid tasks as well as the ongoing responsibility of recovering and collecting bodies for possible identification and burial along with community support tasks including distribution of tarpaulins, clothing and emergency supplies to those in need. Support of non perishable food items and relief kits for 6,000 families remains on standby. The number of Indonesian Red Cross disaster response volunteers has apparently reduced. Those remaining are now focusing on collecting bodies for burial and providing limited community support tasks.

At the national level, the operations room in Indonesian Red Cross national headquarters is now fully operational. A disaster response officer from the headquarters is now established in Banda Aceh. A joint national society/ICRC/Federation assessment team remains in Medan. Further deployment is being planned. Initial intention is assess the situation and to provide a full range of support and relief activities to the most vulnerable communities on the west coast of Aceh province between Tapaktuang and Meulaboh. The operation will probably be based in Meulaboh. Appropriate aircraft, road and sea transport options are being considered to support the logistics capacity for relief operations.

The Federation FACT team focused on Medan today. The regional programme coordinator remains in Jakarta to facilitate the arrival of Red Cross personnel and equipment including reception and subsequent deployment. A basic health ERU (Japanese Red Cross) and the water-sanitation ERU (French Red Cross) are in Medan. Arrangements for the deployment of other ERUs, telecommunications, logistics, basic health, and water-sanitation in-country are also being considered exclusive of deployment direct into Medan. Other suitable airstrips including Padang (West Sumatra) and Pekanbaru (Riau province) are options for staging purposes. Incoming teams are expected including water-sanitation (German Red Cross) and logistics (Danish Red Cross) on 1 January and another water-sanitation (Spanish Red Cross) on 2 January. There is also a possibility to deploy a field hospital (Norwegian Red Cross).

Consignments of relief supplies, including blankets (Korean Red Cross), general items (Netherlands Red Cross) are expected to arrive in the next two days. The FACT deployment and recommendations will determine how best the ERUs can be deployed in a coordinated manner with UN and other humanitarian aid agencies. In view of the difficult access to the affected areas, the Federation Southeast Asia regional delegation in Bangkok has requested some Red Cross societies in the region for assistance in sourcing aircrafts and helicopters to transport relief supplies to the affected areas.

Thailand

More than 4,510 people, almost half of them foreigners, were confirmed dead today in Thailand's tidal wave disaster. According to the local officials, hundreds more bodies are expected to be recovered later in the day. The provincial government of Phang Nga, which includes the devastated resort area of Khao Lak, said 2,027 foreigners and 1,662 Thais were confirmed dead there. Interior ministry figures showed a total of 821 confirmed dead, 203 of which are foreigners, in the five other provinces on the Andaman Sea coast which were battered by huge waves last Sunday. Official records show that 9,810 people were injured and more than 6,400 are still missing nationwide. The government presumes that 80 per cent of them are feared dead.

A candlelight New Year vigil will be held on the Phi Phi Island, one of many planned in a sombre nation which normally marks the occasion with frenzied merrymaking. European nations were also grieving with a large number of foreign confirmed and feared dead. Flooding, stagnant water, disruption of sewer lines, and poor quality sanitation conditions are the biggest concern.

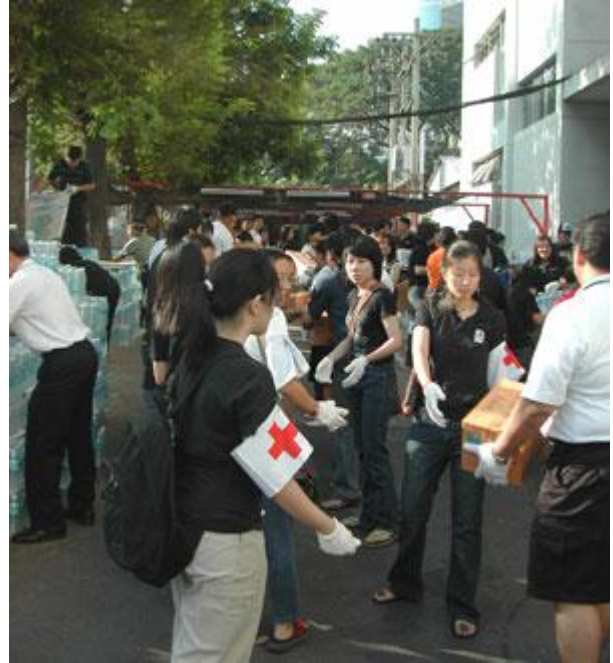
The Thai government is requesting body bags, freezers, coffins and forensic experts to help store and identify decomposing corpses. More than 5,000 soldiers have been sent to join 20,000 local officials and volunteers in rescue and relief operations in the affected provinces. In addition to a shortage of manpower, the search and relief operations yesterday was shadowed by rumours of an earthquake and more tsunamis. The search of wrecked buildings has slowed down due to a shortage of heavy equipment and the false alarm about more tsunamis. Disposal of the masses of dead remains a major challenge with western countries keen to preserve the remains for identification and Thai health officials favouring quick disposal in the tropical heat. Refrigerated containers are in acutely short supply.

Thai Red Cross continues the massive operation of relief activities in the south, distributing relief items and providing medical services to the affected people. Mobile phone users can now contribute through SMS to the Thai Red Cross nation-wide appeal. Hundreds of staff and volunteers are helping to receive and manage the huge amount of donated goods which are pouring into the Red Cross warehouses and donation centres. Distribution of relief items are continuing in three of the worst affected provinces including Satun, Phang Nga and Krabi.

The Federation assessment team, consisting of a water and sanitation delegate, an information delegate, a disaster management staff and a photographer, arrived yesterday (30 December) in Phuket city. The rapid assessment in Phuket and Khao Lak area confirmed the devastation as reported on the media. Thai Red Cross staff and volunteers are seen everywhere providing water, clothes and household items to disaster affected people. Khao Lak city is completely destroyed. It is estimated that 5,000 fishermen are affected and 1,000 dead. Affected people are temporarily housed in a school. The Thai Red Cross has been involved with the distribution of body bags, shampoos and hygiene items donated by the king. A Thai Red Cross medical team will be visiting the school tomorrow. Local people and tourists are volunteering in the relief efforts. Several news stories and images were sent to Geneva. The assessment team will be visiting Phang Nga province tomorrow and joined by a Danish Red Cross delegate.

Malaysia

The situation is returning to normal as search and rescue activities have ended. The death toll is put at 67, according to the Malaysian Red Crescent. The national society will be working on a plan to provide mass cooking for 600 affected people and distribution of relief items in the affected Penang and Kedah. Starting today, the society is taking over from the military the responsibility of mass cooking and looking after hygiene for 500

people still residing at the relief centers in Penang and Kedah. Some psychosocial activities like games and screen films for children and young adults will be organized along with ongoing tracing of missing persons.

Sri Lanka

A Sri Lanka Red Cross Society (SLRCS) pilot team of 6 people (3 ICRC staff and 3 SLRCS volunteers) are now visiting displaced camps in Matara, Galle, and Hikkaduwa. Another team left today for Kalutara (4 SLRCS volunteers and 2 ICRC delegates) to cover areas such as Hikkaduwa and liaise with Government authorities to assess possibilities of re-establishing family links with sat phone and mobile phones. A third team (1 SLRCS staff and 1 ICRC delegate) leave for Matara tomorrow (1 January 2005) and will work with Matara branch volunteers for tracing activities. Eleven water bowsers have been dispatched to Matara, Trinco, Ampa, Galle, Batti, Kalutara, Killinochchi and Mullativu

Batticaloa branch update (31 December):

- 300 SLRCS volunteers have been deployed to work in Kaliwanchikudy, Manmunai North, Kalkudah, and Vellavelly.
- 8 SLRCS volunteers were also deployed to work in the Amapara District, and First Aid Teams and have treated 250 patients in camps.
- 25 volunteers are distributing non-food relief items.

Immediate needs include: water, toilets, face masks, -(500) cooking utensils, doctors, medicines, sanitary towels, underwear, food, mats and blankets, sanitary napkins. Other international organizations operating include 20A, TDH, Oxfam, UNICEF, UNHCR, CARE, Worldview, and Save the Children.

Trincomalee branch update (31 December):

Doctors from 'Future Peace' visited refugee centres and treated patients with the assistance of SLRCS volunteers. Medicines were supplied by the SLRCS. 30 SLRCS volunteers cleaned wells in the Nilaveli area. Trincomalee District volunteers assisted the Vaharai village in the Batticaloa District by distributing non-food relief items received by other organizations. 1,000 mineral water packets were distributed to camps visited by Mobile Health Teams. 300 meal packets collected by volunteers were distributed to persons in the Mattikali Camp. 350 boxes of biscuits donated by Japanese NGO AMDA, distributed to 12 Refugee Camps in the Kuchchaveli D.S. Division. Non-food relief items were distributed to 2 refugee camps in the Mutur D.S. Division. 10 wells in Pallathoddam were cleaned and chlorinated.

Vavuniya branch update (31 December):

- 29,444 persons accommodated in 8 displaced centres.
- 168 injured in hospital (47 discharged).

Branch activities include:

- 32 SLRCS volunteers deployed.
- 9 First Aiders.
- 15 SLRCS volunteers are distributing non-food relief items.

Immediate needs include: water, toilets, face masks, -(500) cooking utensils, doctors, medicines, sanitary towels, underwear, food, mats and blankets, sanitary napkins. International organizations operating include 20A, TDH, Oxfam, UNICEF, UNHCR, CARE, Worldview, and Save the Children.

Mullativu branch update (31 December):

- 25,000 displaced persons accommodated in 17 welfare centres.
- More than 8000+ injured.
- 5,000 affected families.
- 1,600 bodies recovered.
- 3,000 missing persons.
- 25,000 persons evacuated.

Immediate needs include: dressing kits, bed sheets, fibre water tanks (1,000 litre capacity) for welfare centres, clothing, sanitary packages, children's feeding bottles, rubber sheets.

Kalutara branch update (31 December):

Asia: Earthquake and Tsunamis; Revised Preliminary Appeal no. 28/2004; Operations Update no. 4

- 33,794 persons in 111 welfare/refugee/displaced centres.
- 739 injured in hospitals.
- 74,000 displaced persons.

Branch activities include:

- 58 SLRCS volunteers working each day with 4 First Aid Teams; 10 volunteers distributing non-food relief items.

Immediate needs include: dry foods, drugs, mats, pillows, clothes, drinking water, infant foods, baby needs

Matara branch update (31 December):

- 40,500 persons in 63 welfare/refugee/displaced.
- 145,094 displaced persons.
- 1,061 dead in the district.

Branch activities include:

- 54 SLRCS volunteers working with 4 First Aid Teams and 4 medical teams.
- 4 volunteers distributing non-food relief items.
- 1,200 wounded evacuated by the branch.

Immediate needs include: clothes, mats, water, dry rations, kitchen utensils, medicines, face masks. International organizations working include UN, CARE, ST. JOHNS.

Hambantota branch update (31 December):

- 28,388 persons accommodated in 33 welfare/refugee/displaced centres.
- 3,800 injured and 2,822 bodies in hospitals.
- 14,000 affected families.
- 4,800 wounded, 2,600 reported dead, and 2,900 reported missing.

Branch activities include:

- 82 volunteers working with 12 first aid teams.
- 146 bodies evacuated by the branch

Immediate needs include: communications facility, water bottles, masks, vehicles, medicines, cleaning of wells. International organizations operating include World Vision and Plan.

Ampara branch update (31 December):

- 173,396 persons in 124 welfare/refugee centres or schools.

Branch activities include:

- 80 volunteers working with 20 First Aid Teams deployed daily and 10 volunteers distributing non-food relief items.

Immediate needs include: water, clothes, feeding bottles, milk food, drugs, sanitary towels. International organizations operating include UNICEF and CARE.

Gampaha branch update (31 December):

- 900 persons housed in welfare centres.
- 900 displaced persons.

Branch activities include: 13 volunteers deployed daily. Immediate needs include: drugs, kitchen utensils, drinking water, cleaning of wells, toilets, antiseptic liquid. International organisations operating include World Vision.

Galle branch update (31 December):

- 44,582 accommodated in 175 welfare/centres/refugee/displaced centres.
- 3,455 bodies in hospitals.

Branch activities include:

- 30 volunteers deployed each day.
- 30 First Aid Teams deployed each day.

Immediate needs include: tents, shelters, medicine, clothes, feeding bottles, milk food, mats, mosquito coils, soap.

Killinochchi branch update (31 December):

- 12,050 persons affected.

- 626 deaths (figure expected to exceed 1,500).
- 750 missing, 880 wounded, 626 dead bodies recovered, 880 persons hospitalized.
- 7,870 persons in welfare centres, and 2,000 staying with relatives or friends.

Branch activities include:

- 10 First Aid and 74 other volunteers operating in the field.
- 9,870 MHT & First Aid service beneficiaries.

Colombo branch updates (from 30 December):

- 2,500 persons accommodated in 8 welfare/refugee/displaced centres.
- 4,000 displaced in district.
- 24 dead in district

Branch activities:

- 30 volunteers working each day.
- 2 First AID teams deployed

Immediate needs include: shelters, toilets, material to repair houses, cleaning of wells.

Jaffna branch updates (31 December):

Branch activities include:

- a task force to handle the situation had been set up (first meeting was held on 30 December).
- 1,520 volunteers working in Chavakachcheri and Point Pedro.
- Volunteers are engaged in First Aid, Mobile Health and relief operations, and are distributing 2,500 bars of soap along with other relief

Mannar branch update (31 December):

Branch activities include: a team of 08 volunteers, 1 doctor and 1 dispenser traveled to Batticaloa with medicines to assist the teams in Batticaloa.

Puttalam branch update:

- 22,500 persons housed in 9 welfare centres.
- SLRCS is supplying drinking water to these camps via 3 tractor bowsers.
- SLRCS is supplying cooked meals to some of the camps.
- 2,000 persons have been identified as displaced from “uncleared” areas.

India

10,000 people lost their lives along India's southeastern coast and the Andaman & Nicobar Islands. The state of Tamil Nadu in India is one of the worst affected states where according to latest government reports 6187 people have been killed. All 12 coastal districts were affected. The number of dead reported in Nagapattinam district has gone up to 4,379. About 8,000 people are reported missing. More than 200,000 people have been displaced in Nagapattinam with the fishing communities being the most affected. 90% of the boats have been damaged including fishing equipment resulting in loss of livelihood for fishermen. In Tamil Nadu's Cuddalore district, 575 people are dead and over 5000 people have been left homeless. Over 808 people have been killed in Kanyakumari district, 201 people were killed in Chennai, 47 in Villupuram district and 118 in the district of Kancheepuram.

Water and sanitation remains a major concern. There is a fear of an outbreak of water borne diseases. In the Nagapattinam district of Tamil Nadu there has been an outbreak of diarrhoea. People who have lost their homes are living in temporary shelters including Red Cross cyclone shelters, temples, schools and public places. Many people are still in shock and traumatized due to the tragedy.

According to latest reports, in Andaman and & Nicobar Islands 3,000 people have been killed. The official figure of the number missing in Nicobar was put at 5,900. These persons are feared dead. About 30 islands in the Nicobar group are yet to be accessed. The armed forces have launched a massive reconnaissance operation to look for signs of life. In Car Nicobar medical camps have started functioning. Fifty tones of relief material have been delivered by the government. Vehicles have been airlifted to the island and road clearance equipment has also been sent. The central government is sending survey teams to assess the extent of damage and take up emergency

work to supply drinking water. The Governor of Andaman and Nicobar islands has now stressed the need for temporary shelters for those who have been displaced.

In Pondicherry, the death toll has risen to 548 with 30,000 displaced and hundreds of fishermen are still missing. 104 casualties have been reported from Andhra Pradesh, while the death toll in the state of Kerala has risen to 163 with more than 50,000 displaced.

Government and other agencies' efforts in Nagapattinam, Tamil Nadu

To prevent the spread of epidemic, plane loads of drinking water are being flown in. All attempts are being made to facilitate the quick disposal of bodies. On the rehabilitation front, the government will focus more on providing shelter and replacing of boats and fishing nets lost by fishermen. The army has been entrusted with disposing of bodies. Food packets, cooked food and drinking water are being provided to the 7 relief centers that have been set up in the district. Medical camps have been set up in the relief centers.

Thirty heavy earthmoving machines have been deployed by the government. The district authorities have set up a control room. The army has been deployed and is guarding the coastline. Two naval ships have been deployed with two helicopters for emergency assistance. Medical services are being provided by 250 doctors including 25 Red Cross doctors. Government Revenue officers from other districts are also engaged in assessment. Bulldozers and other earth moving equipment are engaged in cleaning the area and being used for mass burials.

Red Cross Action

The islands surrounding the Andaman's are still inaccessible, making it impossible to perform a proper assessment or provide relief. According to the Secretary of the Andaman branch the district administration is not allowing any teams to arrive on the island due to unsafe conditions and warnings of further Tsunami's.

The Governor of Andaman and Nicobar Island has now stressed the need for temporary shelters for those who have been displaced as a result of Sunday's tsunami. 2,000 litres of drinking water was airlifted to the Andaman and Nicobar Islands donated by Coca Cola India to the IRCS. Another 13,000 litres of drinking water donated by Coca Cola India will be airlifted to the Andaman and Nicobar Islands today.

The IRCS is sending 5,000 family kits (incl. medicines) to Cape Comorin on the southern tip of India, in Tamil Nadu, and will be deploying a DHRU to the Andaman Island.

The islands surrounding the Andaman's are still inaccessible making it impossible to perform a proper assessment or provide relief. One harbor at Port Blair, Andaman is now fully functioning and is receiving ships.

Tamil Nadu: the national headquarters had released 4,000 pieces each of saris, dhotis, bed sheets and towels for distribution in the affected areas of Tamil Nadu from the Arakonam warehouse (Tamil Nadu). These have reached Nagapattinam and distribution is ongoing. Similar quantities of kitchen sets and tarpaulins will be distributed in the coming days. 1,000 family packs of non-food items were sent to Villupuram district for distribution.

An additional 5,000 family packs are being sent to Kanya Kumari in Tamil Nadu. The family packs will consist of tarpaulin sheets, plastic buckets, bed sheets, towels, saris, dhoti's and cotton blankets. Emergency ration consisting of BP 5 biscuits (1884 kg) and other food and clothing items are also being sent.

The national headquarters will be deploying 1 water purification unit to Nagapattinam district and 1 water purification unit to Kanyakumari. This has been donated by USAID.

Nestle India has contributed 1,000 cartons of milk. Each carton contains 12 litres. They have also donated 350 boxes of uncooked noodles.

The state branch is actively involved in relief operations and is also coordinating with other stakeholders present. Cooked food, bread and milk/tea are being provided by the IRCS. In collaboration with Coca Cola, IRCS provided 3500 cases of water (12 litres in each water case). Local Red Cross volunteers (300) provided with surgical masks and gloves are helping the people most in need, and have set up a Red Cross post center in the district hospital to register people. 25 doctors and 15 ambulances are presently functional at the Nagapattinam district hospital. A

tracing cell has been set up within the hospital compound. 340 cases have been registered for tracing in the last two days including 128 people who are from states other than Tamil Nadu.

Disaster Mental Health (DMH)-trained volunteers are actively involved in relief work and psychological support at Sirgazhi and Tharangambadi talukas. A full NDRT team has reached Chennai and will conduct an in-depth assessment of many other affected areas of vulnerability in coordination with the state and district branches.

Kerala: the Maharashtra state branch is sending relief material of food, clothing and medicines to the Kerala state branch. A team of doctors, nurses and volunteers are also on their way to provide medical assistance in help in relief distribution.

The Bihar state branch has sent 1,000 family kits to the Allapuzha district branch consisting of dhoti, sari, tarpaulin sheet, bed sheet, steel glasses, beaten rice, dal, jaggary, candles and matchboxes.

Andhra Pradesh: the IRCS headquarters is sending 2,000 kitchen sets and 4,000 cotton blankets to the Andhra Pradesh state branch. These are being sent from the Kolkata warehouse.

The Bihar state branch has sent 1,000 family kits to the Andhra Pradesh state branch. The family packs consist of dhoti, sari, tarpaulin sheet, bed sheet, steel glasses, beaten rice, dal, jaggary, candles and matchboxes.

Requests have been coming in to the national headquarters for the supply of relief material in the form of blankets, cooking vessels, bed sheets and food packs.

The IRCS will focus on supporting the existing medical teams, provide shelter materials, clothing, kitchen utensils and safe drinking water in its current response to needs of the affected people. The IRCS national headquarters, state branch and district branches are receiving local donations (cash and in-kind) from different sectors, and are in the process of distribution (see table below). IRCS activities in response to the current Tsunami emergency situation have been covered by the national and international media.

Myanmar

In the wake of the disaster that hit large areas of southern Myanmar and the Irrawaddy delta, the Myanmar government has refused offers of international relief aid, stating that there is no need for an emergency operation for the country and they can cope with the present situation.

The known death toll as a result of the tsunamis and a concurrent earthquake stands at 86, although the government says 36 people were killed. The government statistics list 45 people injured and 14 missing. Irrawaddy division, southwest of Rangoon, was the most severely affected area. Forty seven people died there, 45 were injured and more than 700 homes were damaged. Over 3,500 people are affected in some way by the disaster.

In southernmost Tenasserim Division, 27 people died and about 270 houses were destroyed. Twelve people died in western Arakan State. The Coco Islands, originally thought to have been hard hit, were least damaged by the earthquake and tsunamis. The state-run daily news also report that the authorities distributed cash, food and other material aid to affected families in Irrawaddy and Tenasserim divisions. The government urged people not to panic and to remain in their homes after rumors of more tsunamis sent thousands into the streets yesterday.

The Federation head of delegation planned a joint field trip with the Myanmar Red Cross counterparts to the Irrawaddy delta area to ensure the full picture of the damage. The trip was called due to constrained access.

The Federation delegation has prepared an initial mobilization list comprising 1,000 emergency family packs - including temporary shelter, hygiene and clothing items, kitchen sets and mosquito nets - replenishment of stocks, transport and national society capacity building components, currently budgeted at some CHF 670,000. This figure is expected to rise markedly following further assessment.

Update on the impact and action in Africa

In **Somalia**, the UNOCHA-led assessment of the remote north-eastern coastline of Somalia still continues. Assessment teams are now on the ground in the areas believed to be the most affected, namely Hafun, Bender Beila, Eyl and Gara'ad plus surrounding villages. In addition, an aerial assessment was carried out yesterday of the coastline between Hafun and Bender Beila, as well as the area surrounding Gara'ad. The initial findings of the combined assessments will be presented by OCHA this evening (31 December). Preliminary information from the aerial team suggests that, with the exception of Hafun, damage to standing structures is less widespread than initially feared. Numbers of affected are still not confirmed, although again it appears that estimates may be less than initially anticipated. Nonetheless, large numbers of people have been affected and are in need of assistance, which has already started to arrive.

The peninsula of Hafun still remains the single site suffering the most devastating effects. Access to Hafun is restricted due to poor road conditions near the town. Relief supplies arriving by truck from Bosaso are halted at Foar, around 60 km from Hafun, and have to be shuttled from there to the town by 4x4 vehicle. Food aid has however reached 500 affected families already, and water, medical supplies and shelter are also getting through.

Airstrips along the Puntland coast are being opened up, and helicopter support is being sought via UNCAS to access the most remote parts. A US Navy helicopter already provided some support to Hafun. The Prime Minister of the Transitional Federal Government is expected to visit several affected areas throughout the country in the coming days.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action in Somalal

Somali Red Crescent branches in Bosaso, Garowe and Galkayo are all involved in the assessment work and emergency response. The existing strong partnerships that SRCS has developed with other UN operational agencies through its health programme, in particular UNICEF and WHO, are being built on for the coordinated response.

From Bosaso branch, covering the hardest hit areas, a team of SRCS first aiders has now reached Hafun with medicines and ORS provided by UNICEF. In addition, teams of volunteers have been mobilized along the whole of Bari region - 30 in Hafun and surrounding villages, 20 in Bender Beila and surrounding villages and 20 in Alula district (mostly in Tooxin and nearby areas). These are all active with the communities there and are assisting with distributions.

A team from Garowe branch including the Branch Secretary is in Bender Beila together with representatives from OCHA, FSAU, CARE, Kaalo and local authorities, and is now proceeding down the coast to Eyl. It will meet there with a team traveling northwards from Gara'ad, and will thus complete a full picture of needs along that more southern area. The Garowe and Galkayo health teams are already working with UNICEF to respond to initial health needs. In addition, volunteers from the coastal sub-branches are active in assisting the affected communities.

Current expectations are that the needs of the affected people can probably be met with the stocks of materials already available to the major UN operational agencies (principally WFP, UNICEF and WHO), but this will be confirmed later today. Already as a first response, WFP are planning distributions to 15,000 potential beneficiaries (including those already started in Hafun), UNICEF are positioning 1,000 family kits that include shelter and water treatment, and WHO has 3 emergency kits in the area which can cater for a total of 30,000 people for 3 months. The coordination mechanism will confirm whether these agencies will be able to meet all the food and non-food needs, and the Federation and ICRC are ready to respond to fill any gaps that may arise in the coordinated response. Consideration will also be given by the Movement partners to possible livelihood support in the medium term for those communities affected.

Media interest on the effects of the tidal wave on the oriental coast of Africa remained high. Briefings and interviews on the overall impact and the Red Cross Red Crescent response were given by the Somalia head of delegation and Regional Information Delegate to media such as BBC (French and English sections), Radio Canada International, Reuters, DPA (German News Agency) and South African Radio stations.

In **Kenya**, the Kenya Red Cross launched a national appeal in support of the Federation appeal. A press conference was convened by the national society and the Charge d'Affairs from the Royal Thai Embassy and High Commissioner of Sri Lanka attended. The Indian High Commissioner sent a communique. The Federation Regional Delegation Disaster Management Coordinator presented the revised preliminary appeal and the ICRC Deputy Head of Regional Delegation presented their relief flights from Nairobi and operations in Indonesia and Sri Lanka. The Kenya press and TV companies were present. It was a worthwhile event and well organized by Kenya Red Cross.

A national appeal was also launched by the Uganda Red Cross, on 29 December. The Uganda Red Cross has also set up an information desk through their tracing service to help with the restoration of family links of those in Uganda who have lost family members and friends abroad.

In the **Seychelles**, the Government has launched an international appeal for funds probably for reconstruction. The French Red Cross/PIROI airlift was put on hold until the situation clarified. 375 families had been evacuated into hotels from regions at high risk of landslide and 500 families affected by the tidal wave. According to the Seychelles Red Cross some 175 families have been affected by landslides caused by heavy rains in the north of the main island Mahe affecting 150 houses. The NS has received and distributed mattresses, bedsheets, kitchen sets and tinned fish donated by the local community to 35 to 40 families. It would appear that the donations are diminishing and so there may be 140 families yet to be assisted in addition to the 500 families affected by the tidal wave on Mahe and Praslin islands. The national society has had considerable difficulties communicating their appeal by email and fax, for food and non-food items for 650 families, fishing equipment and NS capacity building. The Federation's Nairobi Regional Delegation is assisting in reviewing requirements, and will look carefully at the budget (affected by high local procurement costs).

In **Madagascar**, the assessment team from the Madagascar Red Cross returned after a 4-day mission, their report has yet to be received. The team took with them and distributed some basic assistance items and visited the branches en route. There seems to be some concern from humanitarian agencies that the figures reported earlier

by the media of the numbers affected may not be so great. The Federation's Nairobi Regional Delegation is in discussion with UNOCHA Johannesburg concerning clarification of these reports and the situation.
