ASIA: EARTHQUAKE & TSUNAMIS

In Brief

Background

The magnitude 9.0 earthquake that struck the area off the western coast of northern Sumatra Sunday morning, 26 December 2004, at 7:59 am local time (00:59 GMT) triggered massive tidal waves, or tsunamis, that swept into coastal villages and seaside resorts. The earthquake epicentre was located at 3.30 N, 95.78E at a depth of 10 kilometres (see map above). The area is historically prone to seismic upheaval due to its location on the margins of tectonic plates, however tidal waves of this magnitude are rare, and therefore the level of preparedness was very low.

Overview

Latest estimated deaths are over 159,000 (this figure is now anticipated to rise to over 189,000), with over 24,000 missing. Some 2,200,000 people have been displaced while over 1,026,000 are believed to be homeless (please see the summary document available on the Federation's Disaster Management Information System (DMIS), at https://www-secure.ifrc.org/dmis/response/dmi_respond.asp). These figures are still expected to increase.

The Federation has deployed its full complement of disaster response tools in the form of Field Assessment and Coordination Teams (FACT) and Emergency Response Units (ERUs) in the sectors of water and sanitation, health care, aid distribution, telecommunications, and logistics/transportation, and their daily reports are now arriving, providing a valuable source for the ongoing Federation response, and operational adjustments. To date, there are 14 technical teams with over 81 specialists in two countries working around the clock on these sectors. A total of 40 relief flights have been sent out to affected regions.

Operational Developments

Coordination

Given the size and scope of the catastrophe, and the emerging international response, this is clearly a complex operation where effective coordination is critical. Mechanisms have been established and regular meetings are taking place in the field and the countries directly affected (with the ICRC, government authorities, NGO's, UNOCHA and UNDAC), in Geneva (with the ICRC and the UN's IASC Task Force on Tsunami-affected Countries), and in New York (with UNOCHA).

The International Federation is formally managing this operation from its Secretariat in Geneva, supported by its regional delegations in Bangkok and New Delhi and country delegations across the disaster zone, including Indonesia and Sri Lanka. An Operations Task Force is meeting daily, with the participation of Federation technical departments, and the ICRC.

Mobilisation of relief items is being coordinated by the Federation's logistics department in Geneva. The mobilisation table on DMIS is being constantly updated with details of all goods in the relief pipeline. All national societies making pledges of in-kind donations are requested to contact the logistics department at the Federation Secretariat to ensure coordination, and to ensure that the most needed goods are transported to the disaster-affected areas as quickly as possible. The logistics department will provide commodity-tracking numbers and shipping instructions. Details of all relief consignments are sent to receiving delegations, who will ensure that on the arrival of relief goods, confirmation of arrival is sent to the donors. In order not to block the supply chain with unsolicited or presently not needed goods, this coordination with the logistics department is extremely important.

As reported in Operations Update no. 6, the Federation and the ICRC have agreed a joint statement on the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement response to the disaster, serving as a basis for moving ahead effectively and in a coordinated fashion as the Movement gears up to meeting the needs of those throughout the affected countries¹. In addition to the two preliminary appeals launched already by the Federation and the ICRC budget extension appeals for Sri Lanka and Aceh Province in Indonesia (on 3 January 2005), there is a programme extension and budget revision planned on 11 January. A fully coordinated and combined Red Cross and Red Crescent international appeal will be developed and launched early in February. This will include clear, and distinct, objectives and budgets for the activities to be coordinated by each institution.

The Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement pledges to continue providing immediate support to all affected by the disaster. It recognises that longer-term support is equally important to the national societies involved and that the reconstruction and rehabilitation process that will follow immediate efforts will continue for many years. No less important in this context is the Movement's commitment to develop and extend disaster preparedness capacities and systems across the region. In relation to these longer-term needs, the Federation will continue to receive funds and thanks all donors and contributors for the support provided.

Indonesia

The general situation in Banda Aceh is stabilising and continues to improve with determined efforts at making the town more habitable. Only two tremors of 5.0 and 5.7 on the Richter scale were recorded in the area in the last 48 hours.

Latest official figures put the death toll at 113,306, with a further 10,073 missing. As searches extend to previously inaccessible areas the number of dead is expected to rise. Attempts are being made to establish a credible list of missing with the Indonesian government (department of social affairs), schools and humanitarian agencies such as the Indonesian Red Cross (Palang Merah Indonesia/PMI) assisting. This will likely increase significantly the number of missing which has been estimated to be much greater than the current official figure. Some populations in remote areas still have not been reached by the relief effort; there are unconfirmed reports of a camp with 60,000 people in Malabu, an island off the coast of North Sumatra, Indonesia.

The department of health reports that 4,834 survivors are being treated in hospitals (1,174 admitted and 2,660 outpatients). These numbers are increasing daily. These figures do not include those hospitalised and treated by foreign military and NGO facilities operating in the province. The number of internally displaced persons (IDPs) now totals 605,849. These are located principally in Aceh Province and the cities of Medan and Jakarta and are also increasing in number daily, as record-keeping improves. In total, 14 areas (population 1 million) of 21 in Aceh province have been affected with 172 sub-districts and 1,550 villages sustaining damage, and 21,659 houses destroyed.

No disease outbreaks have been reported but the water and sanitation situation is still critical, with more water supplies needed for camps and hospitals in particular. WHO has warned that tens of thousands of people are at risk due to lack of potable water. There have been reported cases of diarrhoea, respiratory and skin diseases, as well as mental trauma. The government launched a measles vaccination campaign on 6 January and a vitamin A campaign is ongoing. However, the planned measles campaign is not likely to commence out of Banda Aceh for another week. The department of health is also carrying out mosquito fogging, disinfection and a health survey in Banda Aceh, and has trained 14 military personnel on sanitation and vaccination delivery. The latest UNOCHA report states that 50 percent of existing health services have been destroyed or damaged. Media coverage is speculating on the potential for disease to spread through the IDP groups and the related immunisation campaigns.

Local authorities continue to assist in the evacuation and concentration of affected people to concentration areas, providing shelter, food and clean water. Health facilities are now being significantly augmented and improved. A comprehensive range of medicines and health team capabilities are now operating in Banda Aceh and will progressively extend to other populated areas.

The Indonesian department of health has requested the following: oxygen, food for infants, a medical team, nebulisers, suction equipment, minor surgery sets, anti-tetanus serum, measles vaccines, antibiotics for ear, nose and throat, bronchoscopes and intensive care unit supplies. It also states that health services are urgently required in the Calang coastal area near Meulaboh. According to an assessment conducted by USAID, there is a significant need for antibiotics, analgesics, tetanus toxoid, surgical supplies and X-ray film in Medan. UNICEF is supporting the Indonesian government's measles campaign and is providing anti-tetanus serum. It has also ordered an additional 10,000 medical kits for households and is addressing child-related issues such as child trafficking and mitigation of illegal adoption. WHO is playing a strong cooperating role in Banda Aceh and is commencing health surveillance. The government of Canada has offered 64 storage bladders of 6,000 litres each and 40 generators. The disaster assistance team from the US agency for international development has conducted an evaluation of nine hospitals in the Medan area, and established a central office there to register patients arriving from Aceh and to provide possible assistance in directing these patients to hospitals in the area.

Major efforts continue to restore existing facilities to operation as quickly as possible and the restoration of public infrastructure is slowly getting underway. This is expected to significantly increase in the next week with the influx of specialist military engineering equipment and additional manpower. The ministry of education has appealed to the UN for assistance with provision of materials for temporary classrooms and education materials for 60,000 children. The minister of people's welfare has declared that the government will construct 24 relief camps for IDPs in Aceh within one week. IDPs are still living in makeshift shelters with inadequate water and sanitation facilities.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action in Indonesia

The situation in the field continues as previously reported. PMI teams are concentrated in Banda Aceh, Lhokseumawe and Meulaboh augmented by special team volunteers and medical personnel. Details of management arrangements and tasking of PMI human resources will be notified when detailed planning and resource allocation are finalised. More than 710 volunteers are already deployed.

Rotation of the emergency response volunteers commenced on Saturday, 8 January, with 120 new SATGANA team members moving forward to Banda Aceh to relieve those in the area. A further 116 are scheduled to move forward tomorrow, 10 January. SATGANA team members withdrawing from the field will now be rested and medically assessed.

At national level, the principal focus of operations is on the west coast of Aceh Province between Tapaktuang and Meulaboh with the bulk of the effort centred on Meulaboh. Provincial offshore islands are also included in the operations. An assessment of the Medan-Meulaboh road confirms that it is not suitable for heavy vehicle – as a result, it is expected that convoys to Meulaboh will now operate using smaller trucks. The road is open but weather and traffic volume will dictate how long the route remains viable. Bulk relief items will now be able to move forward by a combination of air and road transport.

Logistics

Negotiations are continuing to secure a small cargo helicopter for the dedicated use of PMI in their operational area. Road transport is being utilised to move bulk goods from Jakarta forward to Medan in conjunction with chartered aircraft and available transport aircraft. Assets are being shared with other Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement partners to support the ongoing operations, including the rotation of personnel.

Relief donations in kind continue to move forward to the field as quickly as possible. Loading and dispatch are operating efficiently with trans-shipment and reload taking place in Medan in response to requests from the field. Additional transport assets (20 five-tonne all terrain cargo trucks) are scheduled to arrive in Medan later in the week. They will be transported by sea from Batam after a suitable vessel is secured – hopefully tomorrow, 10 January, along with bulk relief items.

The Norwegian Red Cross has deployed a 100-bed hospital with 39 staff to the affected region. A WHO emergency response shipment includes 191 new emergency primary health kits, each one covering the primary health care needs of 10,000 people for three months, 100 surgical kits, each covering 100 surgical interventions, and 40 diarrhoea kits, each covering 100 severe cases. 80 percent of this relief is expected to have been delivered to Indonesia by 9 January – 81 vehicles have been mobilised to assist in distribution of the equipment.

On 8 January, ICRC sent a relief shipment from Singapore to Aceh. Some 160 tonnes of goods, including blankets, drinking water, fuel and tents will provide 40,000 disaster-affected in Aceh with shelter and food. The ship is expected to arrive in six days, and a regular shipment of supplies from Singapore will reach Aceh every four to five days. Basic household items such as cooking utensils and candles will be dispatched beginning next week, and heavy vehicles, housing supplies and a mobile hospital will be transported by air within the next few days.

The presence of foreign military presence assisting in the relief operations continues to increase with improvements in air transport, medical, engineering and logistic resources joining the effort daily in and around Banda Aceh. Resources not dedicated to the military deployment and operations continue to be available for general use and are coordinated by IOM and UNJLC.

The government of Singapore continues to provide air support for flights to Banda Aceh – on Saturday, the mobile air traffic control tower from Singapore began operating in Banda Aceh airport; this will ease pressure on the airport as it copes with up to 200 relief flights daily.

Two Singapore landing craft are stationed off the coast of Meulaboh, capable of taking two helicopters. The Singapore army has permission from the Indonesian government to land in Banda Aceh and Meulaboh, and the Australian army has permission to land in Banda Aceh. A civilian fuel dispenser is refuelling commercial flights in Banda Aceh, but fuel is needed in areas downstream. The Indonesian military will transport fuel to the area to avoid a shortage.

A multi-sector assessment of the west coast was conducted on 7 January, reporting some difficulty in landing ships due to soft seashores and the shifted seabed, requiring military landing craft. The port to the east of Banda Aceh, Krueng Raja, is damaged but semi-operational.

Transport to Banda Aceh by road is ongoing, with a duration of five hours using the Lhokseumawe-Banda Aceh route and 15-20 hours on the Medan-Banda Aceh route. The situation in Medan has not changed and there will be a logistical bottleneck for the foreseeable future particularly for large cargo aircraft. The port is reported to be operating effectively although no great demands have been placed on the facility to date. Convoys of 40 trucks are moving from Medan to Banda Aceh daily. The Medan-Meulaboh route (18 hours) is reported to be passable for

light and medium cargo trucks, while the road between Meulaboh-Banda Aceh (eight hours) is damaged in many parts and will take many months to rebuild. Lhokseumawe is also available for limited port and air transport operations linking to Banda Aceh by road.

UNOCHA have reported several security incidents in the province since last Wednesday, 6 January. Although no casualties were involved, the overall security assessment is not yet certain.

FACT/ERU deployment

The FACT team is concentrated in Banda Aceh as it continues to finalise assessments. The FACT leader/logistics delegate continues to work closely with the principal UN agencies and military liaison teams there to build a working relationship, share information and secure transport resources. Both basic health care, and water and sanitation teams are operating in Meulaboh. Activities are hampered by heavy rain and localised flooding in that area.

The Japanese Red Cross basic health care unit continues to operate in the local hospital. Their reports of infection in the injured are consistent with other reports of operations among the affected populations – many amputations are being performed. The Spanish Red Cross water and sanitation team continue its operation in the Meulaboh area. The German Red Cross teams have deployed their basic health care, and water and sanitation capabilities on the west coast 30 km north of Meulaboh at a place called Keudeteunom (Teunom). Dependency on the ERUs has increased by about 5,000 people since the teams arrived on the ground.

The French Red Cross water and sanitation team has been allotted to the ICRC area and has now moved to Samalanga, located 40 km west of Lhokseumawe on the north coast, to re-establish its operation. The Danish Red Cross logistics team is still split, supporting Movement activities in the Banda Aceh area and Medan, while members from the British Red Cross have just arrived. Pumps sent by the Canadian Red Cross and water purification powder from the Kuwaiti Red Crescent are being transported to Meulaboh from Jakarta. Some 39 tonnes of relief items donated from the Qatar Red Crescent have been loaded onto the trucks donated by the Norwegian Red Cross.

The Southeast Asia regional programme coordinator has moved to Medan today to finalise an outline plan and related budget requirements. An additional logistics delegate (air movements) will move tomorrow either to Medan or Banda Aceh. The coordination of arriving Red Cross personnel including reception and onward movement is being managed by the Federation delegation office. An effective logistics hub is now operating in Batam with all incoming aircraft are being directed to Batam to offload relief supplies except where specific clearances have been given to land in Medan. The dedicated C130 cargo aircraft continues to operate from Batam although slots in the air traffic plan for Banda Aceh are difficult to obtain. Aircrew time is also a concern but additional crew may remedy this. A ground reconnaissance of the Lhokseumawe airstrip has yet to confirm that the BP chartered aircraft can utilise it.

The grounding of the large cargo helicopter for maintenance has continued to impact on the deployment of equipment and distribution of relief supplies. Alternative arrangements using spare capacity of available pooled resources through the UN joint logistics group and the IOM are being pursued along with sourcing additional dedicated aircraft for the operation.

The operational plan is being fine-tuned. The Red Cross and Red Crescent plan calls for a joint operation serviced by the three hubs of Banda Aceh, Meulaboh and Medan and complemented by an out-of-area operations headquarters. The organisational structure to support the ongoing tsunami relief operation is being finalised tomorrow after consultation with the field. It requires a significant influx of specialist delegates for periods ranging from three to 12 months. Details will be advised when the proposal is confirmed.

Coordination

The UN disaster management team continues to share information and coordinate their activities and those of participating NGHAs and NGOs. Information on assets already in the field and in the pipeline, as well as conditions encountered, is being shared with other organisations operating or intending to operate in the area. This enables all involved agencies and organisations to work together to prevent duplication of effort and optimise

capability. Elements of the UN disaster assessment and coordination team are located in Banda Aceh to facilitate this outcome.

The Secretary-General of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies returned from the field last night, 8 January, and departs for Europe tonight. Other VIPs including the President of the International Federation are scheduled to visit in the coming week and a delegate has been appointed to coordinate and support their schedules. Effort is being made to solve the possible lack of dedicated transport resources and required clearances for the visitors.

Sri Lanka

According to weather forecasts on 9 January a tropical cyclone is heading towards Sri Lanka and is expected to pass over the south part of the island on Wednesday, 12 January. The Sri Lanka Red Cross Society (SLRCS) and the Federation are preparing reactions to the humanitarian effect of the cyclone on the already ravaged population of the tsunami-stricken region. Many people living in tents are expected to be badly prepared to deal with the storm as heavy rain can be expected. ERUs are preparing for the cyclone, and some of them may relocate to higher ground to avoid possible flooding.

Health

On 6 January a Federation FACT team assessed the condition and coping abilities of hospitals in Batticaloa, which is one of the worst hit regions in the country.

The team visited Palameenmadu Hospital, which has had minimal damage and treats an average of 260 OPD patients daily. The hospital needs cleaning after the tsunami and has some shortage of medication, as well as contaminated water.

Parts of the Kattakudi district hospital have been destroyed and are currently deserted. The main hospital building has remained intact. This hospital will require major rebuilding. The FACT team recommends that the hospital

be provided with a basic health kit for the needs of 10,000 people for three months as well as certain basic medical equipment, drugs and water equipment.

The Arcuampatty district hospital is two km from the temporary hospital and is fully functional. It houses 30 inpatients and according to the director there is no shortage of medical consumables and medicine.

Emergency relief – non-food items

The Swiss Red Cross is working with the SLRCS branch in Batticaloa district distributing food parcels to 4,000 families living in centres for displaced people. One food parcel contains a ration for 15 days comprised of rice, flour, lentils, sugar, tea leaves and canned fish. All food items are purchased locally and the parcels are packed by SLRCS volunteers in Batticaloa. 50 volunteers are involved in the food distribution which started on 6 January. 799 families in four centres for displaced people will receive this food assistance.

Tracing

27 volunteers along with ICRC delegates have so far visited 142 displaced centers in Kalutara, Galle, Matara, Tangalle, Hambantota, Trincomalee, Vanni and the Colombo suburbs. The volunteers use mobile satellite phones to enable the affected population in displaced centres to contact their relatives and clarify the status of the missing person. In addition, SLRCS has established a 24-hour call centre service with the help of 15 volunteers. More than 213 cases have been registered, and already seven displaced persons have been reunited with their families.

Rehabilitation

USAID has given a grant of USD 350,000 to SLRCS for relief and assistance and the programme will focus on cleaning debris from the coastline (with the help of 700 displaced people), NFRI (500 families), health (medical clinics) and economic security. 60 boats with fishing gear will be distributed to 140 fisher families.

Logistics

The following items had arrived or were in pipeline on 8 January and anticipated to arrive before or on 10 January. Please note that goods are constantly being added to the pipeline and will continue to arrive.

- **Deliveries to Galle warehouse**

6 x 7-tonne trucks with assorted relief items were dispatched from Colombo on 9 January to the SLRCS warehouse in Galle. The consignment contained 356 kitchen sets, 356 tents, 360 tarpaulins, and 89 rolls of plastic sheeting to be distributed to displaced families in Galle district

- **Warehouses in Colombo**

The Federation will be using a warehouse at Global Park in Colombo free of charge for the next three months. Global Park has also offered the Federation to use two Rubhall warehouses free of charge. This area is within the security area of the site and is located 100 m away from the office.

FACT/ERU deployment

As part of the operations of the Federation and partner national societies (PNS) there are presently eight ERUs in Sri Lanka. All are operating in their area of deployment.

On 8 January the Finnish Red Cross basic health care team conducted 50 home visits and treated 165 outpatients. The unit is trying to expand their home visits to the south of Pottuvil but there are difficulties accessing the area because an important bridge was destroyed by the tsunami. The unit has completed the setup of facilities but still has problems with communication links.

The French Red Cross coordinates the management trucking and the cleaning of wells with the Swedish Red Cross and German Red Cross ERUs. They have also initiated hygiene promotion with the population regarding the potential risk caused by contaminated wells. Water from wells in the area covered by the French Red Cross BHCU has not been found to contain harmful bacteria, but it is still quite salty since the tsunami. A consultation tent has been set up for psychosocial activities as part of BHC services, and children can go there to play and draw.

The French Red Cross now has the capacity to produce 40-50 cubic metres of water daily. Their actual daily production fulfills the local

need of 20 cubic metres per day. Another 20 could be transported to other locations, and presently the need for more water in the areas covered by the Swedish Red Cross and German Red Cross water and sanitation units is being assessed. The French Red Cross supply the centres south of Pottuvil with drinking water.

The German Red Cross has completed its installations but heavy rain has hampered the work of water and sanitation unit as many roads have become difficult to pass. A plan of action has been completed in cooperation with the Swedish Red Cross, Finnish Red Cross and French Red Cross ERUs.

In Pottuvil there are 16 centres for displaced people with a total population of around 18,000 people. The centres are located along the coast between Pottuvil and Komari. It is difficult to find good drinking water and sanitary conditions are insufficient, and in order to avoid the outbreak of diseases it has been decided that only the filtered water from the tank belonging to the German Red Cross can be used as drinking water. Major constraints to sanitation work are caused by the shallow ground water level in the area, which is only one metre below ground surface, making it difficult to build ordinary latrines. Presently the German Red Cross water unit is producing around 50 cubic metres daily in cooperation with the Swedish Red Cross.

On 10 January the German Red Cross will take test samples from neighbouring wells in order to measure the water quality. Thereafter, the work on cleaning wells will begin. The SLRCS has provided the German Red Cross water and sanitation unit with 10 volunteers who are presently being introduced to the work.

The Swedish Red Cross have plans to install nine tanks (11,000 litres each) in centres for displaced people along the coast. The Finnish Red Cross is establishing mobile health teams to enable them to provide medical services to displaced people in centres that are not within walking distance from its BHCU in Komari. There are no outbreaks of epidemics in their area of operation. Most common diseases are common cold, bronchitis and minor injuries. Also there are several incidences of psychological disorders as a result of the disaster.

There is ongoing hygiene promotion among the displaced people in the centres, as well as health education campaigns.

Maldives

There will be a 'special focus' on the Maldives in the operations update of tomorrow, 10 January.

Operational objectives²

Emergency relief (food and non-food)

Objective: basic food and non-food item needs of the most vulnerable beneficiaries are met.

Activities planned:

- purchase and distribute a six- to eight-month food ration.
- purchase and distribute a six- to eight-month hygiene package.
- purchase (mainly locally) and distribute one six- to eight-month ration of non-food items to the vulnerable groups, and a reduced allocation (excluding tents, blankets and shelter equipment) to various other beneficiaries.
- purchase and distribute supplementary food parcels to especially vulnerable individuals such as pregnant women and elderly people.

Logistics objective: support the ongoing national society and Federation relief operation by providing efficient logistical support in terms of warehousing, transport management and procurement.

Activities planned:

- support and maintain airport clearing capacity for the substantial amount of incoming relief goods.
- establish efficiently managed warehouses in the operational area.
- acquire and manage a fleet adequately sized to the operation.
- carry out joint national society/Federation local procurement activities.
- designate counterparts in each core logistics functions thus enabling a proper transfer of skills.
- conduct one advanced logistics workshop for participants from each national society.

Health objectives:

- restore parts of former primary health care (PHC) capacities in the affected area to levels prior to the earthquake.
- ensure the appropriate treatment and recovery for those injured by the tsunamis.
- ensure the prevention of or effective treatment for potential/additional health threats such as diarrhoeal diseases, malaria, and respiratory infections.
- design a handover plan to the national societies for PNS/ERU health facilities.
- provide psychological support and training for national society staff to benefit victims of the earthquake.

Activities planned:

- installation of basic health care (BHC) ERU units.
- integration of medical staff for on-the-job training.
- provide PHC services in the surrounding villages.
- effective statistics and data processing will be developed and an early epidemiological surveillance system for diarrhoeal diseases installed.
- psychosocial support programme (PSP) interventions will carry out training for volunteers, and jointly provide PSP services to those affected and relief workers.

Water and sanitation objectives:

- prevent the outbreak of water-borne epidemics.

² *note: these objectives were reflected in the revised preliminary appeal issued 29 December 2004; they are indicatively included here to reflect the Federation's objective-based approach to its appeals and reports. The objectives, however, will be adjusted when the operation is formally revised (shortly).*

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- ensure an adequate and safe water supply and provide sanitation facilities to the basic health care ERU, Red Cross camps, and other health structures.
- handover water and sanitation ERUs to the national societies.

Activities planned:

- water and sanitation ERUs will provide safe water to beneficiaries and BHC units.
- mass sanitation ERUs will provide latrines to the BHC-ERUs.
- water storage capacity will be provided for the affected population in areas without functioning pipe systems, serving the intended beneficiaries whenever possible.
- national society staff will be integrated into the ERUs, and trained.

Basic shelter, care and educational objective: fully or partially meet the basic shelter and care needs to unaccompanied children.

Activities planned:

- accommodate unaccompanied children in buildings constructed for this purpose.
- provide children accommodated in orphanages with basic care and education.
- provide financial support to the extended families or relatives caring for unaccompanied children.
