ASIA: EARTHQUAKE & TSUNAMIS

In Brief

Revised Preliminary Appeal No. 28/2004; Operations Update no. 21; Period covered: 16-17 January 2005; Appeal coverage: 76.9% ([Click here to view the provisional contributions list attached, also available on the Federation's website](#)).

Appeal history:

- Preliminary appeal launched on 26 December 2004 for CHF 7,517,000 (USD 6,658,712 or EUR 4,852,932) for 6 months to assist 500,000 beneficiaries.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 1,000,000.
- Revised Preliminary Appeal issued on 29 December 2004, for CHF 67,005,000 (USD 59,152,246 or EUR 53,439,988) for 2 million beneficiaries for 6-8 months.
- The Preliminary Appeal was originally launched titled "Bay of Bengal: Earthquake and Tsunamis". The title was subsequently changed to "Asia: Earthquake and Tsunamis" in the Revised Preliminary Appeal launched on 29 December 2004.
- Operations update No. 16 issued on 12 January 2005 revised the Revised Preliminary Appeal 28/2004 budget to CHF 183,486,000 (USD 155,286,000 or EUR 118,669,000) with programme extensions for Sri Lanka, Indonesia, the Maldives and East Africa.

Highlights of the Day:

- **The tsunami disaster death toll climbs to over 162,000.**
- **An American Red Cross relief team arrives in Jakarta, Indonesia, to assist with Indonesian Red Cross (PMI) relief efforts.**
- **A Swedish Red Cross and two Austrian Red Cross water and sanitation ERUs are being deployed to Calang, Indonesia and will arrive later this week.**
- **The Spanish Red Cross water and sanitation ERU pumps two million litres of water in Meulaboh, Indonesia.**
- **There are 64 Federation delegates working in Sri Lanka, including eight ERUs with a total of 27 staff.**
- **Large quantities of non-food items continue to be mobilized in the Federation's relief pipeline. The following items are still urgently needed: mosquito nets, sleeping nets, kitchen sets, tarpaulin sheets, jerry cans, family tents, food parcels, hygiene kits and water purification tablets.**
- **Urgent recruitment is underway for 35 Federation field delegates for the tsunami operations with expertise in administration, relief, logistics, health, water and sanitation, construction, information, programme, fleet and flight coordination.**

Background

The magnitude 9.0 earthquake that struck the area off the western coast of northern Sumatra on Sunday morning, 26 December 2004, at 7:59 am local time (00:59 GMT) triggered massive tidal waves, or tsunamis, that inundated coastal areas in countries all around the Indian Ocean rim – from Indonesia to Somalia. Sri Lanka, the Indonesian province of Aceh, four states of southern India, the Maldives, coastal areas of Thailand, Malaysia, and Myanmar were the most severely affected. The earthquake epicentre was located at 3.30 N, 95.78E at a depth of 10 kilometres. The area is historically prone to seismic upheaval due to its location on the margins of tectonic plates. However, tidal waves of this magnitude are rare and therefore the level of preparedness was very low.

Thousands of staff, relief and medical personnel, and volunteers of the Red Cross and Red Crescent societies of the tsunami affected countries have provided a vital initial response, in search and rescue, clean-up, providing

temporary shelter and immediate relief assistance, emergency medical services, psychological first aid and tracing. It is estimated that over 5,000 Red Cross and Red Crescent volunteers and 76 relief and medical teams have been mobilised in the disaster-affected areas.

The Federation immediately launched a Preliminary Emergency Appeal on the day of the disaster with a focus on Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives. On 3 January 2005, the ICRC launched budget extensions additional to its 2005 Emergency Appeal for Indonesia and Sri Lanka. Along with initial support from the country and regional delegations, the Federation deployed within 24-72 hours three [Field Assessment and Coordination Teams \(FACT\)](#) and 14 [Emergency Response Units \(ERU\)](#) in the sectors of water and sanitation, health care, aid distribution, telecommunications, and logistics/transportation to Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives.

Overview

Through a joint letter to the member national societies of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement on 14 January, the Federation and the ICRC acknowledge the generosity of the world in support of Red Cross Red Crescent response in the affected countries and emphasize the need for a well-planned approach to ensure the best use of these resources to meet the needs of the affected population.

The Federation and the ICRC are developing a clear coordination framework in which the Red Cross Red Crescent operational space can be secured, not only to allow the Movement to respond to the immediate crisis but also to long-term disaster preparedness, rehabilitation and reconstruction needs in the region. Recovery assessments have started in the field and will constitute the basis for a combined and coordinated international Red Cross Red Crescent appeal scheduled to be launched in February. The Federation and the ICRC urge all actors of the Movement to coordinate according to the principles and rules adhered at the 1997 Seville Council of Delegates and to work within the framework of the agreed plans in the long-term interest of all populations affected by this disaster. Regardless of the modalities, there clearly exists both the need and the space for all Movement components to deploy the best of their resources through the ICRC, the Federation or bilaterally with the host national societies.

In Geneva, regular twice weekly coordination meetings continue between the Federation and the ICRC, both senior-level Movement cooperation meetings and technical taskforce meetings. In addition, in both Sri Lanka and Indonesia, there are regular coordination meetings between the host national societies, the Federation, the ICRC and partner national societies.

Operational Developments

Indonesia

Overview

The government reports that bodies are being pulled from the rubble at a rate of 2,500-3,500 daily in Banda Aceh and Aceh Besar alone. An estimated 75,500 bodies have been recovered to date. Latest figures from the Ministry of Social Affairs stand at 115,229 deaths, with 12,132 people confirmed missing as of Sunday, 16 January. The increase of 4,741 deaths has brought the total regional tsunami death toll to over 162,000 people.

Coordination

The Indonesian planning ministry, BAPPENAS, has issued a work plan to facilitate the planning process for the relief operation over the next two weeks.

BAKORNAS, the government's national coordinating body for disaster management, reports the total number of health volunteers (nationals and foreigners) as 1,897, in 75 teams. A medical team of two doctors and two paramedics has been deployed to Nias in Northern Sumatra along with medical supplies and mosquito nets. A six-day government, UN and NGO joint health assessment is taking place over eight sites in the affected province. Meanwhile, health sector coordination is in place in Banda Aceh and sub-groups have been established to focus on special issues. The government of Indonesia reports that three hospitals in Banda Aceh are now fully operational, another hospital is functioning at 23 percent capacity and a fifth hospital is being prepared for operation.

Initial indications from UNICEF's registering of separated children suggest that 12,000 children are unaccompanied. An estimated 560 schools (40 percent of the total) in 11 of 14 areas surveyed have been destroyed. BAKORNAS reports that a number of schools have started opening near refugee camps. It also reports that 1,538 teachers are dead or missing and 1,000 teachers have suffered disabilities. The Indonesian government is planning an accelerated recruitment of teachers from outside the affected area.

WFP is now distributing food to at least 300,000 people. This number should increase to 400,000 by the end of the week. BAKORNAS established an emergency team for food distribution on 11 January in Banda Aceh. The Indonesian Military (TNI) is assisting the government in distribution.

According to the government of Indonesia, relocation is underway. So far, 80 percent of internally displaced persons (IDPs) in East Aceh have been relocated; five percent in Northern Aceh; five percent in Bireun; five percent in Aceh Besar; seven percent in Banda Aceh and seven percent in Aceh Besar. The government has announced the private construction of relocation sites with supervision from the Public Works Office. Two sites out of three in Banda Aceh are ready for occupation.

There are currently 602 government heavy machines clearing rubble from Banda Aceh, but only 714 operators. This number will be increased threefold to ensure 24-hour removal operations. Rubble is removed very quickly in Medan. More efficient management of heavy machinery and volunteers is urgently needed.

The Dutch Ministry of Defence has installed vital equipment for the Medan airport, with further installments at Medan, Banda Aceh and Meulaboh due in the coming week.

The humanitarian affairs officer for UN OCHA in Banda Aceh visited the Federation office to receive an update on the Indonesian Red Cross (Palang Merah Indonesia/PMI)/Federation activities in their operational areas. The details provided will be included in the ongoing information exchange among agencies active in the disaster zone to avoid overlap and duplication, and to identify gaps in the overall emergency relief response.

UNHCR has been requested by the government to facilitate inter-agency coordination of assistance to IDPs in the Banda Aceh area in the provision of food, water, sanitation, health care, emergency relief supplies and other assistance. The current limited and uneven distributions to date to the IDP camps leave much room for improvement, apart from the significant, outstanding needs for isolated coastal communities.

The Federation office in Banda Aceh is working with PMI and ICRC representatives on a combined report and presentation requested by BAKORNAS. The Federation Secretariat in Geneva and Jakarta continue to play an important role in the coordination of national society support – over the weekend, Federation staff facilitated the creation of a relief team, staffed by two representatives each of the Japanese Red Cross and Spanish Red Cross and reporting to an American Red Cross relief team arriving in Jakarta. The team's main function will be coordinating existing operations on the ground.

Security

UN Banda Aceh will begin conducting security assessments along key roads in Aceh province, beginning with the Medan – Singkil and Medan – Meulaboh roads.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints

The Jakarta delegation water and sanitation coordinator conducted an assessment of Simeulue Island yesterday. He observed that the southern half of the island remains intact, while the northern part bore the direct brunt of the tsunami wave.

Folklore among the island people dictated an immediate evacuation to high ground upon the occurrence of an earthquake. Consequently, only seven lives were lost and one person is still missing. Destruction was widespread along the northern coast. In a rapid assessment sample of 25 percent of the area, it was noted that – within this sample area – government, administrative, health and school structures were completely destroyed.

In the same sample area, it was noted that 75 percent of homes were totally destroyed and the remainder were damaged. From an aerial view of the northern part of the island, all the rice fields appeared to be destroyed, and local reports tell of a total loss of livestock, including water buffalo and chickens. The view from above, confirmed by interviews with local inhabitants, showed a total loss of fishing boats and nets along the northern coast. A handful of outrigger canoes could be seen fishing during the visit. Some temporary shelters have been constructed from plastic sheeting, although large numbers of people are living in the open. All roads and bridges into the northern part of the island are completely washed out.

Three separate estimates, conducted by local authorities, by CARE Australia, and by AusAid confirm an affected population on the island of more than 22,000, with groups of people scattered in the following sub-districts:

*The IDP population of Simeulue Barat has not yet been counted. This figure is derived as an estimated balance of people based on the total known number of displaced persons.

PMI and Save The Children-US are the only agencies on the ground. To date, PMI has distributed 400 each of family kits, hygiene kits and tarpaulins. There is another IDP population to be counted, resulting from a relocation by the Indonesian navy of some survivors from Meulaboh.

The water and sanitation coordinator advises against the deployment of ERUs, given the widespread nature of the dispersed population. Inhabitants are drinking rain water, as is the traditional practice in such circumstances. As people are disposing waste in the sea and vegetation in the hills, sanitation is not considered a problem in the short term given the size of the displaced population compared to the size of the land mass. This advantage cannot be sustained indefinitely, and longer-term use of sea water and bush risks the spread of disease. A PMI/Federation logistics assessment will be the next step, to determine transportation strategies for delivering emergency relief to such a widespread displaced population.

Overall Goal: Up to 100,000 internally displaced and otherwise affected families (approximately 500,000 people) in western Aceh receive adequate and timely emergency humanitarian assistance over the next six months.

Objective 1 (emergency relief): Basic supplementary food and non food needs of the 500,000 IDP (Internally Displaced People) and most vulnerable beneficiaries are met so that they can start rebuilding their future.

The Qatari Red Crescent relief delegate has returned to Banda Aceh from Lam No and Calang. At Lam No, the delegate set up an office for PMI/Federation coordination, secured a warehouse, and identified trucking and ferry boat resources.

A meeting was conducted by the relief delegate and a PMI counterpart with the local authorities of Lam No, where information was shared on the number of people affected by the tsunami and on conditions of IDP camps in the area. He also met with an NGO inter-agency coordinating group to review the emergency relief activities undertaken by each actor.

The figures for Lam No detail a pre-disaster population of 23,000, with a surviving population of 16,700 of which 12,400 are IDPs. Food for the affected population in Lam No is adequately provided by the government. The greatest immediate need was identified as sanitation. MSF is trying to address this concern, and the MSF representative requested Federation help in resolving the extremely unsanitary conditions in the camps and throughout the Lam No region.

The government has selected a site to establish an IDP camp, and an initial assessment indicates a very high water table resulting from the tsunami, which will complicate the construction of latrines and sewage conduits. All parties agreed there was a need to identify the lead agency for camp management, a decision which has not yet been made.

The Qatari Red Crescent delegate also met in Lam No with representatives of TNI, who informed him that Jakarta had notified them that the Red Cross and Red Crescent did not need escorts. Calang was the second stop in the delegate's preparations on behalf of PMI/Federation for scaling up relief operations. Again, the provision of food by the government was deemed sufficient. As in Lam No, the local authorities have identified a location to set up an IDP camp in Calang, and again, leadership for camp management remains to be identified.

PMI has begun hygiene education for children in Calang using an intact school. They have taken the opportunity to recruit a surviving teacher to recommence schooling for the children that they have attracted return. There is one PMI doctor at Calang and they are requesting a second and/or a nurse. Currently, there are 20 PMI volunteers working at Calang on a two-week rotation, and the team leader has requested PMI to send an additional 20, as well as a generator and motorcycles to traverse the distances between IDP settlements. Local authorities speak of a pre-disaster population in Calang of 10,500, with 3,000 survivors of the tsunami.

During his helicopter flight back to Banda Aceh, the Qatari Red Crescent representative observed many small groups of 10-20 people in isolated pockets walking north along the washed out west coast road and saw that all bridges were destroyed. The people waved frantically at the helicopter as it passed overhead.

Coordination

A UNHCR representative arrived in Calang on 16 January and set up a tent as a base of operations.

Objective 2 (logistics): PMI will have a strengthened supply chain capability and capacity to ensure timely transport of material and human resources to the areas of operation.

The Federation logistics coordinator for the tsunami operation has departed Banda Aceh to inspect conditions at the Batam Island airport transit point for incoming relief goods, after which he travels to Medan to assess the condition of the mountain road from Medan to Meulaboh.

The two Rubb hall specialists have returned to Banda Aceh from Jakarta after training volunteers at PMI headquarters on the technical requirements for constructing these large, mobile tent structures, which will be used as additional storage capacity for relief supplies.

Coordination

IOM representatives who today visited the Banda Aceh office of the Federation reported that 50 IOM trucks carrying food, blankets, tents and fuel have successfully driven the Medan-Meulaboh mountain road. The travel time for the convoy was three and a half days.

Objective 3 (health): primary health care service provided to the tsunami-affected communities and potential epidemics are prevented or adequately addressed.

No new data today from Banda Aceh for this section.

Coordination

A coordinated measles vaccination programme is underway among participating agencies present in Meulaboh, under the auspices of UNICEF. The campaign aims to vaccinate 30,000 children aged six months to 15 years within four days. The French group Alicie has taken the lead on vaccinating children against measles at Calang. They have asked PMI to assist in the procurement of additional vaccine serum, especially to provide complete coverage for children under five years.

A team of 25 Korean Red Cross health staff is on the way to Banda Aceh to support PMI efforts in the delivery of health services and for vector control.

Objective 4 (water and sanitation): the spread/outbreak of infectious diseases is prevented through water and sanitation interventions.

A new Swedish Red Cross water and sanitation ERU and two new Austrian Red Cross water and sanitation ERUs are being deployed to Calang and are expected to arrive this week.

The Spanish Red Cross water and sanitation ERU has now pumped two million litres of water in Meulaboh.

Coordination

There are currently three agencies working on water and sanitation issues at Calang: Cardie, Goal and ACF.

Objective 5 (telecommunications): fast and reliable means of communication is secured in the areas of the relief operation.

For a second consecutive day, the Internet connection at Banda Aceh from the satellite Internet service provider worked only sporadically and unreliably for most of the day on 17 January.

A donation of 10 mobile phones was received on 16 January from Ericsson Response at the Banda Aceh office of the Federation. Altogether, 30 phones were donated to the delegation's Jakarta office and 20 phones were donated to the PMI headquarters.

Sri Lanka**Overview**

The Sri Lanka Red Cross Society continues its relief operations in the country, supported by the Federation and the ICRC. Food and non-food items have been distributed to thousands of families through the national society, and eight Federation ERUs are fully operational in the country, providing urgently needed drinking water, health support, medical assistance and logistics support. Many displaced people are still in need of assistance and the Federation has brought relief items for tens of thousands into the country. Distribution of Federation resourced non-food items has already started in the southern part of the country, with the number of beneficiaries rapidly growing.

There are 64 Federation delegates working in Sri Lanka, including eight ERUs with a total of 27 staff. In addition to activities included in the Federation appeal there are presently 21 partner national societies working in Sri Lanka, and the ICRC is providing much needed assistance to tsunami victims in the form of tracing and relief in the eastern part of the country where the ICRC has its operational mandate.

As reported in Operations Update 19, a recovery assessment team comprised of specialists in the fields of water and sanitation, community health, psychosocial support, community development, and relief and disaster recovery has arrived in Sri Lanka. The assessment team will analyse and provide recommendations for the next 12 months of programming. It is estimated that the time span for recovery will extend beyond five years. The results of this assessment will form part of a broad plan for disaster recovery work in the affected regions.

The objective of the assessment is to determine relevant recovery programming for the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement, building on the national society capacity and role as well as the skills and experience of different components of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement. The recovery assessment team will also establish efficient procedures for coordination of activities with other relief organisations and the government. The team will also look into ways of ensuring the long-term institutional development of the Sri Lanka Red Cross.

In addition to their initiatives in health and psychosocial support the Turkish Red Crescent has confirmed plans for reconstruction of 500 houses for families who have been made homeless as a result of the disaster. The Malta Red Cross is supporting the reconstruction of 65 houses in the Hambantota district.

Coordination

Relief activities of the Federation are closely coordinated with the Sri Lanka Red Cross Society, with regard to planning and implementation at field level. Activities are also closely coordinated with the ICRC in the east of the country, which is where five of the ERUs from the Federation are operating. The delegates belonging to the ERUs follow ICRC security and communication rules in those regions.

Taskforce meetings between the Sri Lanka Red Cross, ICRC and the Federation are being held at the national society headquarters. The role of the taskforce is to make joint policy decisions on all activities. OCHA has a leading role in coordinating the activities and planning of the various humanitarian actors in the country. The Federation shares FACT reports and other information with OCHA.

The Federation representative in Sri Lanka and programme managers coordinate their activities with UN agencies, government departments and donor representatives to ensure successful implementation of overall operations.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints

Overall Goal: Up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) in the south of the country receive immediate relief, shelter, health and care, and community support over the next six months.

Objective 1 (water and sanitation): Adequate sanitation and water supply provided to a selected number of temporary shelters/welfare centres, and water and sanitation systems to serve the affected population.

Progress/Achievements

Through the water and sanitation ERUs in Ampara district the Federation presently provides adequate drinking water to more than 20,000 people. The two water and sanitation units from the Swedish and German Red Cross societies provide approximately 20,000 beneficiaries with 150,000 litres of purified water daily.

The Federation is also starting a programme to improve the existing water supply (estimated cleaning of 1,000 wells) to ensure the targeted population has adequate water in accordance with the Sphere standard. A total of 2,100 wells will be cleaned by the Hambantota, Ampara and Kalutara Sri Lanka Red Cross branches with support from the Spanish and French Red Cross societies. Previous plans for well-cleaning support by the Netherlands Red Cross in Matara have been altered due to changes in needs.

Impact

A total of 20,000 people are receiving clean drinking water through the distribution of purified water by the Federation. A total of 2,100 wells are being cleaned by Sri Lanka Red Cross branches with support of the Spanish and French Red Cross societies.

Constraints

Operations have progressed as planned in most aspects, although rain, damaged infrastructure and flooded roads have caused difficulties in transportation. Communication is also difficult in several of the places where ERUs are operating, slowing the flow of information from the field in some locations.

Objective 2 (shelter): Temporary shelter provided to up to 15,000 families (about 75,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have no

extended family to live with.

Progress/Achievements

The American Red Cross ERU located in Galle is presently facilitating the distribution of tents and tarpaulins in the south of the country to the targeted population through the Sri Lanka Red Cross branches. As reported in Operations Update 19, 356 family tents have been distributed in Gampa district by the Sri Lanka Red Cross to provide displaced people with basic shelter. A total of 1,800 tarpaulins are planned to be distributed in Colombo district in the coming week. Several shipments of tarpaulins have arrived in Federation warehouses or are in the pipeline. As reported in Operations Update 19, 8,380 tarpaulins had arrived in warehouses in Galle. A total of 6,205 tarpaulins have been distributed.

The total number of families who have received Federation shelter as of 15 January is 4,413 families.

Impact

Tarpaulins and tents supplied by the Federation provide much needed shelter for homeless people in the southern districts of Sri Lanka.

Constraints

The American Red Cross relief ERU in Galle has experienced difficulties in establishing reliable communications links with the FACT operations centre in Colombo.

Objective 3 (immediate livelihood restoration): The minimum livelihood requirements provided for up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have lost their belongings.

Progress/Achievements

As at 16 January the American Red Cross ERU had facilitated the distribution of non-food items from the Federation to 5,001 families on the southern coast of Sri Lanka.

The American Red Cross relief ERU has completed the setup of the distribution system in the south, and is now moving onwards to establish a distribution system in Ampara.

Relief supplies for the Galle warehouse are in the pipeline. Stocks as of 16 January were:

In addition to Federation activities the Netherlands Red Cross has distributed non-food relief items through the Sri Lanka Red Cross branch in Hambantota. Over 7-11 January, the Netherlands Red Cross supported the distribution of bed sheets, mats and soap to 1,000 families, as well as the distribution of mosquito nets, milk powder, washing powder, candles, vegetable oil and womens' underwear to 1,898 families. Between 7-14 January the Netherlands Red Cross supported the distribution of non-food relief items to 2,898 families.

Impact

The appeal aims at providing minimum livelihood requirements for up to 40,000 families in the southern districts of the country. As of 16 January more than 12 percent of the targeted population had received Federation-supplied non-food relief items. These numbers are expected to rise rapidly as operations continue.

Constraints

There are difficulties in receiving all the required elements of the non-food relief item packs at the same time. Rather than delay the distributions, it is sometimes necessary to distribute incomplete packs. It is important that particularly vulnerable victims of the disaster receive at least some form of assistance immediately.

Objective 4 (health): A constant, good level of health is ensured for up to 20,000 families (about 100,000 people) through prevention and basic health care, as well as health and hygiene promotion.

Progress/Achievements

Three Federation ERUs continue to provide health services in the eastern regions of the country. The Finnish Red Cross basic health care unit (BHCU) covers the basic health needs of all centres for displaced people between Pottuvil and Kalmunai. The French Red Cross BHCU covers south of Pottuvil with mobile health units. The Norwegian Red Cross BHCU attends to an average of 200 patients per day. The BHCUs report a need for basic health care training/education and also for psychosocial support in their areas of operations. No outbreaks of serious diseases have been observed.

The Turkish Red Crescent will send five specialized physicians, seven nurses, and three psychosocial experts. The Turkish Red Crescent will also locally purchase an ambulance to establish mobile mental health clinics.

Impact

Federation BHCUs are reaching approximately 500 patients daily. Mobile health teams are accessing patients who are unable to travel.

Constraints

Many patients have difficulties reaching clinics due to illness or the distance from the BHCUs. This problem is being addressed by the operation of mobile health units.

Objective 5 (psychosocial support): The resilience of the affected population and the local relief workers is enhanced through psychosocial support.

Progress/Achievements

Psychosocial programmes are being established by the American and Danish Red Cross societies, the Sri Lanka Red Cross and the Federation. The Turkish Red Crescent also has plans to participate in psychosocial programmes and is sending three psychosocial experts as a part of their health initiatives for Sri Lanka.

Logistics

Large amounts of relief items have been received with the assistance of the British Red Cross logistics ERU and the American Red Cross relief/logistics ERU. An average of two planes with Federation relief goods arrive in Colombo airport every day.

Capacity of the national society

At the beginning of the disaster the Federation provided financial support to the Sri Lanka Red Cross branches to cover the initial costs of responding to the disaster. The support was intended to cover recruitment of volunteers, fuel, and other urgent needs. All branches in the disaster stricken areas of the country have been able to increase their volunteer base. Included in the appeal are mobile phones, computers and VHF communication for branches that are not already fully equipped.

Training of volunteers in disaster preparedness and basic health care education, psychosocial counselling for volunteers and other psychosocial activities form a part of the Sri Lanka Red Cross plan of action. Included in the national society plan of action for organisational development is the strengthening of advocacy, branch development and leadership development.

Communications – representation, advocacy and public information

Federation information delegates and the Sri Lanka Red Cross media department continue to provide media coverage, photos, stories and interviews to local and international media. Important telecommunications support to the operation is being provided by the Spanish Red Cross telecommunications ERU.

Malaysia

Overview

On 26 December, five metre high waves from the tsunami flooded the Penang and Kedah coastlines, killing 68 people (57 in Penang and 11 in Kedah). Penang registered a higher death toll as many were enjoying a weekend on the beach; Kedah experienced a higher level of property damage. A village on the southwest side of Penang island miraculously avoided much of the disaster, thanks to the 50-metre mangrove swamp barrier. The tourist island of Langkawi also suffered damages.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints

At the onset of the tsunami, the Malaysian Red Crescent Society (MRCS) in Penang mobilised four ambulances and 60 volunteers in two hours and transported the injured to the hospital as well as assisted in evacuation and emergency first aid. They were well organised and timely, maintaining good communication and coordination with the local government. Kedah's state branch faced some difficulty due to its lower capacity in emergency response; it nevertheless dealt effectively with these obstacles and mobilized volunteers to help in evacuation, first aid, establishment of relief centres, registration and cooking. The Federation further transferred CHF 100,000 to support MRCS in its operations. To date, emergency needs have been adequately covered by the local government, the MRCS and other agencies in Malaysia.

The school term began for three schools in Kedah and two in Langkawi – two weeks later than the rest of Malaysia. Four of these schools were temporarily converted into relief centres at the onset of the tsunami, housing an estimated 3,700 people, while the remaining school was covered in mud deposits. According to MRCS, most of the relief centres have closed, allowing children to start their school year, save for Sekolah Kebangsaan Haji Sulaiman in Kedah that still houses 41 families of 196 people in tents outside the school. In Kota Kuala Muda, Kedah, 1,357 students turned up for class, out of which 595 were affected by the tsunami. The state government and education department have given RM 200 worth of uniforms and school gear to each affected student, and promised that they would provide the students with sports clothing soon.

Current MRCS action is winding down in Malaysia with the drop in beneficiary numbers at relief centres. Many have left the centres to live with relatives, some have returned to repair their houses while others have moved into transit homes. According to the local media, fifty families have now moved into transit houses at the village of Permatang Katong.

The national society is increasingly systematic in coordinating relief activities and goods in Sumatra. There are now 13 MRCS personnel in Aceh. Among them are five doctors and paramedics who run a main clinic – a converted car showroom partially damaged in the tsunami – with seven to ten doctors, paramedics and volunteers from the Indonesian Red Cross Society (PMI). This building also serves as a base, which the Federation and ICRC

later joined. The society's doctors and paramedics also assist the PMI in operating a stationary clinic as well as mobile clinics. A team of eight medical and relief personnel instead of the twelve originally planned is set to replace nine MRCS members returning from Banda Aceh today for 10 days. A further nine-member team will leave for Aceh by ship on a 40-day mission to strengthen MRCS relief and logistic action. They will take with them 30 tonnes of relief goods, with the next shipment expected on 25 January.

Myanmar

Overview

The official death toll stands at 59, with three people missing and 3,205 displaced. Focus is now moving from immediate relief operations towards coordination and a second round of assessments.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints

A brief summary of relief activities is detailed below. More information will be available in the next report.

Objective 1 (non-food): basic non-food needs of 1,000 affected families are met.

There are plans to purchase and distribute 1,000 family packs (kitchen sets, tarpaulins, blankets, mosquito nets, buckets, rope and clothes).

Objective 2 (replenishment of stock): relief stock in the Myanmar Red Cross warehouse pre-positioned for 10,000 families.

There are plans to purchase and transport 10,000 family packs (see above composition) for replenishment of Myanmar Red Cross warehouses.

So far, the national society has received the following stocks for replenishment of disaster preparedness warehouses: 21,240 blankets, 8,200 buckets and 19,432 jerry cans. These figures do not include bilateral donations outlined in the previous report.

A total of 3,060 beneficiaries have received relief aid, 150 have received shelter, six have been assisted with medical care and one has made use of the ICRC tracing and messaging service. There are 300 volunteers assisting in relief operations, two Federation delegates and three emergency relief teams on the ground in the affected regions

Outstanding Needs

Human Resources

The Federation is recruiting 35 field delegates for Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Kuala Lumpur, Maldives and a delegate for the Federation office in New York. While candidates are being considered for seven of the posts, a total of 29 posts, as detailed below, are still to be filled. The recruitment of head of operations for Indonesia is extremely urgent.
