ASIA: EARTHQUAKE & TSUNAMIS

In Brief

Revised Preliminary Appeal No. 28/2004; Operations Update no. 25; Period covered: 20-21 January 2005; Appeal coverage: 87.2% ([Click here to view the provisional contributions list attached, also available on the Federation's website](#)).

Appeal history:

- Preliminary appeal launched on 26 December 2004 for CHF 7,517,000 (USD 6,658,712 or EUR 4,852,932) for 6 months to assist 500,000 beneficiaries.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 1,000,000.
- Revised Preliminary Appeal issued on 29 December 2004, for CHF 67,005,000 (USD 59,152,246 or EUR 53,439,988) for 2 million beneficiaries for 6-8 months.
- The Preliminary Appeal was originally launched titled "Bay of Bengal: Earthquake and Tsunamis". The title was subsequently changed to "Asia: Earthquake and Tsunamis" in the Revised Preliminary Appeal launched on 29 December 2004.
- Operations update No. 16 issued on 12 January 2005 revised the Revised Preliminary Appeal 28/2004 budget to CHF 183,486,000 (USD 155,286,000 or EUR 118,669,000) with programme extensions for Sri Lanka, Indonesia, the Maldives and East Africa.

Highlights of the Day:

- The Federation and the ICRC in Geneva are currently working on an organizational framework for Movement coordination in the tsunami operations. Consultations with national societies are in process and it is expected that the framework will be finalized shortly.
- It is estimated that during the first three weeks of the operations, a total of 250,000 people affected by the disaster have received assistance through the Federation (consolidated figures are still being prepared).
- Approximately 33 national societies are actively involved in the tsunami operations.
- Water and sanitation Emergency Response Units in Indonesia are now producing 452,000 litres of water daily.
- There are 169 camps with a total population of 43,000 internally displaced people in the Nicobar and Andaman Islands, India. The Indian Red Cross has been providing relief distributions to some of the camps.
- On average, one or two flights arrive daily in Colombo, Sri Lanka, carrying relief goods mobilized through the Federation pipeline.
- Recruitment of Federation delegates for the tsunami operations continues; a total of 30 delegates are urgently needed for operations in Indonesia, Sri Lanka and Maldives. In particular, a head of operations for Indonesia, as well as a logistics coordinator and logistics delegate for the Banda Aceh operations centre, are very urgently sought.
- Today, Tsunami Fact Sheet no. 1 has been issued providing key facts and figures on the tsunami operations; the Fact Sheet will be updated regularly.

Background

The magnitude 9.0 earthquake that struck the area off the western coast of northern Sumatra on Sunday morning, 26 December 2004, at 7:59 am local time (00:59 GMT) triggered massive tidal waves, or tsunamis, that inundated coastal areas in countries all around the Indian Ocean rim – from Indonesia to Somalia. Sri Lanka, the Indonesian province of Aceh, four states of southern India, the Maldives, coastal areas of Thailand, Malaysia, and Myanmar were the most severely affected. The earthquake epicentre was located at 3.30 N, 95.78E at a depth of 10 kilometres. The area is historically prone to seismic upheaval due to its location on the margins of tectonic plates. However, tidal waves of this magnitude are rare and therefore the level of preparedness was very low.

Thousands of staff, relief and medical personnel, and volunteers of the Red Cross and Red Crescent societies of the tsunami-affected countries have provided a vital initial response, in search and rescue, clean-up, providing temporary shelter and immediate relief assistance, emergency medical services, psychological first aid and tracing. It is estimated that over 5,000 Red Cross and Red Crescent volunteers and 76 relief and medical teams have been mobilized in the disaster-affected areas.

The Federation immediately launched a Preliminary Emergency Appeal on the day of the disaster with a focus on Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives. On 3 January 2005, the ICRC launched budget extensions additional to its 2005 Emergency Appeal for Indonesia and Sri Lanka. Along with initial support from the country and regional delegations, the Federation deployed within 24-72 hours three [Field Assessment and Coordination Teams \(FACT\)](#) and 18 [Emergency Response Units \(ERU\)](#) in the sectors of water and sanitation, health care, aid distribution, telecommunications, and logistics/transportation to Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives.

A total of 77 relief flights have now arrived in the various affected countries and a further 31 flights are in the Federation relief pipeline, making a total of 108 relief flights coordinated through the Federation.

The Federation and the ICRC in Geneva are currently working on an organizational framework for Movement coordination in the tsunami operations. A note has been sent out to national societies and delegations on this today, for consultation. It is expected that the framework, which will set in place strong platforms for coordination, will be finalized shortly, and a final note will be sent out by the Federation and the ICRC next week.

Operational Developments

Indonesia

Overview

As UNICEF steps up its measles vaccination programme along the devastated west coast of Aceh, officials are finding that few children under the age of seven are turning up. According to the officials based in Meulaboh, this would suggest that a large proportion of under-sevens may have perished in the disaster, as they would have been unable to outrun the water or know what to do. For example, in the sub-district of Samatiga, near Meulaboh, community leaders estimate they have lost 60 percent of their children. Mental health experts from WHO fear that the psychological trauma among victims may be more widespread than initially believed and the agency has begun to coordinate the appropriate training of community workers.

Meanwhile, Mercy Corps is helping hundreds of children return to school in Banda Aceh, as part of its long-term recovery efforts. Under the programme, 15 schools are to reopen on the one month anniversary of the tsunami, with some 500 workers clearing up 15 schools and readying them for the returning school children.

To mark the Muslim festival of Eid al-Adha today, the President of Indonesia joined tsunami survivors in their prayers in Aceh, and pledged to rebuild the region. He told reporters that the government was in the process of developing a master plan for the reconstruction of local infrastructure and for reviving the economy. According to the International Labour Organisation (ILO), the tsunami left some 1 million people without the means to make a living. It is estimated that unemployment in Aceh may have reached 30 percent or more, from seven percent prior to the disaster. However, the ILO projects that by undertaking the necessary repairs to infrastructure and by replacing equipment needed for work, up to 60 percent of jobs could be regenerated by the end of the year.

Indonesia's main donors have pledged USD 1.7 billion in aid to help rebuild Aceh. The UNDP has also scaled up its plans to hire locals to remove debris, while at the same time creating employment opportunities for up to 3,000 people over the next six months.

The U.S Forces have announced that they are preparing to wind down their relief effort, as work begins to shift towards reconstruction. They hope to transfer the bulk of their relief work to other groups by the end of February, with key operations such as the ferrying of aid supplies by helicopter expected to be the last to leave.

Coordination

On Saturday, the Federation, ICRC and the Indonesian Red Cross (Palang Merah Indonesia/PMI) leadership in Jakarta will meet to discuss the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement's plans, as the immediate emergency response moves into ongoing relief and rehabilitation. This is in anticipation of a meeting being held on Monday, 24 January, with the Indonesian Ministry of Planning, to discuss government plans and the Movement's role within the overall effort.

On Tuesday, 25 January, the Federation is organizing a coordination meeting with the various partner national societies (PNS) present in Indonesia. The purpose of the meeting is to get a sense of PNS plans for moving forward and provide a forum for exchange with the Federation recovery assessment team, the members of which have now all arrived for their three-week assignment in country.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints

In Meulaboh, the recovery of bodies continues, even more than three weeks after the disaster. The PMI volunteers have now recovered a total of 3,700 bodies, 77 found only yesterday.

The Federation sub-office there is getting off the ground, although space and facilities are still very limited. Rubb Halls will be set up within the next few days, which will ease current constraints on the storage of relief goods. At present, there is no storage space and it is still proving difficult to transport supplies down from Banda Aceh. Locally, people are still subsisting on rations of biscuits and dried noodles. With the arrival of a number of relief delegates and the installation of the Rubb Halls, the sub-office anticipates having a greater capacity to operate within the week. Four additional Canadian Red Cross delegates arrived today and will be joining the relief and logistics teams in the field.

Overall Goal: Up to 100,000 internally displaced and otherwise affected families (approximately 500,000 people) in western Aceh receive adequate and timely emergency humanitarian assistance over the next six months.

Objective 1 (emergency relief): Basic supplementary food and non-food needs of the 500,000 internally displaced people (IDP) and most vulnerable beneficiaries are met so that they can start rebuilding their future.

There were no relief flights from Batam to Banda Aceh today, due to the national holiday.

Objective 3 (health): primary health care service provided to the tsunami-affected communities and potential epidemics are prevented or adequately addressed.

There is growing concern for patients at the Meulaboh Hospital, who are ready to be discharged but have nowhere to go. Discussions are underway regarding the establishment of a small IDP camp for these people. Several of the surviving health staff from the hospital remain too traumatized to work, with many of them also left homeless.

The Norwegian Red Cross referral hospital in Banda Aceh has been treating up to 100 patients daily since it opened earlier this week, with patient complaints ranging from fever, flu, breathing difficulties and broken bones, to depression. The hospital was set up to ease the burden on the overwhelmed Banda Aceh hospitals and also to act as a referral hospital for patients in the outlying areas of the west coast, including Meulaboh and Calang. The medical team includes doctors from Norway and from the Syaiful Anwar Hospital in Malang, East Java. A contingent of locally hired medical and support personnel of some 190 will complement the core team of 30 medical specialists within the next few weeks.

The hospital is undergoing completion and will eventually have an isolation ward for treating up to 100 patients in the event of an outbreak of infectious disease. Because many of the patients have nowhere to go after receiving treatment (as noted in Meulaboh), the ICRC is also setting up a camp inside a nearby stadium for up to 400 discharged patients and their relatives, where follow-up medical services will be provided.

Objective 4 (water and sanitation): the spread/outbreak of infectious diseases is prevented through water and sanitation interventions.

Objective 5 (telecommunications): fast and reliable means of communication is secured in the areas of the relief operation.

The telecommunications delegate has been receiving conflicting status reports on the mobile network in Meulaboh, with some saying that all networks are working and others, only a few. As a result, the donated phones for PMI use will not be able to be distributed until the network status is confirmed by Ericsson. The expected donation of two VSATs with a two-year subscription has been cancelled. The telecommunications delegate is therefore looking for a local satellite service provider. This is proving difficult, as the market has been saturated over the past weeks.

Technicians are still testing the wireless broadband network in Banda Aceh. The PMI VSAT will not be moved until this is working. A wireless network is available in Medan and will be installed as soon as permanent office space has been found for the Federation sub-office there.

Sri Lanka

Overview

Official government figures indicate that approximately 38,000 people have died as a result of the tsunami. A further 15,000 are injured and over 5,000 still missing. Over 84,000 families have been displaced with nearly 370 camps still in existence. An interim housing plan has been announced by the Sri Lankan government, encouraging international and non-governmental organisations to provide pre-built houses for some 50,000 families currently housed in temples and schools in tsunami-affected areas of the country.

Meanwhile, vital food and non-food items including drinking water, health support, medical assistance and logistics support continue to be distributed to tens of thousands of families through the Sri Lankan Red Cross Society (SLRCS), and seven Federation ERUs.

Coordination

The American Red Cross ERU is in the process of drawing up a coordinated relief plan of action for the Ampara district with the ICRC to determine sectorial responsibilities for the distribution of relief goods, together with the SLRCS branches in the area. See previous operations updates for general coordination mechanisms in place.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints

Overall Goal: Up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) in the south of the country receive immediate relief, shelter, health and care, and community support over the next six months.

Objective 1 (water and sanitation): Adequate sanitation and water supply provided to a selected number of temporary shelters/welfare centres, and water and sanitation systems to serve the affected population.

Progress/achievements

The Swedish Red Cross ERU has conducted an assessment in northern Komari to determine future needs of the local communities. Routine maintenance was also carried out on three water tanks in northern Pottuvil and a further four tanks in the area. A water tank with a capacity of one cubic metre was installed at a school in Urani. A total of 3,392 families have been displaced in the area. Due to the movement of some of these people a water tank with a capacity of 10 cubic metres had to be dismantled, moved and reconstructed.

Meetings were held with the local health inspector to discuss areas with a need for latrines, and to determine the design of the structures, at an estimated cost of LKR 40,000 (CHF 484) per latrine. The ERU estimate a capacity of cleaning 50 wells per month with a setup of five teams, comprising four members in each team.

Logistics

On average, one to two planes arrive in Colombo airport each day with relief goods from the Federation. These goods are handled by the British Red Cross logistics ERU, and are distributed by the American Red Cross relief ERU in conjunction with the SLRCS.

Objective 2 (shelter): Temporary shelter provided to up to 15,000 families (about 75,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have no extended family to live with.

Progress/achievements

An interim housing plan has been announced by the Sri Lankan government, encouraging international and non-governmental organisations to provide pre-built houses for some 50,000 families currently housed in temples and schools in tsunami-affected areas of the country.

A memorandum of understanding was presented to the president of the country by the SLRCS, pledging to construct 15,000 permanent houses for victims of the tsunami.

Objective 3 (immediate livelihood restoration): The minimum livelihood requirements provided for up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have lost their belongings.

Progress/achievements

Distribution of Federation non-food relief items by the American Red Cross ERU since the last update has provided an additional 550 families in the southern towns of Galle, Matara and Hambantota with much needed supplies.

Impact

Communities continue to receive much needed relief goods.

Capacity of the national society

The SLRCS special taskforce, comprising national society management, the Federation and ICRC heads of delegation and PNS in the country, have met to fine tune the national society's plan of action as the operation moves from the emergency relief and assistance phase to the tasks of rehabilitation and reconstruction. Many PNS have expressed their commitment to be partners with the SLRCS for both long- and short-term projects.

A grant from the US Agency for International Development (USAID) has enabled the SLRCS to conduct a health awareness programme in Ampara and Galle, with a focus on vector-borne diseases. This includes the distribution of posters and leaflets in local languages, with messages on personal hygiene and safe water. Red Cross and Red Crescent volunteers will be trained in the dissemination of these messages.

Communications – representation, advocacy and public information

Federation information delegates and the media department of the SLRCS continue to provide media coverage, photo exchange, stories and interviews to the local and international media.

India**Overview**

The 26 December tsunami caused extensive damage and loss of life in the states of Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Kerala, the Union Territory of Pondicherry and the territories of the Andaman and Nicobar Islands (ranging from 1,200-2,000 km distance from the Indian mainland).

Discussions are ongoing with Indian authorities/Indian Red Cross Society to determine whether any international inputs from the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement are needed, particularly with a view to the rehabilitation phase. The national society is likely to seek support for replenishment of disaster preparedness stocks (30,000 family packs and 20,000 tents). Disaster preparedness stocks have been depleted as resources were mobilized to assist those affected. It is imperative that these stocks are maintained as they are highly likely to be utilized in the coming months with the onset of the monsoon and cyclone season.

The official death toll stands at 10,749, but a further 5,640 have been listed as missing for almost a month. Of the missing, 5,554 are in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands and are feared dead.

The first phase of the relief and rescue operations is almost over. The state governments/Union Territory Administrations have already begun rehabilitation measures for affected people. These include provision of temporary shelters, providing employment, restoring infrastructure etc. Detailed damage assessment of the infrastructure is being carried out and full restoration is in the planning stage.

Fishing communities have been the worst affected and a comprehensive government package is under consideration for rehabilitating the affected people by providing dwelling units, fishing boats, nets etc. All schools have reopened in the affected districts of Andhra Pradesh. Most of the schools in the affected areas of Tamil Nadu, Kerala and Pondicherry have also been reopened. All relief camps have been closed in Andhra Pradesh and Pondicherry. People from relief camps in Kerala and Tamil Nadu have started going back to their villages.

In the Andaman and Nicobar Islands, the local administration has resumed normal functioning. Procurement of essential items for relief camps is being made locally. The provisions shops and schools have started reopening in the capital, Port Blair. Relief camps in the island groups are continuing and people are being provided with cooked food. The Indian government says sufficient food, water, medicines etc. are available and medical teams have been deployed in relief camps. The Nicobar group of islands will require extensive rebuilding of dwellings. Pending permanent housing arrangements, temporary shelters are being provided. The government aims at providing approximately 40,000 people in the relief camps in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands with temporary shelters within the next month, before the onset of the monsoon season. The central government has dispatched 14,386 small (five-person) tents and 1,226 large (10-person) tents to the Andaman and Nicobar Islands.

The Indian Red Cross national headquarters has formulated a questionnaire for all branches in affected areas to gain a clearer picture of their needs, especially heading into the rehabilitation phase. A meeting is scheduled for 27-29 January in Chennai (in the badly affected state of Tamil Nadu) in order to gather information and discuss needs on the basis of questionnaire results. This three-day session will be joined by representatives from affected states, donor Indian states and PNS as well as Federation representatives. Until this gathering is held, there will be no definitive beneficiary or distribution figures available covering all affected areas.

The Indian Red Cross has not called upon Federation FACT teams or ERUs during the relief operation.

Coordination

There is daily coordination between state branches and concerned government agencies. Most state branches hold regular meetings with state authorities to identify needs and state government priorities, while at the same time outlining their programmes.

An ECHO meeting calling for project proposals was held on 18 January, and was attended by an India delegation Federation representative. The Disaster Mitigation Committee formed at the national headquarters contains government representation from the Ministry of Home Affairs and the Ministry of External Affairs. The committee planned intervention areas which helped form the basis of the questionnaire to branches.

Indian Red Cross action

In Andhra Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Pondicherry, and Kerala, local branches swung into action, mobilizing volunteers and conducting rescue and relief activities. The Indian Red Cross cyclone shelters situated along the coast were utilized along with schools, colleges and community halls as places of refuge and shelter. Red Cross volunteers provided milk, tea, biscuits and emergency food to affected people. Details of the numbers of volunteers mobilized, the number of beneficiaries assisted and the amount of relief materials distributed (at branch level) are not available at this stage. The Indian Red Cross distributed water donated by Coca-Cola.

The Indian Red Cross provided 25 doctors and 15 ambulances to provide health care in Nagapattinam, one of the worst affected districts in Tamil Nadu. Family packs containing clothes, towels, blankets and kitchen utensils have been distributed amongst the most affected people. These were taken from disaster preparedness stocks stored at the Arakkonam warehouse in Tamil Nadu.

Trained Indian Red Cross volunteers joined relief teams and provided psychological support to survivors in the districts of Sirkazhi, Tharangambadi and Nagapattinam. Some 15 tonnes of Indian Red Cross relief items consisting of kitchen sets, plastic sheeting, towels, sheets, cotton blankets, and clothing have been air freighted and shipped to the Andaman and Nicobar Islands. The scale of devastation in Car Nicobar is reported to be extensive and more consignments are being readied for dispatch to that area. Some PNS, the Federation, multinational firms, housing societies, individuals and others are offering support to the national society for undertaking this relief operation.

Focus on Andaman and Nicobar Islands

The Assistant Director of the Indian Red Cross has been visiting the Andaman and Nicobar Islands for the past week. He is being assisted by four other national society staff. The Indian Red Cross currently has a total of eight staff in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands.

He has reported 169 camps are still functioning in the islands with a total population of 43,000 IDPs. The camps are distributed as follow:

- 85 camps in Car Nicobar Islands.
- 9 in Teresa.
- 3 in Katchal.
- 2 in Nan Cowry.
- 4 in Kamorta.
- 14 in Great Nicobar.
- 45 in South Andaman.
- 7 in Little Andaman.

Over 18-19 January, the Indian Red Cross distributed the following items in 12 relief camps visited:

- 677 kitchen sets.
- 195 cartons of milk (a total of 2,340 litres).
- 177 cartons of drinking water (a total of 2,124 litres).
- biscuits (one distribution of 500 kg and one distribution of 13 cartons, weight not supplied).
- 2,000 family packs (airlifted to Port Blair earlier).

A further distribution is planned for tomorrow in 12 camps covering the Wandoor area, about 35 km from Port Blair. The 4,000 family packs which were sent by ship have arrived and the distribution plan has been discussed with the local authorities. A total of 2,500 family packs will be sent to the Nicobar group of Islands while 1,500 family packs will be distributed in Little Andaman. Logistics are a major challenge and there is a reliance on local authorities to reach more remote areas.

There is no need for further Red Cross relief supplies to be sent to the Andamans with the government providing supplies for the relief camps. Many NGOs are present in the area such as the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA), Oxfam and World Vision. However, they are awaiting clearances for movement from the government. NGOs are looking to utilize the Indian Red Cross to facilitate their work with the government and a coordination meeting for the humanitarian organisations is planned for today (Friday, 21 January) in Port Blair. There has been good visibility of national society assistance. A media release on the Indian Red Cross activities was carried by the local newspaper and radio network.

The water purification plant sent last week will be installed after the location has been identified by the chief engineer of the Water Public Works Department. Training will be conducted on operating the unit soon.

There is an evolving population movement issue with people wishing to return to the mainland (primarily Andhra Pradesh and Chennai in Tamil Nadu). The government is providing people with tickets back to the mainland and a small amount of funds (INR 200 or CHF 11). The general impression is that these people do not want to return to the islands.

Rehabilitation (related to all affected areas)

The national headquarters has deployed its National Disaster Response Team (NDRT) into the affected areas. This team is performing assessments of the needs of the affected people and will prepare a plan of action for the rehabilitation phase. Areas being looked at including housing, vocational tools, provision of fishing nets, boats etc.

Details of relief items provided to the affected areas are as follow:

From national headquarters

Myanmar**Coordination**

At a meeting on Wednesday, 19 January, convened by World Food Programme and attended by the Federation, World Vision and ADRA, the type and quantity of food distributed by the different organizations and provided by WFP was clarified. The Federation noted that it does not intend to carry out further food distribution now that the emergency phase has concluded.

Following the press statement of the Tsunami Assistance Coordination Group on 6 January, in which it was stated that a second assessment and longer-term planning would be made with close cooperation between the international agencies and organizations, an update was issued (see Operations Update no. 24 issued on 20 January for further details). The next meeting will be held on 25 January.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action – progress/achievements, impact, constraints

The Myanmar Red Cross team has returned from an assessment in the Ayeyarwady delta area, and briefed the Federation delegation on a successful distribution in Laputta and Ngaputaw. Included in the briefing was additional information on the affected areas which will assist in the preparation for the rehabilitation and recovery phase of operations.

Local donors

A number of local donors from the tourism and business sectors, as well as individuals, have made donations through the Federation or directly to the Myanmar Red Cross this week, and there are indications of other

donations in the pipeline. The delegation has prepared a certificate of thanks for these donors and when possible has a small ceremony to accept the donation and give the certificate. Donations range in size from a few hundred to a few thousand dollars.

Rent of additional warehouse space

The Myanmar Red Cross this week scouted for available warehouse space in Yangon to rent for a three- to six-month period for the additional stocks donated and purchased over this period. One warehouse a short distance from the headquarters has been identified as suitable. It is anticipated that the rental will begin from next week and that minor renovation and extra equipment will be needed to ensure secure and clean premises.

Planning for long-term rehabilitation and disaster preparedness

The Myanmar Red Cross executive and management team met with the Federation and ICRC delegations early this week to discuss the extended and longer-term appeal which will be jointly prepared by the end of February for inclusion in the overall Federation appeal. Smaller teams will now meet to look at the various components of what will be presented in the appeal documents – rehabilitation projects, restocking and upgrading of warehouses, integrated community-based first aid and disaster preparedness training and the construction or purchase of a logistics and training complex for Myanmar Red Cross.

Further distribution in Kawthaung

The Myanmar Red Cross is investigating if there is a need for further distributions in the Kawthaung area after reports of damage additional to that previously assessed. As both UNICEF and World Vision have been active in distributions in this area, it is important that the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement ensure there is a real need before further distributions are made.

Outstanding Needs

Human Resources

The recruitment of Federation delegates for Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Maldives and a delegate for the Federation office in New York continues, and 30 posts remain to be filled, as detailed below. The recruitment of head of operations for Indonesia is extremely urgent. The recruitment for a logistics coordinator and logistics delegate for the Banda Aceh operations centre (with strong procurement skills and knowledge of Federation systems) is also an urgent priority.
