In Brief

Revised Preliminary Appeal No. 28/2004; Operations Update no. 33; Period covered: 31 January – 1 February 2005; Appeal coverage: 103.9% ([Click here to view the provisional contributions list attached, also available on the Federation's website](#)).

Appeal history:

- Preliminary appeal launched on 26 December 2004 for CHF 7,517,000 (USD 6,658,712 or EUR 4,852,932) for 6 months to assist 500,000 beneficiaries.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 1,000,000.
- Revised Preliminary Appeal issued on 29 December 2004, for CHF 67,005,000 (USD 59,152,246 or EUR 53,439,988) for 2 million beneficiaries for 6-8 months.
- The Preliminary Appeal was originally launched titled "Bay of Bengal: Earthquake and Tsunamis". The title was subsequently changed to "Asia: Earthquake and Tsunamis" in the Revised Preliminary Appeal launched on 29 December 2004.
- Operations update No. 16 issued on 12 January 2005 revised the Revised Preliminary Appeal 28/2004 budget to CHF 183,486,000 (USD 155,286,000 or EUR 118,669,000) with programme extensions for Sri Lanka, Indonesia, the Maldives and East Africa.

Highlights of the Day:

- **Daily Operational Updates will continue to be issued by the International Federation but with special focus on certain operational aspects (e.g. health, water and sanitation, and East Africa) while complete overviews will be issued twice this week (today and Friday) and once weekly from next week (Tuesday).**
- **New visa procedures have been announced for Indonesia's Aceh province. Now required: a letter of employment in the Bahasa language, four passport photos and two copies of the passport's main page and visa showing residual authorization of at least 14 days. Foreigners will be able to apply for the necessary permits upon arrival at Medan and Banda Aceh airports, as long as the necessary documentation is provided.**
- **A health team from the Indonesian Red Cross travelled to Simeulue Island in Indonesia to assist in the UNICEF-coordinated measles vaccination campaign.**
- **Water purification plants supplied by the Red Cross and Red Crescent are providing 1,300 families in the Andaman and Nicobar islands with clean drinking water on a daily basis.**

Background

The magnitude 9.0 earthquake that struck the area off the western coast of northern Sumatra on Sunday morning, 26 December 2004, at 7:59 am local time (00:59 GMT) triggered massive tidal waves, or tsunamis, that inundated coastal areas in countries all around the Indian Ocean rim – from Indonesia to Somalia. Sri Lanka, the Indonesian province of Aceh, four states of southern India, the Maldives, coastal areas of Thailand, Malaysia, and Myanmar were the most severely affected. The earthquake epicentre was located at 3.30 N, 95.78E at a depth of 10 kilometres. The area is historically prone to seismic upheaval due to its location on the margins of tectonic plates. However, tidal waves of this magnitude are rare and therefore the level of preparedness was very low.

Thousands of staff, relief and medical personnel, and volunteers of the Red Cross and Red Crescent societies of the tsunami-affected countries have provided a vital initial response, in search and rescue, clean-up, providing temporary shelter and immediate relief assistance, emergency medical services, psychological first aid and tracing. It is estimated that over 10,000 Red Cross and Red Crescent volunteers and 76 relief and medical teams have been mobilized in the disaster-affected areas.

The Federation immediately launched a Preliminary Emergency Appeal on the day of the disaster with a focus on Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives. On 3 January 2005, the ICRC launched budget extensions additional to its

2005 Emergency Appeal for Indonesia and Sri Lanka. Along with initial support from the country and regional delegations, the Federation deployed within 24-72 hours three [Field Assessment and Coordination Teams \(FACT\)](#) and 18 [Emergency Response Units \(ERU\)](#) in the sectors of water and sanitation, health care, aid distribution, telecommunications, and logistics/transportation to Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives.

A total of 102 relief flights have now arrived in the various affected countries and a further 23 flights are in the Federation relief pipeline, making a total of 125 relief flights coordinated through the Federation.

The Federation and the ICRC in Geneva are currently working on an organizational framework for Movement coordination in the tsunami operations. A note has been sent out to national societies and delegations on this today, for consultation. It is expected that the framework, which will set in place strong platforms for coordination, will be finalized shortly, and a final note will be sent out by the Federation and the ICRC next week.

Operational Developments

Indonesia

The latest official death toll for Indonesia has been raised to 103,025 persons, with a further 127,774 missing and presumed dead, according to the latest Ministry of Health statistics.

As of 31 January, the UN's Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) in Medan has advised that travel into Aceh province will now require a letter of employment in Bahasa, four passport photos and two photocopies of the passport's main page and visa showing residual authorization of at least 14 days. This is similar to conditions required for foreigners entering Aceh prior to the disaster (for obtaining the pass known as the 'Blue Book', free of charge). Foreigners will be able to apply for the necessary permits upon arrival at Medan and Banda Aceh airports, as long as they have the necessary documentation mentioned above. It will also be necessary to report to the local police station. Clearly, a 60-day initial visa is best for all delegates coming from now on.

The situation in the disaster area remains stable, if still precarious. The overall flow of humanitarian relief aid is shifting from foreign military forces and increasingly being assumed by the UN and aid organizations (although some 3,000 foreign military personnel from 11 countries continue to be engaged in the relief operation on the ground, excluding troops offshore). Despite ongoing delays on certain routes, distribution is proceeding at a more regular and increased rate. The International Organization for Migration (IOM) has noted a significant increase in helicopter aid missions – with Indonesia experiencing a growth from 35 a day three weeks ago to 350 currently.

For February, the World Food Programme (WFP) estimates that it will feed 500,000 people in Indonesia, up from the current 330,000 beneficiaries. Aid agencies are reportedly shifting from emergency rations such as noodles and rice to more varied items which include more protein and vitamins. The Palang Merah Indonesia (PMI/Indonesian Red Cross)/Federation plan includes supplying supplementary rations to 500,000 beneficiaries over up to six months, complementing the WFP distribution.

There continue to be reports of diarrhoea, malaria, a few cases of measles, pneumonia and skin infections, but no abnormal disease outbreaks. The newly-arrived Japanese self-defence force has begun a mosquito-spraying programme in and around Banda Aceh, to prevent outbreaks of mosquito-borne diseases. Measles vaccination programmes are proceeding apace. According to UN sources, the measles vaccination campaign reached a total of 65,343 children (about 54.9 per cent of the targeted population) – primarily children located in camps internally displaced people (IDP). Current efforts are focusing on reaching children outside the camps. However, reports from the field underline the challenges faced in carrying out the vaccination programme, due to sketchy information-sharing and ongoing access problems.

There are reports that IDPs continue to gravitate towards the larger centres, such as Banda Aceh, as well as Meulaboh and Calang along the west coast. The first stages of resettling the estimated 417,000 IDPs are now underway, with 38,500 IDPs scheduled to move from tented camps into wooden barracks in 37 different areas around Aceh. Another 40,000 will be moved into prefabricated homes and 320,000 will go into military platoon tents, according to the government's plan. Aid groups have expressed concern about splitting people up, especially

given the strong communal bonds that traditionally exist. The government has said that relocations would be voluntary, although some human rights groups have underlined their concerns about the process and levels of information being provided to IDPs.

The national coordination agency for disaster relief and IDP management, BAKORNAS, has stated that a further 260,000 people are thought to be residing with extended families and within the community. The government has estimated that more than one million homes were destroyed, along with some 450 kilometres of roads and scores of bridges. Officials have announced that they will begin taking a census on 1 February to determine who will be relocated as a priority.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress/achievements, impact, constraints

PMI/ICRC Family Links Programme

The Family Links programme being implemented by PMI and ICRC remains very active, even more than a month after the disaster. The main focus of activity remains the 'persons sought' and 'I am alive' registration. Registration of 'I am alive' and 'Persons sought' enables the survivors to locate their family members by looking through the lists widely provided by PMI/ICRC. These lists are made available on a national level through cooperation with various media (TV, radio, newspapers), and worldwide via the Internet site: www.familylinks.icrc.org. The programme also facilitates communications between families through satellite (SAT) phone calls and Red Cross messages. An overview of PMI/ICRC Family Links activities through 31 January 2005:

Overall Goal: Up to 100,000 internally displaced and otherwise affected families (approximately 500,000 people) in western Aceh receive adequate and timely emergency humanitarian assistance over the next six months.

Objective 1 (emergency relief): Basic supplementary food and non-food needs of the 500,000 internally displaced people and most vulnerable beneficiaries are met so that they can start rebuilding their future.

Progress/ Achievements

Relief distribution is ongoing along the west coast of Aceh. As of 27 January, it is estimated that a total of 71,565 beneficiaries had been reached, both through PMI distributions of pre-positioned stock during the first part of the emergency operation, as well as through ongoing PMI/Federation efforts following the appeal. Relief distribution has been increasing steadily now that the relief pipeline, warehousing and onward transport are all in place. Currently, relief distribution is focusing on the delivery of non-food items, as listed below.

Communities currently receiving regular relief distribution include: Lamno, Calang, Teunom, Meulaboh and the island of Simueleu. Distribution from pre-positioned stock during the first weeks of the emergency was concentrated primarily on Banda Aceh and Aceh Besar, as well as the outlying communities of Biren, Pidie and Lhok Sumawe.

Impact

Non-food item relief was distributed to an estimated 71,565 beneficiaries since the beginning of the emergency operation.

Relief goods are flowing more smoothly through the pipeline, with a steady stream of non-food items reaching the target communities.

Objective 2 (logistics): PMI will have a strengthened supply chain capability and capacity to ensure timely transport of material and human resources to the areas of operation.

Progress / Achievements

A procurement officer from the Federation's Secretariat in Geneva has begun to contact local companies in order to establish a database of suppliers, evaluate their capacity to deliver and assess the overall market capability in Indonesia, particularly focusing on the planned PMI/Federation supplementary food distribution to 100,000 families over a period of up to six months. Each food parcel will include: dried fish, corned beef (halal), iodized salt, sugar, pepper, dried chilli, tea and green beans.

Goods (non-food) continue to be off-loaded and repacked for onward distribution from the airbase at Batam. Containers are in the process of being received and organized for future shipments to Medan by sea, as per the revised logistics plan.

Medan continues to receive shipments from Jakarta and Batam, for onward delivery by truck convoys to Meulaboh and Banda Aceh, as well as by helicopter to Simeulue Island.

Two warehouses and a logistics office have been established in Banda Aceh. A landing craft with net tonnage of 500,000 tonnes has been acquired for the operation as from 28 January. In Meulaboh, two Rubb Halls were erected and goods are being received for distribution.

Impact

A coordinated logistics operation and team is now in place, with the capability to deliver and store 1,000 metric tonnes of relief goods per week, as well as emergency relief unit (ERU) equipment and support personnel, using both air and sea routes.

Supply lines have been established to four distribution points (Lamno, Calang, Teunom and Meulaboh), through two marshalling areas (Meulaboh and Banda Aceh), supported by a national and international hub (Medan and Batam, respectively).

Constraints

One of the constraints has been the lack of clearly identified PMI counterparts for logistics and procurement. Links have now been established with the PMI Logistics Coordinator and logistics team. PMI procurement procedures are being assessed in terms of compatibility with the Federation's to ensure the smooth functioning of the ongoing relief operation.

Goods are now moving well, and the team is working on its forward planning capacity, as well as on stock control, particularly with regard to medical equipment and supplies.

Objective 3 (health): primary health care service provided to the tsunami-affected communities and potential epidemics are prevented or adequately addressed.

Progress / Achievements

The Federation health coordinator held a productive meeting with the PMI counterpart. Immediate priorities for the PMI's health coordinator are:

- monitoring of PMI health activities, including health team needs and rotations, as well as overall capacity;
- overseeing organization of medical supplies;
- organizing an improved and centralized system of PMI health data collection for reporting purposes.

With this in mind, the PMI health coordinator will be undertaking a rapid assessment of each location where PMI health teams are active. In terms of additional resources, PMI plans to place two additional local coordinators in Meulaboh and Banda Aceh, respectively. Another PMI counterpart has been identified for medical logistics, with medical warehousing being organized in Medan and Banda Aceh.

GRC BHCU – Teunom

On average, the BHCU continues to see 75 patients per day through its outpatient department (OPD), which is beginning to reflect pre-disaster numbers as predicted. There are 12 admitted patients, mainly with malaria and/or diarrhoea.

Japanese Red Cross Society BHCU – Meulaboh

Patient numbers at the JRCS BHCU continue to increase, with the clinic seeing 80 patients on 28 January and 98 patients on 29 January, primarily with chronic diseases, as well as some patients requiring psychological support.

The Japanese team continues to support the hospital with surgical and post-op activities. The Japanese Red Cross' storage tent has now been set up in the Federation camp.

JRCS team members accompanied the PMI/Federation team to Simeulue Island to undertake an assessment of the health situation and needs. A PMI health team from Meulaboh also travelled to Simeulue to assist in the UNICEF coordinated measles vaccination campaign.

Impact

There are no reports of abnormal disease outbreaks. The ERU BHCUs and PMI continue to offer basic and specialized health care to an estimated 74,000 beneficiaries.

Objective 4 (water and sanitation): the spread/outbreak of infectious diseases is prevented through water and sanitation interventions.

Progress / Achievements

The Federation's water and sanitation coordinator visited the various ERU water and sanitation operations, as well as various IDP camps in order to assess overall effectiveness and future needs.

Meulaboh

A member of the Spanish Red Cross' water and sanitation team participated in the assessment undertaken on Simeulue Island, along with the Federation's team.

Teunom

The team has indicated that it requires additional logistics support for sourcing fuel and chemicals, as well as for forwarding additional equipment still in storage in Banda Aceh.

Sigli and Salamanga

Overall provision of water has been increased to nearly 20,000 people, including 21 IDP sites. Plans are underway to increase the basic capacity in Sigli to 70,000 litres/day. In Salamanga, an additional 95,000-litre tank is being set up to increase availability of water for distribution to the community. Some problems have been noted with residue palm oil in the hired trucks, which need more cleaning. This problem will need to be addressed for future truck hire.

Forty 3,000-litre tanks have been set up in the IDP settlement areas as distribution points for community water access.

With ongoing increase in demand for water, the French Red Cross team has requested an additional six watering trucks, as well as a further 40 tanks with 3,000-litre capacity for the operation.

Lamno / Calang

A 10,000-litre bladder was installed for water storage for the PMI warehouse which also acts as the base for 150 PMI volunteers.

Assessments were carried out in Patek. It has been determined that there are some 1,500 IDPs requiring assistance.

Two teams of four were deployed to both Batik and Lamno to conduct sanitation activities, over a period of two weeks.

Constraints

Internet connection has been down in the Banda Aceh and Meulaboh offices.

Sri Lanka**Overview**

The Sri Lankan government is expected to collect demographic data of the 100-metre coastal buffer zone by next week, which will enable the housing reconstruction process to finally begin. Under public notice only certain sites and structures (including coastal conservation and vegetation parks, coastal conservation structures, ports, fisheries harbours and related development, and historical and archaeological sites) may be located within 100 metres of the coastline. Additional restrictions have been imposed by the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eelam (LTTE) for areas under their purview, with a 400-metre non-build zone from the coastline. Meanwhile, the reconstruction of some 176 tsunami damaged schools has begun.

The Sri Lanka field assessment and coordination team (FACT) disbanded on Friday 28 January, having managed the initial phase of relief operations in Sri Lanka. Core functions were handed over to the Federation's country delegation for short and longer-term recovery and rehabilitation. Conclusions of the recovery assessment team for the short-term recovery of the Sri Lanka operations are expected to be completed in the next few days. Meanwhile, the Sri Lanka Red Cross Society (SLRCS) continues its relief operations in the country providing drinking water, health support, medical assistance and logistics to families in the coastal areas of east and south Sri Lanka, supported by the Federation and ICRC.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress/achievements, impact, constraints

Overall Goal: Up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) in the south of the country receive immediate relief, shelter, health and care, and community support over the next six months.

Objective 1 (water and sanitation): Adequate sanitation and water supply provided to a selected number of temporary shelters/welfare centres, and water and sanitation systems to serve the affected population.

Progress/Achievements:

In the east coastal district of Ampara some 11,500 internally displaced persons living in 12 camps between Komari and Pottuvil (Ministry of Health in Pottuvil, 30 January) have access to water through the German and Swedish Red Cross Societies' emergency relief units. In nearby Arugam Bay, two 11m³ tanks located there provide the local population with water; at an average use of five litres per capita per day it is estimated that the total population served is 4,500. Another two 11m³ tanks located in Pottuvil provide a further 4,500 people with water each day. The total population now having access to clean water has therefore been re-calculated from 34,000 to 20,500 beneficiaries per day.

Objective 2 (shelter): Temporary shelter provided to up to 15,000 families (about 75,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have no extended family to live with.

Progress/Achievements:

The American Red Cross' ERU, together with the SLRCS Ampara branch, have distributed nearly 4,800 tarpaulins in Pottuvil, bringing the total number of families assisted in the district to over 2,400. People in the area are still in need of shelter and the team is visiting sites to ascertain beneficiaries for the tents at hand.

Objective 3 (immediate livelihood restoration): The minimum livelihood requirements provided for up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have lost their belongings.**Progress/Achievements:**

Standard Federation non-food relief items were distributed by the SLRCS together with the American Red Cross' ERU to a further 669 families in Pottuvil and 717 families in Komari, bringing the total number of beneficiaries so far to nearly 2,400 families. Distributions south of Pottuvil are expected to begin this week. The relief ERU also provided five tarpaulins, 300 school books and pencils to the school in Pottuvil that served as the distribution hub. It provided a further 25 tarpaulins to a local college (which also served as a distribution site) for the construction of temporary classrooms, and three large tarpaulins (4 x 60 metres) for community halls in a camp in Komari.

Impact

There is very positive feedback from beneficiaries indicating that the items being distributed are appropriate to needs.

Constraints

Poor road conditions have slowed the distribution process. The government of Pottuvil has not distributed promised ration cards, which complicates beneficiary selection. A broken bridge linking Pottuvil with the southern part of the district will necessitate the delivery of relief items by barge and farm tractors with wagons. Distribution south of Pottuvil started on 31 January, complicated by poor communications (no email and unreliable mobile phone services as well as no printer in the warehouse centre) between the logistics warehouse and the relief ERU.

Capacity of the National Society

The SLRCS and the American Red Cross' ERU continue hands-on training of volunteers in the Ampara district on distribution systems, and are developing two local leaders to take over on-site selection of beneficiaries and distribution responsibilities.

Communications – Representation, Advocacy and Public Information

At the invitation of the Federation, a well-known Indian humanitarian advocate/actress recently visited Sri Lanka to encourage and support local volunteers in their work with the Red Cross. Over three days, she met with SLRCS volunteers in Galle branch, observed youth in action during a relief distribution and visited the relief ERU warehouse. In Colombo, she met various local dignitaries (including the media representative to the Sri Lankan president and other senior officials of the Foreign Ministry), the Indian High Commissioner, as well as Sri Lankan media. Together with the SLRCS and the Federation she advocated on behalf of victims of the tsunami. A full page article about her visit appeared in a local paper and the actresses' own account of her visit to affected areas is expected to appear in an Indian daily newspaper.

India**Overview**

The Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) held a 'Planning and Reconstruction' meeting in Chennai in the worst tsunami-affected state of Tamil Nadu on 27-29 January. State branches detailed their response to date and the consolidated figures/statistics will be included in the next overall Operations Update on 4 February.

The Chennai meeting revealed an extensive and comprehensive response to the tsunami by the national society, at all levels. This meeting was followed up by a meeting in Delhi on 31 January to work on priorities identified by state branches based on the needs of the most vulnerable.

The findings of the Planning and Partnership meeting showed the Indian Red Cross response capacity has continued to improve, particularly in resource mobilization on a domestic level. There was also significant response from the governmental and private sectors. A major challenge for the Indian Red Cross has been to identify gaps and supplement the assistance provided by other sectors.

Rehabilitation

The Planning and Reconstruction meeting examined feedback to a questionnaire which had been sent to affected states.

The purpose of the meeting was to help the most vulnerable tsunami-affected people to recover by reinforcing activities undertaken and initiatives planned by the IRCS. A comprehensive plan of action for rehabilitation/reconstruction activities is being developed. Additionally, the possibilities for branch development and response preparedness at state and the national levels will be explored.

Objectives of the meeting were as follows:

- to inform/ share experiences regarding relief work undertaken by the IRCS national headquarters;
- to analyze the response from the branches to the questionnaire sent by headquarters;
- to discuss the measures already taken and activities planned by the branches for undertaking the rehabilitation/reconstruction programme;
- analyze the interventions from the major stakeholders and prioritize the IRCS intervention per sector and geographic area;
- to explore opportunities for branch development;
- to develop a possible plan of action with a tentative time frame;
- to agree on the monitoring and follow-up issues/mechanisms.

Participants included staff from the IRCS national headquarters, the Federation, state and district branches, ICRC and PNS.

Branches detailed their response to the disaster to date; the questionnaires were analyzed and realistic needs for each state branch were set in accordance with their capacities and the needs of the vulnerable; and the meeting was concluded by further prioritization of realistic solutions by the working groups.

The follow-up meeting at the national headquarters in Delhi on 31 January, which included India delegation and Geneva representatives from the Federation, involved a briefing by the IRCS leadership, provided time for partner consultations, policy discussions, and anticipated stakeholder participation. The timeframe for this work includes an immediate needs budget to be completed by 4 February and an overall plan of action and indicative budget at the earliest.

The IRCS circulated a draft paper which summarized the needs spelled out by the affected states. Based on the draft paper, discussions were held among the PNS, national society, Federation and ICRC.

The framework agreed during the meeting was a three-tier system including short or immediate needs (three to six months), medium-term needs (three to 18 months) and broad long-term needs (two to five years). The short and medium-term needs can be based on the draft paper which includes basic livelihood support (boats and nets) in the affected states of Tamil Nadu and Andhra Pradesh. Support for the Kerala branch will require further liaison with the state government representative and reconstituting the Red Cross branch. The Andaman and Nicobar Islands and Pondicherry will not be part of the current programme as the Red Cross branches in these two states are very weak.

The medium-term needs would aim at supporting the community-based programmes (including construction), which would proceed following assessments being carried out.

Long-term needs will require detailed assessment of community needs and development of Indian Red Cross capacity in the affected states.

The IRCS leadership endorsed the plan outlined during the meeting. However, it was stressed that any construction undertaken must include active community-based participation. The element of organizational capacity building has been recognized as an integral part of the whole operation and will be included in the planning from the beginning.

The national society is also making plans for replenishment of disaster preparedness stocks. These have been left severely depleted, creating vulnerability in case of future disaster.

Update on Indian Red Cross in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands

All Red Cross-supplied water purification plants located in and around the capital Port Blair are operational. These produce 100,000 litres of clean drinking water daily thus supporting 1,300 families per day. The Spanish and Indian Red Cross Societies' consultants have come back from Andaman after signing a protocol with the Andaman water works department which has agreed to maintain the plant and return it back to the IRCS.

Maldives

Overall Goal: Tsunami affected families in Maldives receive immediate non-food relief, shelter, electricity, health, water and sanitation services; and a national society established.

Objective 2 (immediate livelihood restoration): electric power restored for 30,000 people and the minimum livelihood requirements supported for 2,000 families whose houses have been destroyed or badly damaged, and have lost their belongings.

Progress/Achievements:

The 24 generators provided by the Federation have all now been despatched from the warehouse to their destinations. Five of the generators remain to be installed and brought on line. Those installed are providing electricity which is servicing 7,900 people.

Twenty kilometres of cabling and 200 distribution boxes are expected to arrive in the Maldives in the near future.

The government is expected to formalize a request for 12 more generators. These are to replace ones repaired after the tsunami but which have subsequently broken down because of effects of the salt water. In relation to these, extra cabling and distribution boxes will be needed and discussions have identified the need for tools and training of technicians to properly operate and maintain the generators.

Objective 4 (water and sanitation): about 5,000 people have access to adequate water and sanitation facilities.

Progress/Achievements:

A water and sanitation delegate has arrived from the Australian Red Cross and is in the process of reviewing current needs in light of the initial FACT assessment.

Malaysia

Red Cross and Red Crescent Action

At the end of last week, 1,205 families had received cash donations and relief items including rice, sugar, mineral water, canned drinks, noodles and clothing from the Malaysian Red Crescent Society (MRCS).

The Penang branch in the north of Malaysia is one of the branches that continue to be busy assisting those affected by the disaster. It has so far provided a total of RM283, 000 (CHF 94,334) to all tsunami victims on the island and on 30 January, it continued its assistance by providing relief bags consisting of food, canned drinks, clothing and bleach, to over 500 beneficiaries on the island.

Due to the request from the public, MRCS Penang branch has, to date, set up three separate relief funds to assist those affected by the tsunami; a Penang Tsunami relief fund, a Malaysia tsunami relief fund and an international tsunami relief fund for the Federation.

Meanwhile, the Kedah branch still has about 2,000 beneficiaries in the Kota Kuala Muda shelter. The Penang branch has also assisted this shelter by providing breakfast, lunch and dinner for four consecutive days for approximately 1,000 people.

The Penang branch is expecting a 40-foot refrigerated container to arrive from South Africa later this week. The container contains over 3,000 cartons of fruit, which will go to Kedah and Penang, where the fruit will be distributed to beneficiaries in time for the Chinese New Year celebrations.

Thailand

Overview

The official death toll in Thailand now stands at 5,393 (1,851 Thais, 1,948 foreigners and 1,594 still unidentified), 8,457 people injured, and 3,066 people remain missing.

As the focus, especially in Thailand, moves away from relief and towards recovery and reconstruction, the Asian Development Bank (ADB) has announced that it will establish a US\$ 600 million multi-donor Asian Tsunami Trust Fund to provide rapid reconstruction and technical assistance to the most affected countries.

Red Cross and Red Crescent Action

To date, the Thai Red Cross branches in the six affected provinces in the south of the country have supported around 35,460 beneficiaries, with relief supplies including both food and non-food items. This effort has been possible thanks to the nearly 1,500 volunteers that the Thai Red Cross mobilized in these areas.

Looking now beyond the relief phase, a joint Thai Red Cross and Federation assessment team is currently visiting Thailand's affected provinces in the south of the country. The assessment team will spend almost a week visiting the four major affected provinces of Phuket, Phang Nga, Krabi and Ranong. The purpose of the visit is to scope out the possibilities for long-term Thai Red Cross and Federation support in the affected provinces, focusing attention particularly on psycho-social support, shelter, livelihoods and community-based disaster preparedness.

This initial assessment is due to finish on Thursday, 3 February. Early findings from the team suggest that while substantial efforts are being made by the Thai government and other relief agencies in these provinces, there are still identifiable gaps in both the short- and long-term where the Red Cross could provide assistance.

A key area for the team is considering the role of the Thai Red Cross chapters in these provinces. Traditionally, the Thai Red Cross chapters operate with a certain degree of autonomy from the national headquarters, so working closely with these chapters in conjunction with the headquarters is essential on developing future plans.

In order to provide the opportunity for sharing information between the chapters and the headquarters, Thai Red Cross held a seminar in Bangkok on 27 and 28 January. Over 200 persons, comprising chairpersons, treasurers and secretaries, from 75 provincial chapters participated in the seminar. The chairpersons from Phuket and Phang Nga shared their experiences on their assistance in tsunami incident.

Outstanding Needs

Human Resources

The recruitment of Federation delegates for Sri Lanka, Indonesia, and Maldives and for the Federation's office in New York continues, and 19 posts remain to be filled, as detailed below. The recruitment of head of operations for Indonesia is extremely urgent. The recruitment for a logistics coordinator for the Banda Aceh operations centre (with strong procurement skills and knowledge of Federation systems) is also an urgent priority.
