## ASIA: EARTHQUAKE & TSUNAMIS

8 February 2005

### In Brief

### Highlights of the Day:

- The chairman of the Indonesian Red Cross, together with the heads of delegation of the Federation and ICRC in Jakarta held a very positive and productive meeting with the Indonesian Minister of Planning. The minister has been given the lead coordinating role for recovery and reconstruction efforts in the tsunami-affected areas. It was clear that the government considers the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement as an important partner in Aceh, not only during the initial emergency phase, but for longer-term recovery and rehabilitation. The minister agreed to Indonesian Red Cross (representing the Movement) having a seat on the board of the newly created government coordination office, which will oversee all recovery and reconstruction activities.
- In Indonesia, non-food relief goods have been distributed to an estimated 86,130 beneficiaries since the beginning of the emergency operation. Distribution has expanded to cover Meulaboh and Simeulue Island, as well as surrounding communities.
- The newly revised relief plan in Indonesia is designed to accommodate fluctuations and movements of internally displaced and disaster-affected persons within the region. The current target population is 17,800 families and reflects the current capacity of the Federation and Indonesian Red Cross workers in the field.
- The office of the Federation and the Indonesian Red Cross in Banda Aceh moved to new facilities on 7 February.
- SLRCS is in the final stages of planning and identifying its needs for the next one to five years in a report to be completed in the coming days. As part of this plan, 10 district coordinating officers will be established in the SLRCS branches in the severely affected areas as focal persons to ensure coordination of the operation at all levels. To complement their efforts, a team will be established at SLRCS headquarters managed by a coordinator. Included in the SLRCS plan of action for organizational development is the strengthening of advocacy, branch development and leadership development. The Federation is supporting SLRCS to build its capacity in order to cope with the magnitude of the operation.
- The Federation is considering the construction of 500 new homes in the Maldives (of an estimated 2,000 that are needed according to assessments).

**Appeal history:**

- Preliminary appeal launched on 26 December 2004 CHF 7,517,000 (USD 6,658,712 or EUR 4,852,932) for 6 months to assist 500,000 beneficiaries.
- Disaster Relief Emergency Funds (DREF) allocated: CHF 1,000,000.
- Revised Preliminary Appeal issued on 30 December 2004, for CHF 67,005,000 (USD 59,152,246 or EUR 53,439,988) for 2 million beneficiaries for 6-8 months.
- The Preliminary Appeal was originally launched titled “Bay of Bengal: Earthquake and Tsunamis”. The title was subsequently changed to “Asia: Earthquake and Tsunamis” in the Revised Preliminary Appeal launched on 29 December 2004.
- Operations update No. 16 revised the Revised Preliminary Appeal 28/2004 budget to CHF 183,486,000 (USD 155,286,000 or EUR 118,669,000) with programme extensions for particularly Sri Lanka, Indonesia, the Maldives and East Africa.

**Background**

The magnitude 9.0 earthquake that struck the area off the western coast of northern Sumatra on Sunday morning, 26 December 2004, at 7:59 am local time (00:59 GMT) triggered massive tidal waves, or tsunamis, that inundated coastal areas in countries all around the Indian Ocean rim – from Indonesia to Somalia. Sri Lanka, the Indonesian province of Aceh, four states of southern India, the Maldives, and coastal areas of Thailand, Malaysia, and Myanmar were the most severely affected. The earthquake epicentre was located at 3.30 N, 95.78E at a depth of 10 kilometres. The area is historically prone to seismic upheaval due to its location on the margins of tectonic plates. However, tidal waves of this magnitude are rare and therefore the level of preparedness was very low.

Thousands of staff, relief and medical personnel, and volunteers of the Red Cross and Red Crescent societies of the tsunami-affected countries have provided a vital initial response, in search and rescue, clean-up, providing temporary shelter and immediate relief assistance, emergency medical services, psychological first aid and tracing. It is estimated that over 10,000 Red Cross and Red Crescent volunteers and 76 relief and medical teams have been mobilised in the disaster-affected areas.

The Federation immediately launched a Preliminary Emergency Appeal on the day of the disaster with a focus on Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives. On 3 January 2005, the ICRC launched budget extensions additional to its 2005 Emergency Appeal for Indonesia and Sri Lanka. Along with initial support from the country and regional delegations, the Federation deployed within 24-72 hours three [Field Assessment and Coordination Teams \(FACT\)](#) and 18 [Emergency Response Units \(ERU\)](#) in the sectors of water and sanitation, health care, aid distribution, telecommunications, and logistics/transportation to Sri Lanka, Indonesia and the Maldives.

A total of 125 relief flights have now arrived in the various affected countries and a further 21 flights are in the Federation relief pipeline, making a total of 146 relief flights coordinated through the Federation.

The Federation and the ICRC in Geneva are currently working on an organizational framework for Movement coordination in the tsunami operations. A note has been sent out to national societies and delegations on this today, for consultation. It is expected that the framework, which will set in place strong platforms for coordination, will be finalised shortly, and a final note will be then sent out by the Federation and the ICRC.

## Indonesia

### Overview

The latest figures from BAKORNAS as of 4 February put the number of dead at 112,280, with the number of missing (presumed dead) remaining at an estimated 127,774<sup>1</sup>. PMI is still recovering an average of 70 bodies daily, depending on the number of volunteers available. In some areas, they are the only ones helping the local community retrieve bodies from rubble. At the village of Lamkrut (Lhok Nga), a lone PMI volunteer team of 20 members - 10 evacuating bodies and another 10 in social work - was seen helping families break down damaged housing structures and pulling month-old bodies of relatives from neighbouring houses.

Based on the latest information, the number of internally displaced persons (IDPs) is now estimated at 412,438. Due to the geographic extent of the affected area and its relative isolation, as well as the ongoing population movements following the disaster, it has been difficult to obtain an accurate estimate of IDPs. The government has begun the process of formally registering IDPs and expects to finish this by 10 February – at which point all IDPs should have been provided with an identification number.

The UN's Humanitarian Information Centre, based in Banda Aceh, has been collating information from various sources in order to create a base map which would include information on health and educational facilities, warehousing and IDP locations. This is aimed at demonstrating gaps in assistance provided in terms of geographical spread.

On the educational front, Indonesian authorities from the relevant ministries have announced that children whose schools had been destroyed would, as far as possible, be integrated into nearby remaining schools. Officials are also concentrating on the urgent replacement of teachers by recruiting and training some 3,000 teachers, as well as using volunteer teachers. In addition, schools will be used as the entry point for other much needed support for children in the areas of health, protection, psycho-social care, and water and sanitation.

The departure of the US aircraft carrier which had been the base for dozens of daily relief flights provided yet another signal that the post-tsunami operation was moving from emergency relief to reconstruction activities. The somewhat more normal pace of cargo activity at the Banda Aceh airport is another sign of this shift. Aid deliveries will nevertheless continue for months to come – but will be handled now primarily through UN agencies, the Indonesian Red Cross (Palang Merah Indonesia/PMI) and other Red Cross and Red Crescent societies, as well as a number of NGOs.

Although relief distribution remains a priority, the attention of aid agencies, the government and victims alike is clearly shifting towards recovery and reconstruction – as people look to rebuilding their homes and finding jobs. The logistical problems nevertheless remain huge: the extent of damage varies from village to village, basic infrastructure (most particularly in terms of road access) will take time to rebuild, security continues to be a concern and the humanitarian space has been limited by the number of agencies and NGOs intent on offering their assistance.

The circumstances of tsunami-affected people varies highly across the affected area – from towns such as Banda Aceh, large parts of which were untouched and remain fully functional, to small villages along remote parts of the west coast which were completely wiped out. There is still no complete picture of the total shelter and infrastructure needs along the west and northeast coasts. In an attempt to tailor shelter solutions to the varying needs of the communities, UNHCR is involved in a pilot project with the government and other agencies in the fishing village of Kreung Sabe (8 kilometres south of Calang) – totally destroyed by the tsunami and with half of its population decimated. Surviving families have indicated that they have no desire to relocate; the proposed rebuilding plan will therefore take into account not only permanent shelter, but also essential community infrastructure such as health, water, sanitation, educational and religious facilities – with special attention given to the needs of vulnerable groups.

<sup>1</sup> Although Indonesia continues to add to its death toll almost daily, the number of missing remains unchanged. The government has said that it plans to wait for the legally-required one year period before declaring missing persons dead.

Recent assessments - such as the one carried out by the Federation's Recovery Assessment Team (RAT) - combined with information from PMI branches on the ground, are all feeding into the Red Cross and Red Crescent overall plan of action. In addition, the Federation and PMI are regularly re-adjusting their relief activities to better respond to the changing needs of the communities as the situation becomes clearer. This is reflected, for example, in the expansion of Federation / PMI relief activities to include distribution to host families, as well as plans to distribute recovery or clean-up kits (a set of tools and supplies that will assist IDPs in clearing mud and debris from their damaged property). This will not only meet the needs of families who wish to return home and rehabilitate their shops and land, but reduce stress and hazards associated with cleaning property that is so badly damaged.

### **Coordination**

The PMI chairman, the Federation's head of delegation in Jakarta and the ICRC's head of delegation held a very positive and productive meeting with the Indonesian Minister of Planning, who has been given the lead role as coordinator for recovery and reconstruction efforts in the tsunami-affected areas. It was clear that the government considers the Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement (the Movement) as an important partner in Aceh, not only during the initial emergency phase, but for longer-term recovery and rehabilitation. The government recognizes the important and ongoing role that PMI and the Movement play at the local level in Aceh and elsewhere, and the sustainable nature of Red Cross and Red Crescent activity over the longer term. The local presence and long-term commitment of the Red Cross and Red Crescent were underlined as key factors in ensuring that the Movement would continue to play a key role in the longer-term recovery of Aceh and North Sumatra. The minister also agreed to PMI (representing the Movement) having a seat on the board of the newly created government coordination office, which will oversee all recovery and reconstruction activities.

The minister invited the Movement to submit a plan of action outlining its intended recovery and reconstruction activities and the areas in which the Movement could play a role. This will be integrated in the overall government plan for rehabilitation and reconstruction, which is currently being prepared with input from 10 working groups.

The Federation's RAT has finalized its recovery assessment report for Indonesia, following three weeks of field analysis and discussions with the delegation and PMI leadership. The report has been endorsed by PMI and will be integrated into the Red Cross and Red Crescent's overall regional strategy and operational framework in response to the tsunami appeal. The report will also provide the focus for discussions at the Red Cross and Red Crescent coordination meeting with partner national societies (PNSs), being held in Jakarta on 14-15 February.

As part of a joint planning team on assistance to IDPs, the Federation is assisting the UN to develop a humanitarian and early recovery assistance framework for 2005 - the only international organization outside the UN structure invited to do so. The team is divided into various task groups, each dedicated to a separate technical sector, and the Federation is involved in the livelihood and recovery, shelter, and water and sanitation groups. Although the Federation is participating in the planning process, it is by no means bound by the framework, but rather feeding information into the process and assisting in planning. Despite challenges in compiling a general document that suits the agendas of the various NGOs involved, the sector task groups have submitted their working papers on 4 February and the framework is currently being drafted.

### **Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress/achievements, impact, constraints**

The Federation and PMI office in Banda Aceh moved to new facilities on 7 February. Replacements for a number of delegates in the field have now been approved and they will be arriving over the coming weeks. Newly arrived delegates include the returning Federation's logistics coordinator (British Red Cross) for one month while awaiting the confirmation of a longer-term replacement and a Jakarta-based information delegate (Canadian Red Cross) for one year.

As information from the field becomes more and more refined, the Federation/PMI are re-adjusting their relief distribution plans to better suit the needs of the various categories of beneficiaries.

Additional water and sanitation activities have now been set up in and around Banda Aceh, in communities that have not had any regular supply of potable water.

**Overall Goal: Up to 100,000 internally displaced and otherwise affected families (approximately 500,000 people) in western Aceh receive adequate and timely emergency humanitarian assistance over the next six months.**

**Objective 1 (emergency relief): Basic supplementary food and non food needs of the 500,000 IDPs and most vulnerable beneficiaries are met so that they can start rebuilding their future.**

### **Progress / Achievements**

Federation relief distribution activities continue to focus on Lam No, Calang, Teunom, Meulaboh and Simeulue Island, currently targeting 17,800 families (or 89,000 beneficiaries), revised from the 25,400 families targeted as a result of initial assessments – with additional distribution of non-food items for the northeast coast under discussion with ICRC. An up-to-date relief distribution table will be presented in the operations update of 11 February. It should be noted that the targets may be revised further as the operation proceeds.

All areas are being stocked with relief supplies in the warehouses, which have been set up in each hub for this purpose. Food parcels for the complementary food distribution are being procured, to cover 17,800 families for two months, after which the Federation/PMI will look to procuring food parcels locally to support the economic structure of the local community. Procurement is also underway for 17,800 stoves to be distributed in the western coastal region.

Relief activities over the past few days have concentrated on offloading relief supplies, building the Rubb Hall warehouses and moving supplies from existing storage locations into Rubb Halls – particularly in Teunom and Calang.

Two trucks were mobilized to carry 3,200 family kits to a barge that will ship the cargo to Teunom. Due to limited transport in Teunom, distributions have been on hold for two days with efforts concentrating on the offloading of supplies. This has been a continuous challenge but will hopefully be resolved soon with two trucks coming up from Meulaboh. PMI volunteers have reassessed 17 out of 30 communities involved in distribution to determine the movement of IDP populations.

In Calang, the Rubb Hall construction has been completed and 3,400 family kits are currently offshore in an ICRC barge, awaiting an offloader coming north from Meulaboh. In Lam No, coordination between UN bodies, other NGOs and PMI has steadily been improving and PMI is actively coordinating non-food distribution. In Meulaboh, the relief operation is currently finishing the offloading of 13,800 family kits to warehouse (3,200 of which will leave for Teunom by truck, as mentioned above). PMI registration of IDPs is continuing.

Two Japanese Red Cross relief delegates have arrived directly in Medan, and are planning distributions of hygiene kits, food parcels, tarps, blankets and other items in Meulaboh – similar to non-food items currently being distributed by IFRC and PMI. A meeting has been requested by the Federation's relief coordinator in order to discuss the current operation and coordination with PMI in Meulaboh, so as not to duplicate services. It will be advised that the Japanese Red Cross assess the situation south of Meulaboh and in Simeulue for this purpose.

### **Impact**

Non-food relief goods have been distributed to an estimated 86,130 beneficiaries since the beginning of the emergency operation. Distribution has expanded to cover Meulaboh and Simeulue Island, as well as surrounding communities. Relief distribution has been increasing steadily now that the relief pipeline, warehousing and onward transport are all in place.

The newly revised relief plan is designed to accommodate fluctuations and movements of IDPs and disaster-affected persons within the region. The current target population is 17,800 families and reflects the current capacity of the Federation and PMI workers in the field.

### **Constraints**

- Rotations of PMI volunteers and the number of Federation relief delegates in the field continue to determine the capacity to expand the relief distribution programme.
- Estimates of IDPs continue to change, due to population movements and varying living conditions.

- Recent heavy rains have made movement of large quantities of relief supplies difficult due to muddy road conditions.
- Due to the duration of boat trips to Lam No, Calang and Teunom, boats often arrive too late in the day to start offloading (security and other considerations) – which means the boats must stay overnight, thereby affecting optimum efficiency.

**Objective 2 (logistics): PMI will have a strengthened supply chain capability and capacity to ensure timely transport of material and human resources to the areas of operation.**

#### **Progress / Achievements**

A review of logistics reporting is currently underway, which will be adjusted to provide a more complete synopsis of logistics activities to date.

The Federation's relief coordinator has returned to Indonesia, having extended his mission for another month, until a replacement can be found.

With the Hercules C-130 flying its last mission on 8 February, the Batam logistics hub is shifting its activities towards the use of containerized sea cargo. As at 4 February, seven containers had been dispatched to Medan and four were received at Batam. It is anticipated that shipment by sea will become the main transport mode for goods leaving Batam over the coming weeks.

Cooperation and coordination with PMI continues to work well, in particular the clearance of customs goods in and out of Batam.

#### **Impact**

A coordinated logistics operation and team is now in place, with the capability to deliver and store 1,000 metric tons of relief goods per week, as well as ERU equipment and support personnel, using both air and sea routes.

Supply lines have been established to four distribution points (Lam No, Calang, Teunom and Meulaboh), through two marshalling areas (Meulaboh and Banda Aceh), supported by a national and international hub (Medan and Batam, respectively).

#### **Constraints**

Unannounced deliveries to the various hubs – in particular Medan and Banda Aceh – are seriously stretching optimum use of warehouse space and challenging the efficiency of operations.

Rotation of Federation logistics delegates over the past week has been carried out with the appropriate handover, despite extra burdens on existing delegates during the transition. The immediate and urgent operational needs are keeping both Federation and PMI logistics staff fully focused on the requirements of the relief effort and have prevented the team from initiating discussions regarding the strengthening of PMI capacity in this area.

**Objective 3 (health): primary health care service provided to the tsunami-affected communities and potential epidemics are prevented or adequately addressed.**

#### **Progress / Achievements**

*Note: Communications problems in both Medan and Meulaboh have limited information available for today's report.*

#### **German Red Cross' basic health care unit (BHCU) – Teunom**

The BHCU continues to treat on average 75-90 patients per day in the outpatient department and 10-14 admitted patients, mainly with malaria and/or diarrhoea, and a few infected wounds. As of 30 January, a total of 2,519 patients had been treated.

#### **Japanese Red Cross BHCU – Meulaboh**

The Japanese Red Cross and PMI have now established a close and successful collaboration at the BHCU in Meulaboh. The PMI medical team consists of two doctors, two nurses, two midwives and a laboratory technician,

which will rotate on a two-weekly cycle. The teams share overall workload at the BHCU and their respective mobile clinics.

With the PMI team joining the Japanese Red Cross' team from 2 February, the overall number of outpatient department patients has reached 737 up to 4 February.

The Japanese Red Cross' team continues to provide surgical and emergency support to the hospital, with admitted patients stabilizing at 9-12 patients / day and the number of operations down to one per day.

The mobile clinic is pursuing its activities in the outlying areas, in close coordination with the PMI mobile clinic. To date, PMI has conducted clinics in 20 outlying areas, while the Japanese Red Cross has covered nine – providing basic health care, vaccinations and undertaking assessments.

The Japanese Red Cross' ERU team participated in an assessment of health needs on Simeulue Island, looking into the possibility of establishing a mobile clinic. Together with PMI, mobile clinic services were provided on 4-5 February.

A rotation of the Japanese Red Cross team is scheduled for the coming week.

### Impact

There are no reports of abnormal disease outbreaks. The ERU BHCUs and PMI together have offered basic and specialized health care to as many as 78,500 beneficiaries.

**Objective 4 (water and sanitation): the spread/outbreak of infectious diseases is prevented through water and sanitation interventions.**

**Progress / Achievements**

An operational base for the Austrian/Swedish Red Cross Societies' ERU has now been established. The team will be operating in the districts of Bandar Baru and Peuniti in Banda Aceh, where the Ministry of Works has identified a damaged water pumping station. This has been allocated to the ERU for production of water for distribution to the community.

Distribution is planned for three locations:

- Peuniti district, where the Australian Army was supplying water to the community. This has now been handed over to Federation/PMI;
- Bandar Baru, where the pumping pipes have been damaged and the affected population has, as a result, not been receiving a regular supply of water;
- Bandar Aceh University, which has no water supply at the moment and where students are scheduled to return.

The team will identify additional locations as needs arise. To date, the team has cleaned out and rehabilitated four water points in Lhok Kruet (between Calang and Lam No).

The Federation's water and sanitation coordinator has been inspecting the relocation barracks being built by the government, in order to assess whether or not the Red Cross and Red Crescent should have a role in the provision of essential services.

In addition, coordination has been initiated with UNICEF in hygiene promotion, aimed at sharing PMI's activities, materials and resources in the area.

Three Malaysian Red Crescent volunteers have joined the ERUs as water and sanitation trainees and will offer linguistic and cultural support to the ERU teams.

**Meulaboh (Spanish Red Cross ERU)**

An additional specialized water unit has arrived in Banda Aceh and is awaiting transportation to Meulaboh ERU for the operation. The Spanish Red Cross team is also providing the water system setup for the Danish Red Cross' ERU base camp. The team's participation in the Simeulue Island assessment was constrained by time and is incomplete.

**Teunom (German Red Cross ERU)**

The team is producing on average 14,000 litres of drinking water for the community. A total of seven bladders and tap stands have been set up as distribution points for the provision of drinking in the town and IDP settlements. This is in addition to the specialized water being produced for the BHCU and other agencies.

**Sigli and Samalanga (French Red Cross ERU)**

Sigli is set up with a specialized water plant and is currently producing 120,000 litres daily for distribution. In Samalanga, an additional 95,000-litre tank is being set up to increase the availability of water for distribution to the community. Furthermore, an extra 50 tanks of 3,000-litre capacity are being sent from Medan to support the operation, as well as three trucks with 25,000-litre capacity.

### Constraints

- Additional support to the Banda Aceh operation in terms of new facilities and administrative assistance has alleviated some of the constraints on delegates and enabled them to focus more on operations.
- Rotations within the Spanish Red Cross' ERU team have delayed the implementation of sanitation activities, as all efforts continue to focus on the production and distribution of water.
- There is an urgent need for a replacement water and sanitation coordinator to ensure a smooth transition of the operation.
- Rotation of PMI volunteers needs to be more closely managed to ensure smooth transitions, preventing operational delays and optimizing training.

### Objective 5 (telecommunications): fast and reliable means of communication is secured in the areas of the relief operation.

#### Progress / Achievements

A suitable VSAT provider has been found and a contract for two VSAT connections, for Meulaboh and Banda Aceh, is expected to be signed on 9 February. Installation and maintenance will be done by the company, depending on available means of transportation.

A local organization is currently providing internet connections for a number of schools and the university in Banda Aceh, as well as to PMI in Banda Aceh, Teunom and Calang, (as well as other possible locations). The Federation's telecommunications delegate is looking into possible funding of expenses for internet lines and other services.

Ten Thuraya satellite telephones are now available in Banda Aceh for field trips. Depending on needs, some of these phones will be redistributed to the operations hubs along the west coast.

With the Federation's office move of 7 February, a WiFi internet connection will be set up in the new office (assuming line of sight) - otherwise the GAN connection will be used for CCmail and CDMA connections for internet. A wireless network for printing will be set up for the office.

### Constraints

- With only one full-time telecommunications delegate/coordinator, coordination and planning are proving difficult, as support is needed almost every day in different locations. More telecommunications staff has been requested, and is urgently needed.

## Sri Lanka

### Overview

The overall goal of the Federation's appeal is to provide immediate relief, shelter, health and care, and community support for up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) in the south and east of the country over the next six months. There are presently 25 PNS (with more than 200 delegates), in addition to the Federation (including the seven Federation ERUs), working with the Sri Lanka Red Cross Society (SLRCS) in the country.

### Coordination

There are currently 25 PNS present in Sri Lanka and the total number of PNS delegates is more than 200. Many of them are already establishing a longer term office set-up. Below is the most recent summary of PNS showing their current activities/main interests, location and staff set-up in the country.

### Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress/achievements, impact, constraints

**Overall Goal: Up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) in the south of the country receive immediate relief, shelter, health and care, and community support over the next six months.**

**Objective 1 (water and sanitation): Adequate sanitation and water supply provided to a selected number of temporary shelters/welfare centres, and water and sanitation systems to serve the affected population.**

#### Progress / Achievements

The Federation presently helps to provide adequate drinking water to more than 20,500 people per day through the operation of two water sanitation ERUs, run by the German and Swedish Red Cross Societies.

The Federation has also started a programme to improve the existing water supply (estimated cleaning of 1,000 wells) to ensure the targeted population has adequate water in accordance with Sphere standards.

Out of a total of 3,100 wells, 530 have so far been cleaned by the SLRCS branches with support from the Spanish, French, and Netherlands Red Cross Societies in Galle, Kalutara, Hambantota, Ampara and Matara.

**Objective 2 (shelter): Temporary shelter provided to up to 15,000 families (about 75,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have no extended family to live with.**

#### Progress / Achievements

Two American Red Cross' relief ERU teams, located in the southern district of Galle and the eastern district of Ampara, are presently facilitating the distribution of tents and tarpaulins through SLRCS branches to targeted populations.

Some 356 family tents have been distributed in Gampa district by SLRCS to provide displaced people with basic shelter. A further 330 have been distributed in Ampara, 58 in Galle and 20 in Kalutara. On 3 February, a total of 27,662 tarpaulins had been distributed in the seven districts in Sri Lanka where the Federation is providing assistance to affected families.

**Objective 3 (immediate livelihood restoration): The minimum livelihood requirements provided for up to 40,000 families (about 200,000 people) whose houses have been destroyed and have lost their belongings.**

#### Progress / Achievements

As of 7 February, the American Red Cross ERU had facilitated the distribution of non-food relief items (NRFI) from the Federation to 17,807 families on the southern coast of Sri Lanka. A further 4,558 families have received assistance in the eastern district of Ampara since distribution by the American Red Cross started on 26 January. In the west coastal districts of Colombo, Gampaha and Kalutara, distribution has reached a total of 2,848 families. To date, the total number of families receiving non-relief food items is 25,213 or some 122,575 beneficiaries.

## Health

**Objective 4 (health):** A constant, good level of health is ensured for up to 20,000 families (about 100,000 people) through prevention and basic health care, as well as health and hygiene promotion.

### Progress / Achievements

Three Federation ERUs continue to provide health services in the eastern regions of the country. The Finnish Red Cross' BHCU covers the basic health needs of all centres for displaced people between Pottuvil and Kalmunai. The French BHCU covers the south of Pottuvil with mobile health units. The Norwegian Red Cross' BHCU attends to an average of around 200 patients per day. The BHCUs report a need for basic health care training/education and also for psycho-social support in the area of operations. No outbreaks of serious diseases have been observed.

The ERU mobile health teams have reached surrounding areas where there are patients who are unable to access the clinics.

## Logistics

Detailed, consolidated statistics on relief items are in the pipeline, and items in stock will be available in the next few days. Large amounts of relief items have been received in the country assisted by the work of the British Red Cross' logistics ERU, and the American Red Cross' relief/logistics ERU. An average of one to two planes with Federation relief goods arrive in Colombo airport every day.

## Psycho-social Support

Psycho-social programmes are being established by the American and Danish Red Cross Societies, Sri Lanka Red Cross Society (SLRCS) and the Federation. The Turkish Red Crescent also has plans to participate in psycho-social programmes, sending three psycho-social experts as a part of their health initiatives in the country.

There is close cooperation between the American and Danish Red Cross Societies in providing psycho-social support to the affected population.

The Danish Red Cross (DRC) will concentrate on the districts of Hambantota, Ampara, Batticaloa and Trincomalee, where there is a total of over 150,000 families affected by the disaster. DRC has been working in Jaffna district for approximately one year with a psycho-social programme for people affected by the conflict in the area. Initial emergency psycho-social response by DRC will include debriefing of all volunteers who participated in the relief efforts, training of local counsellors to provide training to volunteers and school teachers, and provision of psychological first aid to people in centres for displaced people.

The American Red Cross has established its operations in the south of the country. Initially, the team will focus on training SLRCS volunteers and staff in providing psycho-social first aid, and later also trainers of psycho-social first aid. The Americans initially plan to cover four districts in the south of Sri Lanka, including Galle district, where the relief/logistics ERU is located.

### Capacity of the National Society

The SLRCS special task force, comprising SLRCS management, the Federation and ICRC heads of delegation and PNS in the country, have met to fine tune the national society's plan of action as the operation moves from the emergency relief and assistance phase to the tasks of rehabilitation and reconstruction. Many PNS have expressed their commitment to partner SLRCS for both long and short-term projects.

SLRCS is in the final stages of planning and identifying its needs for the next one to five years in a report to be completed in the coming days. As part of this plan, 10 district coordinating officers will be established in the SLRCS branches in the severely affected areas as focal persons to ensure coordination of the operation at all levels. To complement their efforts, a team will be established at SLRCS headquarters managed by a coordinator. Included in the SLRCS plan of action for organizational development is the strengthening of advocacy, branch development and leadership development. The Federation is supporting SLRCS to build its capacity in order to cope with the magnitude of the operation.

All branches in the disaster-stricken areas of the country have been able to increase their volunteer base, which now stands at 4,500. Training of volunteers in disaster preparedness and basic health care education, psycho-social counselling for volunteers and other psycho-social activities form a part of the SLRCS plan of action.

Distribution of non-food relief items by the national society's branches has been going slowly but smoothly. Key staff working in the Federation's warehouses in Colombo, Galle and Ampara are being trained by the American Red Cross' ERU so that they can take over some of the duties currently being performed by delegates. On the whole, the American Red Cross' ERU is looking to train local staff for long-term logistics positions. Prior to distributions in the eastern district of Ampara, the SLRCS and American Red Cross' ERU trained 40 new and existing volunteers in relief distribution as well as the Movement's principles.

### Communications – Representation, Advocacy and Public Information

Federation information delegates and the media department of the SLRCS continue to provide media coverage, photo exchange, stories and interviews to the local and international media.

## India

### Overview

The Indian government, neighbouring governments and relief agencies are still carrying out recovery and rehabilitation efforts. To help with the recovery and rehabilitation efforts, the state government of Rajasthan has adopted six villages in Tamil Nadu.

According to ReliefWeb sources, 130 international organizations, including UN agencies and Red Cross units, are working in India in the tsunami-affected areas. The sectors that these agencies cover include agriculture,

coordination and support services, education, food, health, infrastructure and rehabilitation, protection/human rights/rule of law, refugees/IDPs, shelter/non-food items and water and sanitation.

### **Indian Red Cross Action**

On Friday, 4 February, the Country Strategy and Operational Framework for India was completed, with the document forwarded to the South Asia Regional Delegation and the desk officer. The document consists of the narrative on core sectors (health, disaster management, organizational development and humanitarian values) for a period of five years (2005 to 2010). However, the budget section covers only the first period, which has been called the short-term recovery phase. The needs are divided into short-, and medium- to long-term recovery periods for which a long-term activity budget will be developed.

In addition to funding, the Indian Red Cross Society (IRCS) has been progressing on the procurement front by calling for material specifications (such as boats, fishing nets and push carts) from the branches, which will be used in local procurement of livelihood equipment. The national headquarters has already circulated the procurement guidelines to the affected branches.

The IRCS staff at national headquarters will follow-up with their respective counterparts at state level on how to handle the new situation which will affect them in terms of procurement procedures, and the financial and narrative reporting required.

IRCS is also stressing the fact that the needs highlighted in the Country Strategy and Operational Framework for India have to be defined and stated very clearly, so that all the partners have the same goals and objectives. The Federation will play an overall coordinating role in the operation along with multilateral obligations.

An IRCS technical assessment team will be formed and plans to go to the field in mid-March to assess the states on various parameters for carrying out the medium- to long-term programmes. The team will also help in identifying areas for state branch capacity building in the areas hit by the tsunami.

As indicated in an earlier operations update report, an advisory group meeting was held on 3 February. The meeting resulted with IRCS putting together a funding plan based on the tentative pledges received by 3 February from various partners. This plan is currently in progress.

## **Maldives**

### **Overview**

During the last week, the UN humanitarian coordinator alerted the international media to the plight of the Maldives and the fact that the needs of the country were being overlooked by the donors. The UN's Flash Appeal for USD 65 million has still not been funded even 50 per cent; with no funds at all received for the shelter programme budgeted at USD 19 million.

The French Red Cross committed to undertake a major project to build 500 houses and associated public buildings and infrastructure (see below for more details).

Though all schools are open and operating at a certain level, major constraints include the replacement of furniture and reprinting of secondary school text books that need to be produced in Dhivehi. The latter will not be ready for distribution from Male until 15 February. Normally, the education sector has 1,200 expatriate teachers. However, 200 teachers have left the country and have decided not to return. This is placing a stress on the teaching system, with some teachers having to teach two full half-day classes.

Concerns in the health sector with doctor shortages seem largely to have been met by the intervention of the Commonwealth Secretariat which has managed to recruit up to 50 doctors.

The degree of damage to the coral reef is currently being surveyed by the Australian team.

### **Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress/achievements, impact, constraints**

**Overall Goal: Tsunami affected families in Maldives receive immediate non-food relief, shelter, electricity, health, water and sanitation services; and a national society is established.**

**Objective 1 (Shelter): Temporary shelter provided for 3,440 families and permanent shelter material provided for 5,500 families whose houses have been completely or badly damaged.**

**Progress/Achievements:**

Some 2,986 sheets of corrugated iron roofing sheets have arrived in the country to assist in the construction of temporary housing. A further 18,000 sheets are on order from the regional delegation and some 7,000 are expected imminently. Approximately 108 sheets have been used in the construction of temporary shelter on an island close the capital's main international airport, housing some 70 displaced individuals. It is expected that a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU), outlining the responsibilities of the Federation and the Maldives government for both temporary housing and the repair of damaged housing, will be finalized soon.

Following the visit from the India delegation's construction delegate, the delegation has revised its plans in terms of building new homes in the various atolls. Rather than providing materials to assist in the government's reconstruction programme, the Federation is now proposing to take responsibility for fully constructing 500 new houses, with countrywide needs being assessed at over 2,000.

The President and representatives of the French Red Cross visited the Maldives on 6-7 February and, after a field visit and discussions with the authorities, signed a tripartite letter of intent with the authorities and the Federation. The society has committed EUR 15 million towards the building of 500 new houses and associated public buildings on the Atoll of Laamu. A French Red Cross delegate remains in the Maldives to develop the project definition.

**Objective 2 (immediate livelihood restoration): electric power restored for 30,000 people and the minimum livelihood requirements supported for 2,000 families whose houses have been destroyed or badly damaged, and have lost their belongings.**

**Progress/Achievements:**

Following the handing over to the Maldives government of 24 generators with a capacity of 1,490 KVA, an additional request for a further eight generators has been received. Of the original 24, 20 are now operational, providing 1,350 KVA of power to 13,778 people. The need for the additional eight generators developed when it was discovered that some of those repaired following the disaster had been too badly affected by sea water to be run efficiently.

In addition, a further 13,800 metres of cabling, and 203 distribution boxes and spare parts are now on order to address the needs of the communities receiving the additional generators.

Following discussions on the ability of the islands' communities to maintain the new generators, it became obvious that while local technicians were generally available to provide simple servicing, they had neither the tools nor adequate basic training. Thus, the Federation will sponsor training courses at the atoll level in which the state-run electrical supply company (Stelco) will provide basic technical training. At each training session, tools and equipment will be supplied to students who pass the course.

The Maldives government has asked the Federation to supply 5,000 mattresses; work is in progress to fill this need.

The delegation is currently negotiating with the Maldives government for the Federation to provide funding for hiring a boat to transport goods from the capital to the outlying islands. Efforts will be made to ensure that any boats so chartered will prioritize the movement of Federation-supplied materials.

**Constraints**

Transportation of materials into the field remains the major constraint.

**Objective 3 (health): the physical and mental health of the affected population is ensured through the provision of needed basic medical supplies and psychosocial support.**

**Progress/Achievements:**

The German Red Cross has signed a MoU with the Maldives government, committing EUR 5 million to provide assistance to reconstruct and provide medical equipment for 15 health posts, six health centres and two hospitals. The German Red Cross will also be assisting with first aid training.

**Objective 4 (water and sanitation): about 5,000 people have access to adequate water and sanitation facilities.**

**Progress/Achievements:**

A water and sanitation delegate is in the field undertaking an assessment in Laamu atoll.

On 5 February, the Penang branch of Malaysian Red Crescent Society (MRCS) handed out 3,465 cartons of fruits that arrived from South Africa via Port Klang, Malaysia. The Penang branch handed these cartons of fruits to tsunami beneficiaries in nine areas on the island, including: Kuala Muda, Pulau Betung, Kuala Sungai Pinang, Pantai Aceh, Tanjung Bunga, Jalan Bahru, Kampung Bangliao, Bagan Jerman and Tanjung Tokong. Each of these areas received grapes, nectarines, peaches, apricots and apples.

MRCS Penang branch is expecting another two forty-foot refrigerated containers to arrive from South Africa after the Chinese New Year celebrations that will contain cartons of fruits for distribution to tsunami survivors in Kedah.

To date, in the north of Malaysia, the Penang branch of MRCS was asked to provide breakfast, lunch and dinner for four consecutive days to the victims at Kuala Muda shelter for approximately 1,000 people. The Penang branch has also given out a total of RM 283,000 (approx CHF 94,334) to all tsunami beneficiaries on the island.
