INDONESIA: YOGYAKARTA EARTHQUAKE

Appeal history:

- Preliminary appeal launched on 27 May 2006 for CHF 12.8 million (USD 10.4 million or EUR 8.2 million) for 8 months to assist 200,000 beneficiaries.
- Revised appeal was launched on 6 June for CHF 38 million to assist 325,000 beneficiaries for 12 months.

Operational Summary: Emergency relief phase has ended, with 124,778 families receiving relief items from the PMI and the Federation. More efforts have now been put on speedy construction of bamboo shelters so that families still living in tents or tarpaulins can move to a walled and roofed structure before heavy monsoon rains start. With more than 4,000 shelters already completed and more than 1,300 under construction, the construction work continues in four districts of Yogyakarta and Central Java provinces.

Although the contributions list show 5 percent as uncovered, the Federation secretariat and PMI have stopped accepting funding for the moment as human resource constraints currently faced by the Federation/PMI are creating challenges in utilizing funds effectively within the given timeframe. However, the needs are there still and the Federation and PMI do not exclude that funding will be accepted at a later stage.

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Background

An earthquake with a magnitude of 6.3 on the Richter scale struck near the city of Yogyakarta in central Java at 05:54 hrs local time on 27 May 2006 causing extreme and widespread destruction. There has been considerable loss of lives and injuries with villages in remoter areas south of Yogyakarta, as well as in and around Bantul being the most affected. The latest official figures remain at 5,749 people killed, over 38,000 injured and more than 127,000 houses completely destroyed, with over 450,000 additional houses damaged by the earthquake. It is estimated that 1,173,742 people were made homeless. The earthquake epicentre was located some 20 km southeast of Yogyakarta at a depth of 10 km. Tremors were felt across the region, as far away as Semarang and Surabaya on the opposite coast of Java.

Operational developments

Five and a half months after the earthquake, many of the affected families still live in make-shift shelters of tents and tarpaulins. The Federation, working with the Indonesian Red Cross (PMI), continue to support the construction of bamboo shelters in four of the most affected districts of Yogyakarta and central Java provinces, with more than 4,000 shelters already completed and more than 1,300 under construction.

The emergency relief distribution phase has ended, with more than 124,000 families receiving relief support from the PMI and the Federation.

The monsoon preparedness activities have shown positive results. PMI Klaten branch responded immediately after a storm hit some areas of the district on 8 November and distributed monsoon preparedness relief goods.

Some activities, such as health and sanitation slowed down during the reporting period because of the week-long *Eid el Fitr* holidays. These activities have now resumed and will move ahead with the PMI taking the lead role after the workshop scheduled for the third week of November.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action - objectives, progress, impact

Emergency relief (food, non-food and emergency shelter)

Overall Goal: Beneficiaries have the necessary immediate support to meet their basic needs for food, non-food items and shelter until their permanent needs are met for the long-term.

Objectives:

- **Food:** 65,000 families (approximately 325,000 beneficiaries) have supplementary food support until such time as they are able to resume their own income generating activities.
- **Non-food items:** 65,000 families (approximately 325,000 beneficiaries) have the necessary household items and basic economic support to restore domestic stability and their own capacity to initiate their recovery is reinforced.
- **Emergency shelter:** 65,000 families (approximately 325,000 beneficiaries) are provided with the appropriate type of emergency shelter, tools and materials to support their immediate recovery needs, with consideration of temporary, intermediate requirements for coping with the pending monsoon rain season that normally starts in September/October.

The PMI and the Federation have completed emergency relief distribution, having distributed relief items to 124,778 families in earthquake affected areas of Yogyakarta and central Java. Out of this number, more than

65,000 families were provided with a relief package consisting of family kits, food and hygiene parcels, baby kits (to families having children below five years of age), sleeping mats and tents or tarpaulins. The rest of the families received relief items based on their needs.

Almost 100,000 families received relief support of food and hygiene parcels and more than 123,000 received tents or tarpaulins.

The most affected districts of Bantul and Klaten have the highest number of families receiving relief support. A total of 47,243 families in Bantul and 38,181 families in Klaten received support. Recovery tool kits (9,610) were distributed to 48,050 families in Bantul, Klaten, Kulon Progo and Gunung Kidul districts (please refer to distribution table below).

In addition to these relief items, the PMI also distributed household items like bed sheets, jerry-cans and stoves from stock received from Medan.

At the end of distribution, PMI branches in Bantul, Klaten, Gunung Kidul and Sleman organized lessons learnt exercises to review emergency relief distribution and develop a better response mechanism for the future. The branches identified the support from neighbouring district branches, PMI headquarters, the Federation, and the trust of the community and adequate communication systems as their strengths. A lack of knowledge and experience in relief work and an inadequate number of volunteers were identified as their weaknesses. Their recommendations include the need for disaster response training; the need to disseminate Red Cross and Red Crescent messages among beneficiary communities, and the need to enhance coordination between PMI branches and volunteers.

In preparation of the monsoon, some emergency relief stock (3,400 tarpaulins, 3,000 hygiene parcels, 3,000 food parcels, 1,400 baby kits and 4,400 sleeping mats) were dispatched to PMI branches. These items were part of the stock remaining at the Federation warehouse where items like sandbags and blankets still remain in the pipeline.

In the meantime, the first showers of the monsoon rain hit the earthquake-affected area of Klaten district on 8 November. Strong gusts of wind preceding the rain affected more than 30 families in Polanharjo sub-district, sweeping away the roofs of some temporary shelters. The PMI Klaten branch immediately reached the affected area and distributed food parcels, hygiene kits and sleeping mats to 28 families within 24 hours.

Early recovery/ shelter

The construction of emergency shelters continues, with more than 4,000 bamboo shelters already completed and 1,300 under construction. Most of these shelters have been constructed in Gantiwarno and Dlingo sub-districts of Klaten and Bantul.

Throughout the two sub-districts, shelters are being completed every day and families are moving their possessions into their new homes. Communities are committed to construct houses fast in order to move in before the start of heavy rains. Shelter construction has also started in two sub-districts in two new districts; Kulon Progo and Sleman and two new sub-districts in Bantul and Klaten.

The communities divide their time between income generating activities and shelter construction through *gotong royong* (a local Javanese community cooperative practice). In many communities, people engage in income generating activities during the day and *gotong royong* at night. Although the construction of shelters through these community-built programmes is behind schedule, these programmes have witnessed a higher degree of success because of the strong community involvement.

PMI volunteers continue to work with target communities to assist the most vulnerable families. To fulfil the increasing demand of volunteers for shelter construction support, PMI Klaten branch has requested 130 more volunteers from unaffected branches in central Java.

The PMI and the Federation continue to organize training for new volunteers joining the early recovery team. The volunteers undergo an intensive three-day residential basic recovery training, which includes field work simulations, and are immediately assigned to field work after the training. In the last week of October and the first week of November, three trainings were organized for about 120 volunteers.

The trainings and field work have increased the capacity of PMI volunteers. Volunteers are now facilitating more than 75 percent of early recovery trainings.

In addition to financial assistance for shelter construction, the Federation and PMI are working with local organizations to share information on safe construction. As part of recovery assistance, a series of 12 “safe house principles” were published in a local newspaper to help communities make informed decisions about reconstruction. Based on the positive response to this series, a newspaper has offered three days of free space for a question and answer (Q&A) segment on technical aspects of shelter construction. The PMI/ Federation are working with a local university to answer such questions through the newspaper.

The 12 principles of safe construction are also being developed into a 2007 calendar, for distribution in Yogyakarta and central Java.

In the meantime, the PMI and the Federation are supporting a faculty of a local university (Gaja Madah University) to train a team of 30 community facilitators to conduct evening sessions on “safe construction in earthquake areas” in and around areas where Federation and PMI have supported with shelter construction. These sessions will include dissemination of information on earthquakes, bad and good building techniques being used in the areas and possible solutions to poor construction aspects.

A team of lecturers from a local university (Atma Jaya University), with which the Federation and the PMI have been working together for shelter construction support, is undertaking an assessment of the shelters built in Dlingo. The team will inspect houses for earthquake resistance and houses which are found to be having a high risk of not withstanding even a minor earthquake will be advised to make adjustments so that they can resist future earthquakes.

The Federation and PMI branches are discussing how additional support could be delivered to communities through volunteers helping with early recovery work. A PMI training system, along with other community-based approaches often undertaken by PMI throughout Indonesia, is being studied for possibilities to develop early recovery intervention as an integrated and community driven recovery process.

Health and Care

Overall goal: The mortality and morbidity amongst the affected population is reduced to pre-disaster levels by addressing immediate basic health care needs and future health risks through preventative and basic health care interventions.

The health situation in the earthquake affected areas is stable during the reporting period.

Objective 1: To provide psycho-social support programmes (PSP) to affected communities in districts severely affected by the earthquake and to PMI volunteers supporting the response.

PMI continues to provide psycho-social support in Bantul and Klaten districts. Working bilaterally with the Netherlands Red Cross, the PMI conducted school- and community-based psycho-social programmes in ten schools and nine villages in each district. A total of 215 school teachers and 826 community people participated in these programmes.

PMI central Java chapter organized training on PSP on 6 to 11 November. About 43 participants, including 18 volunteers from central Java and Yogyakarta took part in the training. The Federation and the PMI also sent PSP volunteers to attend a workshop on 'the psychology of disaster' which was organized by a local university in the third week of November.

Objective 2: Reduce the impact of the most common diseases and ailments seen in post disaster situations, including epidemics.

PMI branches are preparing for possible health emergencies during the monsoon season. Emergency first aid kits, sufficient for 50 patients, have been distributed to eight branches as part of contingency plans.

The joint health and sanitation promotion campaign using a weekly radio programme continues.

Objective 3: To provide 325,000 beneficiaries with access to preventive, basic clinical and physical health and rehabilitation services.

Rehabilitation and home based care: The PMI home care team in Bantul continues to provide outreach services especially to families with disabled or severely injured members requiring long term care. The PMI home care team treats about 30 patients a week, visiting most of patients daily or every alternate day. A majority of patients receive dressings for their sores while severe cases are referred to a local hospital.

The Bantul physiotherapy team saw approximately 200 patients in October. The team made 140 home visits and 60 patients visited the clinic. The three most common cases afflicting patients are fractured humerus, fractured tibias/fibulas and fractured femurs. In the meantime, Klaten branch has started preparation to provide home care and rehabilitation services.

Objective 4: To support and coordinate efforts with Movement partners and international partners in support to the PMI and its government (MOH).

Objective 5: To ensure the target population has access to adequate and safe water supply, sanitation and hygiene promotion, materials and facilities to prevent significant outbreaks of water supply, sanitation and hygiene related disease.

As a result of the comparatively long dry season, wells in some villages became dry during the reporting period. However, the start of the monsoon rain is expected to fill them up very soon.

The PMI, with support from the Federation, continues to help communities clean wells. An additional 428 wells were cleaned during this period, bringing the total number of cleaned wells to 1,378. The Federation and the PMI plan to clean 2,000 wells by the end of November.

The trucking of water to the population affected by Mt. Merapi will continue until there is adequate water supply, presumably December.
