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Emergency Appeal Turkey: Van Earthquake

This revised Emergency Appeal has a budget of CHF 9,402,445. There is a need still to cover CHF 4,865,091 in cash, kind, or services to support the Turkish Red Crescent Society (TRCS) to assist 10,000 households (60,000 beneficiaries based on revised assessment figures) for 12 months. The operation will be completed by 10th November 2012. A Final Report will be made available by the end of January 2013.

Appeal history:

- This **Emergency Appeal** was launched on a preliminary basis on 26 October 2011 for CHF 10,421,025 for the period of nine months to assist 10,000 households (50,000 beneficiaries). On 16 November 2011 the level of the appeal coverage reached 44% of the budget of the preliminary emergency appeal, through firm cash pledges and confirmed in-kind contributions
- **Operations Updates no. 1, 2 and 3** were issued on 1st, 4th and 10th November 2011.
- After the recent earthquakes of 9 November 2011, this revised appeal reflects the changing needs and complements the efforts of the Turkish National Society, and is based on the joint needs assessment of the affected population conducted by the Turkish Red Crescent in cooperation with the local authorities.

Summary: Since the earthquake that hit Eastern Turkey on 23 October 2011, 2,337 aftershocks have been registered. More than six hundred people lost their lives, and more than 2,500 were injured and hospitalised. Due to the high number of damaged buildings and the continued risks, a large number of families are forced to stay in temporary shelters.

In the evening of 9 November, two more earthquakes shook the Van province. The first one was of the magnitude of 5.6 on the Richter scale, and seven minutes later another tremor hit with a magnitude of 4.5 degrees. 25 buildings collapsed but 23 of them were fortunately empty, following the previous earthquake. Two hotels collapsed and at least 40 people were reported dead. 30 people have been rescued so far. The Turkish Red Crescent immediately dispatched 15,000 tents and 300 rescue workers to meet the increased needs after the latest developments.

Damage assessment conducted after the first quake on 23 October stated that 2,900 houses had collapsed, 25,750 buildings were severely damaged and rendered inhabitable, and 40,800 houses were damaged but remained habitable.

The Turkish Red Crescent immediately mobilized its relief and human resources to respond to the disaster. The National Society is providing hot meals and drinks three times a day. In addition, more than 122,000 blankets and over 46,000 tents were dispatched to the affected area. The above quantities include in-kind donations received by the Turkish Red Crescent in response to the Federation's preliminary appeal during the first two weeks after the disaster. This assistance was considered sufficient to cover the emergency humanitarian needs (relief items and emergency shelter) of the affected population. Therefore, on 4th November 2011 the Turkish Red Crescent informed the Federation that further mobilisation and delivery of tents, blankets and sleeping bags would no longer be required.

Further assessment of the physical damage and a more detailed identification of the number of homeless people conducted by Turkish Red Crescent, the Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Agency (AFAD) and local authorities, provided an outline of the humanitarian needs of the affected population, especially in view of the quickly deteriorating weather conditions. Therefore, transitional shelter solutions have been defined as the highest priority in view of the upcoming winter.

This Revised Emergency Appeal reflects these newly identified priorities and further complements the efforts of the Turkish Red Crescent. It has been prepared in close cooperation with the Turkish National Society to ensure that the basic needs of the vulnerable population be met.

The International Federation offers its sincere gratitude to those National Societies (Norwegian Red Cross, Belgian Red Cross - Flanders, Netherlands Red Cross, Finnish Red Cross, Red Crescent Society of the United Arab Emirates, Canadian Red Cross, Icelandic Red Cross, American Red Cross, Chinese Red Cross – Hong Kong Branch, Australian Red Cross), individual and institutional donors (Canadian Government, New Zealand Government, USAID/OFDA, OPEC, VERF/WHO Voluntary Emergency Relief) that have contributed to this Appeal.

The situation

An earthquake measuring 7.2 on the Richter scale with its epicentre in Tabanlı Village struck Van Province, at 13:41 on 23 October 2011. The Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Agency (AFAD) reported that to date, a total of 2,337 aftershocks have occurred in the affected area.

A technical committee of 20 personnel from the government and 200 technical personnel from different provinces have conducted damage assessment. According to the results there are 25,750 buildings severely damaged and rendered inhabitable and 2,900 completely collapsed. Also there are 40,800 buildings slightly damaged but usable for accommodation. Authorities have strictly forbidden entry to damaged buildings. Continued concerns after so many aftershocks have reportedly forced the local population to move to temporary shelters, or to friends or relatives in neighbouring villages.

During the emergency search and rescue, medical and first aid personnel from 48 different provinces and 39 different institutions were dispatched and deployed to the region by air and land. 37 Turkish Airlines aircraft, 44 military planes and 18 special cargo airplanes have been involved in this ongoing operation. A transportation chain of 12 aircraft (nine civilian and three military ones) continued operating an airlift of tents and blankets to the affected areas.

30 field tents were set up by the Government to deliver psycho-social and public services to people in need.

WHO is in close contact with the Ministry of Health to monitor the health situation and public health needs in the affected area and to provide assistance as needed according to their plan of action.

In the evening of 9 November, two more earthquakes shook Van province. The first one was of the magnitude 5.6 degrees on the Richter scale, and seven minutes later another tremor hit with a magnitude of 4.5. As a result, 25 buildings collapsed, but 23 of them were empty due to the evacuation procedures. Two hotels were destroyed and at least 40 people were reported dead. 30 people were rescued, and search and rescue activities were finalised. Search and rescue efforts are continuing.

The rugged terrain of this mountainous area is posing a logistical challenge to providing people with emergency shelters. Due to freezing temperatures and snow, hypothermia and respiratory tract infections are serious additional concerns. Therefore it has been decided to concentrate on transitional shelter solutions as more effective means of protecting people against winter weather.

Coordination and partnerships

Movement coordination: The International Federation's Europe Zone office is in regular contact with the Turkish Red Crescent, which has been leading the operational response on the ground since the first minutes of the disaster. Daily telephone conferences have been organised with the management of the National Society and with its operational and crisis centre teams, to facilitate the coordination of the response activities. Information is regularly shared with the Turkish National Society about donor contributions. The Turkish Red Crescent Society has been issuing daily operations updates and providing additional information to the International Federation's Europe Zone office.

The International Federation's Global Logistics Services (GLS) are supporting the mobilization of the response in kind and are interacting with contributing partners, however, the Turkish Red Crescent will manage logistics processes for in country procurement of the transitional shelters.

Campaigns and appeals to help Turkish Red Crescent to meet their objective of getting aid to 60,000 people are under way in the National Societies of Australia, Austria, Azerbaijan, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Canada, China, Croatia, Finland, Georgia, Great Britain, the Netherlands, Germany, Hungary, Iran, Ireland, Italy, Malta, Montenegro, New Zealand, Norway, Qatar, Romania, Serbia, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Syria, Ukraine, and the USA.

Coordination with authorities: The Turkish Red Crescent acts as an auxiliary to public services responsible for intervention in the event of disasters, in conjunction with state agencies such as the Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Agency, the fire-fighting department and health services. All activities in the field are being coordinated at the central level by the Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Agency (AFAD). The distribution of relief items is under the responsibility of AFAD and Turkish Red Crescent (TRCS).

The Turkish Red Crescent Society has launched a national fundraising campaign which has resulted by now in raising almost CHF 20,000,000.

Inter-agency coordination: IOM and OCHA have met with representatives of the Turkish Red Crescent Society to discuss gaps in the assistance currently being provided and any potential support that could be provided by international agencies. Information is regularly shared between the Turkish Red Crescent and those agencies.

UNICEF is, jointly with the rapid assessment team of the Ministry of National Education, assessing additional needs in the area of psychosocial support.

On 31 October, the EU and the Turkish Red Crescent signed an IPA grant agreement for the supply of temporary housing units in the forms of prefabricated houses for approximately 6,000 people that were rendered homeless after the earthquake.

The Turkish authorities discussed with the Monitoring and Information Centre (MIC) of the European Union the ongoing and evolving shelter needs and solutions for the quake-affected areas.

Red Cross and Red Crescent action

Overview

The Turkish Red Crescent has made all its emergency response units (five regional, two local and one national) fully operational and has established a Crisis Management Desk in the Disaster Management Centre at its headquarters in Ankara, plus four regional and several local Disaster Management centres. In order to meet the most urgent shelter and food needs, relief items have been delivered to the field and distributed to the affected population. Information from the field has been gathered in the Crisis Desk of the Disaster Operation Centre and is being regularly shared with partners.

Sheltering activities: Within the first ten days after the earthquake of 23 October the Turkish Red Crescent delivered more than 46,000 tents, 123,000 blankets, 6,000 sleeping bags to the affected population. Delivery also included relief goods received by the Federation's preliminary appeal or through bilateral contributions. The Turkish Red Crescent responded to the emergency by establishing tent and Mevlana house cities to accommodate the affected population. A settlement plan has been prepared by the National Society and the local authorities for the 2,000 container houses (7x3=21m² including bath, WC and kitchen) to be established in the Erciş District of Van. An infrastructure works bid for the container houses has been completed by the relevant government body. Arrangements are still in progress. More details on sheltering activities are given below under the planned operation.

Nutrition activities: As at 14 November, the Turkish Red Crescent is providing approximately 307,500 meals (hot meals, hot drinks and bread three times a day) to approximately 23,350 beneficiaries and rescue workers.

Psycho-social support activities:

Psychosocial support services are being provided for the affected population in Van Province Centre and Erciş District by 21 specialists and 5 National Society staff, who came from different provinces of Turkey. Daily, 3,500 beneficiaries are being reached with psychosocial support.

Informative meetings with adolescents on the psychosocial effects of disasters and on ways to cope with them, such as games and painting activities with children, were organized in psychosocial tents in Yenişehir Stadium and Belediye Stadium Tent Cities.

Children who urgently need support were identified through surveillance and contacted by the child psychiatrists. Information meetings on children's reaction in the post-disaster period and on methods to help them were organized for women. Red Crescent volunteers are working on the needs and psychosocial assessment of families whose relatives were lost and those vulnerable families who are not able to access the tent cities and are living close to their houses.

Volunteering activities:

A team of 27 community leaders continue their activities, such as setting up water and sanitation facilities in the tent and Mevlana house cities and distributing identity cards for beneficiaries. Plans were made for the distribution of goods from the depots of Erciş Team Presidency to the city and to the worst damaged villages.

Blood donation services: Turkish Red Crescent Regional Blood Centre based in Van communicated immediately with hospitals in the affected area and created additional stocks of blood for the hospitals. The level of blood stocks was increased with the transportation of 350 units of blood, especially of the Rh negative blood group, from Erzurum Regional Blood Centre, one hour after the earthquake. After the re-opening of the airport, a total stock of 18,000 units of erythrocyte suspension was sent to Van from other regional blood centres for the purpose of stock replenishment. Stocks of blood have been continuously replenished whenever they fell below 800 units. Erzurum and Ankara Regional Blood Centres are also creating additional blood stocks for the replenishment of supply to the affected areas in case of need. Turkish Red Crescent is self-reliant in terms of the blood service and able to cover the blood requirements of the health institutions upon their request.

The needs

Following the results of the joint assessment of the physical damage to buildings and of the humanitarian needs of the affected population conducted by Turkish Red Crescent, the Prime Ministry Disaster and Emergency Management Agency (AFAD) and the local authorities, the provision of transitional shelters has been defined as the highest priority, especially in view of the upcoming winter.

The results of the joint assessment have shown that an average family consists of **six persons**. Therefore the transitional shelter activities were calculated in line with this latest information and not according to the SPHERE standards used in the Preliminary Appeal.

For the coming twelve months, the Turkish Red Crescent Plan of Action will focus on relief and early recovery activities. Given the changing context — including the ongoing assessments by governmental and non-governmental institutions — the Turkish Red Crescent strategy has been adjusted over the course of the operation as per identified needs and stated priorities of the affected population.

In addition to the transitional shelters, that will replace the provision of emergency shelters, the population will also be provided with food and non-food relief items in accordance with their identified needs.

The National Society has defined the following criteria for the selection of beneficiaries:

- Most vulnerable households with minors, older people or people living with disabilities;
- Single-mother households;
- Families living in temporary makeshift emergency shelters;
- Displaced families whose living facilities have completely been destroyed.

The proposed operation

Relief distributions (food and basic non-food items)

Progress:

This objective responds to the needs identified during the initial assessments. The Turkish Red Crescent provided hot meals and basic non-food items (NFIs) including blankets, sleeping bags and heaters to 10,000 households (50,000 people).

All the beneficiaries are being selected through their existing situation in coordination with local authorities and Van Provincial Crisis Management Centre. The priority is to cover the needs of beneficiaries who have lost their houses and own highly or moderately damaged houses by providing shelter items.

Since the beginning of the operation, the Turkish Red Crescent has dispatched and distributed 122,701 blankets and 5,917 sleeping bags to cover the needs of the affected population (more than 150,000 beneficiaries) with non-food items. These figures include the in-kind contributions (65,580 blankets and 17,232 sleeping bags) received in response to the Federation's preliminary appeal as well as the goods delivered through other channels, such as bilateral contributions received from the Austrian, German, Swiss, Japanese, Iranian, Iraqi and Syrian Red Cross/Crescent Societies. The Turkish Red Crescent has therefore exceeded the preliminary emergency appeal targets for relief distributions.

Thanks to the timely contributions from sister National Societies and national public campaigns, sufficient quantities of the relief items needed during the initial stage of the emergency have been delivered to the areas affected by the two consecutive earthquakes. Distribution to the beneficiaries was organised according to the coordinated plan of action by the Turkish authorities with Turkish Red Crescent support. No further contributions under this objective are needed.

Up to 10,000 households (50,000 people) will be provided with access to reasonably healthy, safe and dignified emergency shelters. This objective of the preliminary emergency appeal has been implemented through distribution of non-food items mentioned in the previous objective (blankets, sleeping bags, heaters) accompanied with water and sanitation as well as hygiene promotion actions (led by Turkish Red Crescent as its part of its broad response and therefore not reflected in this revised Emergency Appeal).

Progress: 46,744 tents have been delivered in the field and used in five tent cities as well as distributed directly to families living near their damaged houses. These figures include the in kind contributions (3,970

tents) received in response to the Federation's preliminary appeal as well as the goods delivered through other channels such as bilateral contributions received from the Austrian, German, Swiss, Japanese, Iranian, Iraqi and Syrian Red Cross/Crescent Societies. The tent cities provide shelter for 3,840 beneficiaries (768 families).

In all tent cities, Turkish Red Crescent is responsible for the provision of all required services except for health care. The health care services have been and continue to be under the responsibility of the Ministry of Health. The infrastructure facilities are being provided by the Van Governorate and Van Municipality at local level and the Ministry of Environment and Urban Planning at central level.

Two Mevlana house cities have been established in Van and in Erciş with 518 Mevlana houses set in the latter and providing shelter for 1,064 beneficiaries (266 families). In addition, 2,208 Mevlana houses were also delivered to the affected areas and are being used for settlements and for individual needs (552 families).

A Mevlana house is a 10.5 square metre shelter unit. Each house can accommodate four persons. They are suitable for winter conditions due to their polyurethane thermal insulation. The wiring system helps beneficiaries to use electricity. Within 5 minutes, the installation of the house can be completed.

As of now the Turkish Red Crescent has provided shelter for 241,819 beneficiaries (approximately 48,363 families) through its own stocks, bilateral and multilateral contributions. Turkish Red Crescent Society is finalizing needs assessments in the affected areas in cooperation with Van Governorship, to take stock of the current needs and move into transitional shelter as part of the next phase of the emergency.

Thanks to the timely contributions from sister National Societies and national public campaigns, sufficient quantities of the relief items that were needed during the initial stage of the emergency were delivered to the areas affected by two consecutive earthquakes. Distribution to the beneficiaries was organised according to the coordinated plan of action by the Turkish authorities with the support of the Turkish Red Crescent. No further contributions under this objective are needed.

Given the size of the disaster, the Turkish authorities cannot provide permanent shelter to all the affected people in the short term through the reconstruction of damaged buildings or building new ones. Thus, many people are at risk of spending the winter in tents. Given the fact that winter temperatures in the affected area routinely drop to 10 degrees below zero, the Turkish Red Crescent defined, as its primary objective, the provision of prefabricated houses as means of transitional shelter to the identified most vulnerable groups from within the affected population.

Also, results of the joint assessment have shown that the average family size in the region is six persons. Therefore the transitional shelter activities have been calculated in line with this latest information.

According to the settlement plan of the Turkish Red Crescent and the local authorities, the operation targets a total of 12,000 beneficiaries (2,000 families – families which have already received emergency shelter solutions) in Van province and Erciş district, not receiving support from other organizations. The targeting of the beneficiaries is being conducted in close consultation with local authorities, community leaders and Turkish Red Crescent volunteers.

At the moment 900 prefabricated houses are being procured using European Union IPA funds¹ according to a contract signed on 31 October between the Turkish Red Crescent and the EU delegation in Ankara.

This Revised Emergency Appeal seeks support to enable the Turkish Red Crescent to procure (according to the Turkish Red Crescent rules and procedures) and provide for the remaining 1,100 prefabricated houses.

A prefabricated house will have the following specifications:

- It is a minimum of 21 square metres in size with kitchen, shower, toilet, electricity installations and living space.
- It is built of steel in accordance with international standards and assembled without welding so it can be modified and easily dismantled. The outer and inner wall will be galvanised, filled with polyurethane and with panels providing insulation.
- It has adequate sanitation: wall-mounted wash basin, toilet and reservoir, acrylic shower tray (80x80 cm)
- Accessories: liquid soap dish (plastic), paper towel hanger (plastic), mirror (framed with plastic), shelves (plastic), toilet tissue dish, foam rubber dish (acrylic), shower hanger (plastic) shower curtain (textile), electric water heater (30 lt.), lavatory combination faucet (cold and hot type), spiralled shower faucet (cold and hot type).
- Kitchen cupboard: The size of the lower part will be 60x80 cm, melamine coated chipboard body, laminated flooring cover and kitchen top, stainless steel kitchen sink, sink faucet (cold and hot type).

Logistics

Under the preliminary emergency appeal, logistics support has been provided by IFRC Global Logistics Service (GLS) following Federation procedures to source and procure the relief and shelter items needed, and to ensure the efficient and timely delivery of these items.

Following the launch of the Preliminary Emergency Appeal, a mobilization table has been set up and managed by the GLS from the Federation Europe Zone, in close coordination with the TRCS and Dubai RLU.

Responding to the needs expressed in the mobilization table, 23,500 thermal blankets, 17,222 sleeping bags and 3,970 family tents have been mobilized through in-kind donations and international procurement by Dubai RLU.

Relief items have been delivered to Erzurum, Van and Ankara TRCS reception centres. TRCS managed all in country logistics including further despatch of relief items to the designated areas.

GLS issued Commodity Tracking Numbers for the items despatched through the mobilization table and provided Goods Received Notes back to the donors. All the needs requested through the mobilization table have been covered.

Now the focus will be on the provision of prefabricated houses and in this phase, Turkish Red Crescent will manage the process for tendering and procuring the 1,100 transitional shelters through their own procedures in country.

Communications – Advocacy and public information

The Turkish Red Crescent and the Federation communications teams will work closely together to position and promote the Red Crescent emergency and early recovery operation, ensuring a steady flow of timely and accurate information targeted at key stakeholders including the media, National Societies, and prospective donors.

¹ The Instrument for Pre-Accession Assistance (IPA) offers assistance to countries engaged in the accession process to the European Union (EU) for the period 2007-2013. The aim of the IPA is therefore to enhance the efficiency and coherence of aid by means of a single framework in order to strengthen institutional capacity, cross-border cooperation, economic and social development and rural development. Pre-accession assistance supports the stabilisation and association process of candidate countries and potential candidate countries while respecting their specific features and the processes in which they are engaged.

This will build on the already extensive media coverage existing from the first days of this disaster. Articles and blogs on themes relating to the humanitarian situation and the Turkish Red Crescent response will be promoted through the Federation communications channels including the Turkish Red Crescent website, the news section of www.ifrc.org as well as relevant social media platforms. Press releases and audio-visual contents will be shared with media outlets and story ideas and spokespeople on the ground will be pitched to key broadcasters.

In addition, updates on the evolving humanitarian situation and Turkish Red Crescent action will be maintained on [DMIS](#).

Capacity of the Turkish Red Crescent Society

Since the 1999 earthquake operation, the Turkish Red Crescent Society has grown immensely and acquired new capacities. These capacities include expertise in relief, shelter and livelihoods.

The National Society headquarters have experienced and dedicated staff on Disaster Management as well as a Disaster Crisis centre.

At the moment, the National Society has 191 people deployed and active in the implementation of the response operation – 138 professional associates, 18 temporary local staff and 35 experienced and trained volunteers. In total 40 vehicles are being used in the response operation. For the transportation of the relief items to the region, 568 lorries and trucks have been deployed. 76 air shipment operations have been completed or still in progress.

Additionally, preparation works on “Long Term Projects” that are planned to be conducted with the agencies and institutes that want to help the affected region.

Capacity of the IFRC

The International Federation Secretariat through its Budapest based Zone Office for Europe is supporting the Turkish National Society response operation in accordance with the stated needs. The Federation has helped provide the initial relief items (supplied by sister national societies), and it has developed, along with TRCS, the Plan of Action and is assisting with logistics, technical support and advice.

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How we work

All IFRC assistance seeks to adhere to the Code of Conduct for the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement and Non-Governmental Organizations (NGO's) in Disaster Relief and the Humanitarian Charter and Minimum Standards in Disaster Response (Sphere) in delivering assistance to the most vulnerable.
