Programme summary: Polio vaccination coverage in the sub-region has begun improving since the Kano State government dropped its moratorium on immunizations. The supply of computers and furniture to the offices of the [Nigerian Red Cross Society](#), through the organizational development (OD) programme, improved the capacity of several branches. Members received training in software and internet skills to improve communication and reporting. More Federation/Nestlé HIV/AIDS information booklets were distributed throughout Nigeria. Implementation of health and disaster preparedness programmes of the Nigeria Red Cross needs to be stepped up to meet their targets. Training has been identified in programme reporting to improve the quality of analysis and result-based reports.

The Federation and its partners have worked with the Central Committee of the [Ghana Red Cross Society](#) to implement a restructuring plan agreed by the national society and stakeholders to resolve the financial and administrative challenges and set up a functioning governance and management system for the national society. Furthermore, a coordinated Federation and ICRC approach is to resolve the constitutional and management problems of the [Benin Red Cross Society](#). The [Togolese Red Cross Society](#) was also assisted in extending its health programming.

Operational Development

National elections for local government were held in Nigeria in March 2004.. In Plateau and Kano States, the elections were characterized by ethnic conflicts which resulted in several deaths and injuries especially in Yelwa town, Plateau State, as well as other communities. Displaced persons took refuge in Nassarawa and Bauchi States. The Nigeria Red Cross volunteers evacuated wounded persons and provided non-food assistance to displaced persons. A coordinated ICRC/Federation approach further strengthened the national society's information and resources exchange.

Preparations to undertake a review of the Nigerian Red Cross HIV/AIDS programme in June 2004 have been finalized.

Health and Care

Major health activities for the reporting period focused on key areas such as national training on peer education in the 12 HIV/AIDS project branches. Others are First Aid, School Units, WatSan, as well as a Knowledge, Attitude, Practice and Behavior (KAPB) survey. When meningitis was reported in Jigawa State in February, the branch's Red Cross volunteers carried out a health education campaign to create public awareness.

Goal: Morbidity and Mortality rate in Nigeria are reduced

Objective: The capacity of the Nigerian Red Cross is enhanced in delivering efficient services in improving the health of the vulnerable by the end of 2007.

Expected Result 1: The Nigerian Red Cross gains increased visibility, recognition and relevance to more people in the social context.

Progress

A new training officer was engaged to improve the quality of First Aid services. The headquarters and 37 branches of the national society conducted 10 courses on First Aid at work in which more than 24 persons participated. In addition, the branches implemented several First Aid activities to increase public awareness.

With support from the British Red Cross, two officers from the national society headquarters attended a six-week First Aid Course/Rescue Development in the UK. The Nigerian Red Cross produced 50 copies of their First Aid Manual.

In January, the national society also organized a training on standard First Aid for branch' training officers and coordinators in 14 state branches, namely; Kogi, Sokoto, Kano, Nassarawa, Ekiti, Delta, Borno, Bauchi, Kebbi, Niger, Ogun, Cross – River, Abia and Ebonyi.

Impact

There is an increased volunteer First Aid skill and an improved capacity within the communities to manage accidents with effective First Aid administration.

Expected Result 2: Community Based Health activities have been implemented by Red Cross School Units and Road Safety Clubs, and Health action Teams

Progress

After the training of unit leaders of 12 branches on school unit activities, there were step – down trainings conducted between February and March in the programme branches namely; Anambra, Kebbi, Bauchi, Niger, Kogi, Ogun, Edo, Kano, Kwara, Osun, Delta and Borno. 25 participants from each of the 12 branches and 300 others were trained. (See table 1).

Impact

All School Unit leaders and 300 other people are now trained on First Aid, road safety and community-based health. There is an improvement in capacity within the schools and related communities to effectively prevent and manage accidents and to improve community-based health.

Expected Result 3: All the branches have established and benefited from community health services undertaken by the Mothers' Clubs

Progress

A total of 20 new Mothers Clubs (MCs) were formed each in Akwa-Ibom and Oyo State branches. The Clubs have started health education activities including sanitation, breast feeding, nutrition and oral rehydration salt preparation. The MCs in Anambra State branches were engaged in income generating activities such as soap and body-cream making.

A one-day orientation on WatSan projects was held for zonal officers, branch Secretaries, MCs' coordinators and facilitators of three identified project branches last December. Another survey was conducted and analyzed in 12 communities in Kwara, Enugu and Borno by a technical consultant. A report was delivered to the British Red Cross, the proposed donor.

Finally, the baseline and systematic formats for proper monitoring including reporting of MCs' activities were finalized and produced, and copies sent to branches for their input. A MC Manual will also be produced for members' use.

Impact

The Mothers Club members in Anambra, Akwa-Ibom and Oyo States branches participate in immunization exercises and health education, particularly, breast feeding. The women also meet their domestic needs through income-generating activities such as making and selling wheat flour, local beverages and soft furniture. They also organize snail farming.

HIV / AIDS Project

Expected Result 4: The Nigerian Red Cross has an increased capacity to effectively deliver assistance to vulnerable persons living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA) or persons affected by HIV/AIDS and reduce its spread.

Progress

A training-of-trainers (TOT) workshop for Home Based Care (HBC) Facilitators in 12 new project branches followed last year's assessment and advocacy visits. During this reporting period, the national society conducted training on Peer Education in the same branches. A total number of 36 participants comprising of the HIV/AIDS coordinators and two trainers, each from the 12 project branches, were trained. The 12 new branches include Cross River, Abia, Ondo, Bauchi, Kebbi, Plateau, Enugu, Gombe, Katsina, Abuja, Rivers and Oyo. A step-down training was also done for 1,320 peer educators, 110 per branch. The national society also conducted a one-day seminar on HIV/AIDS. For who? The national society developed a proposal on HIV/AIDS with the American Red Cross

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intending to scale – up the project in eight other states; Lagos, Abuja, Edo, Rivers, Anambra, Nassarawa, Kano and Bauchi.

Impact

According to a behavior change assessment undertaken by the national society, the 1,320 trained volunteers have reached more people, especially the youth, through the national society's projects of peer education, home-based care and counseling.

Polio Eradication Initiative (PEI)

Expected Result 1: Polio eradication in Nigeria by 2005 is attained through the NRCS' contributions.

The Nigerian Red Cross participated in the National Social Mobilization committee planning meeting in January and mobilized its volunteers in the 37 branches to join other organizations involved in the two rounds of immunization exercises in February and March this year. The event was flagged-off in Zamfara State where immunization exercise was not accepted last year. The national society took part in another round in April.

Impacts

1. More children were immunized during the exercises but the number will be determined after evaluation of reports.
2. The Nigeria Red Cross has contributed to the increased acceptance of the polio vaccine in Nigeria.

Other Activities

Sickle Cell Campaign (SCD)

The Nigerian Red Cross is implementing this new project with support from the British International School, Lagos. The national society conducted a two-day orientation and awareness seminar on the Sickle Cell Disease (SCD) for 25 School Unit coordinators in South West Ogun State branch.

Capacity Building and Networking

The Nigerian Red Cross has been in partnership with the Interagency Coordination Committee comprised of the National Programme on Immunization (NPI), WHO, UNICEF, Rotary and USAID. During the reporting period, the national society also participated in a number of workshop and meetings organized by FMOH and other agencies as well as attending meetings with the Government's National Action Committee on AIDS (NACA) to strengthen their collaboration.

The national society officers participated in a number of health meetings and workshops within and outside the country. The collaborative effort of the national society and the Federation in health projects increased through financial, technical and moral support to health programmes from the Federation's sub-regional office.

Impact

Collaboration and networking had been further strengthened due to the national society participation and involvement at various government and other stakeholders' meetings.

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Constraints

- More work needs to be done to improve branches' financial and narrative reporting and fund retirement skills. Volunteer mobility means that training has to be a continuous cycle.

Disaster Management

Goal: Vulnerable people receive sustainable, focused and responsive services.

Objective: The capacity of the Nigerian Red Cross to effectively respond to and prevent disasters is increased.

Expected Result 1: The vulnerability of disaster victims is reduced.

Progress

During the reporting period the Nigerian Red Cross responded to emergencies in Lagos, Oyo and Plateau States, and provided first aid assistance to 914 injured people and distributed food and non -food relief to over 90,000 displaced persons.

A meeting to review the contingency plan for a possible conflict and population movement in Bakassi was conducted. The national society has continued to improve and increase the capacity of its Emergency and First Aid Teams (EFAT) and staff for better service delivery to the vulnerable. It provided equipment for distribution to various EFAT. These items included goggles, hand gloves, bibs, nose masks, helmets and boots; 1,000 each. The national society made an assessment visit to Niger and Adamawa State branches in preparation for the training and establishment of EFAT.

Impact

The EFAT capacity has clearly increased as demonstrated during the crisis in Plateau and Kano States, where trained volunteers evacuated the wounded and assisted displaced persons in April.

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Constraint

Limited access to the coastal areas has hindered prompt delivery service to the Delta region. Further First Aid and disaster management training are also required to improve the team members' skills and to replace those on the move.

Expected Result 2: The efficiency and effectiveness of the Nigerian Red Cross emergency response is increased.

The Nigerian Red Cross disaster and preparedness team has networked with partners in Niger and Adamawa States and stakeholders such as the Nigeria Police, Federal Road Safety Commission (FRSC) and the National Union of Road Transport Workers for improved collaboration in emergencies.

Impact

Improved networking with governmental and non-governmental organizations had brought about a better service delivery to disaster victims. The national society also has better visibility for its role in disaster response.

Constraints

Assessment visits could not be carried out in Ebonyi and River State branches as planned due to other disaster interventions at the time.

Expected Result 3: The capacity of the vulnerable is strengthened Communities in Bakassi and Niger reviewed contingency plans which have been established for evacuating people in the event of conflict and population movement in Bakassi and some other communities in Nigeria and Cameroon.

Trained EFAT assisted over 914 injured disaster victims and supplied food and non-food materials to over 90,000 displaced people.

Impact

Trained EFAT volunteers effectively responded to emergencies in different parts of the country.

Organizational Development

Nigeria

Goal: Vulnerability of people has reduced due to an increased programme and services delivery capacity of the Nigerian Red Cross.

Objective: The Nigerian Red Cross capacity to provide sustainable, focused and responsive services to the vulnerable is improved

Expected Result 1: The managerial, technical and strategic planning skills of the headquarters staff and branches is enhanced.

Progress

The Nigerian Red Cross, with support from the Federation, provided basic office equipment and furniture to branches with few resources in order to improve their office management and reporting skills. The six branches were Kebbi, Kano, Ondo, Akwa-Ibom, Ebonyi and Kogi. The equipment provided included furniture and audio-visual equipment.

Seven branch Secretaries and Radio Operators/Secretaries received training in basic computer software and internet skills to improve communication and reporting. The Federation also provided seven each of the following

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items; desktop computer, printers and back up electrical generators to Kano, Kwara, Akwa-Ibom, Ekiti, Sokoto, Anambra, Gombe and Abuja (Federal Capital Territory) branches.

The national society Secretary General traveled to UK for a ten-week course on 'Working on Conflict'.

On-the-job training was given by the branch liaison officer and the OD delegate to the branch Secretaries of Edo, Enugu and Delta State branches to improve their management skills.

Impact

The national society branches have shown a remarkable improvement in office management and volunteer monitoring skills. Improved office facilities at the branch level enhanced staff and volunteers' motivation and thus improved performance. It has also improved branch visibility.

Constraints

Improved management and guidance is required from the headquarters and zonal officers to support and monitor branches. Zonal officers should work closely to improve their support towards developing the capacity of branch management.

Expected Result 2: The efficiency and integrity of the Leadership/Governance at all Levels in the National Society has increased

The Nigerian Red Cross held its 2003 Annual General Meeting in March this year and the national governance and all the 37 branch Chairmen or their representatives attended; the AGM was funded by the Federation. Issues discussed centered on the development of the national society. The national society president raised an integrity issue involving the Enugu State branch. An investigation committee, comprising the finance development delegate (as a technical adviser), was set up and the committee is expected to present its findings to the Central Council.

During the meeting, elections for Branch Executive Committees (BECs) in Benue, Bayelsa, Gombe, Ogun and Nassarawa State Branches were held in line with the national society's statutes.

Impact

There is an increased awareness on the roles of governance and management both at the national and branch levels. More and more branches now conduct elections of their governance in accordance with the national society's laid down regulations.

Constraints

- Some branches still failed to comply with the national society's electoral guidelines when conducting elections.
- The Kaduna State branch still has a strained relationship between its governance and management.

Expected Result 3: The national society has improved its ability to develop, manage and retain volunteers.

Progress

In February, 27 young people were trained in Lagos as HIV/AIDS peer educators in the Global Youth Awareness Programme (GYAP). In March, a youth from the Lagos State branch of the Nigerian Red Cross was a guest of the Merseyside branch of the British Red Cross for a two-week GYAP programme. While there, she shared knowledge and experience with 700 youths on global issues and culture from her own perspective. Furthermore, two youths from the national society along with other young people from the country traveled to Dakar, Senegal, for the Pan African Youth Forum on HIV/AIDS.

The vocational training centre in the Katsina State branch secured additional funding support from the Katsina State Government to sustain its Youth Empowerment Project, which was first financed with the Empress Shokan Fund.

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Impact

The youth programmes conducted during the reporting period increased the quality of volunteers and members. Participation of young people in international programmes also increased their knowledge of global issues.

Constraints

The branches are finding it difficult to retain volunteers/members. The national society encouraged its branches to motivate volunteers with non-monetary incentives as a means of retention.

Expected Result 4: The national society's financial and resource development is broadened and improved

Progress

The Federation's finance development delegate helped the national society to produce financial procedures. With financial support from the British Red Cross, activities for computerization of the headquarters' finance office have started.

The sales of branded souvenirs made a return of about CHF 53,577 during the period. In addition, a special fund raising event named "Give Love" to support PLWHA yielded CHF 30,880. First Aid training and services have continued to provide income for the national society.

Impacts

Impact on the performance of the computerized financial system at the headquarters is being assessed.

Constraints

The Nigerian Red Cross is required to enhance local resource generation means and partnership with commercial organizations to generate needed funds. Branches need to increase their efforts at membership drives and mobilization.

Humanitarian Values

Nigeria

Goal: The humanitarian values embedded in the Red Cross Movement are widely shared, understood leading to increased tolerance, mutual understanding and respect of human being in Nigeria

Objective: The Nigerian Red Cross capacity to promote the Red Cross Fundamental Principles and Humanitarian value is increased

Expected Result 1: There is greater understanding of humanitarian values and of the Movement's Fundamental Principles within the national society

Progress

The Nigerian Red Cross ensured adequate information flow of its activities and lectures on International Humanitarian Laws (IHL) to police officers, armed forces and the media. The national society carried out an advocacy campaign on the emblem to the public and organized media coverage of important Red Cross events including dissemination and tracing activities. Furthermore, the national society in collaboration with the ICRC, began to run workshops for 37 branch Secretaries, information advisers and coordinators on information dissemination. This programme was concluded in the three northern zones of the country.

Expected Result 2: The national society has an enhanced profile and image as a national humanitarian organization.

Progress

The Nigerian Red Cross and Nestle-sponsored HIV/AIDS information booklets are still in high public demand. A 35- page information booklet on the national society's history and a new edition of News-Magazine have also

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been produced and distributed to stakeholders. The national society has also packaged a week long series of activities to commemorate the birth of the Red Cross Founder, Jean Henri Dunant on 8 May during the Red Cross Day.

Expected Result 3: Branch commitment to tracing activities has increased

Progress

The Nigerian Red Cross with branch support intensified its tracing activities.

Impact: The Nigerian Red Cross information dissemination, publicity, advocacy and tracing activities have promoted its profile. The humanitarian values of the Movement are also better appreciated in the country.

Coordination, Cooperation and Strategic Partnerships

Goal: Focused development and management of agreements, MOU, CAS and other coordination mechanisms are achieved

Objectives: The Federation's Lagos sub-regional office works with the national society, the ICRC and other partners to develop regional meetings

Expected Result 1: The national societies in the Lagos sub-region increased their capacity to work with their partners.

Progress

The fourth Lagos Region and Technical Group meeting for health, information and disaster preparedness (DP) was held from 29-30 April 2004 in Accra, Ghana. Presidents and Secretary Generals of Benin, Ghana, Nigeria and Togo along with focal technical officers for health, DP and information attended the two-day meeting. The Regional Head of Office, Health Delegate and OD delegate represented the Federation's Lagos office at the meeting in which ideas on regional experiences in the areas of health, information and DP were shared.

The meeting resolved the following:

- To exchange existing Mothers' Clubs guidelines in the sub-region and to prepare and produce workable guidelines for the next meeting in Lagos in August 2004. A draft data base for DP activities prepared by the DP Office of the Togolese Red Cross has been circulated. The national societies are expected to complete the data and make it available for the next meeting. Communication and exchange of information on activities has been stressed. The national societies are to submit their activity reports for the regional news bulletin by end of May 2004.

The Federation office hosted 'West and Central Africa Partnership' meeting which was held from 1-3 March in Accra, Ghana. The office also hosted Ghana Partnership seminar on 4 March in Accra to map out a strategy for resolving the organizational and financial crisis of the Ghana Red Cross. Delegates of the Lagos office visited programmes in Nigeria, Togo and Ghana. The health delegate met with partners at different levels.
